\$5.4-million budget proposed for school

Iowa Park school trustees generally agreed on a \$5,464,620 budget for the 1986-87 year, but must still resolve the tax rate.

In their regularly-scheduled meeting Tuesday evening, board members expressed satisfaction that as much "fat" had been trimmed from the proposed budget as was possible.

The budget reflects an increase of \$153,953 over the past year's budget.

Eventhough the board will wait to set the tax rate, after the special session of the state legislature, the discussion on a proposed four-cent increase disclosed a split among members.

W.N. Kirby, state commissioner of education, advised all school boards by letter recently to not set a tax rate until they have an indication of how much money will be provided by the state this year.

Supt. Glen Mitchell, basing his proposed budget on a state funding formula used last year, built the revenue portion of the budget to include a four-cent tax rate increase.

The tax rate for 1985-86 was 71-

cents.

The proposed budget calls for a deficit of \$434,218, which would be taken from the anticipated carryover from the current year's \$1.5-million.

Martha Dudley was the first to say she could not support a tax increase, and received vocal support from John Sibley and Marilyn Hale.

But board chairman Jimmy Howell said if the four-cents were not added, the district would face a "pay now or pay later" situation.

He said he felt if the smaller increase were not built into the tax structure this year, it would require an even larger increase next year, because the carryover necessary to fund the first three months of school would be depleted.

Howell made a point that the interest earned from the carryover money was equal to four and a half cents on the tax rate.

The superintendent admitted there was some extra money built into the maintenance fund, for use in case of an extended cold spell which would cost more in utilities than

normal.

"We hope we don't have to use that money," he said. "We've already cut (budget requests) in most areas before we came to you (with the budget)."

"I feel with 75-cents we won't be wasting anybody's money," stated Howell. He reminded the board that law prevents a school district from making any kind of tax rate adjustment once a rate has been set for the year.

The four-cent increase is equal to two major expenditures in the budget: a computer for the administration office and resurfacing of the track in Hawk Stadium.

The budget calls for the carry-over to be cut to \$1,047,256. But Mitchell said he "felt comfortable" that it could be nearer \$1.2-million, if state funds were near the regular formula and no major expenses such as extremely bad weather developed.

Proposed expenditures by department, and changes from last year,

include: High School, \$984,543, down \$31,162; Vocational, \$235,928, down \$2,806; High School Band, \$27,680, down \$45,705; High School Choir, \$15,810, up \$7,460;

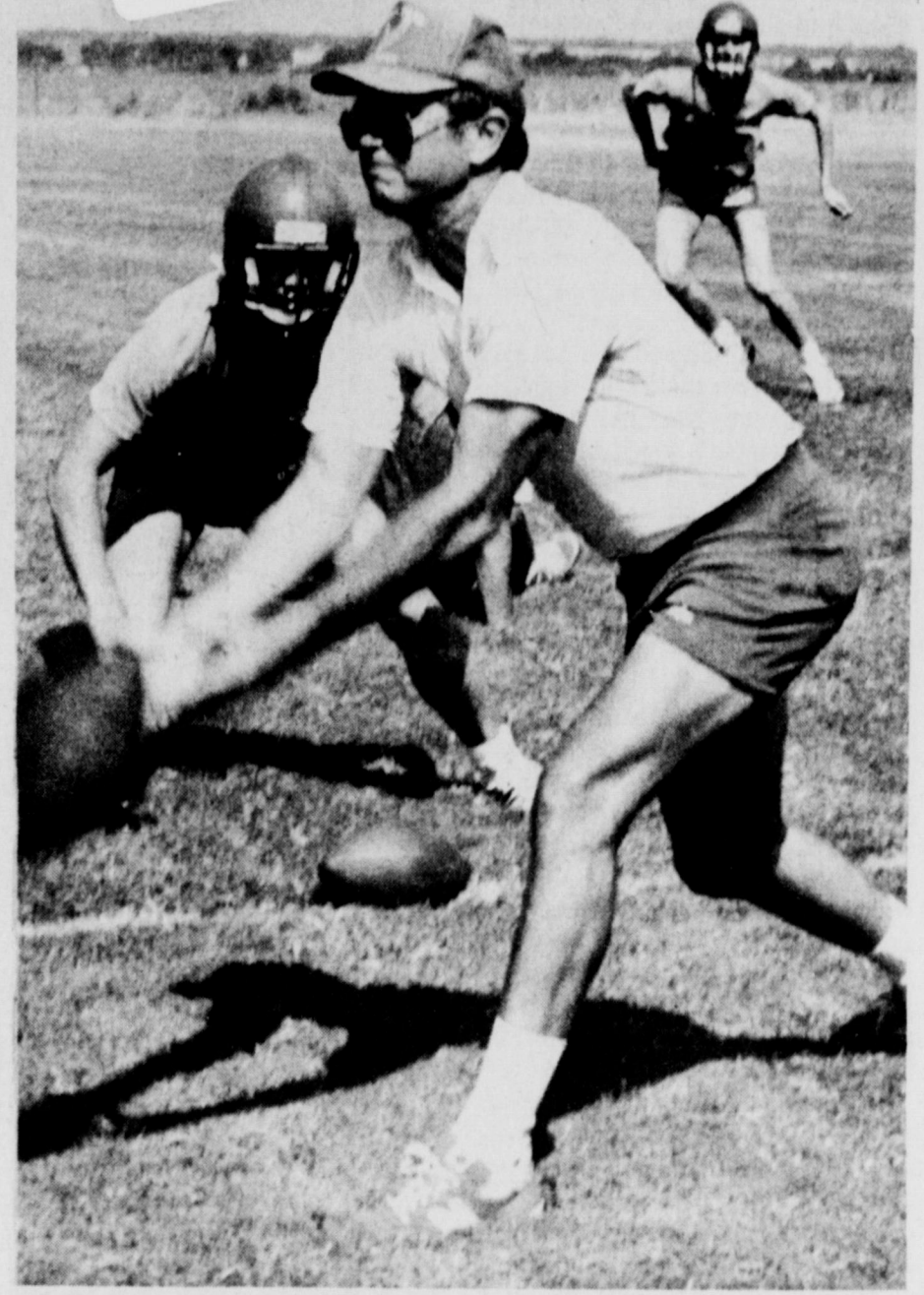
Junior High School, \$625,496, up \$50,663; Junior High Band, \$4,900, up \$600; Junior High Choir, \$1,800, unchanged; Bradford Elementary, \$552,462, up \$33,442; Gifted and Talented, \$25,610, not funded last year;

