ed to know that the West Plains Medical Center Emergency Room (ER) has just been approved by the Texas Department of Health and Human Services to accept for treatment Medicare patients who presents themselves in need of emergency assistance. This approval is retroactive to January 12, 1989. The hospital insurance office will file all claims through the ER from this date, March 8, forward."

Officials at the hospitals were informed through the Texas Department of Health, that to date no Texas rural or metropolitan hospitals have ever before been authorized this temporary approval of Emergency Room (ER) certification by the federal government.

It was explained that maximum approval time that can be allowed under the Federal (Medicare) guidelines for Emergency Room Temporary Certification is one year (12 months).

Chisholm said it is interesting to note that West Plains Medical Center has received the 'first' temporary certification of an emergency room and the approval is only for three (3) months operation to support the hospital efforts to seek full Medicare overall hospital certification.

He added, "It is important that persons covered by Medicare, their friends, or relatives who may deliver them to the ER for treatment, realize that the ER has been approved as a Medicare Cont. Page 6, Col. 3

Bailey County Reflects Increased Water Supply In Ogallala Aquifer

Bailey County groundwater levels rose by 0.13 of a foot, indicating a net increase of 6,901 acre-feet of water to the Ogallala Aquifer last year, according to depth to water measurements taken from 78 High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 observation wells within the county.

The average annual change in groundwater levels for Bailey County from 1979 to 1989 is a decline of 0.47 of a foot. However, groundwater levels increased an average of 0.26 of a foot during the five-year period from 1984 to 1989.

Groundwater levels in the Ogallala Aquifer declined an average of about one-half foot within the Water District's 5.5 million acre service area during 1988.

Very poor soil moisture conditions prior to spring planting, coupled with below average precipitation over most of the area during the growing season,

Seven Muleshoe Educators Go To Computer Meet

Seven Muleshoe educators attended the Ninth Texas Computer Education Association State Convention in Houston at the Brown Convention Center March 5-7.

Attending this conference from Muleshoe were Dr. Lawrence Ward, Carolyn Ward, Colleen Tollett, Mike Richardson, Barbara Finney, Beth Skipworth and Georgia Pena.

Participants learned a lot about the possibilities of using computer technology to improve the educational opportunities of students in the Muleshoe Schools.

TCEA is an active organization dedicated to computer education in Texas. This year's conference theme was "Technology: Window To The Future" and was planned to support the idea that every curriculum area has technology needs, uses and accomplishments.

The conference was attended by 2,000 educators from across the state who had the opportunity to attend over 235 break-out sessions featuring demonstrations and innovations in educational technology.

The nationally known keynote speaker was Walter Koetke, director of technology for Scholastic Inc., since 1983. This speaker's mission was to explore ideas related to learning and how these ideas might be implemented or enhanced with technology.

The ideas presently being explored are: images and emotion, music and art, sound and light, accelerated learning, conceptual thinking, left/right brain functions, laser video discs, artificial intelligence, voice input/output, CD-ROM and CD-I, hemi-sinc, multi-media and networking.

observation water wells scattered across the 15-county Water District service area and are used to determine the annual change in the quantity of water in storage within the Ogallala Aquifer.

Since the majority of these irrigation wells are operational, Water District Technical Division staff members take depth to water measurements during January and February in an attempt to allow water levels to stabilize from the previous irrigation season.

By comparing the 1988 depth to water measurements with those taken from the observation well network during January 1987, staff members were able to note the change in groundwater levels.

