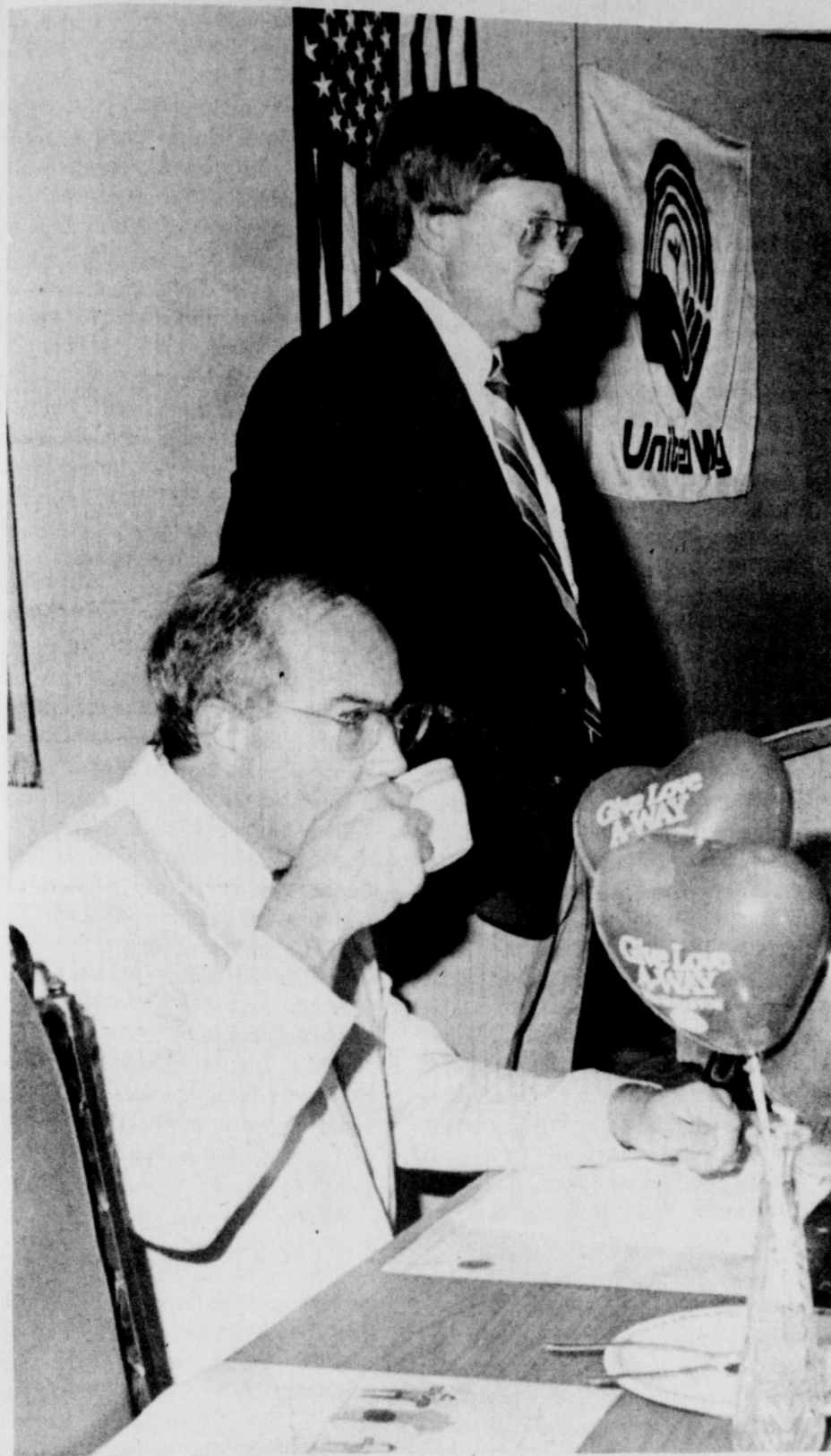

## Cryovac gives UW drive super boost

The 1986 United Way Fund Drive in Iowa Park was kicked off in a resounding fashion yesterday morning, when it was announced the employees of Cryovac had not only exceeded their goal, but almost put the community over its goal.