Kidwell Elementary, \$604,770, up \$108,735; Special Education, \$337,325, up \$57,199; Athletics, \$112,270, up \$12,398; Transportation, \$183,150, up \$13,700; Maintenance, \$737,413, up \$92,838; Cafeteria, \$352,200, up \$9,200;

Administration, \$320,582, up \$51,620; Tax Office, \$77,359, down \$10,135; Debt Service, \$182,333, down \$7,669; Construction, none, down \$200,000; Swimming Pool, \$24,637, unchanged; Chapter I Fund, \$47,723, down \$9,753; Chapter 2 Fund, \$9,629, down \$2,282;

Budget, \$5,464,620, up \$153,953.

The board will hold a public hearing Aug. 26, at which time questions from the public will be answered, and also the expenditure portion of the budget will be adopted, as required by law.

Board approves bids, hires two personnel

Iowa Park school trustees Tuesday night approved bids for foods and gasoline to be purchased during the year, hired two new personnel, and heard a report on changes for in-town bus riders.

Bids were accepted from: Preston Dairy for milk; Oak Farms for ice cream; Bairds for bread, and Chambles, Mobile distributor, for gasoline.

New personnel hired included Dennis Brooks, former Vocational Agriculture instructor, to teach general construction, and Linda Gray, resource teacher at high school.

Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer told the board he and helpers had registered some 700 in-town students, in one day, who will ride buses to school.

The major change being made for bus students is that stops this year will be cut from 81 to about a dozen, Palmer said.

"This will subtract 20-30 minutes for every route," he explained.

Roll call of students riding buses every month, trustees were told. Continued on page 4

The Friendly Door needs volunteers

Twenty volunteers with their own transportation are being sought to assist The Friendly Door, according to Myrna Robinson, manager.

Due to funding cutbacks, delivery of the food served each weekday noon at The Friendly Door will not be provided.

Mrs. Robinson said she needs 20 volunteers who would make the trip once a month.

The food, some of it cooked and the rest unprepared, must be picked

up at 11th and Burnett between 9 and 10 a.m. each weekday. Items picked up can fit in the trunk and back seat of a car, she said.

The delivery cutback took effect Monday.

The Friendly Door, which provides social activities as well as prepared meals for senior citizens, is funded by the Department of Human Resources, North Texas Regional Planning Commission and The United Way.

Student screening set next week

All children who will be five years old on or before Sept. 1, and who were not screened for kindergarten last May, will be screened prior to the beginning of school.

The screening is scheduled by appointment only, between 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday and Tuesday.