The 1988 depth to water measurement data revealed average annual declines in nine of the 15 counties within the High Plains Water District. The counties are Castro, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hale, Lamb, Lubbock,

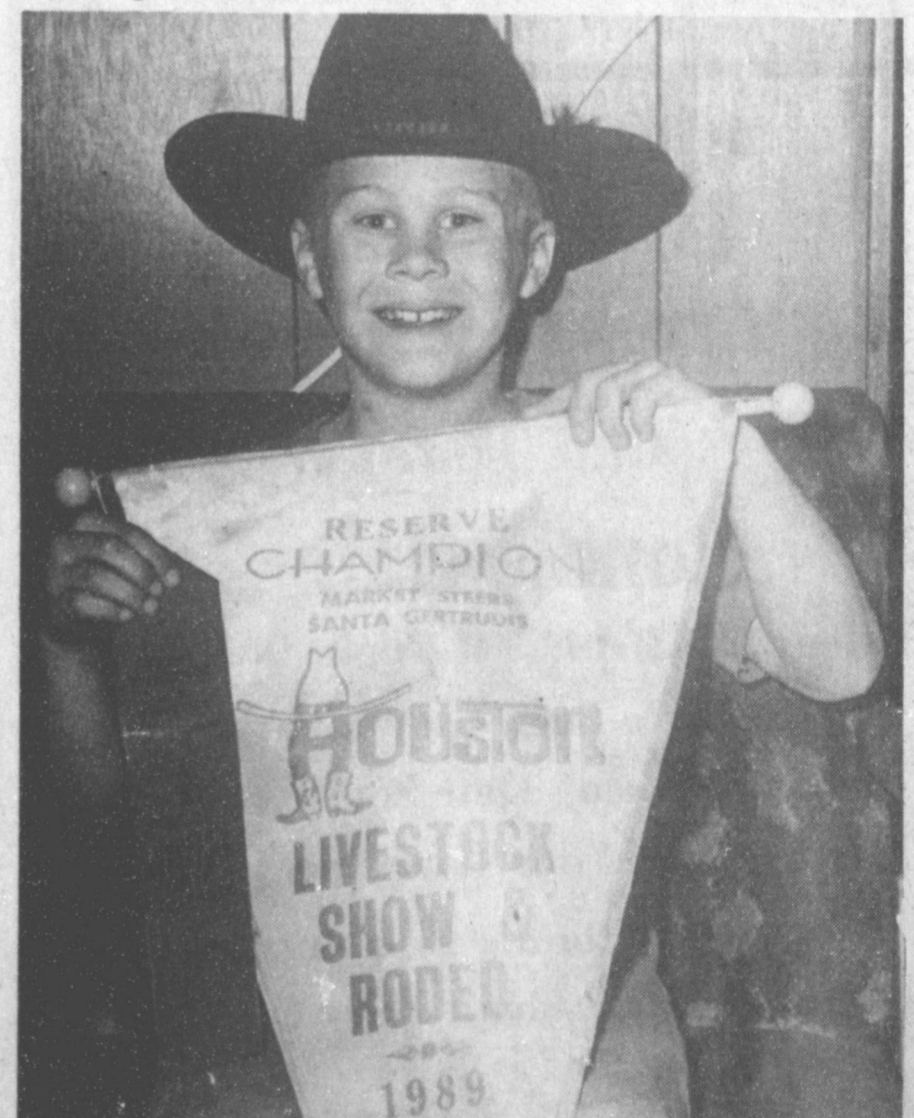
How quickly we forget!! Have been listening to people talk about how much 'wetter' it was during January and February, 1988, than it was for the first two months of 1989.

On the contrary. According to the official moisture received in Muleshoe, during January, 1988 we received .05 in moisture. We also received .05 in February, 1988, for a total of only one-tenth of an inch in the first two months.

This year, the moisture received during the first two months is at .98, just .02 away from an inch.

The same two months produced .25, .54, .05 and .14, along with probably enough 'traces' of rain or snow to bring the total to slightly more than an inch.

People are partially right, though. It seems that the slightly more than an inch of moisture is the first measurable precipitation received in this area since October 1988, leaving producers on the 'short end of the stick' with spring planting fast approaching.

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS



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A homestead Exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. For example, if your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth only \$45,000.

You qualify for a homestead exemption if you owned your home on January 1 and used it as your primary residence on January 1. It doesn't matter whether your home is a house, a condominium or a mobile home.

