## Sesquicentennial event not slated with library's

The community's major event to observe Texas' Sesquicentennial celebration will still be held Mar. 2 at the Tom L. Burnett Memorial Library, but it will not be held in conjunction with the library's formal dedication, it was disclosed Tuesday.

Mayor Tim Hunter, who is involved with both events, told the Sesquicentennial committee the library date had been changed to Mar. 15, in order for special guests to be able to attend.

However, members of the local committee decided to proceed with the project of burial of a time capsule Mar. 2, because it is Texas Independence Day.

The capsule, which will measure 44x17x17, will be buried on the east side of the circle drive, and be marked by an aluminum plaque to be opened on the same date in 2035.

Because the capsule has such a large capacity, all residents, churches and organizations are being encouraged to submit items to be included.

Mrs. Keith Aulds, who is heading the effort to attract participation, said she has contacted virtually every organization in the community to get

items for the capsule.

She suggested people could write letters to their relatives, both known and unknown, that pictures, publications and other items would be of interest 50 years from now.

The capsule, being donated by Tanner-Aulds Funeral Home, will weigh 1,000 pounds and presented the committee a minor problem about how it would be handled from the time it was received and when it is buried.

Items to be submitted by individuals, organizations, etc. should be taken to the Chamber of Commerce office, where they will be kept until the capsule is ready for burial.

Part of the program prior to burial will be a flag ceremony by various youth groups, the singing of "Texas Our Texas," comments about the community's history, and inclusion of a register which is to be signed by everyone attending, and placed in the capsule.

Mayor Hunter said the upstairs of the library will be used for the ceremony, should weather not permit an outdoor gathering.

## Board sets election, buys band uniforms

Iowa Park school trustees Tuesday night called an election April 5 to fill three positions on the board, approved purchase of new uniforms for the high school band, and extended contracts for key personnel.

Terms expire this spring for two board members, and the third will be to complete a term.

Trustees Jimmy Howell, place four on the board, and Rusty Rusk, place five, expire this spring. Candidates for those two positions will be elected to three-year terms.

Place one, filled by Jerald Brown after the death of Ray Hicks, will be on the ballot, with the successful candidates to be elected to complete the two years remaining.

Trustees expressed approval both of the sample uniforms they saw, as well as the low bid, submitted by Fruhauf, which came in about \$14,-

000 under the anticipated amount.

Total price for 130 new uniforms, which included two pairs of pants, was \$31,887. High bid was \$36,223.

Board members held approval of bids for new band instruments, pending inspection of the instruments to determine if they meet specifications.

A discussion was held about whether the \$14,000 saved on uniforms might be put with the \$10,000 already budgeted for instruments, to buy instruments anticipated needed as the band continues to grow.

Contracts were extended another year for the assistant superintendent, principals and assistant principal, tax collector and counselors. All were at the same salary level of this year.

Athletic director David Baugh's contract was also extended a year, but the motion on his contract included a \$2,500 bonus for the current year, and it was approved.

The votes came after a 58-minute executive session.

Board approval was given to hiring Janice Vickers as a junior high school aide.

Two votes concerning construction of additional classrooms at Kidwell Elementary were approved. One was to reschedule the contractors' bid opening to 2 p.m. Feb. 25. The other was to approve prevailing wage rates for the area, which must be used by the contractors.

During his report to the board concerning tax collections, Allen Shewmake said 92 percent of the current rolls had been collected by Feb. 4. This was the same as last year, but collections were \$837,615, higher than the \$628,790 collected at the same percentage last year, he said.

Shewmake warned the board that taxes would be a prime issue next year. He said experts were estimating oil production values would drop at least 25 percent for next year, and at the same time oil prices were also at a 10-year low.

Trustees approved a proposal by Supt. Glen Mitchell, to change the March board meeting to the 18th,

because the regular date, the 11th, conflicted with spring break.

## Streets identified for project

Continuing a policy they set last year, city aldermen Monday night approved a list of streets to be worked on this year.

A priority list was submitted by administrator James Barrington and superintendent Mike Price, including one group of unpaved streets to be upgraded to all-weather, and another group to be sealcoated.

Estimated cost of this year's work was set at \$34,246, all of which will be paid for from the city's sales tax receipts.

