## News in Brief

### 1.1 rainfall measured locally

Iowa Park received .60 of an inch from a heavy rainshower at noon yesterday, and it was still raining after Virgil Woodfin made the measurement.

Woodfin said he also measured

.59 of an inch Sunday.

While the rain is welcomed by most gardeners and homeowners, area farmers are less than pleased. Only about half the wheat was cut when the rains began yesterday.

### Mrs. Archer elected alternate

Mrs. Margarette Archer of Iowa Park was named fourth alternate from this district to the Silver-Hair Legislature, in Friday's voting.

Also named alternates were two former residents: Faris Nowell of Nocona, first alternate, and Euell

Spruiell of Petrolia, third alternate.

Two candidates from Graham, Jack Martin and Margie Kirtley, were voted into office as were Maggie Gaines of Childress and Deno Tufares of Wichita Falls.

A total of 97 votes were cast locally in the election.

### Police arrest three

Iowa Park police arrested three men during the past week, but only one was on a local complaint.

According to the police blotter, an officer was in pursuit of two vehicles west on US 287 shortly before 3 a.m. Saturday, when one turned north on Lake Road.

Ignoring the second vehicle, the officer found the car abandoned on the dirt road beyond the lake entrance, but the driver had escaped on foot.

The pursuit started with a traffic violation.

At 12:05 p.m., Joe Kirk Baggett walked into the police station and told the dispatcher he was the driver.

The 24-year-old was taken before Justice of the Peace Virgil Hill, where his rights were read on a charge of evading arrest, a Class B misdemeanor.

He was then turned over to a Wichita County Sheriff's Department officer and taken to Wichita Falls.

Wednesday evening of last week, police served a warrant from Brazoria County on Mikel Budge Brookshire, 35. He was wanted on a charge of assault.

Brazoria officers, according to the blotter, recommended Brookshire be held on a \$500 bond. He was turned over to sheriff's deputies.

Tuesday evening, police arrested Glen Earl Aaron at 310 W. Lafayette on a warrant issued by Wichita Coun-

ty, for "violation of probation, DWI." He was later turned over to deputies.

cast their ballots at the county agriculture building in Iowa Park.

But those who normally vote in precinct 34 will have to go to Electra and vote at the junior high school. This is because of a runoff for justice of the peace in that area.

Republican ballots will feature runoffs for party candidates for Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Commissioner of General Land Office and Railroad Commissioner.

Vying for Lieutenant Governor are David Davidson and Aaron Bullock.

Seeking the Attorney General's nomination are Roy R. Barrera Jr. and Ed Walsh.

Wanting the Commissioner of General Land Office nomination are M.D. Anderson Jr. and Grady T. Yarbrough.

And competing for the nomination for Railroad Commissioner are John Thomas Henderson and Milton E. Fox.

Republicans who reside in voting precincts 32, 33 and 60 will vote at the First Christian Church in Iowa Park. Precinct 34 Republicans also will vote in Electra, at the public library, for the same reason as the Democrats.

All Archer County Republicans will be casting their ballots at the Lions Club Building in Archer City, according to county chairman Carol Dean.

With the exception of Electra and Burkburnett, all the primary runoffs are on the state level.

Five contested races face the Democrats, state-wide.

For Railroad Commissioner, John Sharp and P.S. Ervin are seeking the nomination for the November general election ballot.

## City to stop selling water outside town

The city council decided Monday to draft an ordinance prohibiting future sale of water outside the city limits.

The council adopted a policy some eight years ago to reject any request for water to property adjoining the city, unless it was annexed.

Council members were to adopt a resolution concerning sales of water outside the city during Monday's meeting, but decided rather to draft an ordinance instead.

The ordinance, which would prohibit sale of water to anyone outside the city, except to those promised water in return for easements when

the transmission line was built from Wichita Falls, is to be on the next meeting agenda.

Mayor Tim Hunter acknowledged the city receives one or more requests for water to a residence outside the city weekly.

