## Death Claims Scott Morris

Scott Morris, 71, died in a Wichita Falls hospital Tuesday afternoon following an illness of seven months. The Iowa Park community was saddened at his death because of losing such a fine Christian person who by his life and conduct exemplified the beauty of a life lived in touch with the Master.

Born in Ozark, Ark., June 19, 1879, he came to Texas at the age of nine and settled at Wesley chapel in Hunt county. He was married to Miss Zina Curtis in 1901 at Wolf City.

They moved to Wichita county in 1919 where Mr. Morris took a job with Skelly Oil company, for which firm he worked until retirement in 1945.

Mr. Morris was a steward in the Methodist church. He had served as president of the Wesley Sunday school class, the members of which served as honorary pallbearers at the funeral.

He was a member of the Masonic lodge and was chaplain in that order at the time of an injury he sustained in a fall last March 7.

Funeral services were held at the Methodist church Thursday morning at 10:00. Rev. Kirk M. Beard, pastor, conducted the service. He was assisted by Rev. James N. Easterwood of the Baptist church. Interment was at Royce City under direction of Tanner Funeral home.

Pallbearers were F. E. Hill, Curtis Sewell, T. J. Pace, L. C. Perry, Miles Thompson and Taylor George.

Survivors include his widow, a son Scott Morris jr. of Luling; two daughters Mrs. Frank D. Sutton of Dallas and Mrs. Clyde E. Mayo of McKinney; 7 grandchildren and one great grandchild.

## Hawks Run Over Holliday, 20-6

The Iowa Park Hawks soared above the Holliday Eagles, Friday night, 20-6, before a thrilled homecoming crowd.

Long runs and an accurate scoring pass accounted for tallies by Hawk ball carriers, and Holliday players made their count when J. Ayres broke through the line and lugged the ball 52 yards.

Leroy Weiss, quarterback, set the stage for the first Hawk score when he rounded his right end for 16 yds to get the ball down to the opponents' 4 yd marker, where Ben Huckaby found a touchdown hole over his right guard on the next play. Nolen's placekick went wide to the left.

Fans settled down to watching both sides play heads-up football the remaining time of the second quarter and the score stood at 6-0 for the first half's efforts.

Early in the third stanza Robert Nolen's punt was blocked and recovered by the Eagles on Iowa Park's 47 yd stripe.

J. C. Parmer, Hawk center, broke through to tackle B. Lancaster for a seven yard loss, only to have Ayres uncage his long run on the next play to tie the score 6-6 when the extra point was missed.

Huckaby cut short Holliday's merry making when he scooped up a teammate's fumble after the kickoff on his 8 yd stripe to streak 92 yards for the untying score and the conversion was good to widen the margin, 13-6.

Scoring ended late in the final period when Iowa Park's entire line held the Eagles long enough for Nolen to pick out Paul Burns, end, for a long pass, who carried the two remaining yards. The conversion split the uprights, ending the counting at 20-6.

Eddie Watson, guard, and Gene Parish, tackle, chalked up good offensive and defensive playing along with Palmer in the line. Weiss was in the mainstay in the Hawks' offensive backfield when going got rough and small yardage was needed.

Besides Ayres, B. Rowell, end, L. Gilmore, tackle, and B. Lancaster, back, led the Eagle list on the play by play record of the game.

Coach W. D. Jeter and his team have a vacation this week before facing Electra's aggregation the following Friday in the last home game of the season.

Officials for last week's game were Bud Wiley, Oklahoma A & M, Bob Burnam, TCU, and Roberts, Pittsburg State.

Iowa Park made 267 yards rushing, 11 first downs, lost 7 from scrimmage and 75 by penalties.

Holliday made 139 rushing, made 5 first downs, lost 56 from scrimmage and 25 yards by penalty.

The Iowa Park Junior Poultry Show, an annual project of the Chamber of Commerce, will be staged on Saturday, Oct. 21, in the Veterans Vocational building on West Park avenue.

Each contestant is to enter four pullets and two cockerels. All contestants must have their birds in the show room before 6:00 on Friday evening, Oct. 20. Pens will bear the name of the contestant, the name of his sponsor and the record of his birds.

Judge will be George O. Stodghill, supervisor of poultry husbandry at Wichita Falls state hospital. The judging will begin at 7:30 Saturday morning.

Prizes will be awarded for grand champion pen, pullet and cockerel and champion pen, pullet and cockerel in each of the other breeds. A prize of \$5 will be awarded to the contestant who has sent in the best reports on time each month during the project.

