Council to discuss second cable service

US 287 west due repairs

Motorists who travel US 287 between Iowa Park and Vernon will soon have better pavement to drive on, thanks to a project approved in February by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

The contract for the highway work was awarded to Forby Contracting, Inc., at their low bid of \$144,076.

Dale Terry, public affairs officer for the highway department in Wichita Falls, said the project extended from Loop 370 at Iowa Park northwestward to the Wilbarger County line, a distance of about 16 miles. Terry said the work consisted primarily of repairing the existing concrete pavement.

Delinquent taxpayer facing increased cost

The cost of not paying one's taxes has increased considerably, with changes dictated by the state. And some 20 property owners in the Iowa Park school district are facing suits which could prove expensive.

Local tax collector Allen Shewmake said the cost of filing a suit and serving the papers has risen from a fee of \$48 last year, to \$133.

But the fee increases to \$176 if the property taxed has lien holders or if both husband and wife must be served, Shewmake said.

Iowa Park schools and city are both represented by former county attorney Harold Lerew, in collections of delinquent taxes.

He said Tuesday he is preparing 20 suits for taxes owed for 1984 and 1985. State law specifies 1985 taxes

said the firm, which operates the cable franchise in Wichita Falls, has been invited to meet with the council when it convenes at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Iowa Park is currently served by TCI, with district offices in Burkburnett. However, state law reportedly does not permit municipalities to give exclusive franchises to any utilities for operating in a city.

Also on the tentative agenda are:

* consider adopting an ordinance to update the current plumbing code;

* discussion of the third phase for renovating city hall, primarily whether the council wants to retain

an old storage building attached to the east wall;

* take action on accepting construction by Texas Fence Company of a fence built around the new public works site on Kamay Road;

* discuss what type of surfacing is to be used on the parking lot being cleared across the street from city hall;

* and discuss applications by the city for a community development block grant.

Though the school board usually meets the second Tuesday of each month, this month's meeting was postponed until Mar. 18.

Annual Project Show slated this Saturday

The annual Iowa Park FFA and 4-H Project Show will be held Saturday at the FFA Barn on E. Ruby.

This year's event is co-sponsored by the Wichita County Young Farm-

ers and Iowa Park MuleSkinners.

Beginning at 9 a.m. will be judging of poultry and rabbits, followed by goats, market lambs, market swine and steers.

Lamb and swine divisions are the largest in numbers of entries, with approximately 45 lambs and 70 swine.

Judging the show will be Merkel Vocational Agriculture teacher J.T. Naron.

The youth will be competing for trophies and prize money.

In the past, the Project Show has been a tuneup for local entrants for the Wichita County Junior Livestock Show, as the animals were, for the most part, taken directly from here to Wichita Falls.

But with restrictions set by the school reform bill on students missing school, the county show has taken a new format this year.

Horses will be judged at the 4-H Barn on Midwestern Parkway next Thursday night, Friday evening will be poultry judging, starting at 7.

Rabbit judging will be the following Saturday morning, lambs at 1 p.m., and hogs that evening.

Goats and steers will be judged Sunday afternoon, and the premium sale the evening of Mar. 17.

City purchases block of land

The city council voted Friday to purchase an entire block of undeveloped land, to be used either by the city or clear it for other uses.

Aldermen purchased Block 31 of the Texas Addition, a tree-covered area between Third and Fourth streets, from Mrs. Ed Schildt of Wichita Falls.

The parcel of almost six acres was recently appraised at \$65,000, but the purchase price agreed by the council was \$38,000, plus closing costs.

The payment is to come from the city's water and sewer surplus fund, Administrator James Barrington told the council.

Noting the city does not own a major parcel of land which could be developed into a civic center, Mayor Tim Hunter said the land has "a lot of potential for several uses," mentioning the possibility of commercial use.

The block is across Fourth Street west from land cleared of a home which permitted extension of Fourth from Van Horn to West Highway.

Barrington said yesterday that the purchase contract was signed Monday.

Pair arrested for possession

An Iowa Park couple was picked up Monday on a charge of possession of drug paraphernalia and a man was charged Friday for driving while intoxicated.

Bennett M. and Bernice M. Brookshire were arrested in the 700 block of West Magnolia, when several drug items were found in their vehicle, according to the police blotter.

Bernice Brookshire resisted arrest and an additional charge of disorderly conduct was placed against her.

Both pled guilty yesterday in municipal court and paid a fine on each charge.

William Eugene Vancamp, 40, was taken into custody at 1:24 a.m. Friday near the intersection of US 287 and Pacific. After being charged with DWI, he was turned over to the Wichita County Sheriff's Department.

Dedication of the new Tom L. Burnett Memorial Library is slightly more than a week away, and plans are being finalized for the event.


Dedication is to be made a week from Saturday, and will be highlighted by a barbeque lunch prepared and served by the Iowa Park MuleSkinners.

Efforts underway to attract bluebirds to Iowa Park area

Mrs. Sam Hunter presented a slide program, prepared recently by the North American Bluebird Society, Thursday evening for a meeting of the Lioness Club held at the Lions building. The hostesses were Mrs. Keith Aulds and Mrs. Homer Blalock.

The film showed the efforts that are being made to keep the bluebirds from becoming extinct and to bring them back to the areas, including the Iowa Park area. It was noted that one of the best ways to attract the birds is to develop bird trails in open and short grass areas and provide proper nesting houses for them along the trails.

The film also gave information about the houses best suited for the birds which have openings of one and

a half inches to keep other birds out, and the control of predators.