Parents should call Kidwell Elementary, 592-4322, for appointment.

Parents are asked to remain with their children until the screening is completed, and have with them the

child's birth certificate and immunization record.

A full year "Special Education Early Childhood" program for three- and four-year old children is available if they have a physical or learning deficiency as determined by sight, hearing, speech, mental maturity, or a physician's diagnosis.

Parents who feel their child may be eligible for the program and missed the screening in May also should call Kidwell Elementary for an appointment.

Seasonal businesses now to be regulated

The city council passed an ordinance Monday night which would regulate seasonal businesses.

Aldermen delayed enforcement of a provision already on the books which requires licensing of building contractors.

Seasonal businesses were described as snow cone stands and stands where farm produce is sold.

Such stands, called short term or seasonal businesses, will be required to comply with "all electrical, plumbing, set-backs, and all other business related ordinances of the city..."

The fee for non-farm produce stands is \$30 for a six-month period and farm produce stands is \$5.

Requirement of building contractor licensing and bonding is already on the city books, but has never been enforced, aldermen were told.

The provisions are listed in the

Standard Building Code, which was adopted several years ago by the city.

A change order on the Johnson Road repaving project, which includes reducing the surface to be paved at the north end and drainage grates, was approved and resulted in a savings of \$2,477, according to James Barrington, city administrator.

An ordinance abandoning a 20-foot strip land right of way in the 100 block of S. Hawthorne was approved.

Also approved was an ordinance establishing holidays for city employees to be New Year's Day, Texas

Independence Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

The holiday ordinance does not become effective until Oct. 1.

A request to permit disposal of all general ledger records retained by the city, prior to 1980, was okayed.

In the second required public hearing on Federal Revenue Sharing, no comment was received from the audience.

Barrington said he does not anticipate any revenue sharing funds this year.

Pavement project to begin next week

City crews will begin sealcoating 64 blocks of streets next Thursday and, if no problems develop, be finished the next day.

Scheduled to have been done earlier in the summer, the project was delayed because county equipment, which the city leases, was not available, according to Mike Price, public works director.

Residents of the streets involved are asked to not park along the curbs during the two-day project, and not have any other vehicles parked.

Residents are also asked to not drive on the streets while work is underway.

Blocks involved, and the order in which crews will be working, are: 100 through 400 blocks of South Jackson, from railroad tracks south to Lafayette; 100 through 400 blocks of South

Colorado, from Daisy south to Lafayette; 400 and 500 blocks of West Chestnut, from FM 368 west to west side of Holder's house; 400 through 1100 blocks of South Texowa, from Ruby south to Garden; 100 through 1000 blocks of East Ruby, from Wall east to FM 1814; 100 through 700 blocks of East Jefferson, from Wall east to Hawthorne; 100 and 200 blocks of West Smith, from Wall west to Jackson;

300 through 1000 blocks of East Cash, from Bond east to Bell; 100 through 1500 blocks of North Victoria, from East Highway north to Access Road; 100 North Texowa, from East Highway north to Cash; 400 through 1000 blocks of East Pasadena, from Texowa east to Bell.

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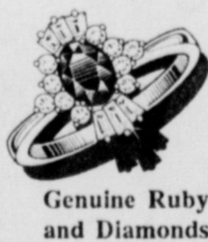
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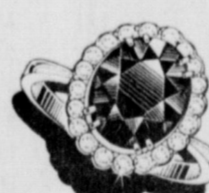
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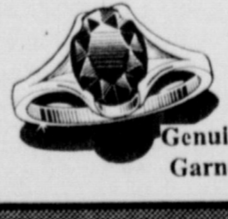
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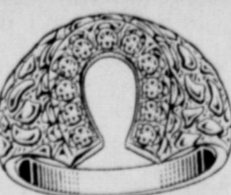


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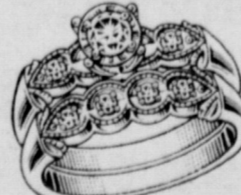


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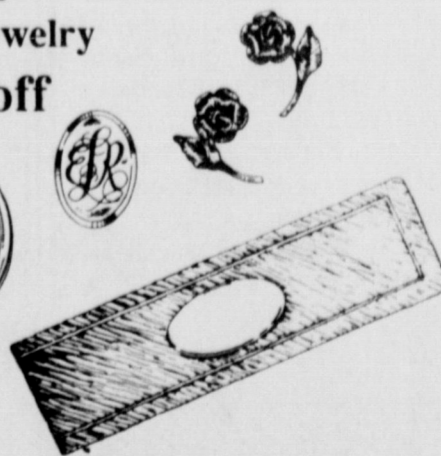
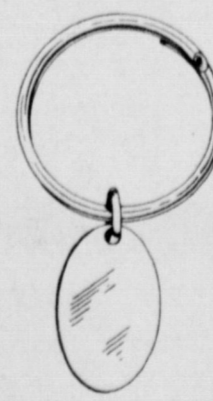
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As I See It....