Sponsors are requested to co-operate in the project by not giving the birds back to the contestant. If the boy is a prize winner and wants to enter his chicks in the Electra and Wichita Falls shows, the sponsor may loan them to him. If the contestant wants to keep them, the sponsor may sell the birds to him—but to give the entries back to the contestant is not fair to the many others who would not get back their birds.

The Volunteer Fire Department is in charge of the sale of the birds after the show. The sale will begin promptly at 7:00 p.m.

A free picture show will be presented at the Parkway theater on Saturday morning at 10:30 for the contestants. Prizes will be awarded to winners at the theater after the picture show.

Mrs. D. O. James was authorized to mail statements to those members and lot owners who are in arrears with their pledges.

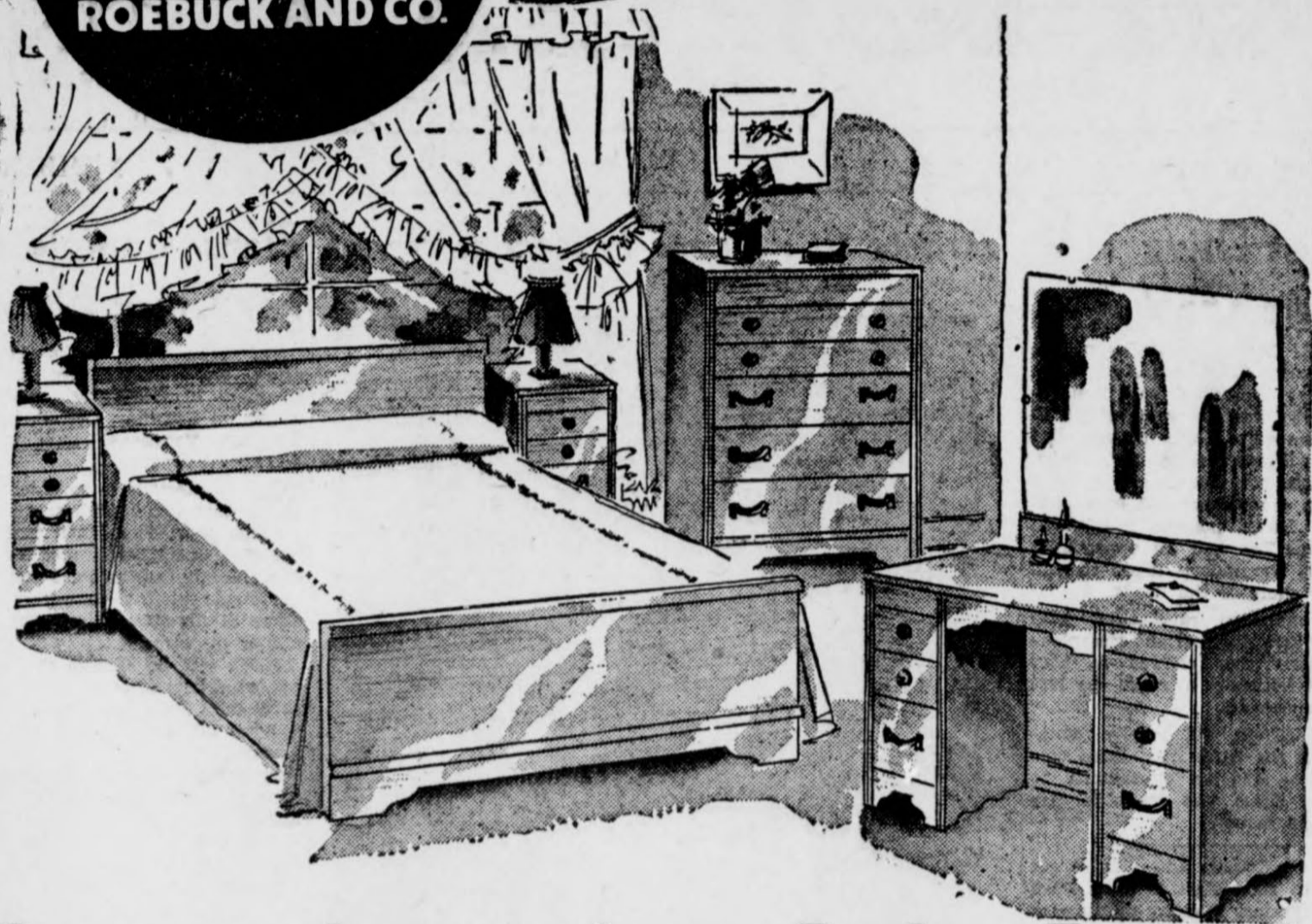

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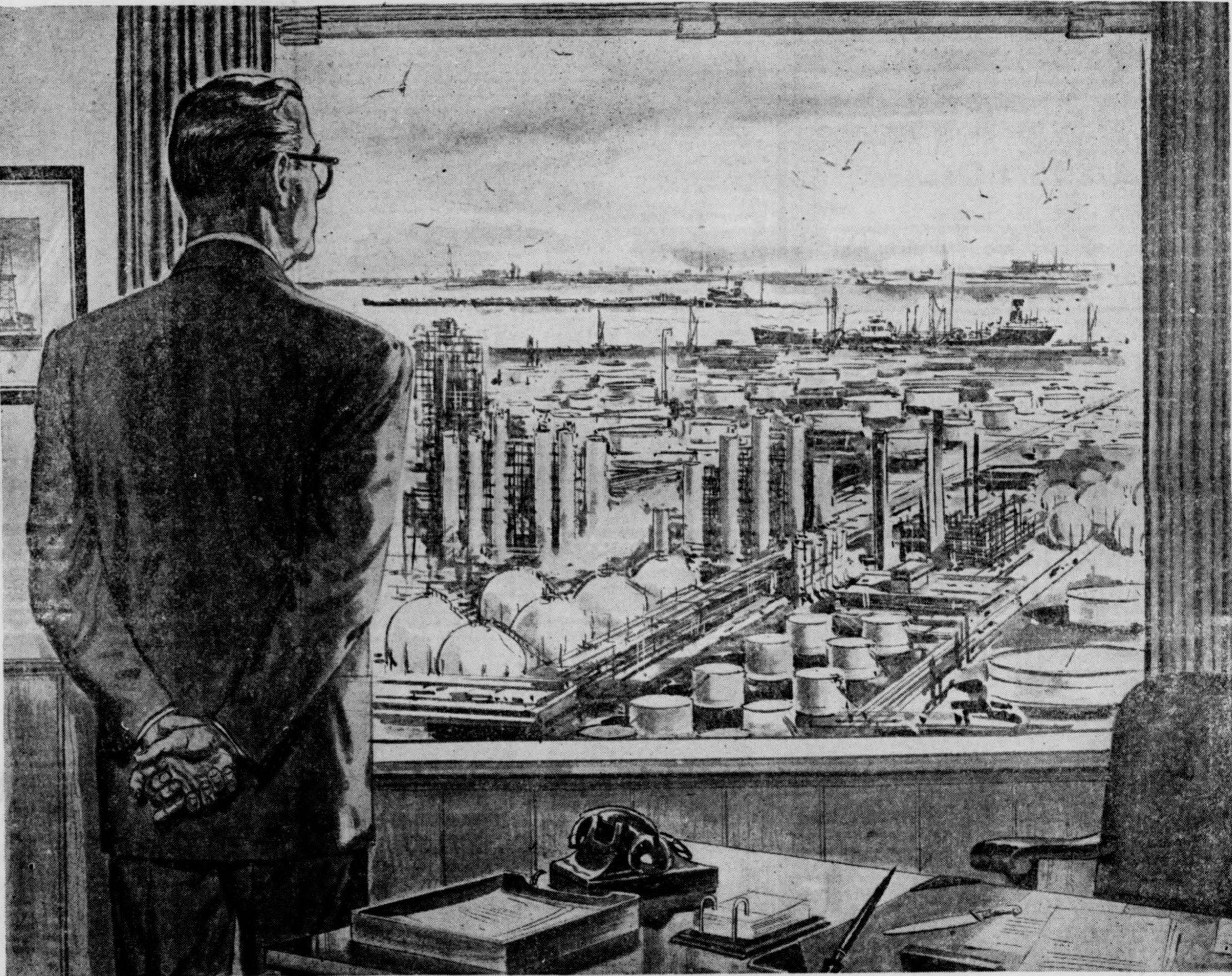
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Today the U. S. oil industry will be called on to supply the United States with 6,400,000 barrels of U. S. oil. It supplied that amount every day last week, and will supply it every day this week and next. It is a million barrels a day more than the peak of World War II, and it is 65% more than it was in 1940.

An increasing amount of today's oil goes to the needs of national defense, but the bulk of it supplies power for the millions of cars and trucks on American highways, the hundreds of thousands of tractors on American farms, and for the industries that make all the things that add up to a high American standard of living.

More cars, more tractors, more industries mean a need for more oil, year after year. This need has required the oil industry to look far ahead, to keep itself more than ready to supply current needs. It must be able quickly to meet increased demands.

As still heavier demands are placed upon it, the industry is confident that it can supply them, too. It will be a big job. And make no mistake about it: it will involve many problems; consumers may be called on to make sacrifices; the job will require time for change and adjustment. But the oil industry is better prepared than ever before to take it on.



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
