Hawks go for regional title Friday

Meet Kermit at Snyder

Iowa Park's Hawks will be making their first appearance in Region Friday since 1970, and will take on a team that was there only last year.

In fact, the Kermit Yellow-jackets played Vernon on the same field in 1985, and lost, 21-14.

When the 8 p.m. kickoff is made, two teams with similar records will be facing each other.

Iowa Park enters the contest with a 9-2-1 season record and as runner up of Dist. 6-AAA. Kermit, on the other hand, has an 8-4 record, and

was runner up to Crane in Dist. 4.

Kermit's two playoff games have both been squeakers. They shut out Roosevelt 7-0 in Bi-District, and last week in Area edged Friona 15-13.

Meanwhile, the Hawks have been on a roll, blasting Ballinger 27-12 and then shutting out Robinson 24-0.

Three of Kermit's losses came in non-conference games. They lost 35-7 to Denver City, 20-14 to Pecos and 31-7 to Lovington, N.M. But they edged another New Mexico team,

Artesia, 8-7, and blasted Cathedral of El Paso by a 41-0 margin.

The only district loss suffered by the Yellowjackets was to champion Crane, 18-2. But they shot down the other four conference opponents easily: Alpine, 35-0; Fabens, 36-6; Greenwood, 32-6, and Clint, 38-6.

Kermit returns six offensive and five defensive starters from last year's 11-1 club, including three-year starter Kevin Hicks. The son of Coach Randy Hicks is the club's leading tackler at linebacker, and is rated by the Hawk scouts as the best blocker and strongest runner. He weighs 215.

Also returning are the brothers Carrasco. Both are seniors. Abel is the quarterback of the Jacket wish-bone offense, and they like for him to keep the ball, rather than pitch it to the trailing back.

In their last three games, Carrasco pitched the ball five times, and it was fumbled three times, according to the scouting report.

Kermit seldom throws the ball. But when they do, the pass is generally effective because they have good receivers.

While the Jackets are not large (they list only four players 200 or more and Hicks is the heaviest), they depend on their quickness both on offense and defense.

Facts about the game

Advance sale of tickets at the high school principal's office will close at 3 p.m. Wednesday. Prices are \$4 for adults, \$2 for students, and \$5 for both adults and students at the gate.

A pep rally will be held at 1:30 p.m. Friday at the practice field, west of the fieldhouse. Those attending are encouraged to remain and give the team bus a send off at 2.

Fans are also encouraged to be on hand Thanksgiving Day, when the team holds its workout starting at 3:15 p.m.

How to find the stadium: Most fans will take Highway 277 to Anson, and turn west on 180. After passing through a traffic circle on the east edge of town and continuing westward, they will take a left at the "Y" and continue on 37th Street, passing a coliseum on the south side. Continue through the traffic light at College Avenue and the high school will be about 10 blocks beyond. The stadium is one the west side of the building.

A large number of eating places are located both north and south of 37th Street on College Ave.

The Hawks also depend on their defense, as evidenced by their scores against Ballinger and Robinson, and scoring the first touchdown last week by blocking a Rocket punt.

Depth has been a major key to Iowa Park's success all season. This was demonstrated last week, when starting defensive end and reserve full-back Jim Cummings was sidelined with mononucleosis, which will keep him out of pads a couple more weeks.

Lance Farris took his place, and the Hawks held the touted Rocket offense to only 93 yards rushing.

That depth is also shown in the backfield, where 12 Hawks carried the

ball against Robinson and 10 against Ballinger.

But that depth chart can be somewhat deceptive. Coach David Baugh has sent the Junior Varsity players he pulled up after the regular season into the two playoff games in their fading moments, much to the pleasure of the green-clad fans in the stands.

Offensively, Iowa Park has amassed 850 yards in their two playoff games: 422 against Ballinger and 428 against Robinson.

And they gave up exactly the same yardage against the two playoff teams as the offense gained against Robinson, 428. The two opponents

averaged 214 yards total offense against the proud Mean Green defensive machine.

There was some concern among the Hawk coaching staff early this week that one or more players may be sidelined by the "No Pass, No Play" rule. But since the deadline for determining players ineligible will not be until 4 p.m. Friday, it was not known if any would be lost via grades, according to Principal Richard Davis.

Iowa Park last made an appearance in a regional football game in 1970, en route to a share of the state Class AA title with Refugio.

