## Council to cut back on Jonhson paving

The city council went along with an appeal Monday night by a resident of Johnson Road to not pave a part of the street in front of her home.

Mrs. Jim Barbour, who lives on the north side of the Johnson and Wagon Wheel intersection, told the city that if all the street in front of her home couldn't be paved, she didn't want any paved.

She pointed out that the new concrete pavement would end right in line with her front door.

Mike Price, public works director, explained to the council that the plan calls for the new paving to narrow from 30 feet in width to 20 feet, and concrete was tapered to a point 96 feet north of the intersection.

To completely pave the street in front of the Barbour home would require an additional 86 feet, which would cost \$3,388 more than the bid calls for.

Mrs. Barbour was given the opportunity to assist in the cost of the additional paving, James Barrington, city administrator, told the council.

The homeowner responded that none of the homeowners to the south had paid anything for their new paving, and she didn't want to do that.

She asked that the paving be continued to her north property line, or stop at her south line.

The council voted unanimously, with Alderman Johnny Coker, who lives south of the Barbours, abstaining, to stop the paving at the south property line.

> EXECUTIVE SESSION Following a 49-minute execu

tive session with City Attorney Jay Cantrell, Mayor Tim Hunter announced the result of the meeting would be to "Turn the matter over to the city's liability insurance carrier."

The session had been held after a suit was filed against the city by Mabel Karstetter, owner of the property leased to the city southwest of town for the sanitary landfill.

Mrs. Karstetter alleges in the suit that city negligence caused the death of nine cows, and also the city had used topsoil from the site for its own benefit, but gave no compensation.

For the record, council members would not comment on the suit. But off the record, members said they had never seen nor heard any proof any cows had died in the landfill area.

The suit reportedly seeks to cover \$3,400 for the value of the cattle, \$15,000 for the topsoil, and mental anguish damages.

The council authorized the city

administrator to be prepared at the next meeting with detailed options for a workorder change on the Johnson Road project.

The change has to do with work needed where the storm sewer dumps into the ditch at the access road. If left as is, damage by washing water could occur on private property.

The change order could cost an additional \$800 to \$1,350, aldermen were told.

covered their mutual interest while in art class of first grade. They were each drawing dinosaurs.

And since that time, they have shared their interests, to the point of developing an impressive, though small, museum of fossils and stones in a shack at the Wells' farm west of town.

Fehr is majoring in geology and Wells in biology. Both are seniors, and both agree their hobby has made their studies easier and more interesting.

One of their most significant finds was, more or less, in Wells' own back yard.

On the south side of Buffalo Creek, the area not pinpointed because it might be too inviting to others who have no business on the property, Wells made his discovery.

They are the vertebra of a giant reptile known as a Dimetrodon, identified as having lived during the Triassic period of the Mesozoic era, some 225-million years ago.

They also have several samples of footprints in limestone made by the Eryops, an amphibian about the size of a large dog, found at Lake Kemp.

Originally discovered by two professors from MSU, the two young paleontologists out-did the two professionals by finding tracks the teachers didn't.

According to the students, the Eryops had four toes on its front feet and five on its back. The boys have fossilized prints of both front and back while the teachers have only the front.

They took over a small shack used by Rex Wells, Kyle's father, for working on his guns and shellloading, because they needed the room to hold their finds and items purchased.

About 80 percent of their fossil collection they've found themselves, but most of their mineral exhibit has

## Iowa Park showing gain in sales, report shows

While a great number of Texas communities are experiencing a drop in sales tax collections because of a drop in the economy, Iowa Park is still managing an increase.

June's sales provided a check of \$11,645.74 to Iowa Park, which increased the year's total to \$90,732.05, an increase of 12.28percent over the \$80,805.94 reported this time last year.

June sales in 1985 raised sales tax of \$9,598.78, according to the state comptroller's report. Wichita Falls, with a gain of

1.10-percent over 1985, is second to Iowa Park among other Wichita County communities.

Burkburnett is reporting a gain of 0.48-percent, and Electra has a loss of 23.55-percent.

By comparison, Electra had received \$105,523 this time last year.

Holliday's July check was only \$3,844.76, down from \$11,701.81 last year. For the year, that community has received \$40,055.66, which is 18.89-percent below the \$49,384.83 reported the first six months last year.







Not only a problem for the patient, but those who are responsible for their care. A few suggestions may be of help. For denture wearers who are unable to care for themselves. . . at regular intervals remove the dentures, and using a damp gauze or clean wash cloth, wipe the ridges where the dentures rest. Rub the top of the tongue if the patient will permit. Many of these patients have a dry mouth due to health problems or medications being taken. Tartar collecting on the dentures is another problem easily taken care of. Simply place the dentures in a cup of vinegar overnight, then brush and wrinse. While inexpensive, it does a reasonably good job without much trouble. Nursing homes have trouble many times trying to find out which denture belongs to which patient. Sometimes the patient can't tell . . . so what do you do? One solution to the problem is to have the dentist imbed the patients name in the denture in clear plastic. . . then there is no question. By the way. . . for those patients with a chronically dry mouth. . there is a synthetic saliva available at the local pharmacy. A few drops placed in the patients mouth certainly will make life a little easier.



before the discovery of America, and that it is possible that the squash was the first food cultivated by Pueblo Indians at least 2,000 years ago.

