CLEAN-UP WEEK

Volunteers key to project's success

This year's Clean-Up Week will possibly be the most successful since the project was begun in Iowa Park, from all indications of participation.

The week begins Sunday and continues through April 25, the following Saturday.

In fact, one group, the Girl Scouts, have already done their work, which was to clean the West side of Gordon Lake.

Service, fraternal and civic organizations of the community have been, or are being contacted, to accept responsibility of cleaning up certain areas in the community.

"We felt if we could involve more people, through their organizations, and ask them to do a small amount of work, we could get more participation than we've had in the past," commented Bob Hamilton, this year's Chamber of Commerce project chairman.

"So far, we've not had a single group to turn us down, and in fact, some throught we weren't asking them to do enough," he said.

The groups are being asked to clean up their designated areas some time during the week, but are being asked to contact either the Chamber or Hamilton, in order to have trash containers placed in the areas so the filled bags could be deposited.

Placing the containers in the areas will cut down on the expense of the city's in having men follow the groups to pick up the bags.

The volunteer groups can pick up plastic bags, furnished by Cryovac, either at the Chamber or the Iowa Park Leader offices.

Groups being asked to volunteer, and the areas they've been asked to "adopt," are: Camp Fire - city park at City Hall; Friendly Door - around the building; Masons - around the lodge; Optimists - South side of West Highway from Fourth St. to Wall, and 23 Study Club - West Park from Yosemite to Colorado.

Also, Epsilon Sigma Alpha-City Park on West Highway between Glenda and Sandra; Athletic Ex-Students Association - Lake Iowa Park East of dam; Future Farmers of America - North side East Highway from Wall to Bell; Future Homemakers of America - South side East Highway from Wall to Bell, and Noon Lions, South side of West Highway from Fourth St. to Access Road.

Also, Amity Study Club - Pacific from Access Road to Aldine; Evening Lions - North side West Highway from Fourth St. to Wall; 4-H Clubs - East side Gordon Lake; Tennis Club - all three tennis courts; and Philia Study Club - Pacific from Aldine to West Highway.

Also, Rotary Club, North side West Highway from Fourth St. to Access Road, and Iowa Park Garden Club, Burnett Library grounds.

Residents and business owners are being encouraged to clean up their respective areas.

The city, as in the past, will open the sanitary landfill to residents for free dumping throughout the week, providing they dump in accordance with the supervisors directions.

The landfill entrance is near the intersection of Johnson Road and West Smith Road.

Iowa Park's Clean-Up Week also coincides with "The Great Texas Trash Off," which will be observed state-wide April 25.

Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts from here will be joining some 15,000 Texans who have volunteered to clean up approximately 2,000

miles of Texas highways on that

The local Scouts adopted a twomile stretch of Old Iowa Park Road, commencing on the East city limits.

Eighteen months ago, Texans were throwing trash on Texas highways to the tune of \$24-million in annual clean-up costs, according to the state highway department.

The volunteer program of adopt-

ing stretches of highways is similar to Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce's plan this year of asking organizations to adopt areas in the community to clean.

Brush and rubbish will be picked up by city workers Friday and Saturday of next week, if residents will notify city hall and let it be known if it will be stacked at the front curb or by the alley trash container.



Trustees need time to formulate plans

Tuesday night's meeting was not nearly long enough to make a detailed study of facility improvements and setting of priorities, school trustees decided.

After hearing reports from each of the campus principals, trustees decided to hold a called meeting May 5.

Board president Jimmy Howell said it would probably take three hours to arrive at any decisions, and then only if several items of information, such as projected costs, were

Problems facing the trustees include requests for additional classrooms, major repairs, and a lack of knowledge of facilities.

The lack of knowledge comes from the fact that almost half the board, 43 percent, was replaced in the recent election.

The three new trustees, Wendall House, Don Decker and Gary Fielding, were all sworn into office at the outset of the meeting. None has been on the board before.