Boutwell to resign from board

Dr. Roy Boutwell tendered his letter of resignation from the Iowa Park school board of trustees, effective April 1.

Boutwell, who served several years as president of the board and asked to not be re-elected as chairman last spring when the board re-organized again, dated his letter Nov. 11, and turned it into Supt. Glen Mitchell.

The letter stated: "I am writing this letter only after much thought and self-examination. I feel compelled to resign as a member of the Iowa Park School Board, effective April 1, 1987. This early announcement and timeframe will allow a replacement to be selected through the normal election process.

"I purposely did not want to serve a seventh term as Board President this year for a specific reason. It is extremely difficult for a person, in a leadership role, not to influence the thoughts and actions of the group he is leading. I felt my individual influence should be reduced, which could be accomplished as a Board Member rather than President. Consequently, I have been less than vocal and somewhat indecisive in an effort to serve without influencing. This action has severely affected my performance as a Board Member, yet, I feel obligated to follow through with my commitment.

"Additionally, I have been on the Board for eleven years (one-fourth of my lifetime) and am experiencing a certain degree of 'burn-out', which is also affecting my performance. The

well being and effectiveness of our school system is too great a responsibility for a person to shoulder if he is no longer able to give 110% effort toward that responsibility. Also, I have always been a firm believer in new and innovative ideas and goals. All too often, 'tenured members' of an organization tend to eventually fall into a 'rut' if they stay around too long. I feel that it is time for someone to occupy my seat on the Board who is fresh and enthusiastic with new ideas and concepts.

"In retrospect, my eleven years on the Board have been enjoyable and full of both challenges and rewards. I have made my share of mistakes but hope I have contributed to making the Iowa Park School System a better system than it was eleven years

ago. "The major reluctance I feel in resigning is in not fulfilling the current three year obligation I accepted from the voters of the District. However, I feel the time is right for a change. The District is in excellent shape both fiscally and functionally, and the current Board consists of exceptional individuals, so I have no misgivings about stepping down. I am thankful for having had the privilege of serving the Iowa Park School District and for the opportunity of being able to give something back to a community that has given so much to me and my family for three generations back; I am a much richer person for having been so blessed. City to negotiate settlement of suit

Following a 49-minute executive session Monday night, the city council voted to authorize the mayor and administrator to negotiate a settlement in a suit against the city.

Mrs. Mable Karstetter has filed suit against the city alleging wrongful use of dirt taken from land leased for the landfill, and negligence causing the death of several cattle.

The vote on the proposal was split, however, as it was on one other motion during the evening.

Alderman George Hammonds voted against the negotiated settlement, while Bud Mercer, Bud Burch and Diane Robnett voted for it.

The other split vote concerned the city giving all employees a turkey for Christmas. Burch voted in opposition to that proposal, which passed 3-1.

Alderman Johnny Coker was absent from the meeting.

Council members grudgingly approved renewal of the police liability insurance policy, which had the aggregate coverage cut in half, to \$1-million, and a premium increase of one-third, to \$7,455 annually.

Another insurance issue approved which has been an issue recently was the city employee major medical coverage.

Blue Cross, Blue Shield, because of a cost containment provision put into the new policy, reduced the premiums significantly both to the city and employees.

Premium paid by the city for employees was cut from \$76,200 to \$73,533, and employee cost for dependants from \$104,366 to \$100,711.

A proposal from Bill Gilmore, representing the Highland Cemetery Association, that the city give the cemetery all the concrete street markers, in exchange for metal pipe

on which new signs can be placed, was accepted.

The project is to take place over an extended period. Gilmore explained the old out-dated concrete markers would retain the city's heritage at the cemetery, while serving a useful purpose.

Also approved was a proposal from Ira Hambricht to permit Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts, Camp Fire and other youth groups to use the old servant's quarters of the Tom Burnett Memorial Library as a meeting place.

Hambricht said he had several adults identified who would volunteer to do needed improvements on the structure.

Also approved by unanimous vote were:

- * appointment of Mercer to the County Appraisal District Board, succeeding Stanley Williamson;
- * rezoning of the "Overbey" property from C-G to C-A/R;
- * a resolution commending Williamson for his representation of

both the city and school on the county appraisal board since its inception;

* a resolution calling on the state to fund any mandated programs required of the city;

* a resolution authorizing the city to participate in the 9-1-1 District;

* a bid of \$11,500 for a full-size two-wheel drive vehicle submitted by Morgan Dodge, for use by the public works director;

* several dumpster replacements, 20 each of the large and medium sizes and 20 roll-outs, and accepting the lowest of two bids, \$8,860;

* a proposal to improve main water lines in the south part of town and advertise for bids on the project;

* a proposal to advertise for bids to construct new sidewalks and west parking area at city hall;

* and a lease of the "Overbey" property, northwest corner of Fourth and West Highway, to Deryl James for \$50 monthly, on a one-year contract, for use as a used car lot.