The announcement was made at a breakfast meeting of Iowa Park volunteers, held in the Lions Club Building.

Cryovac, chosen as one of this year's "pacesetter industries," exceeded its goal by a whopping 36 percent, pledging \$40,436.

More significantly, the amount was 86 percent of Iowa Park's \$47,100 goal.

Cryovac's co-chairmen this year were Greg Liffick and Tom McMahon.

Johnny Coker, co-chairman of the Iowa Park drive along with Robert Palmer, paid high compliment to the Cryovac personnel and leaders.

But Coker and Palmer both emphasize the need for the rest of the citizens of the community to give as much as they can, despite being so close to the year's goal.

They felt the Cryovac pledge should be more of a challenge to the rest of the community, in helping the Greater Wichita Falls United Way reach its goal of \$1,950,000 to fund the activities of 30 agencies.

The Iowa Park division chairmen working with Palmer and Coker this year include: Wayne House, major firms; Carol Hayslip, small businesses; Keith Aulds, special gifts; Alyce Bondurant, professionals, and James Barrington, public employees.

Cryovac's pledge contributed to the \$372,498 announced Tuesday night as having been raised by the 10 Pacesetters. This is 19.1 percent of the overall goal.

## Trustees set 75-cent tax rate

The 1986-87 school tax rate was increased four cents Tuesday night by members of the school board.

The new rate, to fund a budget of \$5,464,620, will be 75-cents. Of the 75-cents per \$100 valuation, 68 cents will go to the general fund and seven cents to bond retirement.

Supt. Glen Mitchell explained he was asking the board to go ahead and act on the rate, despite an earlier suggestion from the state commissioner of education to wait until the

special legislative session was ended.

Because a second special session got underway Monday, and no indication of when it would end, Mitchell said the school needed to go ahead and get its tax notices printed and mailed to property owners.

He said he had a "good indication" of how much the district might expect to receive from the state this year, and was satisfied the new rate would be adequate to finance the school's operations.

In fact, he told the trustees the school could actually receive even more than anticipated, because of a formula which considers the district's tax rate in comparison with the average tax rate of all districts in the state.

Because of the rate increases set last year and this, state funding will be increased.

But whatever excess money the district might have at the end of the year will be needed to build additional

classrooms at the Bradford campus, to comply with the teacher-pupil ratio set by House Bill 72, Mitchell said.

Even at 75-cents, Iowa Park will have one of the lowest, if not the lowest, tax rate in this part of the state.

Mitchell pointed out that Holli-day's rate will be 85.9-cents, Burk-burnett 78-cents, Henrietta .89, Breck-enridge .80, Bridgeport .90, Olney .78, Wichita Falls .824, Electra .93, Bowie .80, Jacksboro \$1.05 and De-catur \$1.26.

Board member Martha Dudley ad-mitted to the other members she had gone into the last meeting with her mind closed to any tax increase.

She said at that meeting she was opposed to any increases. But Tuesday night she said she had stud-ied the situation more and changed her mind, agreeing the increase was necessary.

Trustee Rex Wells said "I don't like to raise taxes. But it's better a little this year instead of a lot next year."

The superintendent said the per-pupil cost of the new budget would be \$2,964, and 68-percent of the total budget was payroll costs.

The state will pay slightly more than half of this year's projected revenue, 50.26 percent, or \$2,583,-754. Local revenue, \$2,499,296, is 48.62 percent and federal funds amount to 1.12 percent, \$57,352.

## Hawks hosting Steers in first home game

Graham's Steers may well be paraphrasing a saying from the kids' game "Hide and Seek" this week and announcing to the Hawks, "Here we come, ready or not!"

