No action taken on proposed 'dirty movie' ban

Any ordinance the city might attempt to draft to ban rental of "dirty movies" would doubtlessly be overturned in a court, city aldermen were told at their meeting Monday.

The opinion was sought by the council in response to a request from the Ministerial Alliance to draft such an ordinance.

Attorney David Nix said all law cases he could find dealt with movie houses, but none could be found to restrict the rental of movies which can be viewed in a private home.

An ordinance prohibiting such renting would likely be found to violate the First Amendment rights of both the business renting the films, and also those wishing to rent them, Nix said.

Additionally, it was pointed out

that an ordinance drafted now could be "grandfathered" by the two existing tv movie rental establishments, since it would be drafted after they were already in existence.

Alderman Bud Burch pointed out that the Ministerial Alliance has brought pressure on a business renting "dirty movies" and had gotten the results sought.

"The issue seems to be resolved at this time," Burch said.

Nix was the only person to address the council on the subject at the meeting.

The council held the second of three required public hearings concerning condemning a house at 325 E. Bank.

No one was present to object to the council, and the next hearing, a

"show cause hearing," will be held Nov. 9. After that, if the council is not convinced the structure will be improved to meet minimum standards of the building code, it will be demolished.

At least two owners of neighboring properties complained about the structure at the hearing held in August.

Aldermen approved City Administrator James Barrington's proposal to enter into a contract with Biggs and Mathews, an engineering firm in Wichita Falls, to conduct a six-month study of the city's water system and future needs.

The project is expected to cost an estimated \$20,000.

Aldermen delayed taking any action on contracting a study on incineration of trash, estimated to cost

\$8,000, until a meeting is held with Cryovac officials.

The city has been negotiating with the local industry, both to take its waste plastic and to sell steam for energy.

A meeting is to be held next

week with representatives of the firm, Barrington reported.

Following a presentation of plans for the remodeling and expansion of the police department by architect Don Daugherty, council members approved advertising for

ads to do the work.

Also approved were proposals to advertise for bids to purchase a trencher for the water department, and for Barrington to negotiate for a contract to lease grass for grazing at Lake Iowa Park.

State sales tax goes up; tax on newspapers stops

Eventhough the state sales tax increases today, and several goods and services are being added to those on which tax is charged, sales tax on purchase of newspapers is omitted.

October 1 was the date set by the state legislature for the increase of sales tax from 5.25 to six percent.

So purchases made in Iowa Park, which has a one-percent sales tax, will be seven percent starting today.

The purchasing price of the Iowa Park Leader will continue to be 30-

cents, but merchants selling them will no longer collect tax on the paper.

tion of the state comptroller's office, stopped charging sales tax on a year's subscription two months ago.

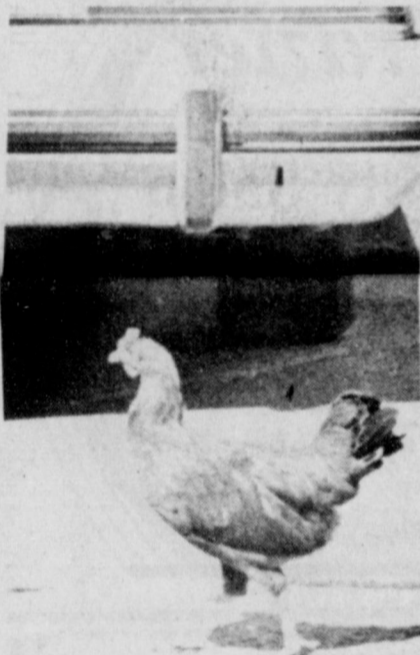
More than 64,000 businesses in the state will commence charging a sales tax today, that have not in the past.

Also going up today will be the tax on cigarettes, which rises from 20.5-cents to 26-cents per pack.

Hawks face Lions Friday at Vernon

Iowa Park's Hawks are setting down from last week's dramatic 16-12 win over Springtown, to get ready for Friday's final non-conference battle with the Lions at Vernon.

The game will be homecoming for Vernon.

