These are functional illiterates and according to the Census Bureau they now make up 13 percent of our who have been deprived of a free public education. For the most part
they are people who have gone through 12 years of schooling and have a diploma to prove it.

Yet they can't read well enough read a simple menu or understand plane schedule.
The Census Bureau made the study of illiteracy only recendy and
announced their findings a couple of weeks ago. Before this study the government had estimated that only one half of one percent of Americans ages 14 and over were illiterate. It is shocking to find that in a
country which leads the world in tech nology, between 17 million and 20 million people cannot read English. Most of these are not illegal aliens from Mexico, either. Most are people who have slipped through the cracks of our public education system. whose native tongue is not English jumps to 48 percent but we need to be more concerned about the others. It is now beginning to be discussed openly that integration of our public schools has not done all that was expected fents.

When schools were first integrat-

The French consume more per capita than the English, and in Argentina it is the daily dish, even for the poor. Beef is popular in New Zealand and Australia in the form of steaks and roasts.