He said, "We have to serve the citizens of the city. That is our obligation, and we can get into a situation in the future where we can't, if we continue the way we're going."

Those residents now purchasing water outside the city would continue to be served, council members observed.

"If some future council wants to resume selling water to people out-

side the city, they'll have to abolish the ordinance," Hunter said.

Monday's meeting was started with an executive session that lasted an hour and 22 minutes, concerning "pending or contemplated litigation."

No action was taken as a result of the executive session, and the council made quick work of the rest of its agenda.

Members approved the purchase of a tractor/loader for the sewer plant, at a bid price of \$8,970.

Also approved was the sale of the old animal control pickup, for which Steve Lowe offered \$795.

The drainage of standing water on Colorado, next to B&R Thriftway, received attention. The subject was a carryover from the council's last meeting.

The city's engineer and public works director both suggested a gravel fill of the low, asphalt-covered area would be the least expensive solution.

Projected to cost \$2,500, aldermen approved a proposal that the city pay half the cost and the land owner, James Huff, pay the balance, and the city maintain the area in the future.

Also approved was the lowest of three bids to repair a city pickup that was involved in a recent accident in Wichita Falls.

Cost of the repair is \$1,316.

### Trustees slate meeting

School trustees will hear the results of tests administered during the year by counselors, when the board meets at 7 p.m. Tuesday in the administration building.

Counselors will report on the results of the Texas Education Assessment of Minimum Skills.

A required public hearing on expenditures of Chapter One and Chapter Two funds will be held.

Board action will be asked on four items: contract for West Wichita

County Cooperative special education services for 1986-87; vocational federal funds for next year; a board policy on college course work for high school credit and early college entry; and consideration of a media services contract with Region Nine.

Also to be considered will be appointing a representative to the Region Nine Joint Committee.

Hiring and accepting of resignations are listed on the meeting agenda under the topic of personnel.

## City permits slack in May

Very little went on locally in the area of construction during May, according to the monthly report on building permits from city hall.

Only five permits were issued during the entire month, and none was for new construction.

The permits increased the year's total by only \$10,644, and the total fell far behind the same period's figures for last year.

Permits issued during the first five months of this year have amounted to only \$624,873, as compared to the \$959,737 reported this time in 1985.

Permits issued during May by city hall were: James England, 711 S. Wall, alteration, \$1,500; Clifford Driver, 727 Park Plaza, new garage, \$6,600; Charles Murphy, 414 W. Jefferson, addition, \$576; Verna Reid, 509 W. Alameda, alteration, \$968; Jean Gilstrap, 1600 Yucca, addition, \$1,000.

### On Dean's List

Susan Cameron of Iowa Park has been named to the Dean's List for the Spring 1986 semester at McMurry College, according to Dr. Paul Jungmeyer, vice-president for Academic Affairs and Dean of the College.

A total of 170 students were named to the Dean's List for the Spring of 1986 semester at McMurry. A student must attain a grade point average of 3.5 or higher on the 4.0 scale and must be taking at least 12 semester hours to qualify for the honor.

### WICHITA COUNTY 4-H DOG SHOW SCHEDULED

The Wichita County 4-H Dog Show is to be held Saturday, at 9 a.m. at the 4-H Barn, in Wichita Falls. Participants will be exhibiting dogs in beginner and novice classes.

This show will be the conclusion of the 4-H dog project which began in late March.

## Wichita, Clay county farmers invited to run for committee

Eligible Farmers in Wichita County are invited to become nominees for the Farmers Home Administration county committee, FmHA County Supervisor Joe W. Gilbreath announced.

As a result of the 1985 farm bill, two of the three members of FmHA county committees must be elected. The third member is appointed by FmHA. The Wichita and Clay County committee assists the FmHA county office in reviewing applications for FmHA farm loans and on other farm credit matters.

Generally, farmers who are residents of the county but not FmHA borrowers are eligible to become nominees for the FmHA county committee.

"Farmers in these counties, serving on the committee, can play an important role by assisting in the process of loan applications and reviews," said Gilbreath.