During the reorganization of the board, Howell was returned to the head chair, John Sibley was elected vice president, and Martha Dudley was returned as secretary.

Prior to the swearing in ceremony, plaques commemorating their years of service on the board were presented to Roy Boutwell, Rex Wells and Marilyn Hale.

Young man found drowned in tub

A young Iowa Park man drown in his bath water Wednesday morning, in an apparent accident.

Kyle Grove, 20, was discovered in his bath tub shortly before 8:30 a.m. after apparently suffering an epileptic seizure, hitting his head and being knocked unconscious.

Police and medical personnel were called to his home, 1012 Louisa, where he lived with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Grove.

Trustees were approached with proposals that they consider constructing 12 additional classrooms, a recreation facility, additional storage space, relocate the vocational agriculture stock area, and, possibly the most expensive of all, completely re-roof the high school building.

No cost estimates were available on the proposals.

More classrooms were requested for Bradford Elementary and the Junior High.

Bradford principal Kenneth Davis told the board his rooms are already at capacity, and larger classes are to come from the Kidwell campus over the next three years.

Davis explained his grades have not yet come under the HB 72 mandate of 22-1 pupil-teacher ratio, but will unless changes are made during the current meeting of the legislature.

Six classrooms are needed at the junior high campus, Jimmy Alsup, principal, said.

This is because the "blue metal building" was built about 25 years as a "temporary" facility. It is being to need major repairs, but could be used for storage if the classes meeting there could be moved elsewhere.

Major leaks are causing damage to the interior of the high school building, which was completed in Principal Richard Davis said

areas inside the building are being damaged when it rains and the flat roof allows water to flow inside. Because all but one room at Kid-

well is now used for regular classes, and another large kindergarten class is expected next fall, more space is needed at that campus, principal Ron Woods told trustees.

Even with four new classrooms built last summer, Woods said the lone room not used for classes is where students hold physical education when weather conditions are poor. That room likely will not be available for PE next year.

Several other storage areas and repair needs were pointed out as being needed.

During the discussion, the district's bonded indebtedness picture was disclosed by Supt. Glen Mitchell, who said all debts would be paid off by 1990.

He said the Valley View school







Cook of the Week

Someone has said "The discovery of a new dish does more for the happiness of mankind than a new star." No doubt, scientists who have their telescopes ready to record data on any new star that appears in the sky will disagree with the above statement, but people who have the responsibility of preparing meals find new recipes a boon in the truest sense.

Chances are that the recipes of Glena (Mrs. Kenneth) Via this week will be a boon to many cooks. Some of them will perhaps be new; others old ones with a new twist that gives promise of adding new flair and excitement to meals. Her "Yam 'N Cranberry Casserole" is one that sounds especially appealing.

The yam and sweet potato are very often confused because they look and taste alike, but they are not the same because they are from different families and botanically far

It seems that the birthplace of the yam was West Africa. This is one region of the world where it is found wild and abundant, and in many sections the staple food. It is also found in Asia which includes India. An early reference to the yam on that continent was a reference to roast kid and yam sauce in a Chinese poem called "The Summons of the Soul." Yams have been described by one food authority as the best known edible root plants in the modern civilized world.

Mrs. Via, the former Glena Miller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Glen Miller, was graduated from Iowa Park High School and received a BSE degree from Midwestern State Univ. She was a member of the Wichita Falls School faculty 11 years, teaching at the Travis and Fannin Elementary Schools. She is presently the owner of Glena Via Insurance Co. and is in charge of the property and casualty insurance.

business keeps her busy, so she does not have much time for hobbies but she likes stained glass art when she has time for it.