That's because the Ragin' Red won its season opener, 32-6, Friday over Stephenville, while the Hawks were suffering their first loss to Burk-burnett, 14-6.

The two clubs will meet at 8 Fri-day night in Hawk Stadium in the first of five home games for the Mean Green this season.

Graham was moved back up to Class AAAA this year, but the return-ing 19 lettermen, including six offensive and six defensive starters, well remember their last meeting with the Hawks.

The two clubs hooked up here in bi-district play last fall, and the Hawks knocked the Steers out of the state playoffs on penetrations.

When the regulation time ended, both clubs had each chalked up 34 points, but the Hawks, who held off a last-minute rally, emerged winners by virtue of penetrations, 6-5.

That was the first meeting be-tween the two clubs since 1981,

while members of the same district.

"We're out to have fun," com-mented Head Coach Mike Calcote before the season opener. Calcote is now in his third year with the Steers, and he's led them to a 16-4-2 record this far.

Leading the Steers tomorrow night will be quarterback Bruce Logan, who passed for 297 yards and five touchdowns in last year's game against the Hawks.

Joining him in the backfield will be last year's Dist. 6-AAA Most Val-uable Player, Robert Lofton, who rushed 1,200 yards in nine games last season.

Logan is also a standout on the defensive platoon, having been named second team All-State in 1985, Paul Blunt, third team All-State, and cornerback Mark Hardin.

Hawk mentor David Baugh said he was not displeased with the play of his defensive unit last week at Burkburnett, but he didn't feel the offensive unit had progressed as much as it should have at this point in the season.

The effort of Danny Forman was a highlight, offensively, to Baugh. Forman broke a couple of tackles and

had a 39-year run against the Bull-dogs that set up Iowa Park's only touchdown, and finished the night with 99 net yards on 16 carries.

But there were a number of areas in which the team was to work this week to improve consistency in blocking assignments, which was felt to be the main problem in the season-opening loss.

Explaining why Scott Weaver had been given the ball only seven times in the game, Baugh said his returning starting tailback was needed in the defensive secondary, and he was still not in top condition after a summertime accident.

Weaver, who blocked a sure TD pass in the end zone Friday, gained 30 net yards against a tough Bulldog defense.

## City employees seek change in insurance

Iowa Park City employees appreciate the medical insurance provided them, but they've asked the council to reconsider the program approved a couple of weeks ago, because the cost they have to pay for dependents is more than most can afford.

A petition, signed by 38 person-nel, was considered during Monday's council meeting.

The petition stated: "We, the undersigned city employees, respect-fully request that proposals for em-ployee group medical insurance be reconsidered. We are very appreciative of having the insurance offered all City employees, but the current pol-icy for employee dependents is cost prohibitive to those of us who need it the most. Your reconsideration

will be deeply appreciated."

Mayor Tim Hunter, speaking to employees in the audience, said, "It seems you feel you have a Cadillac policy and you wanted a Ford. We want to try to work with you."

Cost for dependent coverage is \$119 monthly, it was stated. "Most employees can't afford it," comment-ed Larry Ashford.

Mayor Pro Tem Johnny Coker suggested the employees might form a committee to recommend what kind of coverage, and cost, that would be more acceptable.

Before any change is made, even if the employee committee makes recommendations, the mayor said he would want to know if the city were violating any laws by changing so

soon after accepting a new policy.

"If the employees do it (make recommendations for change), would (the city) have to stay with a company that has an office in town?" asked Janice Newman.

"Legally, no," replied Hunter. "We could go to Amarillo or even Maryland if we wanted."

The council, when considering policy proposals, decided to consider only those from agencies officed in the city, which is not an unusual action in other situations.

The subject is to be on a future meeting agenda, but no action was taken Monday.