Members of the Mean Green unit have been reminded by the coaching staff that their 4-0 record means nothing when they take on the Lions on their home turf.

Vernon, because of competition and injuries, has one of its worst seasons starting going into the 8 p.m. kickoff. The Lions are a deceptive 1-2.

This will be the 18th consecutive meeting between the Hawks and Lions. The series, started in 1970, has been even, with Iowa Park winning nine, Lions seven, and a 0-0 tie

in 1964. Vernon lost its season opener 13-14 to Altus, when the Lions decided to go for the win, late in the game, and failed on a two-point conversion.

The Lions' only win thus far was a very respectable 17-14 decision over Gainesville.

But then, in the third game, they fell 9-0 to Class AAAAA Amarillo Tascosa.

Leading ground-gainer for Vernon is senior Steve Goff. The 165-pounder has carried the ball 54 times and gained 238 yards. Two of his games were century markers, 103 against Altus and 105 in the Gainesville game. He carried only nine times in the Tascosa tilt for 30.

Starting quarterback is sophomore Eric Knight, who has been hav-

ing his problems against larger teams because his line is extremely small for a Vernon club.

Largest offensive starter is tight end Pat Dillard, a 205-pound senior. Next to him is tackle Chris Carr, at 195.

Other starters are center Mat Knight, 190, guards Bobby Burrus, 170, and Dwayne Boyd, 165; tackle Keith Shelley, 185, end Greg Rice, 155, split receiver Kenneth Hall, 165, and fullback Peter Hall, 154.

Rice is the only two-way starter, according to the scouting report.

Down linemen include Mike Anderson, 220, Clint Perkins, 188, Kelly Reis, 174, Jeff Bristo, 160, and Dustin Heitschmidt, 160. In the secondary are Rice, Aldean Sims, 166, Bryan Nava, 165, Chris Coker, 159, Duwayne Brown, 145, and the team's leading tackler, Brad Koch, 185.

Linebacker Koch is averaging 14 solo tackles per game, having been credited with 46.

Head Coach Leo Brittain was able to schedule only nine games this season, so he left last Friday as an open date. The timing worked, because two or three injured players were able to recover and be ready for the Iowa Park game.

Iowa Park, according to the Harris Rating System, is a 12-point favorite, despite losing two starters in the Springtown game.

Harris moved the Hawks into seventh place among the state's Class AAA teams after Friday, giving them a power rating of 175, which is supposed to be 12 points better than Vernon's 163 rating.

Iowa Park lost quarterback Jeff Huff and linebacker Chad Fielding in the first three minutes of the Springtown game.

But their loss may not be for the entire season.

Coach David Baugh said doctors believed Huff's fracture of his left

Entertainment has been scheduled the entire day, beginning at 9 a.m. with the Turtle Trot and junior high band playing in concert.

The high school band will follow at 9:20, state band at 9:40, Friendly Door Band at 10, the Rocking Hawkettes at 11 and at 11:30 the

junior high choir, high school chorale, Mixed Company Choir and A Cappella Choir.

On the stage at 12:30 will be the Blue Falcons from Sheppard AFB, the ESA King and Queen contest at 1:00, 4-H dog show at 1:30, Cloggers at 2, Kids Under Construction at 2:30, and at 3:30, the Guinness World Book Races, including such things as a bathtub race, will begin.

In addition, a flower show will be on display in the First Christian Church.

