Flu bug sweeps area; no age group spared

The near epidemic flu that recently swept the area has young and old alike reaching for tissues and aspirin, visiting their doctors and taking days of undesirable bed rest.
So what is this thing that has grown men acting like babies, and children staying home from school in record numbers? Type B Influenza to be exact, according to Dr. Larry Stutte of Park Clinic. And to add insult to injury, those who received annual flu shots at the end of 1988 will probably not be protected from this particular strain.
Stutte explained that at the beginning of each year, two or three prevalent strains of influenza in the area are identified and a vaccine to combat them is developed to be administered at the end of the year. Type B Influenza, unfortunately, wasn't included in this year's vaccine.
Dr. Stutte said the patient load at the clinic was definitely up during the past two weeks as many sought relief from the illness. Symptoms of this particular flu include chills and sweats, low grade temperature, dull headache, dry cough, scratchy throat, muscle aches in adults, and a feeling of malaise, according to Stutte.
He said the best care for the flu

is rest, plenty of fluids, taking a non-aspirin pain reliever or aspirin for pain and fever, and taking over-the-counter medication for the cough or sore throat. He cautioned against taking aspirin for those with stomach problems and those under 13 years old.
Stutte also said that a trip to the doctor's office isn't necessary unless complications arise.
The classrooms in Iowa Park have been a little less crowded due to the flu, which apparently began its sweep in the lower grades and worked its way up. Averaging an 11 per cent absenteeism rate during the past two weeks, each school noted a significant jump in the number of students absent.
Normally 10 - 20 students are absent each day from any given campus, but that figure rose to 35-74 during the peak of the illness.
Kidwell Elementary, housing grades kindergarten through second, reported the highest absenteeism rate due to the flu during the week of Jan. 16-19. With 481 students enrolled, Kidwell had 65 students out of the classroom that Monday, 59 Tuesday, 61 Wednesday and 74 on Thursday.

The following week still showed a great number of students absent at Kidwell, but fewer than the previous week.
Bradford Elementary, along with the junior high and high school, reported that absenteeism peaked during the week of Jan. 23 - 27.
Bradford, with 454 students, showed 70 absent Monday, 60 on Tuesday, 51 Wednesday, and 42 both Thursday and Friday.
The junior high, with an enrollment of 418, lost 44 Monday, 43 Tuesday, 46 Wednesday and Thursday and 45 Friday.
Monday, absenteeism at the high school peaked at 59 students, and declined the rest of the week with 51 absent Tuesday, 45 Wednesday and 44 absent both Thursday and Friday. 528 students are enrolled at the high school.
Randy Lovelady, vice principal at Iowa Park High School, noted that the absenteeism rates at each school may be misleading as several students checked out of school each day after official roll was taken during second period.

Two women perish when house burns

Deputy confirms arson being investigated

Fire took the lives of two women in their rural home late Thursday night, but two others in the structure escaped uninjured.
Dead were Hattie White, 60, and her daughter, Virginia Little, 60.
Mrs. Little's daughter-in-law and her four-year-old son escaped and notified a neighbor that the house was ablaze.
Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department was called to the scene at 10:24 p.m. Three other departments, Wichita West, Kamay and Cameron Gardens, were called in to assist, according to Danny Skinner, chief of the Iowa Park department.
The house is located on a cul-de-sac off Peterson Road, northwest of Chaparral Baptist Camp.
The younger Mrs. Little, whose husband was at work in Wichita Falls, took her son to the next door neighbor, Lewis Enterkin, and asked him to notify authorities of the fire.
The son, Allen, and his family had moved into the home a few months earlier to live with his mother and grandmother.
Enterkin said he was unable to

enter the structure, after being told the two elderly ladies were possibly still in it, because of the heat.
The two bodies were removed after the fire was declared out at 2:45. Both were burned beyond recognition and were sent Friday to the forensic laboratory in Dallas for identification.
Skinner said the roof of the house was falling in as the first units arrived.
He and the other Iowa Park firemen returned with their equipment to the station and prepared them for any other emergencies, as is their custom.
But Skinner and another fireman returned to the fire scene about 3:25 and stayed until nearly 4:00, "just to check on it," he said, adding there was no sign of more fire.
However, firemen were called out once more at 6:35 a.m., according to the records, because the fire had "rekindled."
The initial fire was reportedly started in a bedroom closet by the elder Mrs. Little, who was said to