Police were informed Monday morning that five storage sheds behind Harvey's Hamburgers had been burglarized. No inventory has yet been provided by those renting the spaces.

Jason Gholson, 606 N. Yosemite, said someone smashed the

glass in his front door sometime Saturday night.

Police arrested four juveniles at 10:49 p.m. Friday in the Wal-Mart parking lot on charges of "minors in possession" of beer.

Steven Lee Lane, 23, was taken into custody at 2:16 p.m. Sunday on a warrant from Wichita Falls Police Department for no motor vehicle liability insurance and warrant fee. He was released after posting a \$100 bond, according to the police blotter.

Speaker's theme is 'Americanism'

Merle (Mrs. M.K.) Anthony, a noted area speaker and former teacher in the Wichita Falls High School, was guest speaker for the 23 Study Club's Americanism program at a Thanksgiving dinner held Thursday evening in the Fellowship Hall of First Baptist Church.

"Know your country. Ours is a proud and noble heritage. Let us learn to protect it," she urged. She said Americans do have much to be thankful for as they observe the Thanksgiving season, which seems to have always been an American custom, but reminded that the nation's freedom is fragile.

While meditating over the past and counting her blessings, Mrs. Anthony paid tribute to many people that have helped to shape her life and inspired her to live a useful, Christian life.

Included among these were her mother, husband, school teachers of earlier years, noted writers, and students that she has taught. She stressed the importance of expressing gratitude and acknowledging help, words of encouragement, many times even sacrifice to make life easier for others.

As an example, she quoted Marian Anderson, the noted vocalist, who, when asked what the most important event in her life was, said, "The most important event in my life was the day I told my mother that she didn't have to take in washing anymore."

"I love my country and I am proud to be an American," Mrs. Anthony declared. She said that she was grateful to the men and women who

have fought and given their lives that America would remain the "Land of the Free."

Even though she has travelled to many other countries and beheld many beautiful sights, she said that none was so beautiful to her as the monument in Washington, D.C. of the Marines planting the American flag on Iwo Jima.

The American flag is one of the most treasured possessions of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony. Their enthusiasm to fly it has been so contagious that their neighborhood boasts a flag in every yard on days that it should be flown. Mrs. Anthony said that any day she feels the urge to fly the flag she flies it.

She said that a true American should be aware of the needs of others and reminded her listeners that

many people are in need of help at Thanksgiving 1986. "Don't stand by the wayside and watch the parade go by; get involved in helping to provide food and clothing, ministering to the sick, bereaved and down trodden." Remember the words of the Master, "In as much as you have done it unto the least of these, ye have done it unto me," she concluded.

One of Mrs. Anthony's favorite projects is the Food Bank at the Floral Heights United Methodist Church in Wichita Falls, where she is teacher of the Men's Bible Class. Club members brought an assortment of non-perishable food items to the meeting for her to take back to the church.

Miss Betty Meadows offered the invocation before the meal.

Following the meal, Mrs. Joe Singer, club president, gave the welcome address as she read a verse of "I Love America" by Gail Brook Burket and introduced Mrs. Anthony.

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As I See It....

Iowa Park, as is the case in most other communities in this part of the country, is currently experiencing a rash of home burglaries.

We've had more than 20 thefts from homes and vehicles during this month alone, and it apparently is going to get worse as the winter progresses.

As hard as they may try, our police can't be everywhere all the time. They need the help of citizens.

This isn't a point peculiar to our community. Citizen participation in fighting crime is a known success.

We developed a Neighborhood Watch program here a few years ago,

but I wonder if the neighbors are being as watchful as they ought to be.

And I also wonder if other neighborhoods wouldn't like to become involved.

In this type of program, people aren't supposed to become any more involved than alerting the police in case of some suspicious activity in the area. They never, repeat never, are to attempt to apprehend anyone.

We've felt all along that crime would be on the upswing this winter. It always takes a rise about the middle of November and tapers off around late February.