Listening to a talk by Speaker of the House, Gib Lewis, Saturday in Fort Worth, he made a statement that certainly sounded familiar, as well as common sense.

It took me a while to place the phrase with the originator of the comment, but I did.

"You don't assess new taxes on people who are already having a hard time."

That is a paraphrase of one made earlier by Bill Clements, former governor and now a candidate opposing Mark White in the November general election.

Why is it worth mentioning?

Well, Lewis is a Democrat and Clements is a Republican. And both are irritating the dickens out of the governor, who wants more taxes, as does Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby.

Lewis, himself a businessman, applied his own business sense to formulating a plan on how the state can take care of its \$3.5-billion shortfall this year, which is the purpose of the special session now underway.

He explained when his sales were down, he couldn't raise his prices, because his customers and competition wouldn't let him.

"You have to make cuts in your

operation," he stated.

Boy, that's refreshing to hear from an elected official. It's about the same kind of logic I heard from Rep. Stan Schlueter of Killeen, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee I told you about last month.

While I'm not too sure about part of some revenue Lewis proposes to help the state fund, another part is very sensible.

He proposes to take the revenue generated from the deposits of the Permanent University Fund and the Permanent School Fund. The interest from the funds, not the principal.

Lewis raised a lot of eyebrows and got a lot of reaction on this one.

I might not go along with the School Fund, but there is no reason

why, that I can see, that revenue from the University Fund couldn't be used to help bail out the state.

At a time when enrollments are down at almost every public college and university in the state, we don't need more new-building construction. That is the only thing the money can be used for.

If your attention is not directed toward Austin and the special session, it should be. You should read and listen to every report coming from there.

And you should pay attention to who is making the most noise and how it will affect your pocketbook.

That's your money they're talking about, you know.

One change not made from last year's in-town bus routes, is that Kidwell Elementary students will be let off the buses at the same places they were last year, in order to have them closer to their homes in the afternoon.

The same buses bringing students into town will not be used to transport in-town students, thus cutting the time rural students have to spend on their routes, Palmer said.

The board voted to approve changes in the bus routing.

They also approved schedules for free and reduced lunches, a formality required to receive federal commodities, and were told there would be no need for any increases in lunchroom prices.

Supt. Glen Mitchell proposed the board allow the district to receive its state funds "electronically," with deposits being made straight to the bank. Trustees did not object.

Transfer of a third grade student, son of a Kidwell Elementary teacher not residing in the city, was approved by the board.

Also approved was a policy to allow qualified high school students to take college courses, if those courses are not offered locally.

Following a program instituted last year, four students who competed on the state level in University Interscholastic League events were recognized and presented framed certificates.

Four recognized were Stacy Miller, headline writing in literary contest; Lisa Hodges, twirling, and Stephen Biddy and Scott Weaver, both of whom competed in the high

jump at the state track meet.

Prior to the meeting, board members toured the four-room addition to Kidwell Elementary, and voted to accept the building from the contractor. Members complimented the work of both the contractor and the architect.

In the waning moments of the regular meeting, high school science teacher Tim Kaspar asked permission to speak.

His request came at the end of a discussion on the 1986-87 budget, and Kaspar expressed his fear that money would be cut from the budget, while his chemistry room was in need of equipment.

Kaspar said he feared legal action in case of an accident and equipment which is required was not available.

Both Mitchell and Kaspar's principal, Richard Davis, pointed out to the teacher and board members that the line item budget included almost everything to which he addressed.

The faculty member was then informed by the board president that the school has a "chain of command." If a teacher does not receive satisfaction from meetings with his principal and then superintendent, he is then to request a place on the meeting agenda.

Local sales tax still above '85

Iowa Park is still showing a healthy gain in sales taxes collected over the previous year, according to a report from the state comptroller's office.

The report was for taxes collected in June and during the second quarter and reported to Austin by July 20.

The rebate check was \$15,038, which raised the year's total to \$105,770.05, an 11.22 percent gain

over the \$95,101.95 reported this time last year.

Wichita Falls, with a 3.54 percent gain, is the only other county community in the plus column. Burkburnett is down .52 percent and Electra is down 27.41 percent.

