City calls election; studies building plan

The city council Monday night called for a May 7 election and discussed construction of a new building for the Chamber of Commerce.

The May date was set because of the state's adoption of a March 8 primary election.

Terms expire this spring for Mayor Tim Hunter and Aldermen Bud Burch and Bud Mercer. Absentee voting will extend from April 18

through May 3, at city hall.

During a discussion on building a new facility for the Chamber of Commerce, which is proposed to be located on the vacant lot west from city hall, Administrator James Barrington said a building estimated to cost \$40,000 could possibly be completed at a savings of 20 to 30 percent if the city served as general contractor and used its own personnel

to do electrical and plumbing work.

The city has earlier expressed an interest in relocating the Chamber office, so the space could be used for its own office needs.

"We cannot add onto this building for anything like \$28,000," said Mayor Hunter.

A floor plan drafted by Architect Don Daugherty was provided for the council's inspection.

Daugherty and Barrington were instructed to gather cost estimates, to be presented at a future meeting.

Authorization to advertise for bids on new and replacement trash dumpsters and a mowing tractor was approved.

Barrington said the expenditures for the purchases were budgeted at \$20,800.

Bids will be sought for 20 three-yard, five one and a half-yard and 10 90-gallon dumpsters, as well as a 35-horse powered tractor.

Advertising for bids on a loader tractor was also approved after Mike Price, public works director, explained it would replace another piece of equipment, a backhoe/loader, that has become too expensive to repair.

A resolution accepting the 1986-87 audit report of Gant and Toombs, as well as approving the firm's bill and naming the same group to be the next audit, was approved.

Burglary suspect arrested

Iowa Park police apparently solved a series of coin machine thefts Friday when a suspect was arrested.

The suspect, Donald Wayne O'Brien, 20, was charged with burglary of a coin operated machine that occurred Jan. 14 at Davis Laundry.

He is also suspected in a series of similar burglaries.

O'Brien was taken to county jail.

Another arrest was reported on the police blotter the previous day.

Carlotta Lee Perkins, 24, was taken into custody on a traffic warrant issued by the Wichita Falls Police Department and turned over to an officer of that department.

Two thefts were reported during the past week.

A vehicle parked in a secure fenced area at Expressway Texaco was reportedly broken into last Wednesday night.

Taken were a cassette deck, speakers, equalizer and a set of gauges. A suspect is under investigation.

Herman Lewis told police Friday his .45 semi-automatic pistol was taken from 413 W. Aldine.

Alan R. Conrad told police Sunday that two men assaulted him when he was dumping trash at Colonial Apartments, where he resides.

A criminal mischief incident also was reported Sunday. Bill Robinson, a candidate for Justice of the Peace, said several of his yard signs along West Highway had been taken down.

Trustee meeting rescheduled Feb. 23

The regular monthly meeting of Iowa Park's school board was not held Tuesday night, as had been announced, and has been postponed until Feb. 23, according to Supt. Glen Mitchell.

Two trustees had said they would not be able to attend the meeting and, since one of the major items on the agenda concerns contract renewals for assistant superintendent, principals, assistant principal, athletic director, tax collector and counselors, a full board's action was desired.

A called meeting will be held at 6:30 Tuesday, but the only action on that agenda concerns bids received to construct a new wing at Bradford Elementary.

Business window hours change at Post Office

Iowa Park's Post Office will begin a practice of not opening its business area until 1 p.m. on Wednesdays, starting next week, according to Postmaster Ken Turman.

Box mail as well as city and rural delivery will not be affected.

With the exception of Wichita Falls, Denton and several Fort Worth stations, all offices in the Dallas Division will adopt the same policy.

The cost-reduction measure is re-

quired by the Budget Reconciliation Act of 1987, Turman said.

"While the Postal Service is trying to do its part to help reduce the Federal deficit, I regret any inconvenience this will cause our customers," Turman commented.

Post Offices adopting the policy will provide parcel pick-up through the "Dutch Doors" in the lobby, but are prohibited from conducting financial transactions until 1 p.m. on Wednesdays, including food coupons.

Coach could be named Friday

Field of 70 candidates narrowed to final five

A new head football coach and athletic director could possibly be named by Iowa Park school trustees as early as Friday.

The Leader has learned from an informed source that a delegation of school officials is out of town today, making background interviews of at least one candidate.

Should information gleaned by the representatives prove satisfactory, a called meeting could be held some time Friday to name a replacement for former coach David Baugh.

However, according to the Leader's source, a final decision could possibly be extended into next week.

Board members interviewed five applicants last week, two on Thursday and the others Friday.

The five were chosen from approximately 70 applicants who sought the position.

Early-day family histories sought for centennial book

Early-day Iowa Park family histories will be published this fall, as part of the community's centennial observation.

