Stand them out of a draft and several inches

apart to cool. After jars have cooled about 10 hours, take off the bands and test seal by pressing on lid. If the Dome is down or goes down and stays down when pressed with the finger, the jar is sealed. Don't put the bands back on the jars. They have finished that job of sealing and are ready to start over with a new batch of lids. Leaving the bands on the jars will neither help nor hurt a vacuum
