close to the year's goal. They felt the Cryovac pledge should be more of a challenge to the rest of the community, in helping the Greater Wichita Falls United Way reach its goal of \$1,950,000 to fund the activities of 30 agencies.

The Iowa Park division chairmen working with Palmer and Coker this year include: Wayne House, major firms; Carol Hayslip, small businesses; Keith Aulds, special gifts; Alyce Bondurant, professionals, and James Barrington, public employees.

Cryovac's pledge contributed to the \$372,498 announced Tuesday night as having been raised by the 10 Pacesetters. This is 19.1 percent of the overall goal.

# Trustees set 75-cent tax rate

The 1986-87 school tax rate was increased four cents Tuesday night by members of the school board.

The new rate, to fund a budget of \$5,464,620, will be 75-cents. Of the 75-cents per \$100 valuation, 68 cents will go to the general fund and seven cents to bond retirement.

Supt. Glen Mitchell explained he was asking the board to go ahead and act on the rate, despite an earlier suggestion from the state commissioner of education to wait until the special legislative session was ended.

Because a second special session got underway Monday, and no indication of when it would end, Mitchell said the school needed to go ahead and get its tax notices printed and mailed to property owners.

He said he had a "good indication" of how much the district might expect to receive from the state this year, and was satisfied the new rate would be adequate to finance the school's operations.

In fact, he told the trustees the school could actually receive even more than anticipated, because of a formula which considers the district's tax rate in comparason with the average tax rate of all districts in the

Because of the rate increases set last year and this, state funding will be increased.

But whatever excess money the district might have at the end of the year will be needed to build additional

classrooms at the Bradford campus, to comply with the teacher-pupil ratio set by House Bill 72, Mitchell

Even at 75-cents, Iowa Park will have one of the lowest, if not the lowest, tax rate in this part of the

Mitchell pointed out that Holliday's rate will be 85.9-cents, Burkburnett 78-cents, Henrietta .89, Breckenridge .80, Bridgeport .90, Olney .78, Wichita Falls .824, Electra .93, Bowie .80, Jacksboro \$1.05 and Decatur \$1.26.

Board member Martha Dudley admitted to the other members she had gone into the last meeting with her mind closed to any tax increase.

She said at that meeting she was opposed to any increases. But Tuesday night she said she had studied the situation more and changed her mind, agreeing the increase was necessary.

Trustee Rex Wells said "I don't like to raise taxes. But it's better a little this year instead of a lot next

The superintendent said the perpupil cost of the new budget would be \$2,964, and 68-percent of the total budget was payroll costs.

The state will pay slightly more than half of this year's projected revenue, 50.26 percent, or \$2,583,-754. Local revenue, \$2,499,296, is 48.62 percent and federal funds amount to 1.12 percent, \$57,352.

# City employees seek change in insurance

Iowa Park City employees appreciate the medical insurance provided them, but they've asked the council to reconsider the program approved a couple of weeks ago, because the cost they have to pay for dependents is more than most can afford.

A petition, signed by 38 personnel, was considered during Monday's council meeting.

The petition stated: "We, the undersigned city employees, respectfully request that proposals for employee group medical insurance be reconsidered. We are very appreciative of having the insurance offered all City employees, but the current policy for employee dependents is cost prohibitive to those of us who need it the most. Your reconsideration

will be deeply appreciated."

Mayor Tim Hunter, speaking to employees in the audience, said, "It seems you feel you have a Cadillac policy and you wanted a Ford. We want to try to work with you."

Cost for dependent coverage is \$119 monthly, it was stated. "Most employees can't afford it," commented Larry Ashford. Mayor Pro Tem Johnny Coker

suggested the employees might form a committee to recommend what kind of coverage, and cost, that would be more acceptable.

Before any change is made, even if the employee committee makes recommendations, the mayor said he would want to know if the city were violating any laws by changing so soon after accepting a new policy.

"If the employees do it (make recommendations for change), would (the city) have to stay with a company that has an office in town?," asked Janice Newman. "Legally, no," replied Hunter.

"We could go to Amarillo or even Maryland if we wanted."

The council, when considering policy proposals, decided to consider only those from agencies officed in the city, which is not an unusual action in other situations.

The subject is to be on a future meeting agenda, but no action was taken Monday.

The 73-yard drive featured a 39-yard run by fullback Danny Forman, a run for 11 more by Weaver, followed by a Davis-to-Forman pass that picked up another 15 yards.

From the Bulldog 12 yard line, with only 1:40 showing on the scoreboard clock, Forman hit the line for another two yards.

Then Davis rolled out to his right and found wide receiver Richard Morath in the end zone for a 10-yard pass and Iowa Park's only TD of the evening.

Robert Adams, who had missed a 26-yard field goal attempt when the Hawks' first possession of the second half stalled, kicked the extra point.

Iowa Park got the ball once more before the final gun sounded, but with only 23 seconds remaining and not enough time to mount another TD drive.

Iowa Park suffered four turnovers, three fumbles and an interception. Burk had two miscues, a fumble covered by Eric Whitman and an interception by 198

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

Forman was the workhorse of the evening for the Hawks, being called on 16 times and gaining 99 yards.




Belinda (Mrs. Bud) Singleton said that two of her favorite recipes she shares with the Leader readers this week are Cherry Salad and Salsa, the latter is great with chips and dips. It could be that the olives and olive oil, two of the ingredients, have a major part in its tastiness.

"No fruit tree," wrote an anonymous author in Gourmet in November, "has experienced so profound influence on the growth of civilization as the olive." Pliny said, "except for the vine there is no plant which bears a fruit of as great importance as the olive," and Plato came to the concLusion that it was his favorite food.

The tribute to the importance of the olive may seem exaggerated in the case of a fruit which we are conscious of chiefly as an appetizer or garnisher of a limited number of dishes, or an ingredient for salads, etc. But in ancient times when our civilization was being shaped, the olive was not simply a decorative touch to the more important dishes of the meals, it was often the most important dish itself.

It has over a period of 5,000 years or more shaped the cuisines of the Middle East, Greece, Spain, Italy and southern France. It has been used as a cleanser instead of soap, burned in earthen vessels to provide light, used as a lubricant, and still used to preserve foods. The wood of the olive tree was used in constructing the tabernacle in Solomon's temple.





CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 4, 1986** 

**PROPOSITION NO. 1** ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction

with the Comptroller. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes

of property taxation."

ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Cur-

rently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws. The proposed amendment will ap-

pear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of

state laws."

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual-insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other

insurance companies."

ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also each bill contain a title expressing authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or

county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."