For the year, Electra has dropped from \$125,519 to \$91,112, according to the report.

Holliday is down almost as much as Electra, 22.55 percent. That community's receipts for the year have dropped from \$59,113 to \$45,784.

Archer City is down 8.93 percent, Lakeside City 11.57 and Megargel 10.12. Only Scotland and Windthorst are reporting gains, 7.81 and 8.68 percent, respectively.

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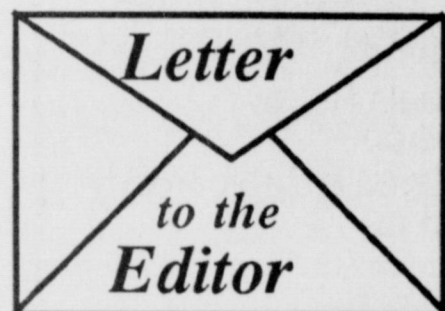
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To the editor,

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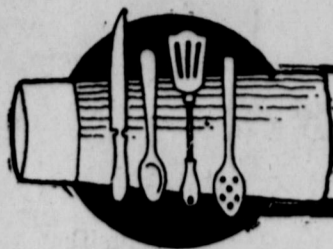

Pizzas appeal to both the young and the old because they look, smell and, of course, taste good. They are crusty, eye-appealing and a good meal to balance with milk.

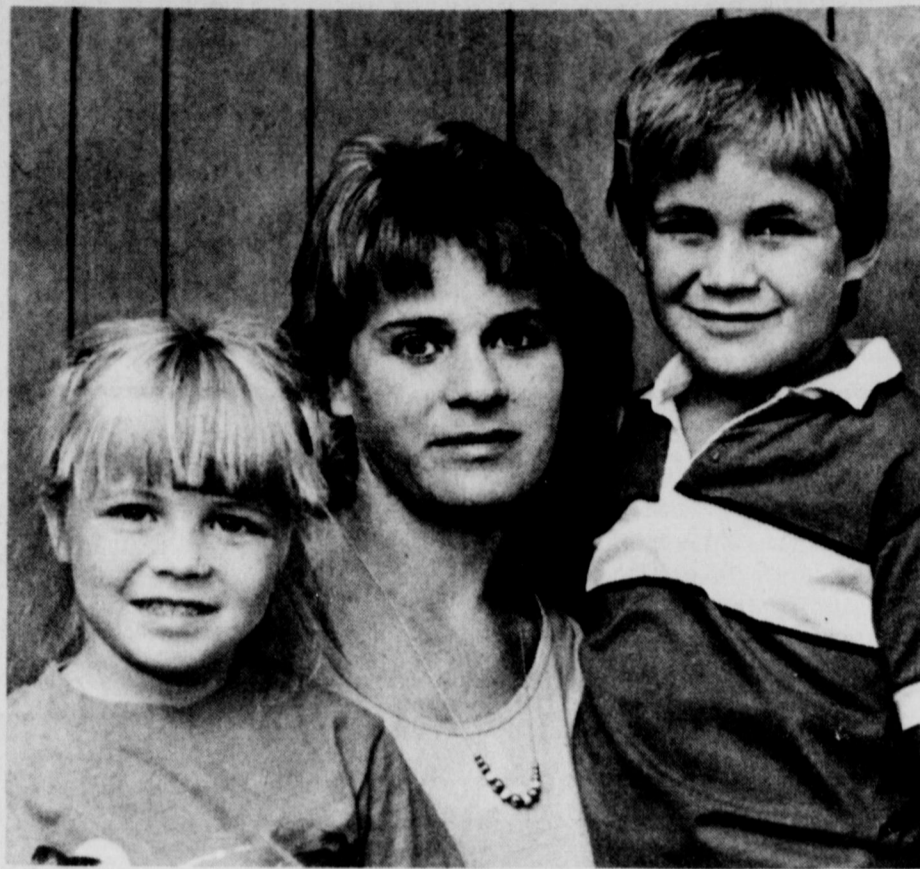

Connoisseurs say that Mozzarella cheese is the best for pizza making and it comes from Italy's Campania made from buffalo milk.

Not many people, if any, have aspiration to make the world's largest pizza, and certainly Linda (Mrs. Blaine) Horton, our cook for this week, does not. She does use the best cheese, according to the connoisseurs, and, in all probability, pizza is one of the favorite dishes that she prepares for her family.