For this first election only, two members will be elected at the same time. One will serve a one year term of office and the other will serve two years. In the future, all terms of service will be for three years each on a staggered basis.

Nominating petitions must be returned to the Wichita county office by Tuesday.

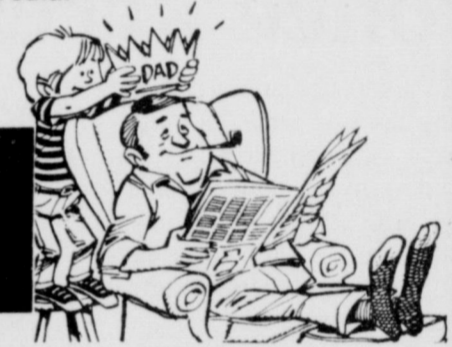

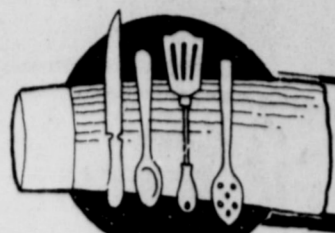

Judging from the comments about the Cook of the Week feature, we feel that it has opened and continues to open a treasury of meal-brightening, economical dishes. It has offered an endless variety of salads, desserts, main dishes, entrees, etc. with a fresh kind of appeal to pave the turnpike to people's hearts.

The recipes this week will probably have special appeal for those who like Hawaiian cuisine where delicious fruits, particularly pineapple and coconut, sweet breads, poi, the roasted pig in barbecue pits are some of the most popular foods. The leis, luau, breathtaking scenery, beautiful flowers as numerous as the sand on the many palm-lined beaches, fire eaters, snow-capped volcanoes, friendliness of the people, aloha, etc. take captive the hearts of tourist and visitors.

Isabella (Mrs. Joseph) McLean and her family are newcomers to Iowa Park, having been here for a little over a month. They spent two years in Hawaii when Joseph was stationed with the U.S. Marines and she is "in the know" about the cuisine of the 50th state.

1 tsp. ginger  
1 medium onion, cut into wedges  
2 zucchini squash, sliced  
2 cups cooked ham

Blend orange juice and cornstarch; add soy sauce, sugar, lemon juice. Set aside.

In saucepan, heat oil. Cook onion 2 minutes, add zucchini and ginger. Remove from pan, add more oil to pan and cook ham 2 minutes, stirring in orange juice mixture.

Cook until thick, add vegetables and peaches. Cook 2 minutes. Serve over rice.

### RAINBOW KABOBS

1 1/2 lbs. chuck steak, cut into cubes  
1 1/2 tps. meat tenderizer  
1-8 oz. can tomato sauce  
1/4 cup brown sugar  
2 Tbs. prepared mustard  
1 tsp. horseradish  
1 bell pepper, cut into cubes  
1 onion, cut into wedges  
6 cherry tomatoes  
6 mushroom caps

Moisten meat with water, pierce with fork and sprinkle with meat tenderizer. In saucepan, combine tomato sauce, mustard, horseradish, and heat through.

Arrange meat and vegetables alternately on skewer. Broil 4 or 5 inches from heat about 14 minutes. Turn frequently and baste with saucepan mixture.

1 lb. mushrooms (24 count)  
4 Tbs. butter  
1/3 cup chopped Mozzarella cheese  
1 Tbs. bread crumbs  
1/4 cup sliced pimiento-stuffed olives

This particular Bullock, however, is not only a nobody, he's an unknown.