A meeting was held Friday afternoon of centennial workers, where it was decided the family histories, as well as the history of Iowa Park, will be printed during the year.

While the committee is hoping to publish the histories in a book form, finances may dictate their publications in other forms, said Robert Palmer, Chamber of Commerce president.

The committee is asking families to submit their histories, by May, to the Chamber of Commerce office.

A history of Iowa Park is being compiled by Lita Watson, who was at the meeting along with Joni Whi-

tis, Susan Dillard and Bob Hamilton.

Palmer said book publishers require considerable "up front" money before they will accept a book to be published, and unless someone or some business agrees to underwrite the initial expense, prospects of having a book printed appear dim.

He has scheduled a meeting with one well-known Texas book publishing firm's representative in hopes to work out some sort of agreement.

The committee agreed that persons with old photographs of local people, places and events should be contacted. The photographs would be copied for use in the publication.

Additionally, a list of volunteers who will work on the publication will be gathered at the Chamber office. The volunteers will work as coordinators, proof readers, typing or have writing skills.

Doctor encourages walking as a beneficial exercise

Dr. Erwin Soell was the guest speaker for the Philia Study Club meeting Monday night in the home of Mrs. Ron Barnes. Mrs. David Springer was the co-hostess.

Introduced by Mrs. Don Decker, Dr. Soell introduced his talk on "Walk for Your Heart" by stating that walking meets all the criteria for excellent exercise, and that it could even provide sufficient exercise for a training program for youth.

He said walking is ever-increasing in popularity and is reasonably safe at any age and would increase the body's aerobic ability. He further stated that it is not as hard on the joints as jogging and that it doesn't require a lot of special equipment but good walking shoes will be helpful.

Continuing, Dr. Soell said that walking is a convenient exercise that can be enjoyed in the city, the suburbs, or the country. It can aid in weight loss when combined with a sensible diet, but walking without dieting will only result in a 10-pound weight loss over a year's time, when one walks 20 minutes daily.

Dr. Soell said walking helps slow down the effects of osteoporosis because regular exercise helps maintain bone health, which is true

especially in the legs. He said that walking is very enjoyable but it also adds a feeling of "well being," and the body continues to function at a higher level for a time after exercising.

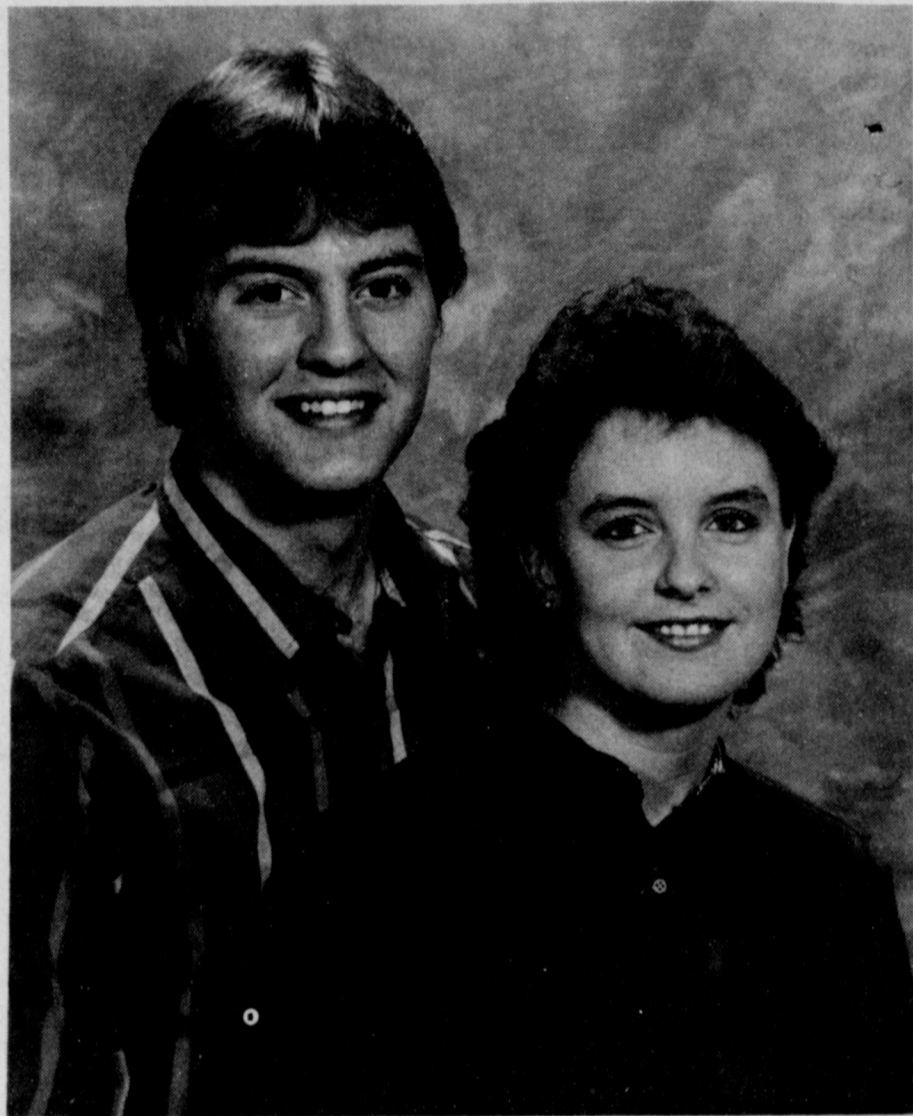
He concluded by stressing that walking qualifies as a good aerobic exercise, and that walking with one-three pound hand weight comes close to jogging in relation to burning calories. "One should strive to walk five times a week for at least 20 minutes and cover one and a half to two miles. Even slower walking will provide some benefits. Find an