2 1/2 cups flour
3/4 tsp. baking powder
1/4 tsp. salt

Combine first seven ingredients in a saucepan, bring to a rolling boil and boil 1 minute, stirring constantly. Chill thoroughly before using. Cream together margarine and sugar until light and fluffy, add egg and vanilla and blend well. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt, add to creamed mixture and blend well.

Chill dough and roll out on a lightly floured board about 1/8 inch thick and cut with fluted cookie cutter. Place a spoonful on each of half of the cookies. Cut 2 gashes in other rounds and place over filling. Gently lift parts so that filling will show. Press edges together with a fork. Place on greased baking sheet and bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees) 8 to 10 minutes. Makes about 40 filled cookies.

TUNA SALAD

1 can tuna
1 small onion
1 large apple, cut in chunks
1/2 to 1 cup pecans
1/2 to 1 cup chopped celery
1 large sweet or dill pickle
Mix and add mayonnaise to taste. This can be used with crackers or as sandwich spread.

CHERRY BING BARS

2 cups sugar
2/3 cup evaporated milk
dash of salt
12 ozs. regular marshmallows
1/2 cup plus 1 Tbs. margarine
1 tsp. vanilla
6 oz. cherry drops (chips)
10 oz. crushed salted peanuts
3/4 cup peanut butter
12 oz. cocoa or chocolate chips
Mix sugar, milk, salt, marshmallows and 1/2 cup margarine in pan over low heat. Boil 5 minutes, add cherry drops and vanilla. Put into 9 X 13 buttered pan. Cool. After this

is cool melt chocolate chips in pan or double boiler. Add 1 Tbs. margarine, peanut butter and crushed peanuts. Spread over cherry mixture and chill. Keep in cool place. Cut in small pieces.

MEXICAN CASSEROLE

1 1/2 lbs. hamburger meat
2 cans Ranch style beans
1 can RoTel chilies and tomatoes
1 1/2 pkg. Taco sauce
1 pkg. tortillas (flour)
1 can cream of chicken soup
pkg. cheese

Brown meat in large pan; place tortillas in 9 X 11 X 2 cake pan, then a layer of meat and beans, then cheese, chilies and tomatoes, taco sauce. Pour the cream of chicken soup over last and bake at 350 degrees 30 to 45 minutes.

NEW ORLEANS CHOCOLATE SHEET CAKE

2 cups flour
2 cups sugar
1 stick margarine
1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. vanilla
4 Tbs. cocoa
1/2 cup cooking oil
1 cup water
2 eggs
1/2 cup milk (optional buttermilk)
1 tsp. cinnamon

Sift together flour and sugar and set aside. Bring to a boil the margarine, cocoa, and oil and water. Remove from heat and add to flour and sugar mixture. Add eggs, milk, soda, cinnamon and vanilla. Pour into a greased 11 X 16 pan. Bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees.

FROSTING

1 lb. powdered sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
1 stick margarine
6 Tbs. cocoa
6 Tbs. coffee
Combine margarine, coffee and cocoa. Bring to boil. Add powdered sugar and vanilla. Spread over cake quickly.