But two or three things have apparently caused an unusual increase this season.

First, and probably foremost, is the economy of the area. A lot of people are out of work because of the oil slump. To some, and probably a very minor portion of unoccupied, stealing is a way to money.

And there is doubtfully a group that steals to satisfy a drug habit. These are not necessarily Iowa Park-ans, but some could be.

And, thirdly, our society has become one of worldly possessions. To those who might not have things as nice, or as many, as others, these possessions become desirable.

A sort of "keeping up with the Joneses" syndrome.

Besides the neighborhood watch

program, there's something else we can do to protest our property.

If you're going to be away from your home overnight, or more than a day, you should contact the police.

They will ask you how long you will be gone, what vehicles will or may be parked there, if any lights will be on in the house, and maybe a couple of other questions.

Then, when you return and tell them you're home, they'll furnish you with a printout of times a patrolman checked your property, what was observed, and so forth.

It isn't a bad idea to also alert one of your neighbors of your plans to be gone. That extra help for the police makes it tough for anyone to go onto your property without someone seeing them.

But the main thing anyone can do is to secure his property. Lock your doors and windows whenever you are not home. Lock your car at night, if you leave it out of the garage.

Locked doors may not keep a burglar out, but there's no reason to make his job any easier.

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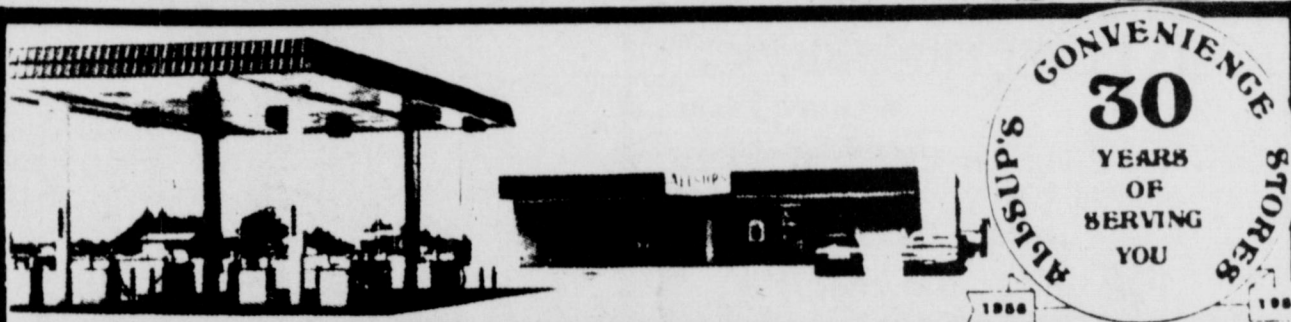

Hawks are Area Champs

It wasn't going to happen two years in a row. No sir! The Hawks were determined they were going to win the area title, in Weatherford, this time.

And they did, shutting out Robinson 24-0. Iowa Park had advanced to the area level last year, and lost to Ballinger at Weatherford, 21-14, in game overloaded with mistakes.

While some teams feel they have to establish their game with the run or the pass, the Hawks set the tone of Friday's game with their defense. It was the defense that scored the first points, and then shut down Robinson's touted offensive machine.

And the Mean Green defensive platoon had done such a remarkable job in handling the Rockets that Coach David Baugh brought the Iowa Park fans to their feet with 3:18 remaining in the game by sacking his Junior Varsity on the battered Waco suburb club.

In all, Baugh signaled 12 different Hawks to carry the ball against Robinson's proud defensive platoon, and they amassed 342 yards rushing, plus connecting on five of six passes for another 86 yards to finish with 428 yards total offense.

Robinson was allowed only 43 yards rushing in the first quarter, 25 in the second, 22 in the third, and three in the fourth period. The Rockets completed

only two passes the entire game, both in the final frame, for another 62 yards, to wind up with 155 yards in the contest.

The Mean Green defense forced three fumbles, intercepted two passes and blocked a Rocket punt while exhibiting its dominance. All three of the fumbles were covered by noseguard Robert Adams.

The game almost didn't get started, as the Hawks twice kicked off out of bounds, and on the third kick, were called for being off sides. And when Robinson finally ran its first play, Iowa Park already had 15 of the evening's 100 yards in penalties.

The Rockets were set deep in their own territory when Scott Weaver quick kicked 51 yards to the Rocket end zone at the end of the first Hawk possession.