Aldermen approved a proposal to

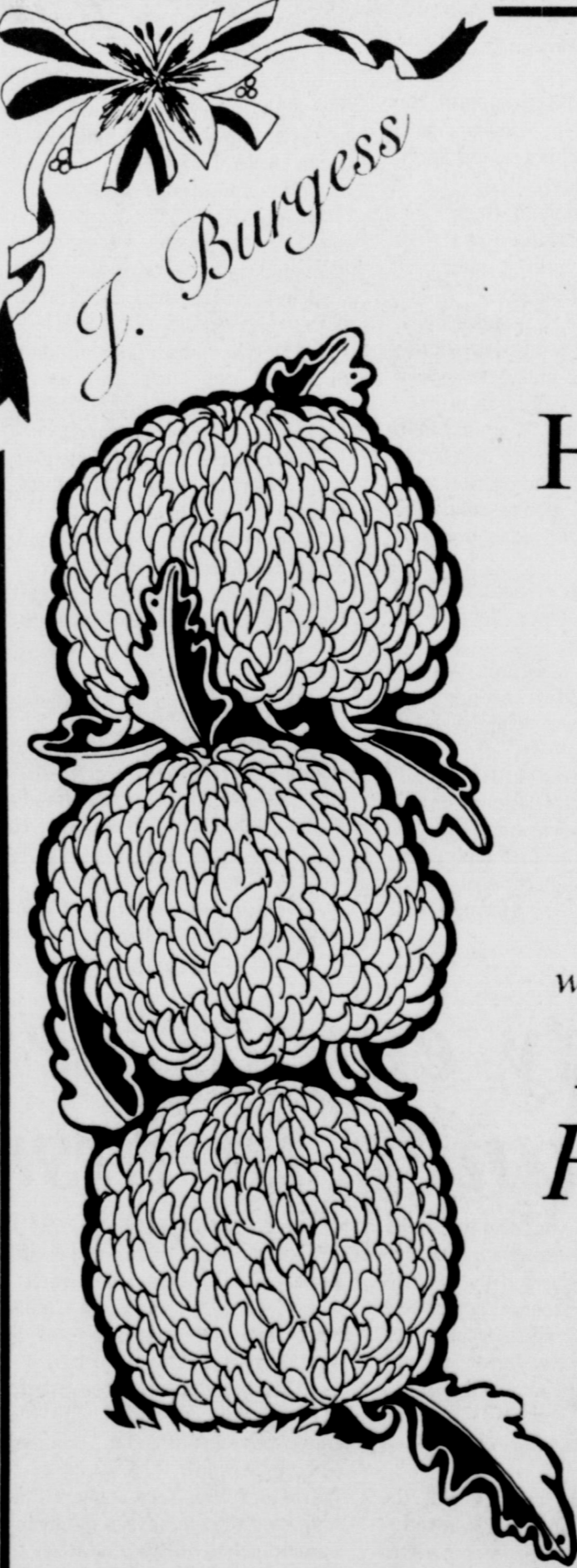
The groom's parents co-hosted the rehearsal dinner Friday evening with Mr. and Mrs. O.N. Newman at the latter's home.

## Board approves trips, student activities

School trustees Tuesday night approved a lengthy list of proposed student trips and fund-raising activities, including an unusual activity for money-earning for the high school choir.

All trips and activities for the high school, with the exception of trips for baseball and track, were in printed form for board consideration.

The new fund-raising proposal offered by Darrell Dick, patterned after a similar activity he organized at Duncanville, where the choir earned some \$3,000, and performed a service for the community at the same time.

His proposal, basically, calls for students to coordinate with the city which areas of the community need cleaning.

Students then contract pledges of money for per-hour work to do the cleaning.

"It has given us better public relations than anything I've ever done," he told the trustees.

The project can be done one day in the fall, but could have an additional day in the spring, and the people aren't being asked to purchase something they really don't want, like candles, etc., he told the board.