Class schedules ready Aug. 28

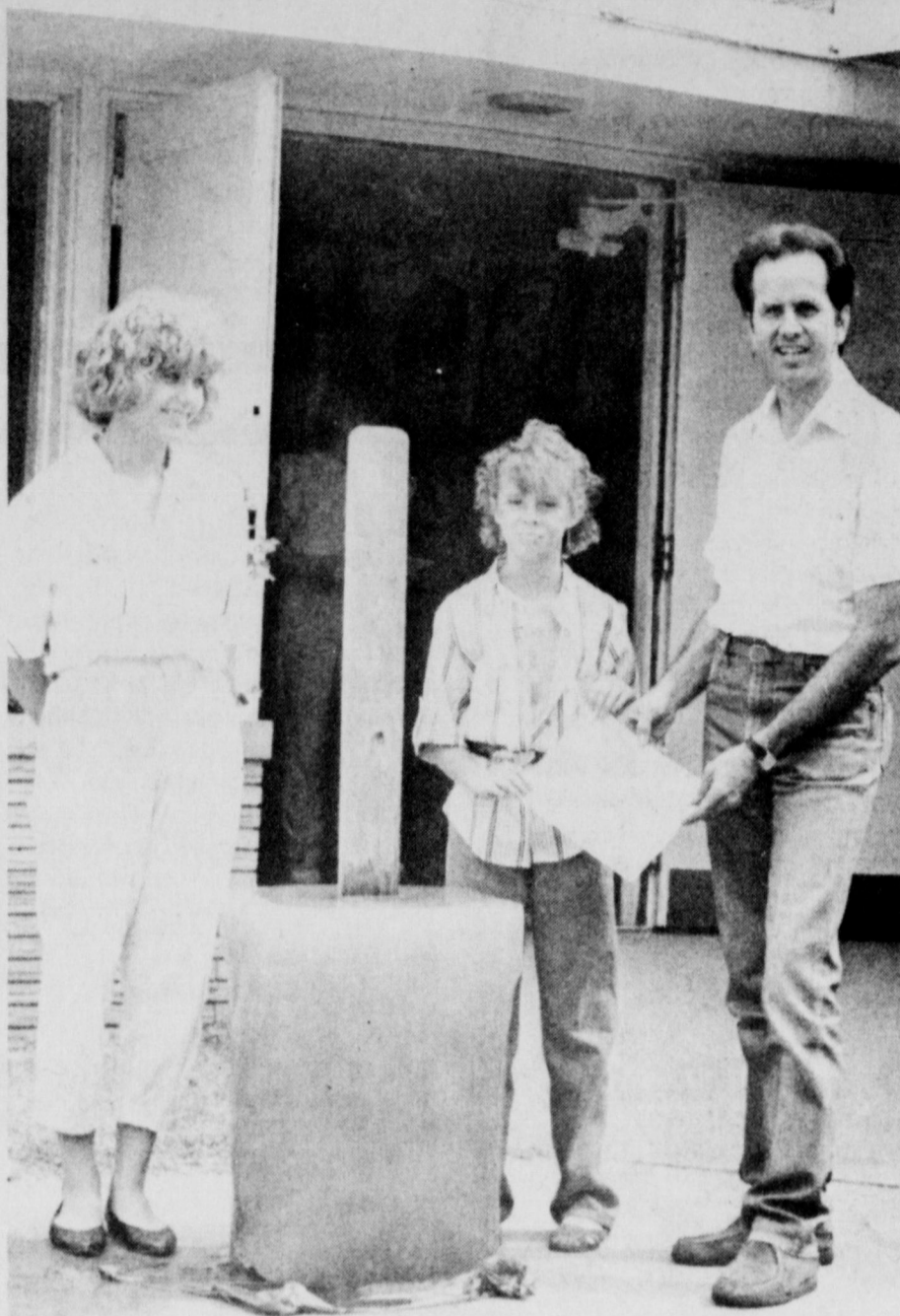
HOLLIDAY - August 28 is the date set for all Holliday High School students to pick up their class schedules and parking permits, according to Bill Lee, principal.

Tips On Dental Health

ROOT CANAL FILLING

Occasionally the pulp tissue of the tooth is injured, may die and become infected. Root canal treatment is necessary if the tooth is to be retained. This means to remove the infected tissue and entering the canal at the root tip. With modern materials and methods this sometimes can be done in one appointment, but it usually takes several times.

Root canal therapy can be done if the tooth is accessible (usually not on wisdom teeth), and the canals are open enough for the dentist to get the reamer (little drills) through to the tip of the root in a manner that it can be thoroughly cleaned and sealed.

The success rate is about 90+ percent, but it also depends on the patients health and the ability of the body to repair itself. It is usually wise for the treated tooth to be covered with a crown to prevent further damage and to rebuild the crown of the tooth.

Many times it is convenient to complete the treatment without pain or injections because the nerve is totally dead. However, sometimes if the patient has put off and put off and appears at the dental office with prolonged pain - sometimes there is no magic to eliminate all the pain-don't wait!

Health Tips

Winter skin isn't all that far away. Millions of customers will be looking for relief.

Airtight houses and turned-up thermostats will soon signal the beginning of the cold season. With it will come a rash of customers with "winter skin," victims of overheated rooms who suffer dry, usually itching, skin. They're likely to seek our aid first for the disorder.

We can assure customers that most dry skin conditions, while irritating, are minor. Simply, dry skin is a condition in which there is insufficient moisture present in the outer surface of the skin. A 10 or 15 percent keratin hydration level is normal for most climates. Once the relative humidity of air decreases, such as during the winter months, keratin's moisture content drops below the critical 10 percent minimum. It then dries, cracks and loses its integrity of a physical barrier.

Dry skin, a common condition, suffered by millions of Americans, can occur at any age, but is more common in older patients.

We can suggest several ways of combating dry skin. The best way is to prevent drying in the first place, by increasing the amount of moisture in the environment. Adding a humidifying unit to the furnace is one way. A less expensive alternative is to recommend a cool mist vaporizer whenever the air is dry.

