Two seriously injured in one-vehicle wreck

Two Wichita Falls men remained in Wichita General Hospital yesterday, recovering from injuries they sustained in a one-vehicle accident here Saturday night.

While on routine patrol at 10:03 p.m., Sgt. Mike Stark found a Volkswagen van stopped after running into a guard rail at the end of West Highway, near the exit of the

high school parking lot, with its motor running.

He found two men, Reggie Leroy Lacy, 46, and Jerry Wallace Campbell, 41, unconscious inside the vehicle, and immediately summoned EMTs of the fire department.

The emergency workers had considerable difficulty extracting the two from the wreckage, eventhough it remained upright.

Campbell, the passenger, had been shaken from his seat, apparently at impact, and was lodged with his head and shoulders between the steering column and Lacy's lower legs.

Both men sustained massive head injuries, apparently when they struck the windshield. Neither was wearing a seat belt.

The dead end was created when US 287 bypass around the north side of the city was completed. It was marked with a barricade and large, reflective sign. The speed limit in the area is 30 miles per hour.

Skid marks were found approximately 90 feet before the van struck the barricade. The vehicle wiped out three large posts which helped support the metal barricade.

The vehicle's windshield was found approximately 45 feet beyond where the van stopped, and the large marker sign another 45 feet to the

Caps, apparently worn by the two men, were on the pavement about midway between the vehicle

and the windshield. Stark said he had to disconnect the battery cable to stop the engine,

because the ignition key had been broken off and could not be turned.

Police have prepared a warrant for Lacy, to be served upon his dismissal from the hospital, for driving while his license was suspended.

Lacy was reported in fair condition by the hospital, while Campbell was described as being critical.

Harkney did not file a formal complaint with police, however.

Police picked up a bicycle, reported by a citizen, from a ditch near the George ball park Sunday afternoon, and can be claimed by identifying it and proving ownership.

Council gives okay on purchases, sale

The city council Monday night approved the purchase of a tractor mower and steel building, rejected all bids submitted for contract mowing of parks and lots, and decided to sell a

Aldermen also approved a request to waive the city's solicitation ordinance where it applies to solicitors for the Wichita Falls Times and Record News.

A tractor mower to be used to mow grass around water towers got council approval. It was estimated to cost \$7,000.

A steel building was offered to the city for \$4,995, including moving it from where it is now located, to the public works department area south of the city.

At its Feb. 23 meeting, the council tabled action on six bids received to mow city property. The bids ranged from \$880 "per cycle" to \$1,447.

Lowest bid was submitted by Lawn Care Etc., owned by Kenneth Watts, and highest bid was by Claude Robertson. Gary Bradford, who had the contact last summer, bid \$1,100.

Administrator James Barrington told the council Monday the city actually didn't have to put the job out for bids, because it was considered "professional services" which do not require bidding.

Mayor Tim Hunter recommended rejecting all bids and either consider the city doing the work itself, or rebidding after making some changes in the bid specifications.

His suggestion drew a motion and it passed, but it was not determined whether the city will do the work or the project will be re-bid.

A brush chipper, purchased three years ago for \$3,500, was deemed too

labor-consuming by Mike Price, public works director, who recommended selling the equipment.

Price also told the council the city's policy of picking up brush one day each month, the last Friday, costs the city \$1,000 each day it is done. He said the city might want to eliminate the practice altogether.

Don James, editor of the Wichita Falls newspaper, appeared before the council to request a waiver from the city's ordinance covering door-to-door solicitors.

He listed as reasons that the paper had been a good and responsible neighbor more than 80 years, that the prohibition of subscription solicitation violated the state and federal constitutions, and that 1,900 families look to the paper for their livelihood.

James was told the ordinance was put into play when "numerous" complaints were received by the city hall and police department recently when a team of youths were brought here to sell subscriptions.

Barrington said some of the complainants reported the youths calling them "jerks" and stronger when they were rejected.

James, who objected to the city's demand that solicitors pay \$30 per day per person, denied having heard any complaints, and assured nothing like that would occur in the future.



One of her recipes, "Roy's Favorite Peach Cobbler," is a reminder that "as American as peach cobbler" could be said without doing injustice to the apple pie because the roundish, yellow, edible fruit is second only to the apple in world distribution,

Some of the finest peach orchards in the country are in this area, and since the season is not far off, many people are already contemplating the enjoyment of fresh peaches and cream, cobblers, pastries and preserves. Others are thinking about canning or freezing them.

Diet Guidelines The American Heart Association has issued revised diet guidelines which, they believe, will lower

the risk for cardiovascular disease. The new guidelines call for healthy adults to limit their cholesterol intake to less than 100 mg per 1,000 calories, with a maximum intake of 300 mg per

Saturated fat intake should be less than 10% of total calories and total fat intake should be less than 30%. Sodium intake should be 1 g/1,000 calories with a maximum of 3 g a day.

For adults who drink, alcohol should be limited to 15% of total calories, or 1 1/2 ounces of alcohol (two drinks), or two 4-ounce glasses of wine, or two 12-ounce beers.

Drive underway to replace LL lighting

A fund-raising drive is underway to finance replacement of lights for the Major and Minor Little League Baseball fields on West Magnolia, according to Pat Kennedy, league president.


Twenty-four wood poles have already been donated, and the wiring is also expected to be donated, as well as the labor for installing the