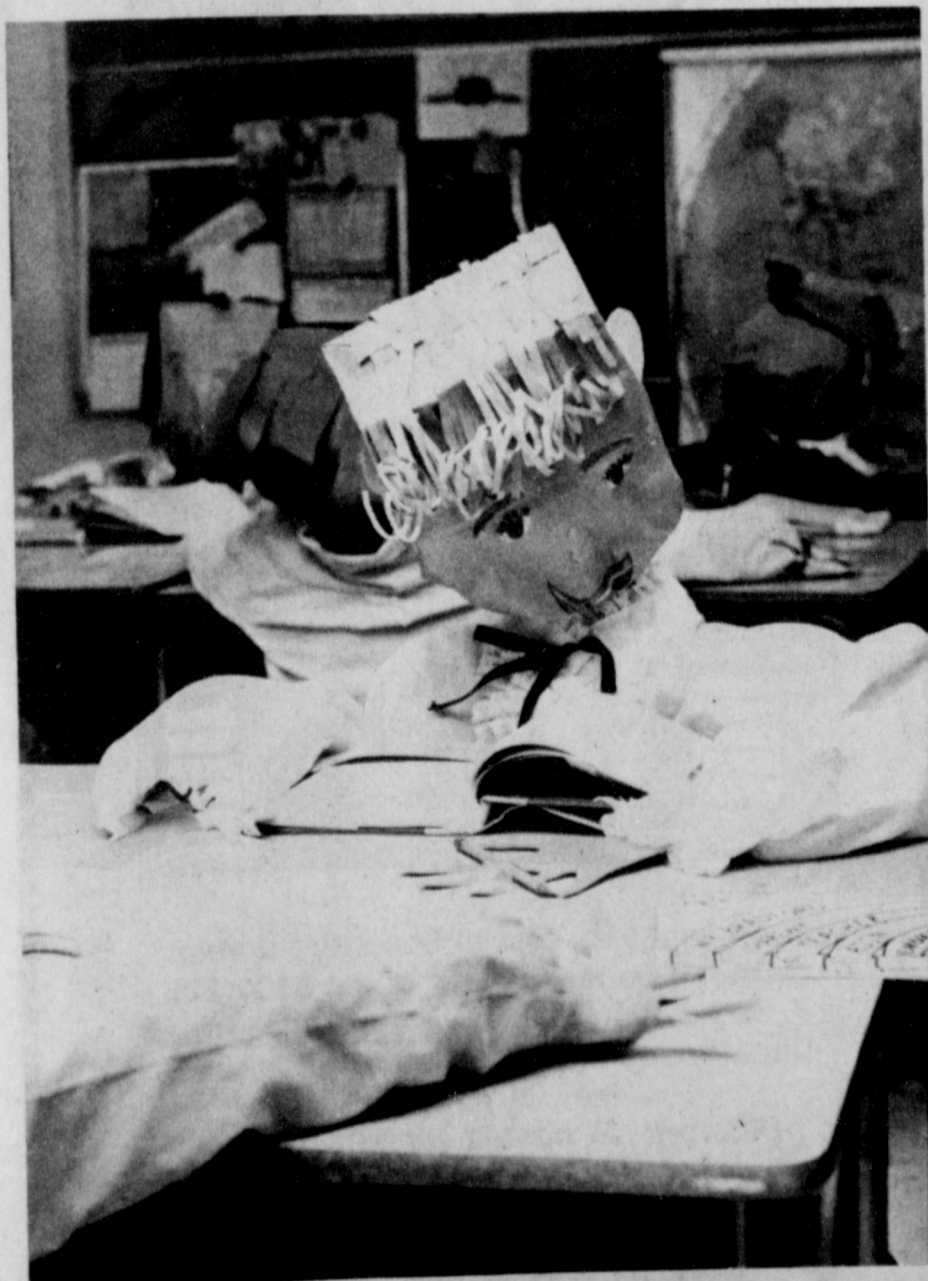
Class of '57 reunion set Oct. 10

Then add a lot of water and 1/2 bunch of cilantro (diced) and five to seven diced carrots. Let cook for a while and add:

- 1 T. chili powder
- 1 T. garlic powder
- 1 T. comino (cumin)
- 2 T. garlic salt
- salt and black pepper

Let cook a while longer and cheek meat and carrots. If the carrots have begun to soften a little, add five to seven potatoes (diced). Let cook a while longer and add squash, cabbage and cob corn. Sometimes you can use tomatoes or tomato sauce.

MEXICAN RICE

Fry and brown:
2 cups long grain rice
1/2 cup oil
1 quartered onion

Add to rice:

- 8 cups water
- 1 T. cumin (ground)
- 1 T. garlic powder
- 1 T. salt
- 1 T. chili powder
- 4 stock spoons tomato sauce

Cook together until rice is fluffy.