Streets to be surfaced with crushed rock include: blocks 500-700 of E. Lafayette; 400 block of S. Hawthorne; 400 block of S. Penn; 100 block of S. Saratoga; 100 block of N. Saratoga; 500 block of N. Penn and 400 block of W. Jefferson.

Streets to be sealcoated will include the following blocks: 100-400 S. Jackson; 300-1100 S. Texowa; 300-1000 E. Cash; 100-1000 E. Ruby; 100-1500 N. Victoria; 100-400 S. Colorado; 100-700 E. Jefferson; 200-700 W. Clara; 100-400 W. Ruby; 100 N. Texowa; 100-200 W. Smith; 300-400 W. Daisy, and 400-500 W. Chestnut.

Price said the all-weather work could be commenced as soon as materials were on hand. The sealcoating work, however, will have to wait until temperatures improve for that type of work.

In other business, aldermen gave final approval to a revised plat of Shiloh Four, approved sale of surplus property, approved a request to use right-of-way for a church's parking, approved the purchase of a new computer, and also approved a designated space for parking at city hall for the handicapped.

## Iowa Park man shot by would-be robber

An Iowa Park man was shot and wounded early Friday morning when he interrupted a robbery in progress at a convenience store.

Charles Childs, 44, said yesterday he hopes to return to his job by tomorrow, but admitted to still being extremely sore.

Childs, an employee of Wonder Bread, was making a delivery at the Gulf Mini Mart on Hutton Road, on the southeast side of Wichita Falls, about 4:40 a.m., when he saw the robbery in progress.

The robber, according to Childs, marched the store attendant out to Childs' truck, where he was still sitting, and at the point of his gun forced him out onto the driveway.

As the trio began walking back to the store's front door, Childs said the bandit demanded the building's keys, which the attendant attempted

to explain he did not have.

The robber retorted he would just have to kill them, then.

Childs said he didn't doubt the man's intentions, because he said the man was acting crazy and had a wild look in his eyes.

So he made a grab for the gun. The robber jerked clear and fired, striking the Iowa Parkan in the leg.

Childs said he started running and heard the gun go off again. "I kept expecting to feel the sting of pain," he recalled. "I can't figure how he missed me, at such close range."

As Childs ran, so did the store clerk, leaving the robber standing alone in the light. He is believed to have panicked and began running himself, in the opposite direction.

Childs said the store attendant saw a vehicle drive from behind the store, seeing only brake lights, but he was sure the robber had not had time to reach the car when he saw it leaving.

Police reportedly conducted a lengthy search for the robber, but as yet have not found him.

He was described as in his late 20s, about 170 pounds, long dark hair and wearing a dark jacket.

Childs was taken to Wichita General Hospital for treatment, where it was learned the bullet had passed through the fleshy part of his leg, missing bone, muscle and arteries.

He was discharged later that morning and has been recovering in his home.

## Elderly man is charged

For the second consecutive week, a man has been charged with a sex offense against a juvenile.

Wichita County deputies served a warrant issued by the Iowa Park Police Dept. Tuesday on 68-year-old Robert Benjamin Payne of Wichita Falls. He is charged with "indecentness with a child" after a complaint was filed Monday.

Last week, officers arrested James Wofford Jenkins, 54, on two charges of aggravated sexual assault of a juvenile girl.

Police were also kept busy this week investigating a rash of tire slashings, involving five vehicles.

Police began receiving complaints Saturday morning, and the last the following day.

Tires were reported slashed at 104 Westview, 100 E. Diamond, 507 N. Second, 112 Westview and 101 Westview.

Investigation into the slashings continues.

When aldermen voted to approve a handicapped parking space at city hall, Mayor Tim Hunter emphasized the space could not be used, at any time during regular work hours, by any employee of the city.

Additional storage buildings are planned, under new ownership, and an arrangement with the present owners for access, not meeting the required space since two dedicated streets by the tract are not open, does not meet the code.

were a proposal to permit an additional water tap on a line on Coleman Road and the Cub Scouts wanting to meet at the south fire station.

Mayor Hunter recalled the council was concerned about the last tap approved on the Coleman Road water line, which was the thirteenth.

