This report attempts to organize the information and suggestions provided by local citizens in such a manner that local leaders and officials can work with the community in bringing about desired change and improvements. Since these observations and recommendations have been based
upon information provided by the citizens of Iowa Park, only the citizens and leaders of Iowa Park can determine the degree of their validity and the appropriate steps for improvement that will be most acceptable to the community as a whole. Hopefully, the community dialogue and interaction in examining the results of this survey will
lead to a consensus regarding the method and focus for lead to a consensus regarding he mehod and fos
further development. There seems to be a broad base of support for improv-
ing facilities and opportunities for recreation and entertaining facilities and opportunituses for recceated with social and
ment. "Eating out" is closely associated recreational activities in a community. Similarly, com-
munity festivals, event and activities are mutually supmunity festivals, event and activities are mutually sup-
portive of the two previous mentioned concerns. The successful establishment and operation of a family style sestaurant or cafeteria is a private sector enterprise that can best be addressed by the business community. It appears there is significant support for this type of development. Recreation facilities and entertainment opportunities
requires both facilities and programs. It also involves the requires both facilities and programs. It also involves
private sector, community organizations and the public private sector, community organizations and the public
sector. Other communities have successfully achieved development in this area through a recreation council with representation from the community organizations, city
goverment and the private sector. The council or an overgovernment and the private sector. The council or an over-

among the different groups, can help delineate responsibilamong the different groups, can help delineate responsibil-

tributions of the various organizations for an overall community beautification project.

This survey revealed a high level of satisfaction with the community and development projects could provide an opportunity for individuals to make a tangible contribu tion to their community. It appears that further study is
necessary to determine the economic feasibility of establishing retail outlets for clothing, furniture, and appliances which were identified as lacking in availability to meet the overall requirements of the community.
Community pride is a strong incentive for communy support. If some combination of the above or othe projects are adopted, it might be feasible to include an
overall community promotional component. Iowa Park would be the envy of many communities and has a strong would be the envy of many communities and has a strong
foundation of high quality community services and facil ities as a basis for further development.
In summary, the predominant concerns and suggestions lead to three primary recommendation

1. Develop an overall community recreation and existing and ongoing programs and activities.
2. Develop a community beautification program in volving individual community citizens, community organizations and the public sector.