Exemptions are available to all homeowners on their school taxes. Additional exemptions are available to homeowners who are disabled or age 65 or over. Other exemptions may be offered to homeowners by school districts, counties, cities, and special districts. All taxing units offer exemptions to disabled veterans.

Apply to your local appraisal district office at the address shown

below for all exemptions you may qualify for. Application forms are available at this office. If you received a homestead exemption on your present home in 1988, you won't need to apply again for 1989 unless the chief appraiser requires you to reapply.

However, if you passed your 65th birthday or became disabled before January 1, file a new application to receive the additional exemptions.

If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, make a new application for 1989.

The deadline for applications is April 30, 1989. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time.

Wednesday, March 15, *World of Today and Tomorrow*. Name two ways they used their resources wisely, today. Read the paper and find a story about someone in their community. Find out what time it is at Juliette Low's birthplace. Find out the length of their feet in centimeters. Count the change in their mother's purse. (Ask permission,

first). Find out what the low and high temperatures are and learn what a record temperature is for this date.

Thursday, March 16, *World of the Arts*. Draw a picture and share it with a senior citizen or someone sick, disabled or handicapped. Make a puppet with a bandana, handkerchief, paper plate, or other material. Entertain someone with their puppet. Sing a Girl Scout song with their family, friends, or alone. Remember to use their resources wisely in two ways. Collect five aluminum cans to be recycled. Find something hidden by natural surroundings or a habitat (home) of a wild animal. on March 12, 1912. In 1913, she changed the name of the movement to Girl Scouts and continued to work with great dedication, vision, and strength to bring Girl Scouting to many people. Through the Girl Scout program based on Juliette Low's ideas, girls and adults have great opportunities to understand themselves and others, to develop skills, values, and ethics, and to extend and contribute their special gifts and talents.

Girl Scouts have three special birthdays to celebrate: October 31, Juliette Low's birthday (also known as Founder's Day); February 22, Thinking Day, the birthday of Lord Robert Baden-Powell, founder of Boy Scouts, and Lady Olave Baden-Powell, the World Chief Guide; and March 12, the birthday of Girl Scouting in the United States of America.

Today's girls are exposed to the world outside their homes at an earlier age through preschool programs, television, travel, play groups, and other early childhood experiences. Most girls who are five years old or in kindergarten are ready for Girl Scouting and being a Girl Scout gives them many opportunities.

Through the Girl Scout program, girls expand their world to include adults and children outside their family circle. The Girl Scouts in the troops may come from different life situations. Some may be the only child in a family and have had little experience with other children; others may have older and younger siblings and be more experienced in interacting with their peers. Some of the girls may come from homes that have the latest electronic devices and games while others may not. Some may have been born or have lived in other countries, some children may have traveled far beyond their home environment-out of state or out of the country. In Girl Scouting a girl's growth is based on both her own unique background and the opportunities the movement opens up for her.

From The Senate

Recently I received a letter from a fourth grade student who attends the Belmar School in Amarillo. The student asked me to answer a number of questions. Because the questions were thoughtful, and because the answers to these questions would probably be of interest to more than just the fourth grade class at Belmar School, I decided to use this column to answer them.

Dear Micah,

Thank you very much for your letter. I was tickled to learn that you are interested in Texas government and specifically, my job as State Senator.

The first question you asked was "What is your job?" I wish the answer were as simple as the question. In fact, my job is many different things.

First and foremost, my job, along with thirty other Senators and one hundred and fifty members of the Texas House of Representatives, is to make laws for the people of Texas to abide by. As time goes by and our society changes there arises a need to change old laws that are on the books and enact new laws.

Micah, it is important to understand that in deciding which laws should be changed and what new laws should be enacted, I am not guided only by my thoughts and beliefs, rather my job is to represent the views, beliefs, and wishes of all of the people who live in Senate District 31.