PIE CRUST

4 c. flour
1/2 cup cold water
pinch salt

Roll into ball. Let stand in refrigerator 10 minutes.

TACO MEAT

2 cups boiled hamburger meat (put meat in pan filled with water, cook till brown and drain)

Add to meat:
1 T. cumin (ground)
1 1/2 T. chili powder
2 stock spoons tomato sauce

MEATLOAF

- 3 lb. hamburger meat
- 1 cup rolled oats
- 1 1/2 T. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1/2 onion, chopped finely
- 1 can tomatoes

Mix together and bake 45 minutes to one hour at 350. Optional: pour tomato sauce or ketchup over loaf before cooking.

4 LAYER OUT OF THIS WORLD DESSERT (Chocolate Cream Pie)

First Layer:

- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 1 cup flour
- 1/2 cup powdered sugar
- 1/2 cup margarine or butter

Mix and press in 9X12 greased pan and bake 10 minutes at 350. Cool.

Second Layer:

- 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
- 1 cup whipped topping
- 1 cup powdered sugar

Mix well and spread over first layer.

Third layer:

- 2 sm. pkg. chocolate instant pudding

Mix according to package and spread over cheese layer.

Fourth layer:

Spread remaining whipped topping over the top.

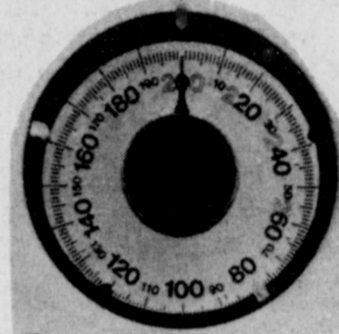

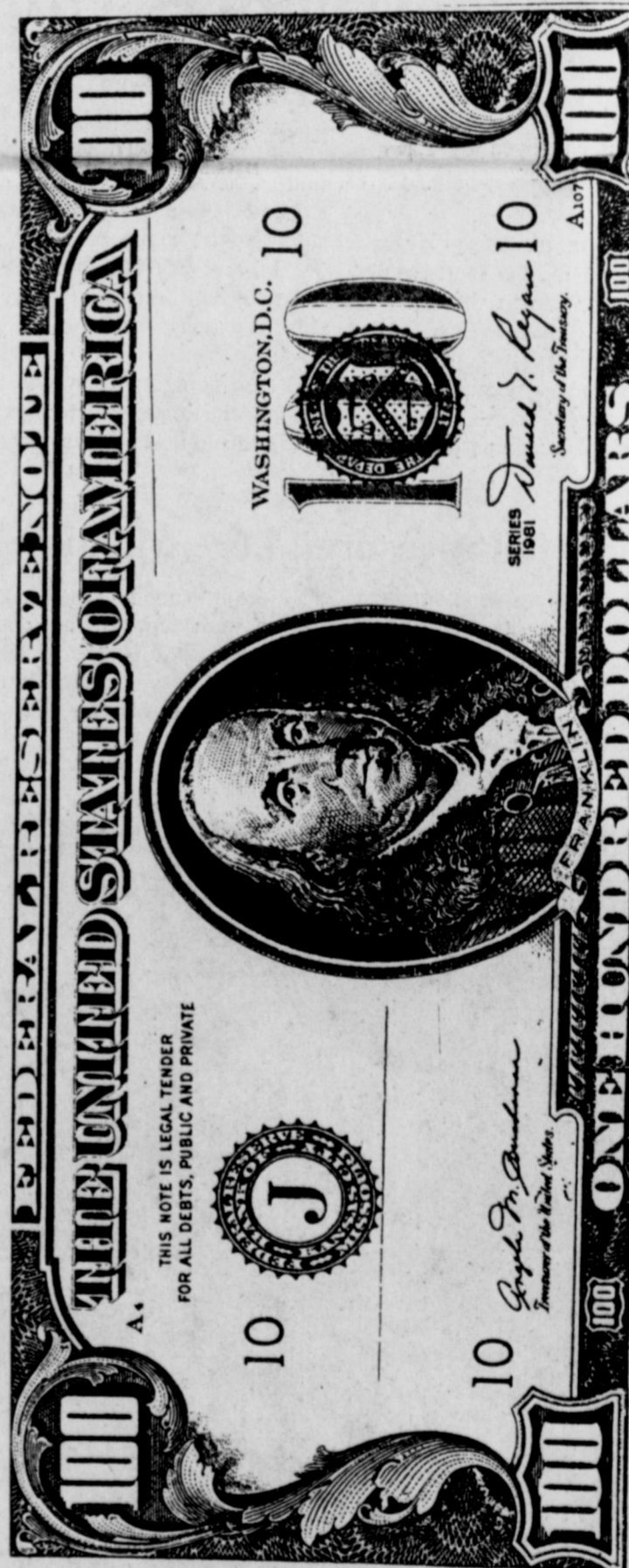

German floral expert Garden Club speaker

Mrs. Glen Atkins, a native of Germany whose husband is stationed at Sheppard Air Force Base, gave an interesting program Friday morning on flower arranging techniques for the Iowa Park Garden Club.

The flower arranging artist became a certified florist in 1984 after studying agriculture, botany and working as an apprentice in Germany three years. She commented that in Germany, fresh flower arrangements are not as expensive as they are in the United States and they use more garden flowers in their arrangements.