Three plays later, Robinson attempted to punt from the 25, but Greg Feltman broke through the blockers and knocked the punted ball into the end zone. Defensive end Wayne Oltman leaped on the ball for the six points. Adams then kicked the extra point, and Iowa Park led 7-0 with 7:32 remaining in the first quarter.

Iowa Park showed no fear of Robinson on the ensuing kickoff by kicking short into the front line. The ball bounced off a Rocket, and Adams claimed his second fumble on Robinson's 45. The Hawks

didn't score on that possession, when Toby Brown's attempt at a field goal from the 24 didn't get enough height to clear the defenders, and was blocked.

The Hawks marched to Robinson's nine yard line late in the second period where, facing a fourth and five situation, Baugh called on Adams to kick a field goal. And he easily cleared the uprights from 27 yards to give Iowa Park a 10-0 lead at the halftime.

A mishandled kickoff and penalty set the Hawks back on their own two yard line to start off the second half. But they covered the 98 yards in only 12 plays to score again.

The drive started with twin 17-yard runs by Weaver and Danny Forman, followed by a 13-yard pass from Scott Davis to Forman. A holding penalty appeared to have thwarted the drive, but on the next play, David Meissner scampered 35 yards to the Rocket 18, and four plays later, Davis scampered around his right end the remaining seven yards to score.

As the third period wound down, Robinson attempted its first pass of the evening. It was tipped by Weaver into the waiting hands of Jeff Huff, on the Hawk 33.

Forman and Meissner carried the ball to the 40 where, on the first play of the final stanza, Weaver broke over right tackle and outraced the Rockets to score the game's final touchdown. Fierce blocks by Adams and Al Chacon broke the tailback free.

A short kickoff followed, and with a 15-yard penalty coupled with a 38-yard pass by Robinson, the Rockets were threatening. But Adams' third fumble cover of the evening handed the ball over to Iowa Park's offense at the Hawk 15 yard line.

Reserve linebacker Gary Tatum put an end to Robinson's final possession, when he intercepted a desperation pass with 37 seconds left on the clock.

Forman, although handling the ball only twice in the first quarter and once in the fourth, carried 18 times in the game and gained 95 yards. Weaver, with that 60-yard TD run, averaged almost 22 yards per tote, gaining 86 yards on four attempts. Forman also caught two passes for 29 yards and Weaver one for 10.

Meissner finished with 46 yards on six carries and JV back Billy Kenyon carried twice for 27 yards and snagged a Dan Fannin pass for 37 more.

Davis, who gained 26 yards rushing, completed four of his five pass attempts.

