# Johnson Road project to cause inconvenience

Work on the Johnson Road project which will probably be the most disruptive to residents in the north part of the city will commence next week, according to Mike Price, city public works director.

Water in that area will be cut off about four hours Thursday of next week, while two taps are made on the new line which has been installed.

Service will be cut about 10 a.m. and be resumed approximately 2 p.m. one week from today, Price

He explained that the time was set so the fewest numbers of people and meals would be involved in the curtailment.

"We knew at least one meal period would be involved in the tapping, so we chose the one we felt the fewest people would be inconvenienced," Price said. "Earlier or later would also involve a lot of people taking baths and that sort of thing."

City workers will be on hand to assist the contractor, in order to make the taps in the shortest period of

Travel on Johnson Road will be even more of a problem beginning Monday, Price warned.

That's when the contractor will begin ripping up the old pavement in preparation for laying a new concrete surface.

Traffic has been slowed the past couple of weeks, while equipment was digging on the west side of the road to lay drainage and water pipe.

Price said the contractor could not tell him how long the paving project would take, because it depended on the weather and interruptions.

A surface will be left for travel, possibly in the ditch, Price said.

"We've tried to get a temporary approval from the state to let people drive both directions on the access road," Price said. "That would help, but so far we've not received it, even on a temporary basis."

Principal purpose of the overall project was to lay a storm drain along Johnson Road, from Wagon Wheel to the access road.

The drain, according to an engineer, is to prevent most of the flooding problems of homes north of the expressway.

The drain is expected to handle approximately 30 percent of all the water that drains into Country Hills

They were having to jump into the wind, waiting between jumps in that cold temperature, and knowing when they landed, that plastic bag on which they landed would be cold on their exposed limbs.

I was so cold, sitting there watching them jump, I just knew they would be so brittle they would shatter each time they landed.

Each year, I think the crowd can't get any larger. But it always does. I think that's because when one sees his first state meet, he always returns.

That's what happened to me. I vowed as I watched that first meet in 1961 that the state meet weekend would be my annual sports outing. Some folks take an annual fishing or hunting trip, some go skiing, others do something else.

Me, I head toward Austin about this time every May. And I've got a world of memories I treasure.



Dear Sir:

I am writing a letter to you because the Wichita Falls Times and Record News refuses to give me a chance to speak after lambasting teachers in their paper on Saturday and Sunday, May 3 and 4.

I wrote to them thanking them for a classic example of biased writing. I was referring to the Saturday, May 3, morning headline, "Teachers disrupt White's speech." I pointed out that they were obviously biased for Mark White and against teachers. (My sixth, seventh, and eighth grade reading students readily identified the biased headline on Monday morning, May 6.)

My students also identified a headline which did not fit the article. The headline told the readers that the article would be about teachers disrupting White's speech. (The definition of disrupt as found in the 1985 edition of the World Book Dictionary is: to break up; burst apart; split; shatter - The rioters disrupted the assembly.) However, the article was about teachers asking the Governor questions AFTER his speech and then only after he had approached them. It was not a breaking up, bursting apart, splitting, or shattering." The Wichita Falls Times and Record News missed again.

In reference to the letter by an anonymous editor of the Wichita Falls Times and Record News, teachers have no apology to make for their behavior on Friday, May 2, at Kell House. They were attentive throughout the Governor's speech. There was no heckling or jeering as was erroneously reported. The recording "Shove the Gov," was not played during the governor's speech. In fact, he didn't get to hear it at all, which is unfortunate.

However, questions were asked of the Governor when he came out to talk to the teachers. It's time teachers had answers to their questions from the man who instigated this massive assault on the people who care enough about children and education to stay in the classroom in spite of the attitude of many government officials and the Wichita Falls Times and Record News.

In reference to the letter to the Wichita Falls Times and Record News in Sunday's paper written by Lessel Evans, I wish to make this response. Ms. Evans, I, too, was given tests before I was certified to teach. I successfully completed the National Teachers' Examination and Minnesota Multiphasic Personality Inventory, which is a psychological examination. Certain scores were required on these tests before a person could become a certified teacher. I met these requirements, graduated with honors, and later earned a master's degree. Do you feel that now, fourteen years later, I should take a new test, a test not nearly as comprehensive as the first and written at a lower level of readability? Please consider this analogy. The state of Texas is upgrading its graduation standards. How would you feel if all Texas high school graduates were required to take a test to validate high school

diplomas earned as long as thirty years ago? Does this seem at all fair?

# Cook of the Week

The bean is a protein vegetable whose forms are so many and so numerous. One thing that can be said of all of them is that they go back to prehistoric times. For centuries they have probably been the answer to "what's cooking today?"

brough, a young homemaker, has evidently realized their importance because two of her recipes this week, Baked Beans and Green Bean Casserole, feature beans as the main ingredient.

The three most important beans in order given are Asian soybeans that were cultivated 4,000 years ago; American haricot beans which have been found in excavations dating several back thousands of years; and the European broad beans that have been discovered in the kitchen middens of prehistoric lake settlements.

The haricot bean seems to be the most versatile. There are round, oval, fat, flat and kidney-shaped beans and are produced in six different colors, 3/4 cup milk according to one food authority. This bean was discovered in Florida in 1528, and again, later, at the mouth of the St. Lawrence River.

The green or wax beans go back French fried onions to ancient Roman times. It is said that the Indians grew them when Miles Standish courted Priscilla. They also planted green lima beans with corn to choke the weeds, and they taught the Pilgrims how to make succotash, the first truly American dish.

Thanks to the creativity and imaginations of cooks in this century, the modern cooks have a variety of ways to prepare the beans agreeable to the palate and taste.



He explained many major colleges use a similar plan for raising



FIBER REGULATES ENERGY, REDUCES COLON CA RISK

By helping to regulate energy availability and loss, dietary fiber may lower the risk for colon cancer, according to Dr. David Kritchevsky of the Wistar Institute of Anatomy and Biology in Philadelphia.

The protective role of dietary fiber has been advocated (and debated), but its mode of action has not been delineated. According to Dr. Kritchevsky, fiber reduces the calonic

content of stools and thus may inhibit carcinogensis. Dietary fiber may also protect by increasing fecal bulk, lowering fecal steroids and lowering colonic acidity.

The scientist presented his findings at a conference on diet. nutrition and cancer held in Houston by the American Cancer Society.