Mrs. Adkins explained the four forms of flower arrangement design and showed examples of each. The designs are symmetric, one-sided or natural, linear and parallel.

She demonstrated the symmetric design using carnations, little mums and asters and said that she likes to use native grasses in most of her arrangements, both for interest and for fillers.

She also demonstrated a one-sided arrangement, and after she finished the two arrangements, she gave them to the club, and they were won by Miss Ethyle Kidwell and Mrs. Bea Boles.

Preceding the program, 17 members answered roll call with their favorite cut flower. Mrs. Don Decker, vice president, presided over the business.

Mrs. Dave Davis gave the thought for the day entitled "Smell

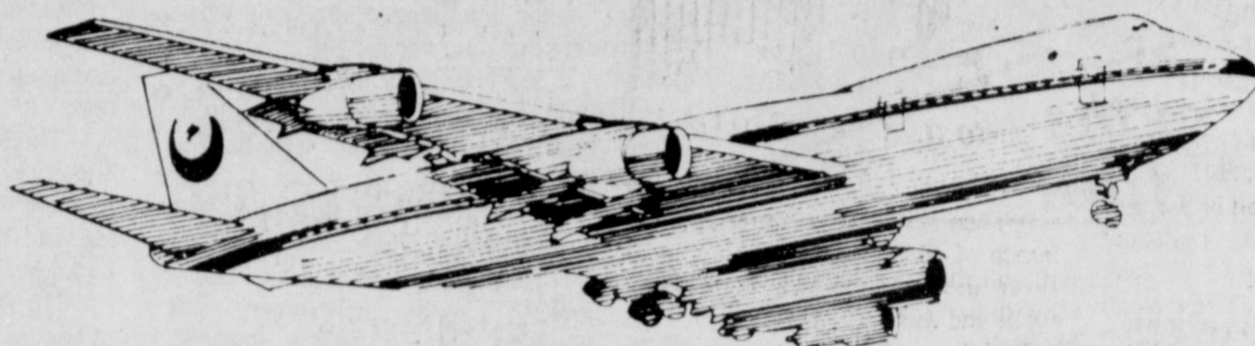

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Hawks overcome Porkeys with final-second pass

Hawk football fans have a new "comeback game" they'll be talking about for years to come, and let the last "big one," the 1965 game against Quana, rest. Friday night's last-second 16-12 non-conference win over the Porcupines of Springtown has taken its place.

And leading the cast of characters who made it all possible were Toby Brown, Billy Kenyon, Jim Cummings and Dan Fannin.

It was a game with all the makings of a good novel.

Item: Iowa Park has never beaten Springtown, though the two finished in a tie last year, and in all three meetings, the Porkeys came from behind in the fading ticks of the clock.