EASY PEACH FRIED PIES

3/4 cup sugar

3 tablespoons cornstarch

3/4 cup water 3 peaches, peeled and diced

1/4 tsp. almond extract

1 (10 ounce) can flaky refrigerator biscuits Vegetable oil

Combine sugar, cornstarch and water in small saucepan, mix well. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until smooth and thickened. Remove from heat, stir in peaches and almond extract. Set mixture

Roll each biscuit out on a lightly floured surface to 1/8 inch thickness. Spoon about 1/4 cup peach mixture on half of each dough circle. To seal pies, moisten edges of circles and fold in half, making sure edges are even. Using a fork dipped in flour, firmly press dough edges together.

Cook pies in 1-inch deep hot oil (360) until golden, turning once. Drain pies on paper towes, and serve warm. Yield: 10 pies.

YAM 'N CRANBERRY CASSEROLE

1 can (40 ounces) Princella Yams, drained

1 pkg. (12 ounces) fresh whole

cranberries, (3 cups)

1 1/4 to 1 1/2 cups sugar

1 small orange, sliced 1/2 cup pecan halves

1/4 cup orange juice or brandy 1/4 tsp. ground cinnamon

1/4 tsp. ground nutmeg 1/8 tsp. mace

Combine cranberries, sugar, orange slices, pecan halves, orange juice and spices in 2-quart casserole. Bake uncovered at 375 degrees 30 minutes. Stir yams into cranberry mixture; bake until hot through, about 15 minutes. Makes 8 servings.

BAKED SOLE WITH SHRIMP SAUCE

2 pkgs. frozen sole fillets (or

flounder) 1 can cream of shrimp soup,



Trustees approved purchase of a computer program to be used for figuring budgets.

The program, which was not in the previously-approved computer package, would cost \$2,200.

Following a 17-minute executive session, the board approved hiring all auxiliary employees another year, and also approved adding 13 more teachers to the Career Ladder Level Two.

Sales tax receipts slip

Sales taxes for Iowa Park dropped into the minus column again, according to a report this week from the state comptroller's office.

Based on sales made in February and reported to the comptroller by Mar. 20, Iowa Park's rebate check of \$9,163.66, which brought the year's sum to \$49,881.51, is 3.5-percent lower than this time last year.

The city's \$9,352.95 check last year had raised the year's total to \$51,688.59, according to the report.

Overall, Wichita County sales taxes for the year are 9.6-percent below this time last year.

Burkburnett, according to the report, is a minus 4.4-percent, Wichita Falls minus 9.28-percent and Electra minus 39.05-percent.

Payments over the state are an average six percent less than this time in 1986.

Archer County's average, compared with this time last year, is down 42.51-percent, the report stated.

Holliday is a minus 60.19-percent less than this time last year, and Archer City minus 38.72.

Just as the fruit trees thought they were safe from winter snows, the nation's taxpayers thought they were safe from changes in the tax law. After the extensive changes that were made in the income tax law last year, the general idea was that the Congress was through tinkering with the tax code.

In the President's budget there was no call for new taxes. The populace is not clamoring for a higher tax bill but, Jim Wright and his fellow Democratic Congressmen feel that we need to pay more in taxes.

The Democratic budget that was presented to Congress this week uses the old Democratic philosophy of tax increases to finance more government spending. At the same time the Democrats tell us that the tax increases are necessary to reduce the national debt and meet the targets of the Gramm-Rudman bill.

What about reducing spending? The Democratic leadership stated that they have made all the cuts in the budget that they feel the country can stand and that any further reductions in spending would hurt the programs financed.

To anyone, but a Washington bureaucrat, that statement would mean that there will be less spending by government under the Democratic budget. Wrong. The actual amount of money spent by Washington would increase about six percent over the amount spent last year.

Wright is talking about cutting the rate of increase in spending. The fact is that if government spent exactly as much money this year as last, there would be no problem of reaching the Gramm-Rudman target of a \$104-billion deficit.

I know of very few families in Ochiltree county that have the problem of how they are going to spend their pay raise. Most families are trying to figure out how to make ends meet on a reduced pay check. Our national government should do the

Instead the Democratic leadership of the House of Representatives want

to increase taxes to finance their spending schemes. One of the first places they plan to tap your pocket book is at the gas pump. Wright's budget calls for an increase of 10cents per gallon in the gasoline tax.