Another very important part of my job is to speak up for the interest of our part of the State. In a study done a few years ago, Bob Bullock, the Comptroller of

Public Accounts for the State of Texas, informed us that our part of the State, that is the Panhandle and West Texas, was the only region in the state that sent more money to Austin in taxes than it got back in appropriations. I believe this is unfair and part of my job is to work to correct this inequity.

Helping my constituents is another aspect of my job that is very important to me. Texas has over 240 different State agencies. Each of these agencies deals with the people of Texas in one way or another. Sometimes our citizens have problems in dealing with a State agency. There may be a problem getting a permit from the Texas Railroad Commission, receiving a transcript from a State university, helping an out-of-state doctor relocate to one of our rural communities. My job is to be of assistance.

While a big part of my job is to work for the passage of various pieces of legislation, an equally important part of the job is to work against and to vote against the passage of other pieces of legislation. A good friend of mine who serves in the Texas House of Representatives put it well when he said "The most important thing I do in the Texas Legislature is not pass bills, it is to kill bills."

You went on to ask about my responsibilities as a Texas Senator. Specifically, you asked "What responsibilities do you have?" Once again, your short, simple question has a rather broad multifaceted answer.

I believe the single greatest responsibility I have as a Texas Senator is my vote as one of thirty-one Senators. Just as you

won't learn anything if you don't attend school, I won't do my constituents any good if I am not present for every vote. I cast my vote in committee meetings where, if a bill receives a positive majority vote, it is referred to the full Senate. It is on the floor of the Senate that I am called upon to cast my vote which is the next step in the process of a bill becoming a law.

The responsibility that goes hand in hand with the responsibility to be informed on the issues you vote on. The process of becoming informed on issues takes up the majority of my time. I learn about issues by talking to constituents either in the district or when they come to visit me in Austin.

But the main way I stay informed on issues and pending legislation is by reading, reading and more reading. I read bills that have been filed and reported to committee, I read bill analyses prepared by the Senate research organization, I read newspapers and magazine articles, I read industry newsletters, but most importantly, I read letters like yours. The single most effective way of communicating with your elected representative is by writing them personal letters and letting them know your views on an issue.

We keep every letter we receive. Those that deal with specific pieces of legislation we place in a "bill file" so that when the bill comes up for debate in committee or on the floor of the Senate, I will have the letters at hand. My objective with this system is to be able to communicate the views of my constituents in a timely and effective manner.

As your State Senator I am responsible for literally every aspect of State government. One area of State government that impacts you Micah, is public education. Over half of the entire State budget in Texas is dedicated to education. That will amount to some twenty billion dollars in the next biennium (two year budget period).

Finally, Micah, you asked "What do you do in Austin?" Again a simple question with a big answer. I decided the best way to give you an idea of what I do in Austin is to set out for you a schedule of a recent typical day's activities.



Comptroller Explains Franchise Tax Changes

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that corporations affected by the franchise tax bill passed by the Legislature on March 2 can get extensions by requesting them before the March 15 due date.
 Bullock said he is offering the extension since the new law became effective only 13 days before the March 15 deadline for filing the annual franchise tax returns.
 However, Bullock said that corporations must still either file a report based on the old law and amend that return by June 15, or request a filing extension by March 15 and file a tax return based on the new law by June 15.
 The corporations must also note that the amended returns are a result of the new law, Bullock added.
 Corporations that have already filed a return under the old law may file an amended return by June 15. Bullock said they should also notify his agency that their amended return is a result of the new law.
 Under the old law, corporations could exclude pre-acquisition earnings of companies they invested in when they filed their state tax returns. Now, those earnings are no longer exempted, and investments in other companies must be reported at cost, according to Bullock.
 The law also affects corporations that filed returns based on the two- or three-factor accounting method. Instead, these companies must use only one factor -- gross receipts -- to determine the amount of franchise tax due to the state.
 "There are going to be companies that will owe more than they have paid in taxes to the state. They won't know how much more until they complete their amended returns, and I'm not going to collect penalties and