The line is only two inches, which is supposed to have a capacity to serve only eight taps. Also the line is not looped.

The city will contact customers along the line, who are actually the owners, not the city, to determine if they want to upgrade the size and also loop it.

## Candidate filing changes could cause confusion

Some changes in deadlines for filing of candidates in city and school elections this year may lead to confusion.

It was pointed out by city and school officials that though both will hold elections the same date, April 5, deadline for candidates to file are not the same, as they have been in the past.

Deadline to file for a place on the city ballot is Feb. 19, according to Administrator James Barrington.

Deadline to file for a place on the school ballot is Mar. 5, Glen Mitchell, superintendent, said.

There are three places to be voted on in this year's city election: the mayor and two aldermen.

Tim Hunter has already filed for another term as mayor. Bud Mercer is also seeking re-election as alderman.

Bud Burch, who was appointed to fill Don Decker's vacated seat, has also filed for a place on the ballot.

Only those three candidates had filed by late yesterday afternoon.

Though the school board called its election only Tuesday night, one candidate has already turned in his application for a place on that ballot.

Gary Fielding filed as a candidate for Place One on the board. Place One was held by the late Ray Hicks, and Jerald Brown was appointed to fill his unexpired term.

Two other places on the board, Place Four, held by Jimmy Howell, and Place 5, held by Rusty Rusk, are also up for election.

As of late yesterday afternoon, only one other request for application to file had been requested, Mitchell said.



## Club tours museum

The members of the 23 Study Club toured the Wichita Falls Museum Thursday afternoon for a program of slides and narration presented by Peter La Paglia, curator.

One of the highlights of the program was showing some of the 50 prize winning photographs of the White House News Photographers Association, formed in June 1921, during the administration of President Warren G. Harding. Since then the original association of 17 photographers has grown to more than 400 men and women who take assignments around the world.

The curator showed slides depicting what museums once were like and what they are becoming now. These revealed that they were once housed in damp, dingy basements with displays consisting of family collections housed in rows of glass cases. "With the 20th century space flights creating news stories, exhibits are becoming larger, thus necessitating larger museums to house larger exhibits," he remarked.

He continued to say that artifacts are major factors of any museum, and that dust, humidity, proper lighting,

internal theft are just a few of the problems a museum has to address in insuring proper care of items on view to the public.

La Paglia stated that he had just acquired a quilt which had been made for sharing at the Texas Centennial, and that a future quilt show is being planned to coincide with the Texas Sesquicentennial at which time early Texas quilts will be on view.

Mrs. C.L. Metz served as program coordinator. Following the program, club members enjoyed a Dutch treat at Braum's.

Before going to the museum, members met at Texas Electric Reddy Room for a business session directed by Mrs. Keith Aulds.

Mrs. John Rentschler, chairman of the committee to purchase a gift for the Burnett Memorial Library, stated that an oil painting by Charlene Metz Tate of a Southern Colonial Mansion in New Orleans will be presented to the library.

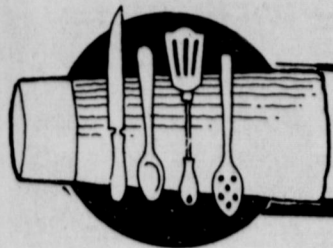

## Cook of the Week

The hardest thing about cooking is planning meals so there is a variety in a family's diet, according to Betsy (Mrs. Bill) Hendrickson, this week's cook.

Betsy said she tries to cook different kinds of dishes so she won't get stuck in a "cooking rut."

When she and her husband, Bill, were married eight years ago, Betsy says that she had never cooked before and was convinced that Bill would starve to death before she learned.

But, with the help of her sister and a lot of patience, she turned into quite a cook, even experimenting and concocting her own recipes.

The couple now have a two-year old son, Tyler, and try to expose him to healthy foods, especially fresh fruits and vegetables.

The Hendricksons moved here at the first of the year from Pittsburg, Pa., and brought with them some recipes that warrant trying. Among them are cheesed cauliflower and harmonist stew.

Betsy is a trained dental assistant, but at this time prefers to be at home with their son.