A gallon of gas will soon cost more for taxes than you get in fuel. The state has already increased its tax by a nickel a gallon and is eyeing further increases.

Putting more taxes on people trying to make a living is not the answer to the deficit problem. The answer is to reduce the amount of spending by the federal government.

Maybe the Congressional pay raise has made our representatives think they can afford more taxes but, their consituents cannot. JIM HUDSON



Wichita County Commissioners' Notebook

The 9-1-1 telephone emergency number, which was overwhelmingly approved by Wichita County voters in November, will soon be available to county residents.

Monday, Wichita County commissioners voted to further support the 9-1-1 emergency assistance program by approving a \$10,000 interest-free loan to the 9-1-1 Communication District. The loan will be for a 120-day period.

Wichita County is maintaining its aggressive approach to crime prevention. Commissioners approved a request from Sheriff Tom Callahan to send Deputy Artie Woods to a seminar in Corpus Christi, April 21-23.

The seminar will consist of two courses dealing with Latch Key/Self Care and Neighborhood Watch. The only cost to the county will be for travel; remaining expenses will be paid from the Rural Crime Prevention Grant.

After June 1, hiring requirements for Wichita County will be more strict. In accordance with the 1986 Immigration and Reform Act, commissioners passed an order wherein future county employees will be required to produce proof of eligibility to work in the United States.

Burkburnett residents received county-wide recognition Monday when commissioners proclaimed April 25 as "Beautification Day" in Burkburnett.

The proclamation is in recognition of Burkburnett's support of the "Keep Texas Beautiful" campaign and the efforts of local schools, churches, businesses and other organizations in making the clean-up project a success.

Commissioners voted to table action on the Individual Development Center's request to lease county property, and bids for a wheel loader for Precinct Two. The items will be taken up at the April 27 court meeting, which will be held at the courthouse in Commissioners Courtroom at 10 a.m.





They included a nuclear physicist who studies tests at underground bomb sights to determine the radioactive level; an atmospheric chemist who experiments on the movement of the atmosphere at Antarctica; and a nuclear geochemist who studies the history of the earth and its rare elements.

Miss Collins and Kaspar explained that although Los Alamos National Laboratory does maintain a weapons contract for the Federal Government and is involved n the "Star Wars" program, the laboratory is run by the Univ.of California and not the government. 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FAMILY HEALTH NOTES DIABETES

How does a person with diabetes, or for that matter any illness of long duration such as chronic kidney or heart disease, learn to cope and live with the problem? At least part of the answer is in being as well-informed on the condition as possible and to learn about the causes, treatments, and day-today habits that are required for good control. Most comprehensive diabetes education programs require anywhere from twelve to eighteen hours of continuous education. In this article we will talk about what diabetes is and begin to describe the various types of diabetes. What one does for himself, how rigid treatment must be, how often one needs to see the doctorall depend on the type of diabetes.

For all practical purposes diabetes is a problem with the body's ability to handle sugar. It is also a problem of not having enough insulin, all the way from too little insulin to no insulin at all. Recently, however, we have found out that in the vast majority of diabetes the problem is not with the lack of insulin but that the normal to above normal amounts of insulin in the bloodstream are just not working properly due to a problem at the cell level with receptor sites.

The function of insulin is to allow sugar in the bloodstream to penetrate the cells, where the sugar provides energy for the vaious activities of the cells e.g. a heart cell, a kidney cell, a brain cell, etc. Insulin acts like a "key" which unlocks the locks (receptors) on the surface of cells and thereby opens the cell and allows sugar to enter. This is similar to a car working--the car (cell) has to receive gasolien (sugar) before it will operate.