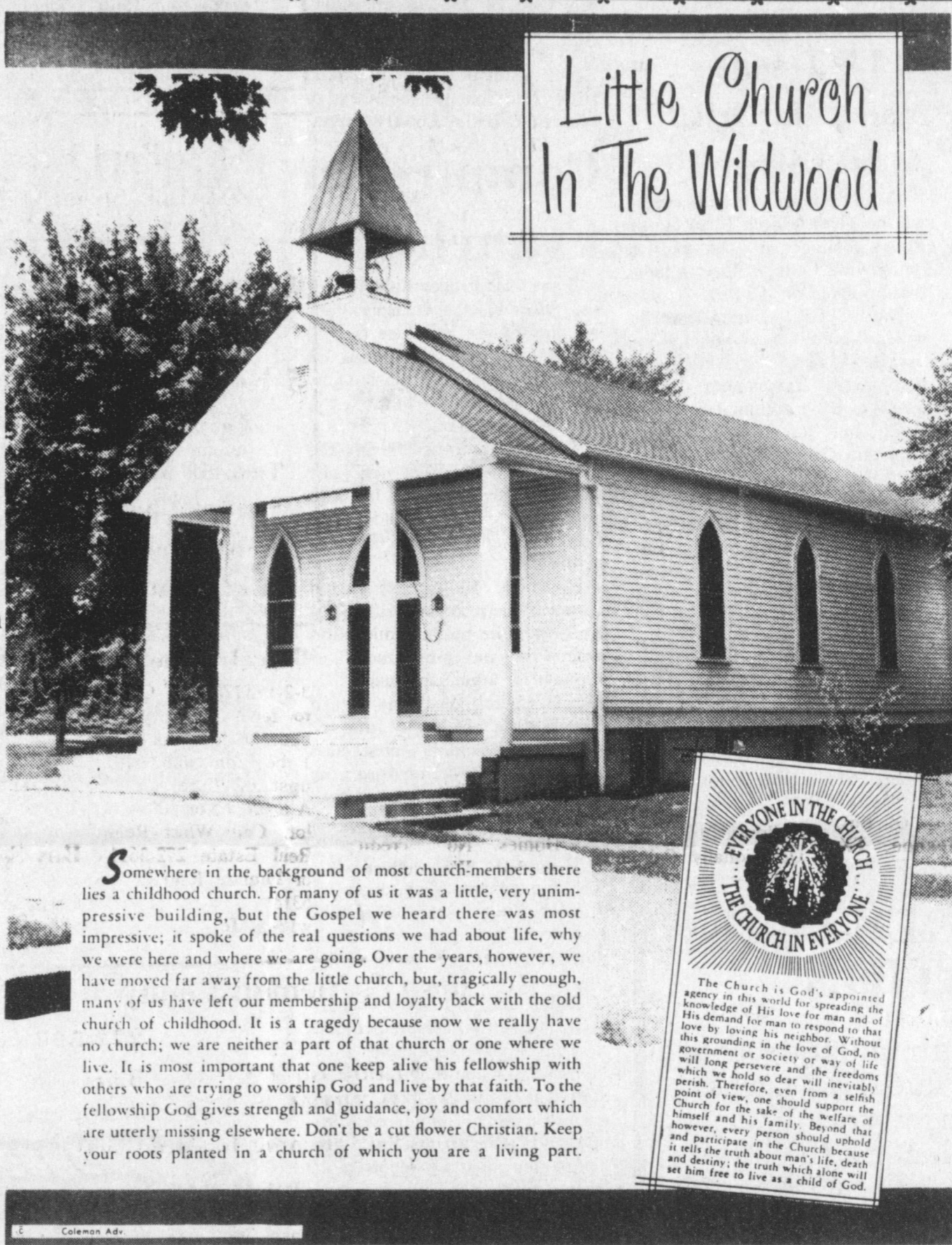