have been in a state of mental confusion and lit a blaze to keep warm.
All fires that cause a death are investigated, but it is the "rekindled" fire that caused considerable suspicion to investigators.
Sheriff Deputy David Duke is the designated arson investigator for the county.
Duke confirmed he requested Mark Clever of the Wichita Falls Fire Department to assist him with a "sniffer," an apparatus used to determine if any flammable liquid has been used in cases of arson.
Duke said Wednesday, the second fire "was not a rekindle," and added he has a suspect in the case.
He said the sniffer showed traces of accelerant in several different locations in the house.
The bodies of the two victims were returned to Iowa Park Tuesday and funerals for the two victims were held Wednesday afternoon.
Allen Little and his family have moved into the home of his wife's parents in Wichita Falls, because the house that burned is uninhabitable.

TEXAS WEATHER: Rain, record high temps followed by 'blue norther'

Texas weather has been living up to its reputation the past few days.
A general rain fell over the area, starting Friday afternoon and contin-

uing until the next morning, leaving the second measurable precipitation of the new year and bring broad smiles to farmers.
That was followed by two days,

Monday and Tuesday, of unusually warm temperatures and hard winds.
But about 9 a.m. Wednesday, a front passed through from the north, and weather observers are promising sub-freezing temperatures the next few days.

While the official moisture reading for Iowa Park, taken by Virgil Woodfin, was .9218 of an inch, others reported an inch or more from Friday's rain.
Readings ranged from "about an inch" at Kamay to 1.25 northwest of town, to 1.75 on the east edge of the city.
Prior to that, .33 of an inch was received from a three-and-one-half inch snowfall two weeks earlier.
Farmers in general described the rain as a "lifesaver for the wheat."
Official temperatures at the weather bureau in Wichita Falls reached 78 degrees, setting a new record for Jan. 31.
Winds Monday and Tuesday gusted well above 25 miles per hour.
While the cold front is not expected to bring with it temperatures like the sub-zero readings Alaskans have been experiencing, temperatures are expected to reach as low as 10 degrees before the system moves on to the northeast.
Should the forecasters be correct, this will be the first "real winter weather" the area will have experienced since the winter of 1987-88.

Brothers in jail, hospital after fight Tuesday night

Two brothers from California were involved in a fight here with an Iowa Park man Tuesday night. One wound up in county jail and the other in the hospital.
Police were notified at 9:53 p.m. of a fight in progress at 711 E. Bank, but upon arrival, the two men had departed.
They reportedly had been fighting Monty Castro, of that address.
A few minutes later, a call for EMTs of the fire department were called to Park Gulf, on East Highway, to treat a man "who had been involved in a fight."
The injured man, Richard Slobig, 27, had scratches on his neck, bruises, and complained that one of his legs was numb and his back hurt.
The injured man was transported by ambulance to Wichita General Hospital.
Meanwhile, police ran a check on his brother, John Slobig, 29, and learned he was wanted in California on an outstanding warrant for violation of parole.
He was transported to county jail.
Castro told police he did not want to press charges against the two men.
Approximately \$1,000 worth of damage was inflicted to a vehicle in the 500 block of N. Wall sometime Wednesday night of last week.

The owner told police someone had cut all the wiring under the hood of his Suburban.
Approximately \$500 worth of damage was done to a home in the 900 block of E. Highway Thursday.
According to the police report, a light fixture was damaged, holes knocked in sheetrock, and trash scattered through the house.
Burglars were apparently scared away before they were ready Saturday evening at a home in the 900 block of E. Ruby.

Several items, including a portable television and boxes of jewelry had been placed in a suitcase that was found on the floor of a room when the owner returned home about 7:49 p.m.
According to the police report, a door had been forced open to gain entry into the house.
Still under investigation is the alleged theft of a billfold containing about \$20 in cash, taken from an employee's purse at Heritage Manor sometime Monday.