There are two major types of diabetes based on what we know: Types I and II. There are other types, such as those associated only with pregnancy, pancreatitis, or other basic hormone problems. However, in the two major types, the causes are not known. Type I diabetes used to be call juvenile, brittle, or ketosis-prone diabetes. It is presently call insulin-dependent diabetes mellitus (IDDM). Ten to fifteen percent of older people with diabetes have this very difficult type. Their bodies have no insulin, and without insulin they will die. Most of these individuals develop diabetes before the age of 30-35, are underweight, and usually start out with the typical symptoms and signs of diabetes -- increased thirst, increased food intake combined with weight loss, and increased urination. They are very prone to developing ketoacidosis which can lead to coma if insulin is not begun. Although this type of diabetes does not seem to run in families, it does seem to be associated with the presence of certain genes in the chromosomes that are affected by certain environmental incidents, such as virus and chemical irritants.

Type II diabetes mellitus or non-insulin dependent diabetes mellitus (NIDDM) constitutes the large majority of individuals with diabetes, about 80-85%. In these cases there is plenty of insulin -- in some instances too much--but the insulin is ineffective because there are not enough receptors on the cells to allow sugar to get in, so sugar accumulates in the bloodstream to cause the typical signs of diabetes -- increased thirst, urination and hunger. But unlike Type I individuals, it rarely leads to ketoacidosis or coma. Also, these individuals are usually overweight. This type of diabetes usually develops in people over the age of thirty, seems to run in families, and most cases can be controlled or treated quite well with special diet and loss of weight, requiring no medication.

In other types of diabetes, which represent a very small portion of diabetics, a specific cause can be determined. For example, pancreatitis caused by excessive alcohol intake or from obstruction of the tubes in the pancreas can cause diabetes. Pregnancy can be associated with diabetes, but in this type the diabetes goes away at the end of the pregnancy. However, some of the "diabetic prone" individuals will develop full-blown diabetes later in life and therefore have to be watched closely for this after pregnancy.

Diabetes is a disease which can be controlled, but unfortunately cannot be cured.

Scott Weaver, who had his most outstanding meet of his career, shattered Mike Brockman's 1963 long jump record of 22-10 with a leap of 23-7 1/4, one of the best in the state this year for a high school athlete.

David Meissner broke the record of Gary Williams in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles, 39.6 seconds set in 1970. While his winning time was a slower 40.02, he was clocked at 39.5 in the preliminaries.

And Lori Allen broke her own school record of 119-8 in the discus with a winning toss of 119-8 1/2.

Weaver had a day the likes of which no Hawk fan has seen since the days of Bobby Gilbreath.

The senior Hawk not only won the long jump with that record leap, but won the 100-meter dash (11.53), 110-meter high hurdles (15.53), and first in the high jump (6-2).

Weaver's only disappointment was a second place in the 200-meter dash, where he was edged out by Seymour's Mark Peters, 23.40-23.74.

Coach Barry Lucy, besides pointing out that both the high hurdles and 100-meters were run into a 20mile per hour wind, said Peters got a leaning start in his win over Weaver.

"Everybody besides Peters slowed to almost a start after five yards, thinking the race would be called back," he said. That was the edge the Panther sprinter needed to win.

Brett Hale won the 3200-meter run in 10:47.16, indicating he is recovering from his stress fracture, and Brad Huff was third in the 1600 meters, 5:05.01, adding depth in the Hawk distance events.

Danny Forman placed third in the intermediate hurdles (41.80) and

Meissner was fourth in the high hurdles (15.95), giving the Hawks a total of 30 points in the hurdle races.

More points came off the arm of Dennis Phillips, who was third in both the shot put, 43-11 3/4, and discus, 128-5.

Additional points came from both relays, where Iowa Park placed sixth: 46.47 in the 400-meter, and 3:43.12 in the 1600-meter.

Other Lady Hawk points were: Meisel, second in the 3200-meter run, 13:39.87; Turner, third in the 100-meter dash, 13.78; and the sprint relay team, which won first in 51.45.