Item: two Hawk starters were sidelined with injuries early in the game - Chad Fielding covering the opening kickoff, and Jeff Huff returning a punt on the fourth play of the game.

Item: Springtown, after two delay penalties, punted to the Hawk 42 yard line with 29 seconds left on the clock.

On the first play following POJO's last punt, Kenyon advanced the ball from the Hawk 42 to Springtown's 48, and Coach David Baugh used his last time out with 18 seconds remaining on the clock.

Then Fannin passed to Craig Rickman on the 34, but the ball bounced to the ground, incomplete. Had he caught it, with several defenders around him, the game would have ended, right then and there.

But with 13 seconds showing on the clock, Kenyon took a handoff on an apparent sweep to his right. As he neared the line of scrimmage, he stopped, and used the arm that made him the leading pitcher on the baseball team last spring.

Brown was the deeper of two receivers, and one defender was between them. The ball sailed over the defender's hands and Brown, not having to break his stride, softly cradled the ball into his arms and needed only a couple of steps to the goal line.

The clock had only five seconds showing when Brown kicked the second of two successful extra points (the second required after a five-yard penalty for motion), making the score 16-12.

Cummings was called on 20 times during the game to carry the ball, and he responded with 115 yards against a very respectable Springtown defensive unit. Time and again, he would tear or spin away from tacklers to gain additional yardage.

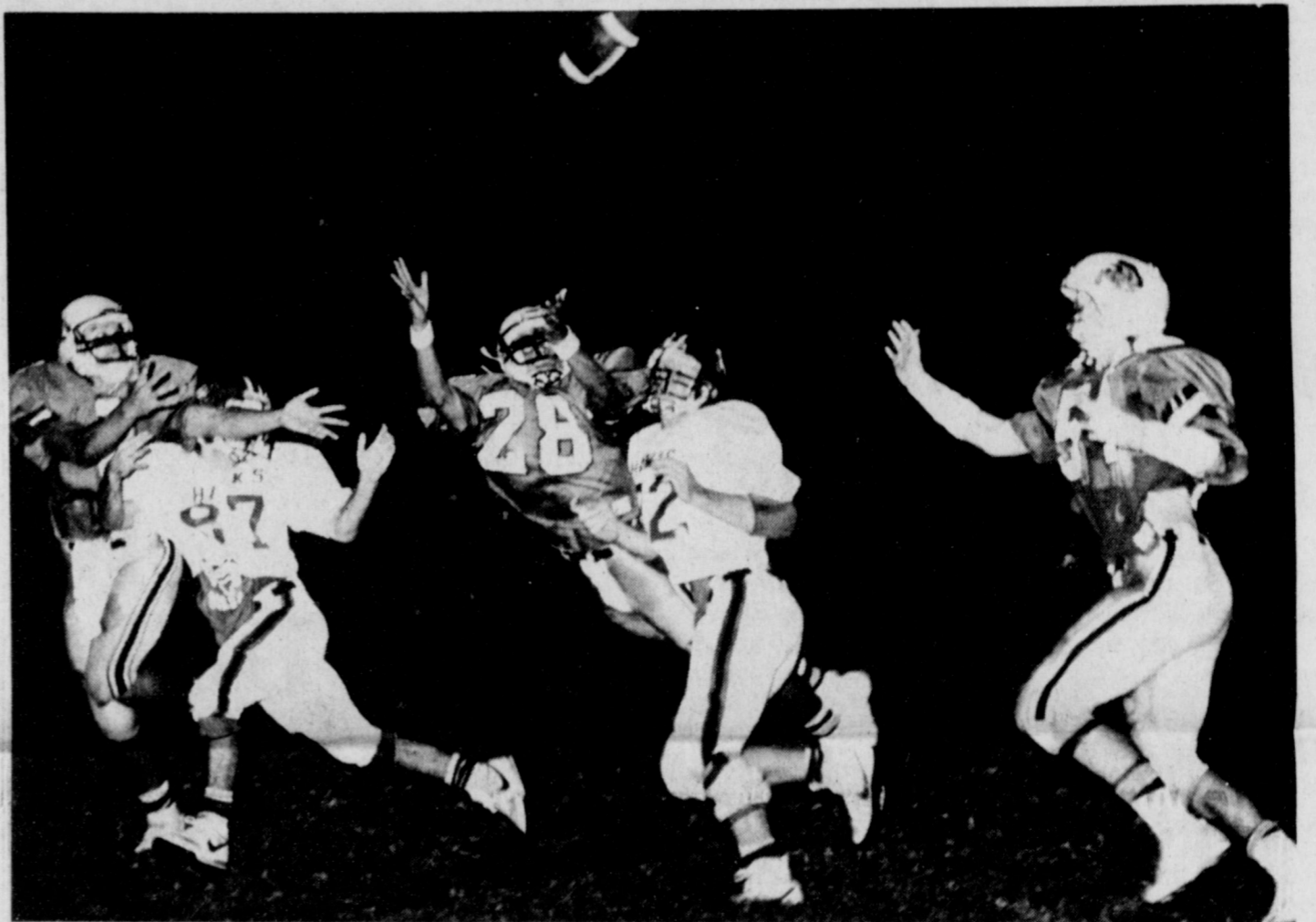
Brown lit up Iowa Park's side of the scoreboard early in the third quarter, when the Hawks were trailing 0-9.