Excessively long baths and strong soaps can rob the skin of moisture. We suggest that persons avoid these, and "blot" the skin dry after bathing, rather than rubbing it.

Finally, we suggest one of the many skin emollients or protectives available. Products containing petroleum jelly or lanolin fill in tiny fissures in the skin and help smooth it.

If patients don't get relief of dry skin in a reasonable time, they should seek the advice of a dermatologist.

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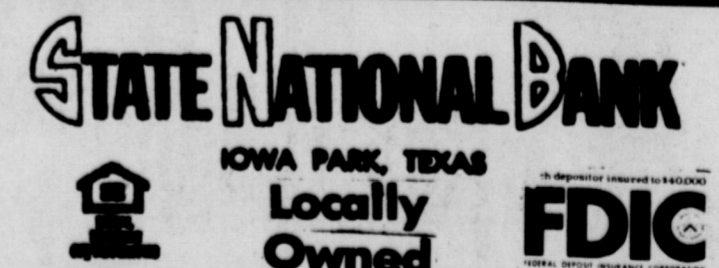

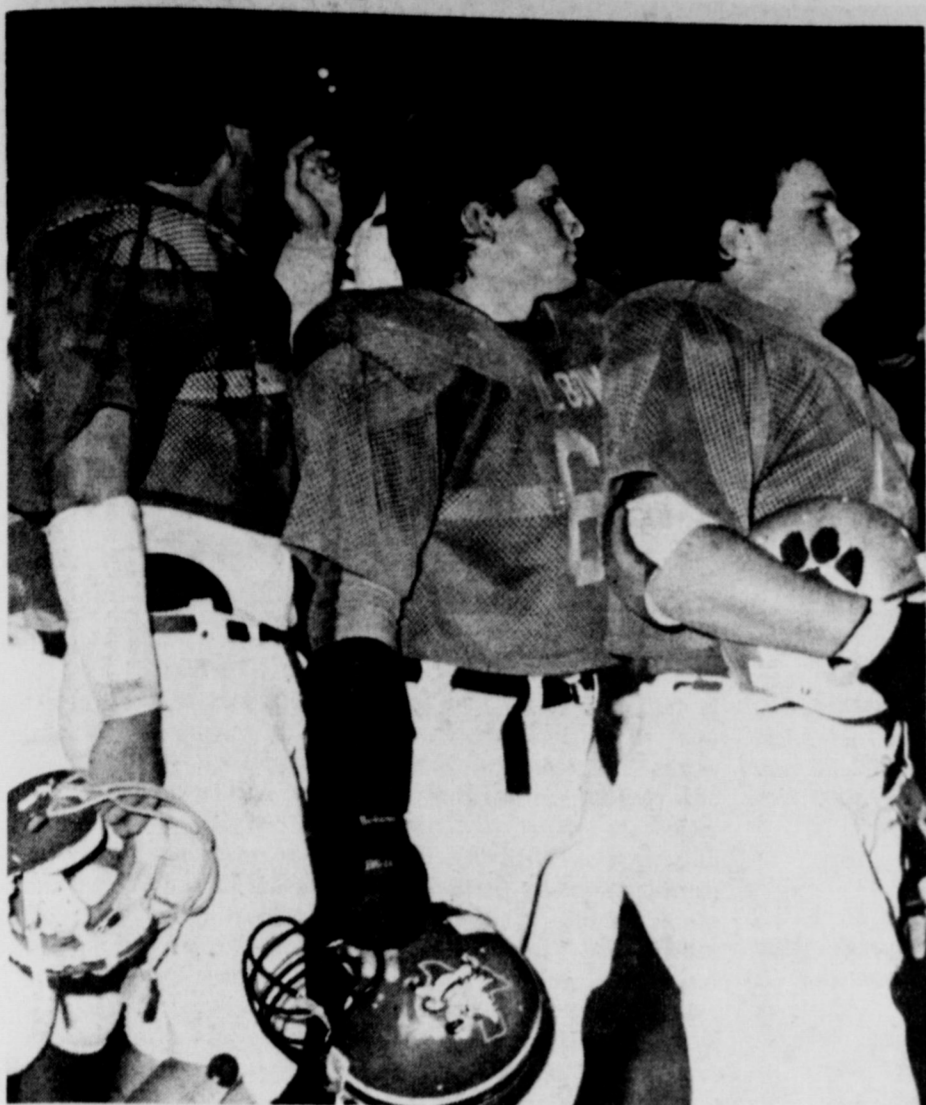

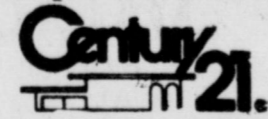