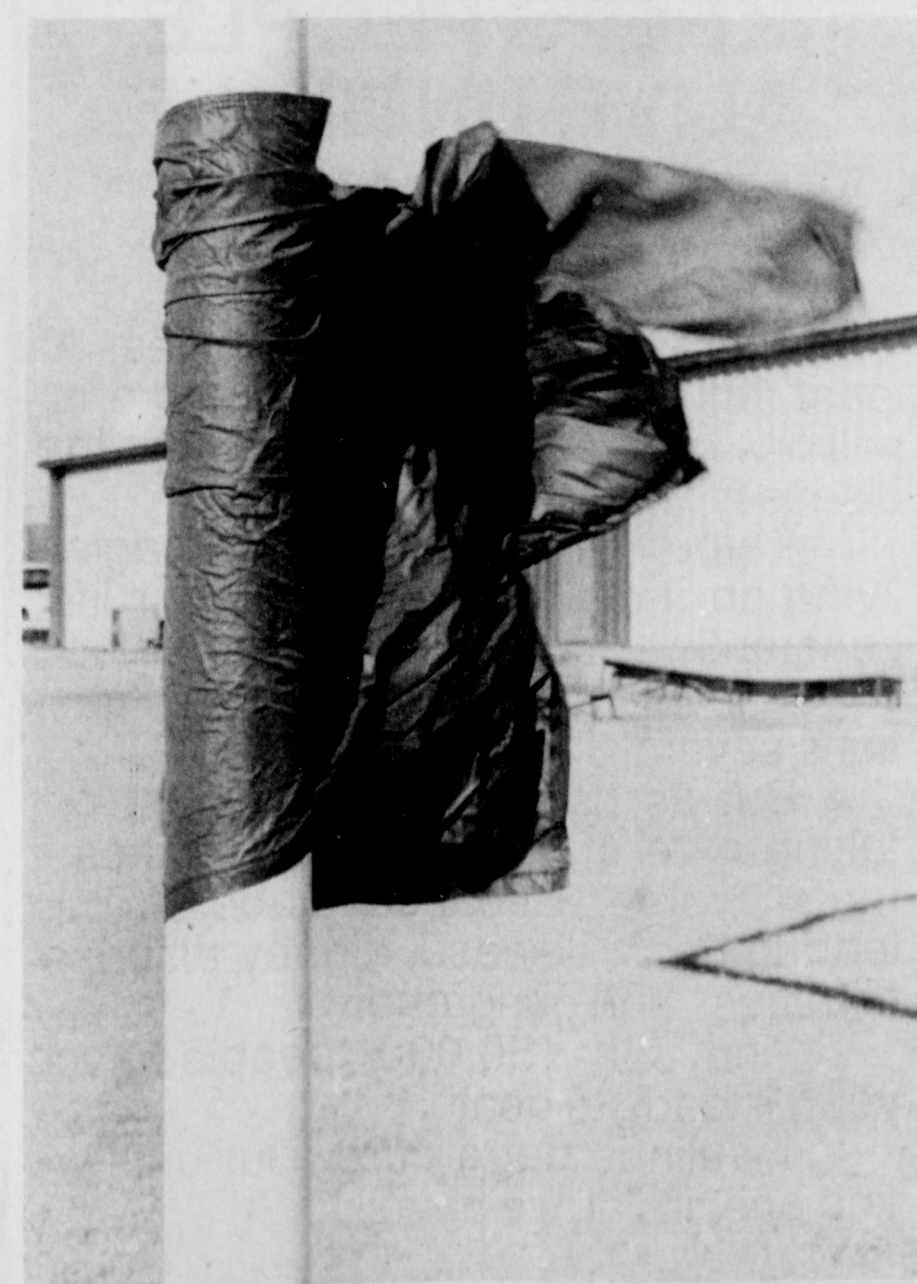

Trustees will be asked to act on bids for a light dimming system for the high school auditorium, and also on bid specifications for a new three-quarter ton pickup truck.