The Hawks had taken the second half kickoff and marched to Springtown's 11 yard line, before losing 10 yards on two rushing attempts. Brown first kicked from the 26 yard line, but the play was nullified by a five-yard penalty. Undaunted, he then split the uprights from 42 yards away.

Springtown scored before the third quarter ended, taking a 12-3 lead on a 29-yard field goal.

Iowa Park answered with a drive that began on the Hawk 19, and was capped with a 35-yard pass from Fannin to Kenyon. The junior backup quarterback faked out the entire POJO defense with an apparent handoff, spun, and hit Kenyon running down the middle of the field, completely alone.

Brown's kick attempt for the extra point was

blocked with 11:09 remaining in the game. That took away an opportunity for the Hawks to win on a field goal.

For a change, penalties were disastrous to the Porkeys, instead of the Hawks. The hosts were flagged 11 times for 80 yards, and some of those came at very strategic times and places. Iowa Park was penalized only four times for 30 yards.

There was no scoring in the first quarter, as both teams swapped turnovers. Gary Tatum stopped the second Porkey possession with an interception. Late in the period, Springtown punted and Tim Martin muffed the reception and POJO had the ball on the Hawk 12.

The Porcupines appeared to have scored on the first play, but offsetting penalties nullified the play. Gregg Young made a tackle one yard behind scrimmage, Springtown threw an incomplete pass, and then Bobby Keller and Brown made a tackle six yards back, on the 19.

The scoring opportunity was missed when a 26-yard field goal kick fell short.

But on their next possession, Springtown, with a 25-yard pass, drove to the Hawk one, took a five-yard motion penalty and then threw an incomplete pass before lighting the scoreboard with a 23-yard field goal.

The Porkey fans were dancing in their seats about three minutes later, when one of Fannin's passes was intercepted on the Hawk 45 and returned for a TD. The kick for extra point was wide.

Springtown was on the Hawk 32 with 1:07 left

in the second quarter when Brown intercepted a pass on his own 19 to kill another threat.

After Brown's field goal, Springtown, with a big, 53-yard run, had the ball on the Hawk one yard line, facing a fourth down situation. Coach Lucky Gamble called his troops to the sideline during a time out and, apparently, did not hear the official's signal for play to get underway. Springtown was penalized five yards for delay, and had to settle for a 19-yard field goal.

Andy Jacobi was pressed into a starting position at tailback, in place of Joel Galloway, who had been ill most of the week. Jacobi carried 12 times and gained 49 yards, next best to Cummings.

Kenyon wound up with 35 yards on five carries.

In that 1965 Iowa Park-Quana game, the Hawks took possession, inside their own one yard line and drove the length of the field to win 14-12 in the final two minutes of the game. A loss would have put them out of the district race. The win allowed them the opportunity to advance all the way to the semi-finals, where they lost to the eventual champion, Plano.