exercise you enjoy and do it consistently," he said.

TEX-MEX TOSTADA SOUP

1/2 lb. ground pork or beef
1 cup chopped onion
16 oz. canned tomatoes
16 oz. canned pinto beans
8 oz. tomato sauce
1 cup water
2/3 to 1 cup picante sauce
1/4 t. ground cumin
Tortilla or corn chips, coarsely crushed
Shredded lettuce
(1 add 1 can chopped chiles)

Brown meat with onion in 3 qt. saucepan; drain well. Drain and chop tomatoes reserving juice. Add tomatoes and juice to saucepan with beans, tomato sauce and cumin. Bring to boil; reduce heat. Cover and simmer 10 minutes. Ladle into soup bowls. Top with tortilla chips and cheese. Makes six servings.

PARTY CHEESE BALL

2-8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
1-8 oz. can pineapple (drained)
1/4 cup green pepper (chopped)
1/4 cup celery (chopped)
2 T. onions (chopped)
1 tsp. seasoned salt
2 cups pecans
1 small jar pimentos (chopped)
Mix together cheese, pimentos, pineapple, pepper, celery, onions, salt and 1 cup of pecans. Roll into ball and then cover ball with remaining pecans.

COWBOY COOKIES

1 cup brown sugar
1 cup sugar
1 cup shortening
2 eggs
2 cups flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. vanilla
2 cups oatmeal
1 large pkg. chocolate chips
1 cup chopped pecans
In small bowl, combine flour, baking soda, baking powder and salt. In large bowl, combine shortening,

sugar, brown sugar and vanilla - beat until creamy. Beat in eggs. Gradually add flour mixture. Stir in chocolate chips, oatmeal and pecans. Drop onto ungreased cookie sheets. Bake 10 to 12 minutes at 375.

MICROWAVE TWICE-BAKED POTATOES

4 baking potatoes
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup sour cream
1/2 tsp. salt
Dash pepper
Paprika
Pierce potatoes and place on a paper towel in oven. Cook on high 12 to 16 minutes. Do not overcook, as potatoes will dehydrate. Remove 1/4-inch horizontal slice from top of each potato. Using a teaspoon, remove centers to a mixing bowl. Add sour cream, salt and pepper to potato pulp and beat until smooth. Divide evenly in shells, mounding if necessary. Cook on high 4 minutes. Sprinkle with paprika.

Laws that protect women' 23 Study Club program topic

Alyce Bondurant, a lawyer in the firm of Newman and Bondurant, and the first woman lawyer in Iowa Park, discussed "Laws That Protect Women" Thursday afternoon for members of the 23 Study Club. She was introduced by Mrs. C.L. Thompson.

The program had been planned in relation to the Status of Women division in the Public Affairs Department of General Federation of Women's Clubs.

Miss Bondurant said that the Women's Rights Movement started in the United States in 1848, and the Women's Suffrage League was formed in Texas in Houston in 1903. By 1914, there were 21 clubs and the main issues of the league were voting and property rights. She said that the Equal Rights Amendment had been proposed in every Texas Legislature since 1957 and finally passed in 1972. Since that time, the status of women has changed considerably.

To show how the status of women has changed in the twentieth century, she said that in 1911 a married woman with her husband's consent could get a court order allowing her to participate in business activities, but she was barred from certain jobs and educational opportunities. Today, if she desires, she can educate herself for any type work, and own and manage her property.

Chamber's role locally explained to Epsilon Eta

Jeanette Robertson presented a program on the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce for Epsilon Eta Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha Tuesday evening in a meeting held at the home of Tama McDowell.