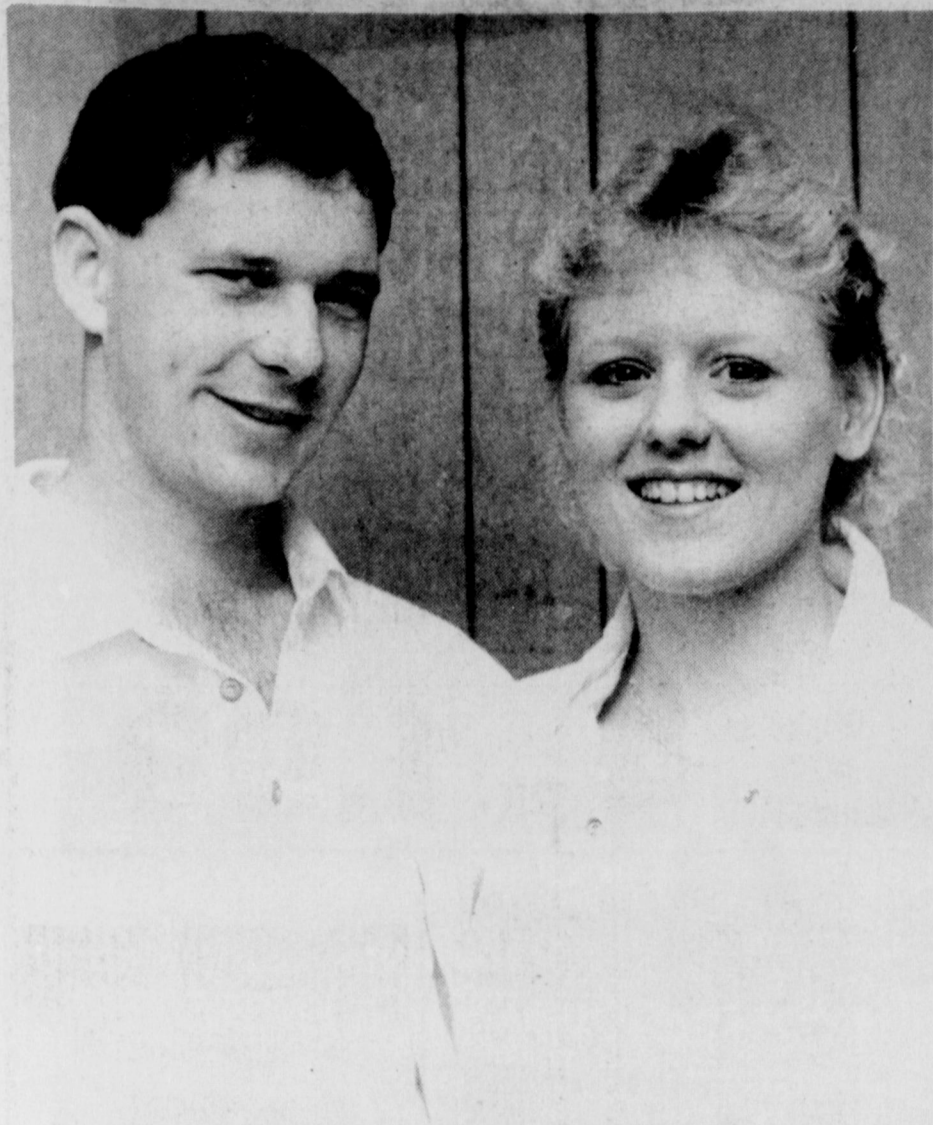
Reception to honor Nipper

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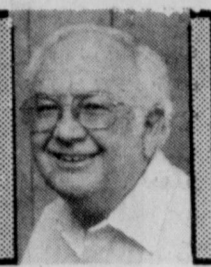
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As I See It... By BOB HAMILTON



I feel for those people up in Alaska, with those tremendously cold temperatures they've been experiencing the past couple of weeks.

It's hard for us to visualize what -50 or -60 degrees is like, here in this part of the country.

I went through a similar period in February 1951 while stationed at Anchorage in the Air Force.

I've always said it didn't make much difference once the temperature reached below 0. And, really, it doesn't.

Except for one phenomenon the news has reported as a possible cause of a military aircraft crashing: ice fog.

I was told by the men working in the weather station at Elmendorf AFB that when the temperature gets so cold, any moisture in the air freezes into tiny crystals. The crystals are so tiny and so thick, they give the appearance of fog. Hence, the term ice fog.

Anchorage achieved a record low temperature, as I remember, of -64 degrees at one point during that cold spell in February 1951. We were warned to dress properly with the gear we were issued, and whenever outside to check our exposed flesh, noses, cheeks, etc., for feeling, and not allow ourselves to be frostbitten.