Mrs. Hunter said there were three types of bluebirds: mountain, western and eastern and that the last type were the ones that are seen in this area. She said that five bluebird trails have already been developed in the Iowa Park area and that two or three more would be developed within the next few weeks. She showed one of the cedar houses made to specifications that are placed along the trails.

Preceding the program Mrs. V.I. Woodfin gave the meditation on "Love Shaved Through". For roll call, members named their favorite birds.

There are many exciting new things happening at our library in the month of March. The regularly scheduled Supplementary Tutorial Program for students grades 1-6 will continue. Students grades 1-3 meet on Thursday afternoons from 5 until 6 o'clock. Students grades 4-6 meet on Tuesday afternoons from 4:30 - 5:30. This is a service of the Tom Burnett Memorial Library, but students are asked to provide their own study material.

Just a reminder to library patrons. The Library hours are: Monday - closed; Tuesdays and Thursdays, 12:00 - 8:00; Wednesdays and Fridays, 10:00 - 4:00; and Saturdays, 9:00 - 1:00.

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
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As I See It....

At a location 3.5 miles southwest of Burk Burnett, R.W. Darden has finaled a new oil producer in the Wichita Regular Field.

The well is designated as the No. 45 J.E. Roller "A", pumping at the rate of 19 barrels per day.

Location is in the CTRR Survey, A-50. Bottomed at 1,268 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Cisco Sand Formation, 1,107 to 1,109 feet into the hole.

Drillsite is 150 feet from the north line and 664 feet from the east line of the survey.

The same operator has given up on his efforts to make producers out of the Nos. 39, 40 & 41 W. F. George. Each was a developmental try in the Wichita Regular Field. The locations were about four miles southwest of Burk Burnett. Spudded in Jan. of this year, the wells had reached total depths of 1,520, 824 and 704 feet, respectively.

No. 39 location was 4,579 feet from the north line and 600 feet from the east line of th L. B. Taliferro Survey. No. 40 was 3,551 feet from the north line and 1,035 feet from the east line and No. 41 was 3,904 feet from the north line and 1,035 feet from the east line of the same survey.

Monroe Well Service of Wichita Falls has filed first production figures on three new wells in the Wichita Regular Field. The Nos. 8, 9 & 12 Elsea-DFS "198" showed combined potential to make 17 barrels per day.

Drillsites are about 3.5 miles northwest of Burk Burnett in the RRVL Subdivision, Blk. 88.

The wells will produce from perforations in the Gunsight Sand Formation, ranging from 1,665 to 1,722 feet into the wellbore. Total depths were 1,771, 1,783 and 1,783 feet, respectively.

Drillsite of the No. 8 well is 7090 feet from the south line and 350 feet from the west line and No. 9 is 600 feet from the south line and 1,000 feet from the west line of lease. No. 12 location is 1,000 feet from the south line and 803 feet from the east line of the lease.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 61 S. M. Daniels, a 2,000-ft.

developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field. The operation will be located four miles southeast of Burk Burnett in a 250-acre lease in the H. Hastie Survey, A-99. The operator is F. T. Felty of Burk Burnett.

Location is 4,220 feet from the south line and 2,200 feet from the east line of the survey.

The No. 6 Perkins "Sherry-Kim", a 1,825-ft. developmental well, is scheduled to be drilled in Wichita County's KMA Field. Bentley & Laing of Wichita Falls is the operator. The well will be located in a 100-acre lease four miles northeast of Kamay in the H. B. Balch Survey, A-12.

Drillsite is 6,545 feet from the south line and 1,900 feet from the west line of the survey.

Two 5,500-ft. developmental wells are planned by Quintin Little Co. of Ardmore, Okla., at drillsites about eight miles southeast of Iowa Park. The locations are in a 40-acre lease in the Denton CSL Survey, A-57. Wells' designations are the No. 4 L. R. Monaghan and the No. 3 R. B. Sisk. They are in the Daves Field.

The Monaghan well is located 467 feet from the north line and 600 feet from the west line of the survey. The Sisk well is 520 feet from the north line and 467 feet from the west line of the survey.

Monroe Well Service has filed for permit to drill the No. 32 Bickley-SLA, a 1,999-ft. developmental well three miles northeast of Electra.

Location is in a 95-acre lease in the Wichita Regular Filed, C&MRR Survey, A-594.

Drillsite is 1,065 feet from the north line and 665 feet from the east line of the survey.

The Wichita Regular Field gained a new producer when McCormick-Gordon completed the No. 2 Boyd-Gilbert 6.3 miles northeast of Electra.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of six barrels per day. It was taken to a 2,200-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Cisco Sand Formation, 1,863 to 1,865 feet into the hole.





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
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Cook of the Week

Judging from the recipes that have been submitted to the paper for the Cook of the Week section through the years, Mexican foods rank very high in popularity, especially with the younger cooks.

There is more to Mexican cuisine than tortillas, enchiladas and chilies. It is an ancient, but very much alive, cookery in the time-honored tradition of the Mayan and Aztec civilization.

Chili powder, an ingredient in one of Penny (Mrs. Spankey) Morgan's recipes for this week, adds zest to many Mexican dishes. Chili (capsicum) peppers were some of the most valuable treasures discovered in the New World. Spanish explorers loved the nippy, red-podded capsicum immediately. An early historian, Pater Martyr, wrote that Columbus had found pepper "more pungent than that from Caucasus."

It was an Englishman from India who created the first chili powder, so the story goes. Once he had reached Texas in far-off America he kept longing for curry. Chili peppers and oregano were easy to come by, so were cumin, garlic and salt. One day, so the legend goes, he ground the ingredients. It wasn't curry powder for certain spices were missing but it was richly flavorful. He found it a completely right spice for beef, beans and corn meal dishes.