1 bay leaf  
1 Tbs. salt  
1 tsp. sugar  
1/2 tsp. pepper  
1/2 tsp. paprika  
8 carrots, sliced  
8 potatoes, cubed

### SPAETZELS

2 eggs  
pinch of salt  
1/2 cup flour  
water to thin  
Flour and brown meat in oil. Add onions, cook briefly. Add meat and onions to large pot containing hot water and seasonings. Add carrots, cook 2 hours, then add potatoes and cook 45 minutes longer. Add spaetzels and cook (covered) for 15 minutes.  
Spaetzels: Beat eggs with salt. Add flour (enough to make a thick paste). Stir well. Add water to thin (until it is the consistency of thin pancake batter). Pour mixture through slotted spoon into bubbling stew. Cover and cook 15 minutes.

### EASY CHICKEN AND GRAVY

1/2 stick margarine  
1 medium onion-sliced  
4-8 boneless chicken breasts  
1 can cream of chicken soup  
pepper  
In large skillet saute' onion in margarine. Add chicken and cook until firm. Mix soup and 3/4 can water, pour over chicken. Sprinkle with pepper, cover and simmer 45 min. to 1 hour. Serve with mashed potatoes.

### HARMONIST STEW (with spaetzels)

Flour  
1 1/2 - 2 lbs. stew beef, cut in 1" peices  
vegetable oil  
1 medium onion, chopped fine  
7 cups hot water  
1 1/2 Tbs. lemon juice  
2 tsp. worcestshire sauce

**FLANK STEAK ORIENTAL**  
1 flank steak (1 1/2 lbs.)  
meat tenderizer  
1 Tbs. cornstarch  
3 Tbs. soy sauce  
3 Tbs. vegetable oil

1 sliced onion  
1 sliced green pepper  
1 can bean sprouts drained-reserve liquid.  
Chow mein noodles - large can  
Slice flank steak thinly across the grain. Sprinkle with meat tenderizer and let sit 10 minutes.

Mix cornstarch and soy sauce in large bowl. Add meat and stir till well coated. Let sit 10 minutes.  
In large frying pan put oil and fry onion and green pepper rapidly. (do not brown them, but keep crisp) Remove vegetables. Add more oil if necessary and stir-fry meat until thoroughly browned. Return peppers and onion to pan and add drained bean sprouts. Heat over low heat a few minutes, adding liquid if necessary. Serve over chow mein noodles. Serves 4.

### CHEESED CAULIFLOWER

1 medium head cauliflower  
1/2 cup mayonnaise  
2 tsp. yellow mustard  
3/4 cup sharp cheddar cheese, grated salt  
Remove leaves, trip base and wash cauliflower. Cook whole in

boiling, salted water 15 to 20 minutes until tender. Drain. Place in baking dish, sprinkle with salt. Mix mayonnaise and mustard, spread over cauliflower. Top with cheese, bake at 375 10 minutes or till cheese is melted. Serves 4 or 5.

### BROCCOLI CASSEROLE

2 pkgs. frozen shpped broccoli, cooked and drained  
1 can cream of mushroom soup  
2 eggs  
4 oz. sharp cheese, grated  
3/4 cup mayonnaise  
1 small onion, chopped  
1/2 cup Ritz cracker crumbs  
Mix all ingredients except cracker crumbs. Pour into a square, well-buttered baking dish. Sprinkle top with crumbs and dot with butter. Bake at 350 for 30 minutes. Serves 6.

### FRUIT DESSERT

2 cups graham cracker crumbs  
1 stick margarine  
1/2 cup granulated sugar  
8 oz. cream cheese  
2 Tbs. mild  
1 cup confectioner's sugar  
1 pkg. dreamwhip  
1 cup water  
1 cup sugar  
2 Tbs. cornstarch  
1 pkg. (small) strawberry jello  
1 qt. fresh strawberries, cleaned and sliced

**Crust:** Blend cracker crumbs, margarine, and granulated sugar (1/2 cup). Spread in a 9" X 12" pan and bake at 350 for 10-12 minutes. Cool.

**Cream filling:** Blend cream cheese and milk, then fold in confectioner's sugar. Prepare dream whip as directed and fold into cheese mixture. Spread cream cheese filling over cooled crust.