That ice fog collects onto anything it touches. I recall one of the men in our barracks had a small copper wire stretched from one building to another, for a radio antenna. That wire grew to more than two inches in circumference with its ice crystal coating, yet hardly weighed more than an ounce per foot.

I was watching a report on tv Monday evening, and understood the reporter to say they were also experiencing strong winds at Anchorage.

That was a surprise to me. I don't remember a report of any winds in excess of 10 miles per hour those two years I was there. Anchorage is protected on three sides by tall mountains, and I'm not too sure the reporter wasn't confused as to the location where that particular film footage was shot.

We had a problem last weekend with weather. Not the cold kind, but the harassing wet kind.

Dolores and I went all the way down to San Antonio to attend the mid-winter convention of the Texas Press Association.

We left Wednesday afternoon, and didn't see the sun from the time we passed through Decatur until we were in the same area returning home Saturday afternoon.

We had planned, during breaks in the convention program, to go out on that city's famed river walk. But umbrellas wouldn't have been enough to keep us dry. It would have required full wet suits.

Unless you're familiar with the streets of San Antonio, getting into and out of the downtown area from the highway is an experience. There's construction almost everywhere you look, and one-way streets almost as frequent.

We stayed at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, which would require an entire column to describe. It's really nice.

Three of our speakers were outstanding, including Ben Barnes, Robert Flynn and Henry Cisneros.

Barnes, the former lieutenant governor, spoke on the banking crisis.

After pointing out all the banks and savings and loans in Texas that had been closed the past couple of years, Barnes accused the government of "selective enforcement" of banking laws.

"If the auditors had gone to New York at the same time they came to Texas, they would have closed down almost all the major banks there," he said, explaining their loan losses to third world countries were even more severe than Texas banks experienced.

San Antonio Mayor Cisneros said his city is an example of hope in Texas, with its success in growth, diversification and jobs gained. He told the audience Sea World had exceeded its anticipated goal of three-million attendance four months earlier than projected after opening.

He closed his talk by pointing out the growing populations of Hispanics, blacks and orientals in the south, primarily in Texas, Florida and California.

They're here, and growing, he said, and we must all start learning how to get along with each other.

From the jest of his talk, I almost got the idea he was telling us that the whites will, in a few more decades, become the minority population of those states.

To me, the most entertaining and interesting talk was by Flynn, who is writer-in-residence at Trinity Univ. in San Antonio.

A down-to-earth speaker, I would have enjoyed anything he had to say. But his talk that particular day was about his youth, when he was growing up in Chillicothe.

After his talk, and I wasn't ready for him to end it, I asked him if he remembered going to school with Keith Aulds.

His face lit up as he said yes. I almost got the idea he had some stories to tell about Keith, his late twin and other brothers. But he didn't, and asked only that I say hello to our local funeral director.

I may, sometime in the future when we return to San Antonio, look him up and pursue that matter in more detail.

Should make for an interesting column, if Keith doesn't burn the paper office before I get it printed.

New Chamber president outlines goals for year

Growth in membership, improved relations with Sheppard AFB and projects for the year were major topics of Monday's meeting of the Chamber of Commerce board of directors.

Chairing his first meeting since being installed as president, Ken Via reiterated his statement made at the recent annual banquet, listing his major goals for the year as being growth in membership and relations with the base.

He sought council from board members on how best to encourage more businesses and individuals to join the organization.

Via pointed out that a united representation of businesses could only be achieved with increased memberships, and many projects the organization might undertake requires more funding that could come from dues.

He also seeks to encourage more individual memberships.

Basic dues in the Chamber are \$120 per year for businesses and \$24 for individuals.

Via said he would council with representatives of the city government to see if a representative from the Chamber could also be named to the community relations council, which was formed for the purpose of improved relations between Sheppard with Wichita Falls, Burkburnett and Iowa Park.

At the present, Mrs. Phil Welch represents the city on that council, and is the only representative from Iowa Park in the organization.

The president asked each director for their suggestions of projects the Chamber might undertake during the year.

Responses were given, but no action on adoption of any particular project was taken.

New city maps was a project of the Chamber's last year, and Via, as first vice president, headed the project.