And at the same time, expenses to the city would be saved, if such work were contracted.

Reports on the first week of school were made by each of the four principals in the system.

Richard Davis, of the high school, said he had 33 students who were not in Iowa Park last year. He also said some of his classes were

overloaded, but he was working to correct the situation.

There are 30 new students at the junior high, according to Jimmy Alsup. He said the building and gym looked better than they have in several years, thanks to the summer maintenance program.

School bells are used only to start and end the day at Bradford, Kenneth Davis told the board. He explained the change has made the building much quieter and everyone in it less nervous.

Parents unfamiliar with school policy used the circle drive, which is ordinarily reserved for buses, at the Kidwell school, Ron Woods said. He added that he has 150 students enrolled in kindergarten, and his eight first grade classes each have 22 students.

During his report on transportation, Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, said he had added four more bus stops in the city, from the original list announced before the start of school, and small problems were being corrected.

Trustees approved some changes in school policy, including graduation requirements for cosmetology students.

authorize City Administrator James Barrington to pay a matching portion of a grant for a fitness center to be constructed at Oscar Park.

The city's portion of an overall cost of some \$15,000 is \$2,195. A grant of \$6,000 from Wells Fargo will be applied, and the balance is paid by a grant through Bethania Hospital.

The equipment is used in a multi-station paved walk outlay to be built around Gordon Lake. A similar setup was put into operation a year ago at Lucy Park in Wichita Falls.

Aldermen also approved a waiver

from requirements of an architect's seal on plans for expansion of Pacific Avenue Missionary Baptist Church.

This is because the structure is small and presents no apparent areas of danger to occupants, according to Ashford, code enforcement officer.

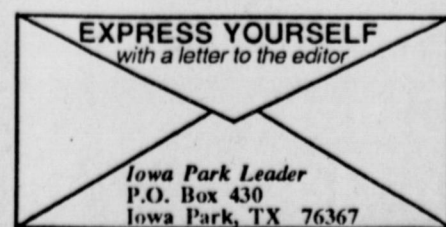

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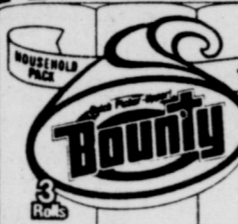
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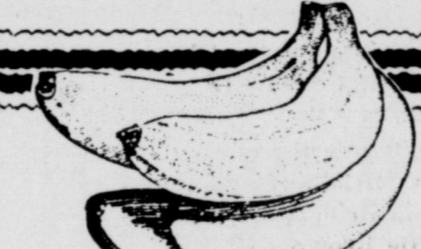
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### Book of Daniel program topic

## Cook of the Week

Belinda (Mrs. Bud) Singleton said that two of her favorite recipes she shares with the Leader readers this week are Cherry Salad and Salsa, the latter is great with chips and dips. It could be that the olives and olive oil, two of the ingredients, have a major part in its tastiness.

"No fruit tree," wrote an anonymous author in Gourmet in November, "has experienced so profound influence on the growth of civilization as the olive." Pliny said, "except for the vine there is no plant which bears a fruit of as great importance as the olive," and Plato came to the conclusion that it was his favorite food.

The tribute to the importance of the olive may seem exaggerated in the case of a fruit which we are conscious of chiefly as an appetizer or garnisher of a limited number of dishes, or an ingredient for salads, etc. But in ancient times when our civilization was being shaped, the olive was not simply a decorative touch to the more important dishes of the meals, it was often the most important dish itself.

It has over a period of 5,000 years or more shaped the cuisines of the Middle East, Greece, Spain, Italy and southern France. It has been used as a cleanser instead of soap, burned in earthen vessels to provide light, used as a lubricant, and still used to preserve foods. The wood of the olive tree was used in constructing the tabernacle in Solomon's temple.

 BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1986

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**  
 Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

rently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title. The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT**  
 House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual-insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

**PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT**  
 Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."