**Strawberry topping:** Cook water, sugar, and cornstarch until thick. Remove from heat and stir jello into it until jello dissolves. Add sliced strawberries. Pour on top of cream cheese filling and refrigerate until jelled. Any fruit may be used with this. Serves 12.

The Friendly Door Senior Citizens will sponsor a dance, open to the public, from 7 to 10 p.m. Friday at the ASCS building.

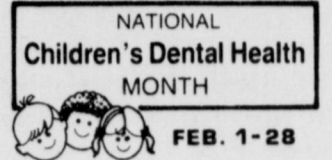

# Iowa Park has twin city

Iowa Park now has a sister city, in Australia, and residents are being encouraged to correspond with those of the community "down under."

The twinning of Iowa Park and Kimba is a project of the local Sesquicentennial committee. Kimba is celebrating its 150th anniversary, as is Texas.

In response to a letter written by Dee Blackwell, Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce secretary, the following letter was received:

Dear Dee,

I have been given your name by our Ms. Libby Ellis of the South Australia Jubilee 150 Board. She was acting following a request from your Glen Hartman of Austin, Texas, to whom you wrote on July 8th 1985 seeking information regarding the twinning of Iowa Park with a South Australia town.

I understand that you should now be in receipt of an introductory letter from Ms. Ellis.

We have for some time been attempting to be twinned with a Texas town, and although our local school is linked with Austwell-Tivoli I believe that communications have been rather lax. We are therefore keen to be twinned with your town/city.

Perhaps a little information about Kimba would be of interest.

Kimba is a rural town about 500 km north-west of South Australia's state capital, Adelaide and situated on the main highway linking the east and west coasts of Australia. No doubt small by US standards, the town is typical of many such South Australian country settlements with a town population of 900 residents and a further 900 people living within the District Council boundaries. The Kimba area covers a vast expanse, with our closest town (Cleve) being 72 km south. There are no towns to the north before Coober Pedy, an

opal mining township 800 km away.

The area is fully dependant on rural activities, primarily that of cereal growing, predominantly wheat and barley. Sheep and pigs are also farmed, generally as a secondary line to cropping and there are a few farmers that run some beef cattle. The average farm would be between 2,500 and 5,000 acres in area. Immediately to the north and east of Kimba, farming country makes way for the beginning of Australia's huge pastoral runs where one man's station (farm) may consist of many thousand square kilometres.

Within the Kimba District Council area there are four main Communities. Buckleboo to the north, Kelly to the south/east, Waddikee to the south/west and the township of Kimba. The former three outlying areas were established many years ago (pre-1920), and although they like to retain their separate identities, all residents regard Kimba as being the "hub" of the District.

The populace is served by the following business houses: 2 banks, 3 general stores, 2 hair dressers, 2 garages, 5 farm machinery dealers, 2 drapery and dress shops, 1 electrical and gift store, 1 hardware store, chemist, dry cleaner, 2 road-houses, 2 stock agents, Community Hotel/Motel, a modern hospital and currently 2 doctors, together with associated essential services e.g. police, post office, ambulance, fire and emergency rescue services.

Service Clubs are very active in the area viz. Rural Youth, Apex, Lions, Hospital Auxiliary, Church groups, together with an assortment of sporting clubs in Australian Rules Football, cricket, bowls, basketball, swimming, netball, vintage cars etc. We also have a very active Historical Society.

Kimba has a modern, well equipped Area School of some 350 stu-

dents ranging from year 1 (5 years old) to year 11 (15-16 years old). Unfortunately the final year of schooling, matriculation is not as yet available and students wishing to complete this have to study elsewhere.

I trust that this very brief resume gives you a slight insight into our Community and hope that you may be interested in continuing our correspondence. If so, please respond as soon as possible in order that I can arrange for the initial exchange of ideas and information between our residents. I envisage that should you register your interest with us that I can co-opt many of our residents, of various ages, occupations and interests to regularly contribute to this exercise.

I eagerly await your responses and look forward to your furnishing similar information regarding Iowa Park to that I have outlined about Kimba.

# Lady Hawks bow 47-40 to Bowie in finale

Basketball season ended abruptly Saturday night for the Lady Hawks in Archer City, where they lost a play-off to Bowie for second place in Dist. 5-AAA and a ticket into the bi-district playoffs.