He told the board the advertising was sold for the printing of the maps, but costs were greater than the amount collected. He said he was still seeking a quote from a printer to finish the project.

Stan Spruiell was inadvertently left off a list of Iowa Parkans in last week's issue of the Leader who had completed degrees during the fall semester at Midwestern State Univ.

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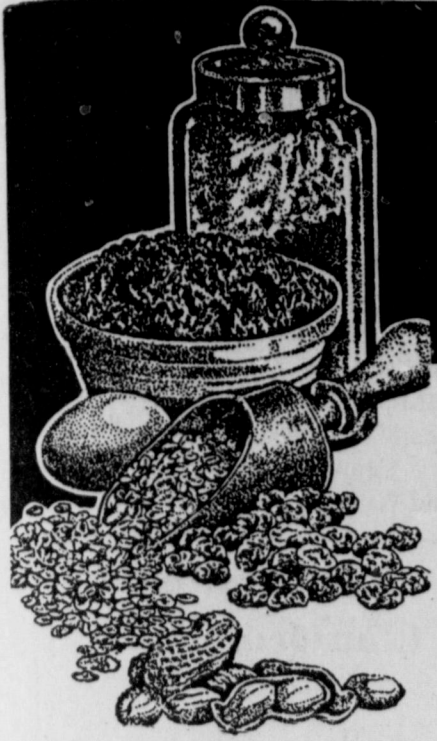

1 cup buttermilk
3 cups flour

Cream butter and sugar well. Add eggs 1 at a time and beat. Dissolve soda in warm water and add to buttermilk. Add flour and buttermilk alternately to creamed mixture and beat well. Add vanilla and beat some more. Pour into greased and floured tube pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 1 1/2 hours.

JELLO SALAD

1 pkg. lemon jello
1 can crushed pineapple
1 pkg. chopped nuts
Sliced bananas
1 pkg. marshmallows
1 pkg. whipping cream

Mix jello and refrigerate until it starts to mold. Fold in drained pineapple, bananas and marshmallows. Top with whipped cream and dust with crushed nuts.

PINEAPPLE CHIFFON PIE (Pink Pie)

1 1/3 cup pineapple juice
1 cup sugar
2 eggs well beaten
1 cup milk
1 pkg. strawberry jello
1 can milk frozen

Beat eggs. Add sugar, milk, and pineapple juice gradually; let come to a boil. Add jello and let cool. Then add to can of milk that has been frozen and whipped. Pour into graham cracker crust and freeze overnight.

SPAGHETTI

1 lb. ground beef
1 lb. Polish smoked sausage
1 lb. spaghetti
2- 16 oz. cans tomato sauce
3- 6 oz. cans tomato paste
Oregano
Italian seasoning
Garlic salt
Optional: Onion

Brown ground beef and smoked sausage (chopped or sliced), salt with garlic. Simmer 3-5 minutes. Add tomato sauce and paste, stir. Add oregano and Italian seasoning to taste. Simmer on low heat.
Cook noodles about 15 minutes or until done.
Serve with tossed salad and rolls.

REFRIGERATOR ROLLS

3/4 cup shortening
1 cup boiling water or scalded milk
2 eggs beaten
3/4 cup sugar
2 tsp. salt
1 cup cold water
2 pkg. yeast
1/2 cup lukewarm water
7 1/2 cups flour

Combine shortening and boiling water; stir until shortening is melted. Combine eggs, sugar and salt and beat in cold water. Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Combine the 3 mixtures and add flour. Dough will be too soft to knead. Just mix with heavy spoon until flour is completely mixed in. Cover and chill overnight.

To use: Remove dough from refrigerator, punch down, pinch off the amount needed, shape into conventional roll size. Place in greased pan and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake at 350 degrees 15-20 minutes, or until golden brown.
Shape remaining dough back into a ball and place in refrigerator.

ITALIAN STEAK

1 round steak, cubed
1 bottle Italian dressing
1 cup flour
1/2 cup oil

Marinate steak overnight in Italian dressing. Remove from dressing, flour, and wait about 20 minutes before frying.

BUTTERMILK CHICKEN

1 whole chicken, cut up
1 cup buttermilk
1 egg
1/2 cup oil

Mix the egg and buttermilk. Dip chicken in mixture before flouring. Fry on low heat 20-30 minutes.