She said that the Chamber of Commerce was not organized for profit and that its main objective is to promote the civic, commercial, industrial and agricultural welfare of the city and vicinity. She said that it is an association of businessmen and individuals and the classes of membership were commercial and civic.

Mrs. Robertson added that the Chamber of Commerce provided many services including sponsoring the annual Whoop-T-Do, and providing a wealth of information to prospective residents, businesses and newcomers, and that it assisted the committee responsible for getting the Cryovac plant here, and helped secure the land for the Wal-Mart store.

During the recent District Six convention held at Fort Worth, three Epsilon Eta members were elected to serve as district officers. They are Tama McDowell, president; Jo Bumgardner, treasurer and Tia Turner, coordinator.

The chapter won first place awards in civic hours, service hours and civic money; and third place in service money, and education for Nov. and Dec.

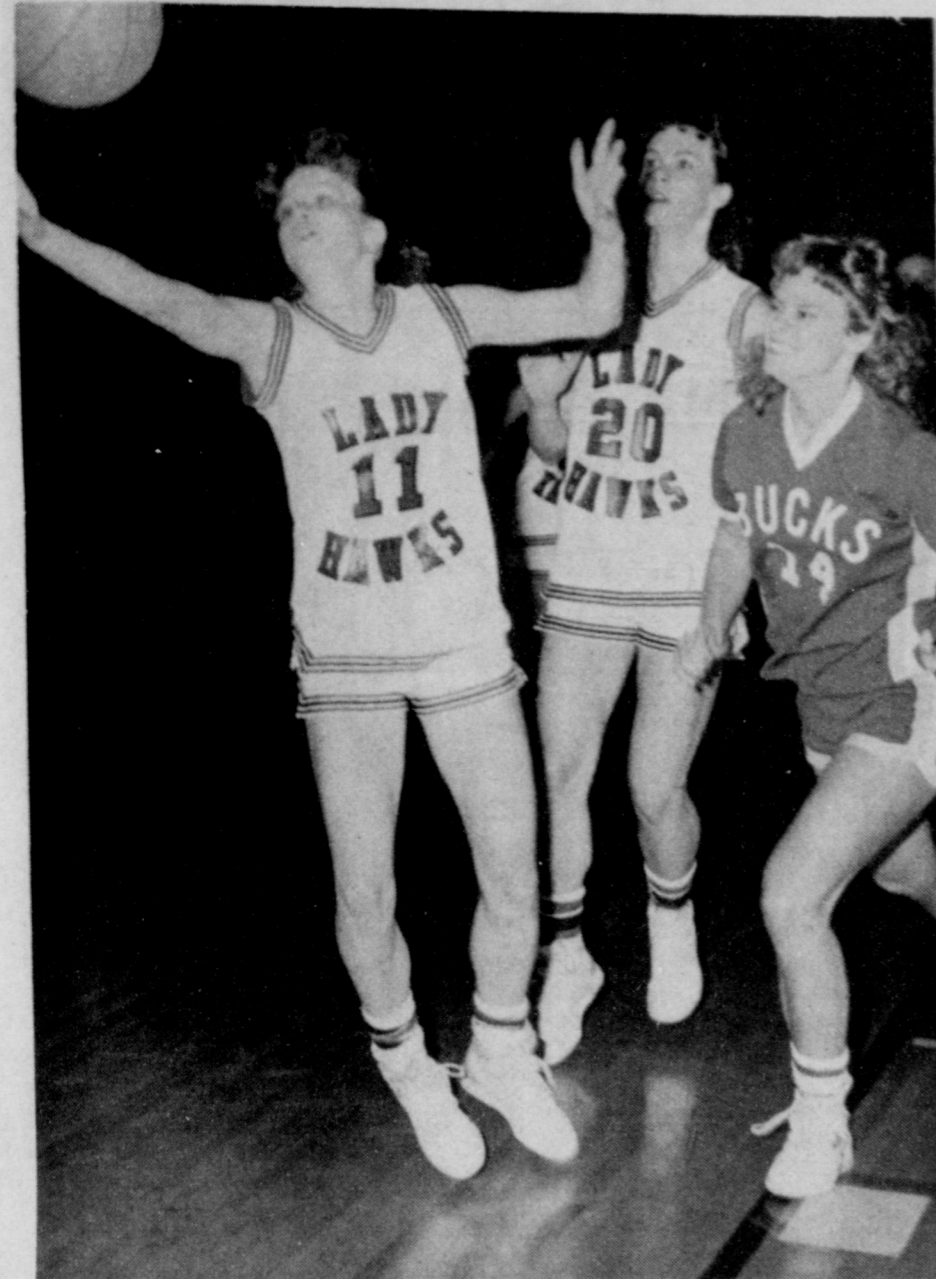
had only nine.
