

Coach could be named Friday Field of 70 candidates narrowed to final five

Early-day family histories

sought for centennial book

A new head football coach and athletic director could possibly be named by Iowa Park school trustees as early as Friday.

The Leader has learned from an informed source that a delegation of school officials is out of town today, making background interviews of at least one candidate.

Should information gleened by the representatives prove satisfactory, a called meeting could be held some time Friday to name a replacement for former coach David Baugh.

However, according to the Leader's source, a final decision could possibly be extended into next week.

Board members interviewed five applicants last week, two on Thursday and the others Friday.

The five were chosen from approximately 70 applicants who sought the position.

Indicating the interest shown in the position, Supt. Glen Mitchell said the opening was never formally advertised, and numerous telephone calls were received after the cutoff date set by the board.

The five finalists include Dean Kirkpatrick, Iowa Park assistant coach, and four others who presently hold head coaching positions.

The other four are Earl Overton of Floydada, Mike Merritt of Needville, Dewayne Richters of Jourdanton, and Len Williams of Mart.

Kirkpatrick, 40, is a graduate of Wichita Falls High School and Midwestern State Univ. He has served as defensive coordinator since joining the Iowa Park staff in 1983, and his teaching field includes social studies,

Business window hours change at Post Office

Iowa Park's Post Office will begin a practice of not opening its business area until 1 p.m. on Wednesdays, starting next week, according to

Postmaster Ken Turman. Box mail as well as city and rural delivery will not be affected.

With the exception of Wichita Falls, Denton and several Fort Worth stations, all offices in the Dallas Division will adopt the same policy. The cost-reduction measure is re-

quired by the Budget Reconciliation Act of 1987, Turman said.

"While the Postal Service is trying to do its part to help reduce the Federal deficit, I regret any inconvenience this will cause our customers," Turman commented.

Post Offices adopting the policy will provide parcel pick-up through the "Dutch Doors" in the lobby, but are prohibited from conducting financial transactions until 1 p.m. on Wednesdays, including food coupons.

Doctor encourages walking as a beneficial exercise

Dr. Erwin Soell was the guest speaker for the Philia Study Club meeting Monday night in the home of Mrs. Ron Barnes. Mrs. David Springer was the co-hostess.

Introduced by Mrs. Don Decker, Dr. Soell introduced his talk on "Walk for Your Heart" by stating that walking meets all the criteria for excellent exercise, and that it could even provide sufficient exercise for a training program for youth.

He said walking is everincreasing in popularity and is reasonably safe at any age and would increase the body's aerobic ability. He further stated that it is not as hard on the joints as jogging and that it doesn't require a lot of special equipment but good walking shoes will be helpful.

Continuing, Dr. Soell said that walking is a convenient exercise that can be enjoyed in the city, the suburbs, or the country. It can aid in weight loss when combined with a sensible diet, but walking without dieting will only result in a 10-pound weight loss over a year's time, when one walks 20 minutes daily.

Dr. Soell said walking helps slow down the effects of osteoporosis because regular exercise helps maintain bone health, which is true





Chamber's role locally explained to Epsilon Eta

Laws that protect women' 23 Study Club program topic

Alyce Bondurant, a lawyer in the firm of Newman and Bondurant, and the first woman lawyer in Iowa Park, discussed "Laws That Protect Women" Thursday afternoon for members of the 23 Study Club. She was introduced by Mrs. C.L. Thompson.

The program had been planned in relation to the Status of Women division in the Public Affairs Department of General Federation of Women's Clubs.

Miss Bondurant said that the Women's Rights Movement started in the United States in 1848, and the Women's Suffage League was formed in Texas in Houston in 1903. By 1914, there were 21 clubs and the main issues of the league were voting and property rights. She said that the Equal Rights Amendment had been proposed in every Texas Legislature since 1957 and finally

The new freedom of women led to one of the most interesting and informative parts of Miss Bondurant's talk; community property versus private property. She explained that private property could be a gift. inheritance or one's own income. She stressed the importance of women and in having a will and gave examples of what could happen when people die intestate.

She also discussed probating wills, the homestead laws for both widows and widowers, and the benefits of conservemanship, or joint manging by husband and wife.
