Flu bug sweeps area; no age group spared

The near epidemic flu that recently swept the area has young and old alike reaching for tissues and aspirin, visiting their doctors and taking days of undesirable bed rest.

So what is this thing that has grown men acting like babies, and children staying home from school in record numbers? Type B Influenza to be exact, according to Dr. Larry Stutte of Park Clinic. And to add insult to injury, those who received annual flu shots at the end of 1988 will probably not be protected from this particular strain.

Stutte explained that at the beginning of each year, two or three prevalent strains of influenza in the area are identified and a vaccine to combat them is developed to be administered at the end of the year. Type B Influenza, unfortunately, wasn't included in this year's vaccine.

Dr. Stutte said the patient load at the clinic was definitely up during the past two weeks as many sought relief from the illness. Symptoms of this particular flu include chills and sweats, low grade temperature, dull headache, dry cough, scratchy throat, muscle aches in adults, and a feeling of malaise, according to Stutte. He said the best care for the flu

is rest, plenty of fluids, taking a nonaspirin pain reliever or aspirin for pain and fever, and taking over-thecounter medication for the cough or sore throat. He cautioned against taking aspirin for those with stomach problems and those under 13 years old.

Stutte also said that a trip to the doctor's office isn't necessary unless complications arise.

The classrooms in Iowa Park have been a little less crowded due to the flu, which apparently began its sweep in the lower grades and worked its way up. Averaging an 11 per cent absenteeism rate during the past two weeks, each school noted a significant jump in the number of students absent.

Normally 10 - 20 students are absent each day from any given campus, but that figure rose to 35-74 during the peak of the illness.

Kidwell Elementary, housing grades kindergarten through second, reported the highest absenteeism rate due to the flu during the week of Jan. 16-19. With 481 students enrolled, Kidwell had 65 students out of the classroom that Monday, 59 Tuesday, 61 Wednesday and 74 on Thursday.

The following week still showed a great number of students absent at Kidwell, but fewer than the previous week.

Bradford Elementary, along with the junior high and high school, reported that absenteeism peaked during the week of Jan. 23 - 27.

Bradford, with 454 students, showed 70 absent Monday, 60 on Tuesday, 51 Wednesday, and 42 both Thursday and Friday.

The junior high, with an enrollment of 418, lost 44 Monday, 43 Tuesday, 46 Wednesday and Thursday and 45 Friday.

Monday, absenteeism at the high school peaked at 59 students, and declined the rest of the week with 51 absent Tuesday, 45 Wednesday and 44 absent both Thursday and Friday. 528 students are enrolled at the high school.

Randy Lovelady, vice principal at Iowa Park High School, noted that the absenteeism rates at each school may be misleading as several students checked out of school each day after official roll was taken during second period.

Two women perish when house burns Deputy confirms arson being investigated

Fire took the lives of two women in their rural home late Thursday night, but two others in the structure escaped uninjured.

Dead were Hattie White, 90, and her daughter, Virginia Little, 60.

Mrs. Little's daughter-in-law and her four-year-old son escaped and notified a neighbor that the house was ablaze.

Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department was called to the scene at 10:24 p.m. Three other departments, Wichenter the structure, after being told the two elderly ladies were possibly still in it, because of the heat.

The two bodies were removed after the fire was declared out at 2:45. Both were burned beyond recognition and were sent Friday to the forensic laboratory in Dallas for identification.

Skinner said the roof of the house was falling in as the first units arrived.

All fires that cause a death are investigated, but it is the "rekindled" fire that caused considerable suspicion to investigators.

mine if any flammable liquid has

been used in cases of arson.



Prior to that, .33 of an inch was received from a three-and-one-half inch snowfall two weeks earlier.

Farmers in general described the rain as a "lifesaver for the wheat."

Official temperatures at the weather bureau in Wichita Falls reached 78 degrees, setting a new record for Jan. 31.

Winds Monday and Tuesday gusted well above 25 miles per hour.

While the cold front is not expected to bring with it temperatures like the sub-zero readings Alaskans have been experiencing, temperatures are expected to reach as low as 10 degrees before the system moves on to the northeast.

Should the forecasters be correct, this will be the first "real winter weather" the area will have experienced since the winter of 1987-88.