It is somewhat confusing to read in the same article that "squash" was grown in the gardens of Babylon; that Pliny mentioned it; that Apicus gave a recipe for it; and that it was mentioned in the first Roman cookbook. However, it is believed that their word for squash really meant edible gourd which can still be eaten

The summer squash is the variety called for in Mrs. Hardin's recipe. A French gastronome described the summer squash as "it brings deliciously to the table all the freshness and the charm of your vegetable garden."

### MEXICAN SQUASH

3 summer squash (about 1 lb.) unpeeled and sliced 1/4 inch thick 1 large onion, sliced 1 clove garlic, chopped 2 tbsp. butter or oleo 2 ears fresh corn cut off the cob or 1 1/2 cups canned corn, drained medium tomato, peeled and 1 chopped Chopped jalapeno pepper or canned green chilies to taste 1 1/2 tsp. salt

3/4 cup grated cheese

Saute onion and garlic in butter until tender. Add squash, corn, tomato, pepper and salt. Cover and simmer 30 minutes or until squash is tender. Pour into serving bowl. Sprinkle with cheese and corn chips. Serves 6.

FRUIT DIP 1 cup sugar 1/2 cup hot water 2/3 cup light corn syrup 2 egg whites

1/4 tsp. vanilla Dash of salt 1/8 cup mayonnaise Combine sugar, water and syrup in saucepan. Over low heat stir until

sugar is dissolved. Boil without stirring until mixture will spin a thread. Beat egg whites until stiff and add to hot syrup. Add salt and vanilla, mix well. Fold in mayonnaise. If mixture is too stiff add orange juice. Chill and serve with fruits of your choice.

EASY ROLLS 2 cups self-rising flour

1 cup milk

4 tbsp. mayonnaise

Mix well and spoon into greased muffin pans. Bake at 400 degrees until golden brown, about 15-20 minutes. Makes about 12 rolls.

#### HOLLIDAY MEAT BALLS 1 lb. ground beef

1 egg 10-12 saltine crackers, crushed 2 tbsp. Worcestershire sauce 2 tbsp. finely-chopped onions Salt and pepper 1 (12 oz.) jar chili sauce 1 (12 oz.) jar grape jelly Mix all ingredients, except chili sauce and jelly, as though making meat loaf. Form balls, approximately 1 inch in diameter from the meat

Place chili sauce and grape jelly in a deep saucepan, heat and mix thoroughly. Allow to come to a boil. Drop the meat balls, one at a time, into the boiling mixture.





I guess the main thing is that the money the "Hands" event raised will finally get to where it was intended in the first place .... even if it does take a couple of years.


Bob Bullock, the state comptroller I've taken issue with on a number of occasions, is getting more press these days than when he was being arrested for DWI.

## The Jesse Chisholm Trail

Jesse Chisholm gave his name to one of the most famous episodes in western history, but he never knew it. Chisholm, of Scotch and Cherokee ancestry, migrated with the Cherokees from Tennessee to Arkansas in the 1830s and later set up a trading post at Council Grove, on the North Canadian River near present-day Oklahoma City. His

freight wagons cut a 220-mile TEXAS SKETCHES path from Wichita, Kan., down to his store, and in 1866 when a Texas cattleman asked the best way to drive a herd to the Kansas and Missouri

markets, he was advised to "take Chisholm's trail." Joseph G. McCoy was hired by the developers of the new town of Abilene, Kan., to get a trail laid out to bring Texas herds to their railhead. McCoy's trail began deep in South Texas, the first cattle going up to Abilene in 1867. But instead of being called "McCoy Trail" or "Abilene Trail," by 1868 the route from Texas to Kansas was called the Chisholm Trail, giving its title to legendary cattle drives of story, song and film. The Texas portion of the trail saw several herds combined below San Antonio and again near Austin, crossing the Colorado River. The Brazos was crossed at Kimball Bend or Waco, then all herds combined at Fort Worth, continuing through Denton, Cooke and Montague counties to the dangerous crossing of "Big Red" at Red River Station.

Fort Worth was where the trail drivers outfitted their cowboys for the long trip across the Indian Nations. In season, the trail was a living, animal river. In 1871, half a million head of cattle passed through Fort Worth going up the Chisholm Trail. Although later cattle trails moved westward, Fort Worth remained "Cowtown" in the

## Three state parks located in area for recreation

"See Texas First" is the recommendation of Rep. Charles Finnell, in urging citizens to visit some of the state parks Texas has to offer in the immediate area.

Three of the 109 state-operated parks are within Finnell's ninecounty 80th House District.

"In these times, it is both intelligent and economical to see and discover Texas first," Finnell said. "Travel and tourism constitute the second largest industry in our state."

Copper Breaks State Park, in Hardeman and Foard counties, contains Indian ceremonial grounds, a portion of the official Texas Longhorn herd, and an interpretive display. Fishing, swimming and a boat ramp are available.

Fort Richardson Historical Park is a 387-acre historic sight in Jack County. It was one of the "string of seven forts," the original defense system against Indians, and features original and reconstructed barracks and buildings of that colorful post-Civil War period. Tours can be arranged; fishing and a museum are also available.

Lake Arrowhead Recreation Area in Clay and Archer counties is an extensive recreational park offering boating, water skiing, swimming and fishing on the man-made lake. The park has a grocery store and paddleboat rentals.

All state parks post a nominal admission fee. Copper Breaks, Fort Richardson and Lake Arrowhead offer camping areas (utility and primative), picnic areas, restrooms, showers, nature trails and group shelters.

More information can be obtained by contacting the individual state parks or by calling the Texas Tourist Bureau.