Iowa Park never adjusted to the officiating, which differs from one game to the next, depending on those calling the game. The Lady Hawks were called for 36 fouls and four starters were on the bench when the final buzzer sounded.

So, by virtue of their 47-40 win, the girls from Bowie advance into the playoffs along with the champions from Vernon, the defending state champion team.

Bowie started off with the hot hand, leading 6-0 before Cindy Clanton sank a free shot to get Iowa Park on the scoreboard with only 2:55 remaining in the opening period, which ended 9-4 in Bowie's favor.

But the Lady Hawks rallied in the second quarter, narrowing the margin to 18-21 by the half.

Going into the final frame trailing 25-33, Iowa Park narrowed the lead to five points with 1:31 left on the clock.

But seconds later, Lisa Selby joined Lori Allen, Laura Parker and Crystal Lewis on the bench via the foul route. Bowie had lost only one player, a reserve, and the advantage was all Bowie's.

However, Clanton narrowed the difference to five points again, 39-44, but with 19 seconds remaining, too short a period for Iowa Park to pull the game out of the fire.

Selby hit eight points in the fourth quarter to finish with 11 points before being benched. Clanton had nine.

Bowie was outscored from the field, 11-16, but hit 25 of 47 attempts from the charity line to make the score's difference. Iowa Park players sank only eight of 20 free shots, many of them the front of one-and-one opportunities.

"I was very disappointed in our play," Coach Ray Sefcik said. "I felt we were beaten by an inferior team. We fouled too much and never adjusted to the officiating.

Though his team finished with a

16-8 record and was second behind Vernon in the first half of the round robin district schedule, Sefcik said this was "...the most disappointing season I've ever coached. I just wasn't able to get out of the team what I should with the material I had to work with."

"But we've got two back from

the varsity to start all over again next year," Sefcik commented. He was referring to junior Wendy Trantham and sophomore Lori Allen.

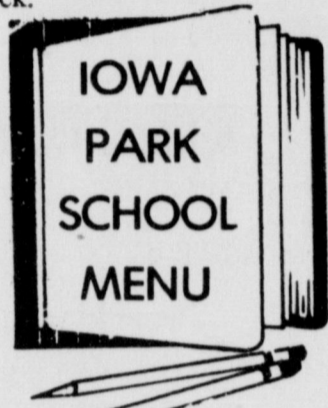

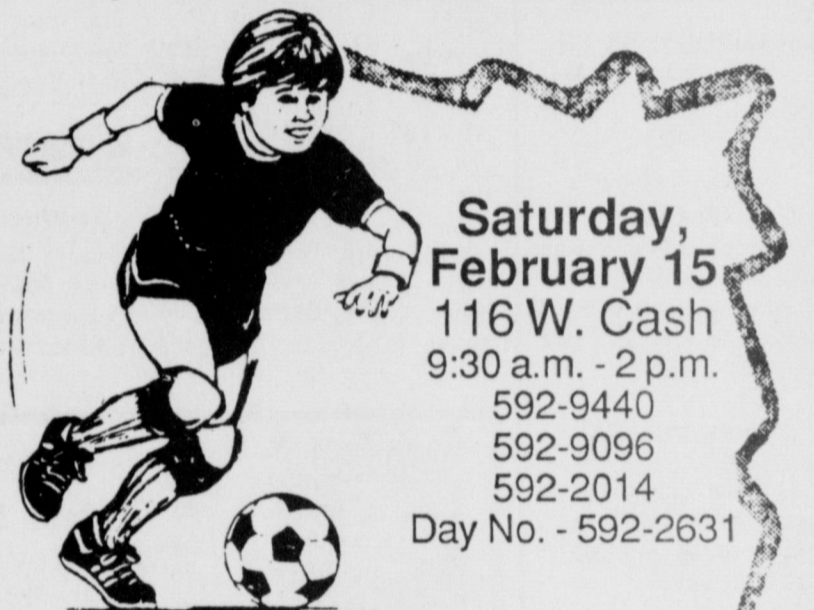

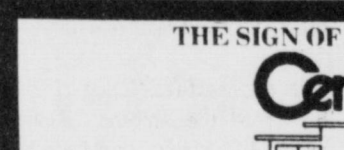