I feel for those people up in Alaska, with those tremendously cold temperatures they've been experiencing the past couple of weeks.

It's hard for us to visualize what -50 or -60 degrees is like, here in this part of the country.

I went through a similar period in February 1951 while stationed at Anchorage in the Air Force.

I've always said it didn't make much difference once the temperature reached below 0. And, really, it doesn't.

Except for one phenomenon the news has reported as a possible cause of a military aircraft crashing: ice fog.

I was told by the men working in the weather station at Elmendorf AFB that when the temperature gets so cold, any moisture in the air freezes into tiny crystals. The crystals are so tiny and so thick, they give the appearance of fog. Hence, the term ice fog.

Tired of cats

Anchorage achieved a record low temperature, as I remember, of -64 degrees at one point during that cold spell in February 1951. We were warned to dress properly with the gear we were issued, and whenever outside to check our exposed flesh, noses, cheeks, etc., for feeling, and not allow ourselves to be frostbitten.

That ice fog collects onto anything it touches. I recall one of the men in our barricks had a small copper wire stretched from one building to another, for a radio antenna. That wire grew to more than two inches in circumfrence with its ice crystal coating, yet hardly weighed more than an ounce per foot.

I was watching a report on tv Monday evening, and understood the reporter to say they were also experiencing strong winds at Anchorage.

That was a surprise to me. I don't remember a report of any winds in excess of 10 miles per hour those two years I was there. Anchorage is protected on three sides by tall mountains, and I'm not too sure the reporter wasn't confused as to the location where that particular film footage was shot.

We had a problem last weekend with weather. Not the cold kind, but the harrassing wet kind.

Dolores and I went all the way down to San Antonio to attend the mid-winter convention of the Texas Press Association.

We left Wednesday afternoon, and didn't see the sun from the time we passed through Decatur until we were in the same area returning home Saturday afternoon.

We had planned, during breaks in the convention program, to go out on that city's famed river walk. But umbrellas wouldn't have been enough to keep us dry. It would have required full wet suits.

Unless you're familiar with the streets of San Antonio, getting into and out of the downtown area from the highway is an experience. There's construction almost everywhere you

Barnes, the former lieutenant governor, spoke on the banking crisis.

After pointing out all the banks and savings and loans in Texas that had been closed the past couple of years, Barnes accused the government of "selective enforcement" of banking laws.

They're here, and growing, he said, and we must all start learning how to get along with each other.

From the jest of his talk, I almost got the idea he was telling us that the whites will, in a few more decades, become the minority population of those states.

To me, the most entertaining and interesting talk was by Flynn, who is writer-in-residence at Trinity Univ. in San Antonio.

A down-to-earth speaker, I would have enjoyed anything he had to say. But his talk that particular day was about his youth, when he was growing up in Chillicothe.

After his talk, and I wasn't ready for him to end it, I asked him if he remembered going to school with Keith Aulds.

His face lit up as he said yes. I almost got the idea he had some stories to tell about Keith, his late twin and other brothers. But he didn't, and asked only that I say hello

New Chamber president outlines goals for year

He told the board the advertising was sold for the printing of the maps, but costs were greater than the amount collected. He said he was still seeking a quote from a printer to finish the project.

Via said the maps would be ready for next month's meeting, or he would begin refunding the money collected.

While the new president also said he wanted to see a rejuvenation of the defunct retail merchants association, as part of the Chamber's goals for the year, no formal plan for that project was discussed.



Spruiell completes **MSU** degree work



1 lb. ground beef 1 lb. Polish smoked sausage 1 lb. spaghetti 2-16 oz. cans tomato sauce 3-6 oz. cans tomato paste Oregano Italian seasoning Garlic salt **Optional**: Onion

Brown ground beef and smoked sausage (chopped or sliced), salt with garlic. Simmer 3-5 minutes. Add tomato sauce and paste, stir. Add oregano and Italian seasoning to taste. Simmer on low heat.

Cook noodles about 15 minutes or until done.

Serve with tossed salad and rolls.

Mix the egg and buttermilk. Dip chicken in mixture before flouring. Fry on low heat 20-30 minutes.



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