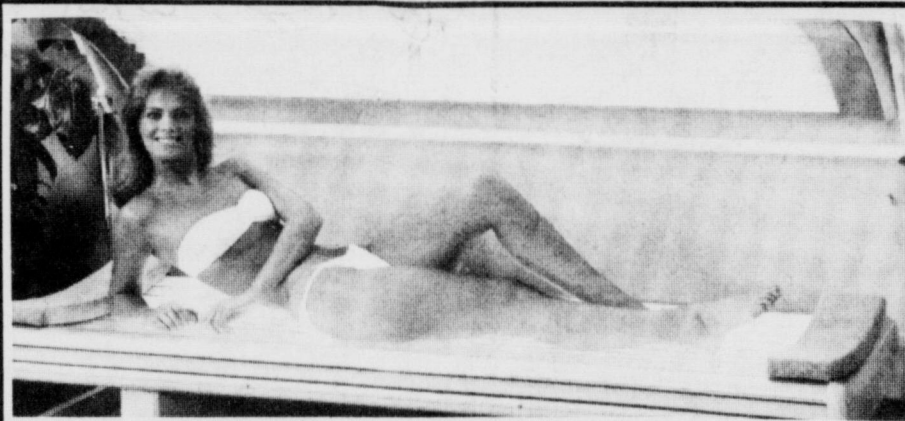

### DON'T SLAP

Although your first instinct is to give a slap on the back when you see someone choking on food, this may be the wrong move, according to the American Heart Association and the American Red Cross.

Such slapping may cause the object to become more firmly stuck in the airway.

The recommended procedure is the Heimlich Maneuver.

To do this, put your arms around the victim from behind, clasp your hands just below the rib cage, and give several quick upward thrusts to force air up the windpipe.

The air gusts should dislodge the object and enable the person to expel it.

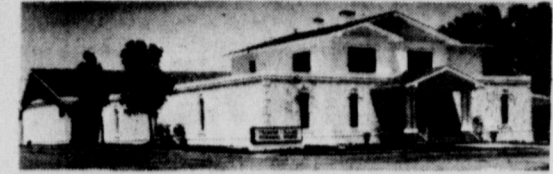

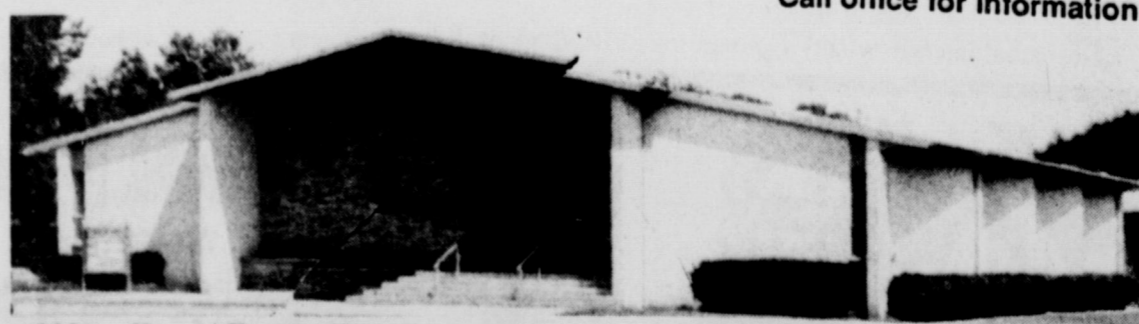

# AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Two new producers have been brought on line in the Wichita Regular Field, with J&I Oil as the operator.

The wells are designated as the 24-A and 25-A Mrs. Noble Gray, located 4.3 miles southeast and 4.3 miles southwest of Burkburnett, respectively. The wells are located in the DL&C Survey, A-616.

They indicated potential to pump oil at the combined rate of 24 barrels per day. Total drilling depths were 1,312 and 1,352 feet, respectively. Production will be from perforations in the Cisco Sand Formation, ranging from 1,028 to 1,038 feet into the wellbore.

The 24-A well is located 750 feet from the north line and 122 feet from the west line of the lease.

Drillsite for the 25-A well is 750 feet from the north line and 122 feet from the east line of the lease.

At a location 4.5 miles southeast of Burkburnett, Gene Robertson Oil has finalized a new oil producer in the Wichita Regular Field.

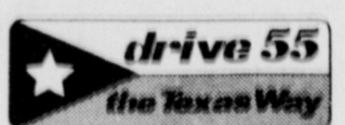