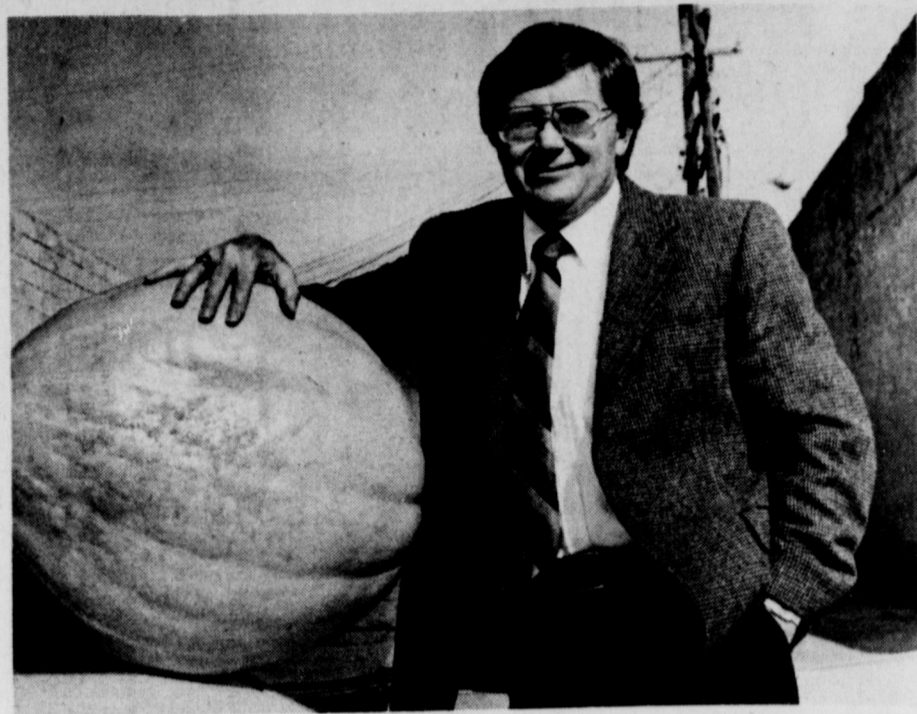

BAKED QUAIL AND WILD RICE

Six quail (or three cornish game hens if you're a poor shot!)
Butter

Salt
Pepper
Wild Rice

Put a pat of butter inside each quail and thoroughly salt and pepper each quail inside and out. Bake at 350 for ten minutes in a covered baking dish, add a tablespoon of lemon-juice. Bake for twenty minutes while rice is cooking in a separate pan. Add the rice to the quail and bake another ten minutes in an uncovered dish. Serves three regular people or two quail hunters.

COUNTRY STYLE OKRA

(Whoop-T-Do winning recipe)
About 25 okra pods
One fresh tomato
1/2 onion (preferably red)
One large potato
1/2 bell pepper
Salt and pepper
Corn meal

Cut up and stir fry the tomato, onion, potato and bell pepper in a skillet with two tablespoons of grease for five minutes. Use a hot fire. Drop the cut up okra in a paper sack with corn meal and salt and pepper. Shake, then add to the stir fry. Cook until the okra starts to brown. Feeds six people or one Hawk football player.

HOMEMADE PUMPKIN PIE

Pie shell (buy at store if you're a "city cook")
Pumpkin (fresh!) About 2 lbs.
2 eggs
3/4 cup sugar
1/2 tsp. salt

1 tsp. ground cinnamon
1/2 tsp. ground ginger
1/4 tsp. ground cloves
1 can evaporated milk

Clean pumpkin. Best way is to cut in half and bake for a while. Then you can scoop the pumpkin out. Or you can cut it up if you have a sharp knife and lots of band-aids. Boil pumpkin until tender. Combine other ingredients and boil about five minutes. Pour into pie shells and bake about an hour at 350 degrees until a knife stuck in comes out clean. Makes 3-4 pies.

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Area oil, gas report

At a location two miles southwest of Fowlkes, Williams Petroleum has finalized a new oil producer in the Wichita Regular Field.

The well is designated as the No. 27 Tidewater, pumping 21 barrels of oil per day. It is located in a 158-acre lease in the SA&MG Survey, A-430.

The well was taken to a 1,999-ft. bottom and was plugged back to 1,010 feet. Production will be from a set of perforations in the Permian Sand Formation, 912 to 918 feet into the wellbore.

Drillsite is 2,070 feet from the north line and 150 feet from the west line of the survey.

Hale-McDonald of Wichita Falls has revealed plans to drill two 1,950-ft. developmental wells in the Wichita Regular Field. The wells are designated as the No. 26 T.J. & J.L. Waggoner "A" and the No. 27 J.J. Waggoner "D". Drillsites are five miles north and five miles northwest of Kamay, respectively. The No. 26 well will be drilled in a 100-acre lease in the M.A. Willis Survey, A-547, while the No. 27 well will be drilled in an 80-acre lease, same survey, A-548.

Drillsite for the No. 26 well is 190 feet from the south line and 3,400 feet from the west line of the survey, and the No. 27 well will be located 400 feet from the north line and 490 feet from the west line of the lease.

Monroe Well Service has revealed production data on the No. 9 Perkins "DFS" 1985", a developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field, 3.5 miles north-northwest of Burk Burnett. The well showed

ability to pump five barrels of oil per day, plus 85 barrels of water from Gunsight Sand Formation perforations at 1,717 to 1,719 feet into the hole. Total drilling depth was 1,775 feet.

Location is in a 39-acre lease in the RRV L S/D Survey, Blk. 83, 500 feet from the south line and 150 feet from the east line of the lease.

Publishers Petroleum has completed a plug-back operation at the No. 19 W.T. Waggoner Estates "Times", a developmental well in the Times Field, Wilbarger County. The well is located three miles west of

Harold in a 960-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-371.

The operation indicated potential to pump 19 barrels of oil per day from perforations in the Mississippi Formation at 4,768 to 4,780 feet into the wellbore.

The operator originally completed the well in August of 1972, and it produced from perforations in the Ellenburger Formation at 5,113 to 5,117 feet into the hole. The original total depth was 5,120 feet, and Publishers plugged the well back to 5,015 feet.
