Iowa Parkan receives USAF award

Jack Railsback, a resident of Pleasant Valley Estates and claims officer at Sheppard AFB Office of the Staff Judge Advocate, recently won the Air Force's Outstanding Civilian Career Service Award.

The award is presented to the civilian employee who "continuously demonstrates outstanding performance in his duties."

According to Col. James R. Barrow, Sheppard's Staff Judge Advocate, "Mr. Railsback's leadership and expert management skills were directly responsible for significant cost savings to the Air Force and for promoting high morale among people assigned to the Center."

Under the leadership of Railsback, the Claims Division was rated "outstanding" during the 1986 Air Training Command Management Effectiveness Inspection.

His duty performance was individually recognized by the Office of the Judge Advocate General of the Air Force in its 1984 evaluation of the Sheppard's Staff Judge Advocate

Railsback also received high praise for his "professional" handling of claims involving military members of foreign nations participating in the Euro-NATO Joint Jet Pilot Training program in 1984 following a fatal aircraft crash in the early stages of the program.

He is also credited with assisting in the development and implementation of the preventive medical malpractice programs, Risk Management Training, which helped reduce the number of medical malpractice

Key school personnel get pact extensions

sonnel were extended another year, most of them with salary increases, by the school board Tuesday night.

Contracts for the assistant superintendent, all principals and assistant principal, counselors and tax collector were extended.

Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, Richard Davis, Jimmy Alsup, Ron Woods and Richard Davis, principals, each received a \$2,736 "catch-up" salary increase.

All trustees except Don Decker voted for the motion.

It was later explained that none of the five had received a salary increase as have teachers the past two years.

Decker's opposition vote was not pertaining to the contract extensions of the administrators, but only to the increased expenditure for salaries which comes from the general

Voting on the contracts was taken following an executive session that lasted an hour and 26 minutes.

Trustees noted an unusual drop in the district's enrollment, following mid-semester.

The district's enrollment dropped from 1,845 in January to 1,811. That figure is only 15 greater than the same date in 1987.

High school and junior high experienced the greatest decreases. The high school went from 530 students last month to 512, and junior high from 420 to 405.



The couple have selected June 25 for the date of their wedding which will be held at the First Baptist Church in Holliday.

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
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Cook of the W Week

The recipes shared this week by Chi Chi (Mrs. Keith) Rusk will probably be a boon to many cooks. Some of them are, no doubt, new, others may be old with a new twist that gives promise of adding new flair and excitement to meals. Cooking is one of her hobbies, and she takes seriously the responsibility of planning and preparing the right kind of meals for her family and

BEST BEEF AND NOODLES

- 1 tsp. oil 1 tsp. salt
- 12 oz. pkg. Fettucini noodles 2 Tbls. butter or margarine
- 1 tsp. oregano
- 1 medium onion, sliced (boiled for 3 minutes)
- 1/2 lb. Velveeta cheese Leftover roast or soup bone meat
- 2 cans cream of mushroom soup 1/2 cup milk

Bring salted water to a boil; add oil. Add noodles and cook for 8 minutes. (Do not overcook). Drain, add butter and toss gently until melted. Add oregano and Parmesan cheese. Toss to coat evenly. Layer in a large, sparingly greased, casserole dish. Next layer meat, cut in bite-size pieces, onion, and sliced Velveeta. Mix milk and soup and pour over top. Bake in 350 degree oven 25 minutes.

BROCCOLI- ONION DELUXE

- 2-10 oz. pkg. frozen cut broccoli or cauliflower or mixture of both 2 cups small whole onions or 2 med.
- onions quartered. 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 2 Tbls. flour
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 cup milk
- 1-3 oz. pkg. cream cheese
- 1/2 cup shredded sharp Cheddar
- 1 cup soft bread crumbs

Cook broccoli or cauliflower as directed on package. Drain well. Cook fresh or frozen onions until tender in salted boiling water. Drain. In sauce pan, melt half of butter. Blend in flour, salt and dash of pepper. Add milk. Cook stirring constantly until thick and bubbly. Reduce heat and blend in cream cheese until smooth. Place vegetables in 1 1/2 qt. casse-role dish, pour sauce mixture over and mix lightly. Top with American cheese. Melt remaining butter, toss with bread crumbs. Sprinkle atop casserole. Bake at 350 degrees until heated through, 40-45 mi

BREAD STICKS

Day old hot dog buns Butter or margarine

Garlic salt Parsley

Parmesan cheese (grated)

Break apart bun. Butter top of each piece. Sprinkle with all or any combination of garlic salt, parsley, Parmesan cheese. Cut down middle. Will make 4 long strips. Bake on cookie sheet in 400 degree oven until browned. Package of 8 buns will make 32 sticks.

BLACK FOREST CHERRY PIE

Elegant but easy 4-layer pie

- 2/3 cup sugar
- 3 Tbls. cornstarch
- 1/4 tsp. salt 2 cups milk
- 2 eggs beaten slightly
- 2 Tbls. butter
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1/3 cup Nestle's chocolate chips 1 (8-inch) baked pie shell

1-16 oz. can pitted dark sweet cherries, drained and halved 1/2 cup whipping cream

Combine sugar, cornstarch and salt in medium sauce pan. Gradually stir in milk. Cook, stirring until bubbly; cook 2 more minutes. Stir small amount of hot mixture into beaten eggs. Return to hot mixture and cook 2 minutes more. Add butter and vanilla. Stir 1/2 cup pudding mixture into melted chocolate chips. Spread in pie shell. Cover vanilla mixture with waxed paper. Cool 30 minutes. Arrange cherries, cut side down, (reserving 8 halves). Spread vanilla mixture over this; chill. Whip cream. Spoon around edges. Add remaining cherry halves.

ICED TEA

2 cups fresh, cold water 3-4 family-size tea bags 1 1/3 - 2 cups sugar (to suit your family's taste).

Put water in pan, bring to a boil. Add tea bags. Remove from heat and cover. Let sit for at least 3 minutes. Put sugar in gallon jar. Add tea mixture, then fill remainder of jar with fresh cold water. Pour over ice and add lemon slice.

ORIENTAL CHICKEN

- 1 whole or 2 halves chicken breast Marinade:
- 1 Tbls. cornstarch
- 1 Tbls. light soy sauce 1 Tbls. sherry
- Sauce: 1 tsp. salt

Lemon slices

- 1-2 Tbls. curry powder 4 Tbls. catsup
- 1 Tbls. oyster sauce
- 1 medium onion 2 medium tomatoes
- 1 medium green pepper

2 Tbls. brown sugar Slice chicken in thin strips and

marinate for 15 to 30 minutes. Cut tomatoes into wedges and marinate in brown sugar for 15 to 20 minutes. Heat wok and add 1 Tbls. oil. Stir fry onions with green peppers for 1/2 minute. Add 1 Tbls. sherry and cover for 1/2 minute. Set aside in dish. Pour 2 Tbls. oil in wok, let heat, and stir in curry powder. Let flavor release for few seconds. Add chicken and salt and stir until done. Add tomato wedges and stir until heated through. Add catsup, onions and peppers until heated.





AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

The Tricore Field, Wichita County, will see more developmental action when Tri Core Oil and Gas of Irving spuds a pair of developmental wells. The ventures will be known as the No. 1 and No. 1-M Dickinson, with drillsites four and three miles north and north-northeast of Clara, respectively.

The No. 1 is in a 64-acre lease in the Specht Colony Land Subdivision Block 19, 2,520 feet from the south line and 1,000 feet from the east line. the 1-M is in a 79-acre lease in the same subdivision Block 19, 2,700 feet from the south line and 150 feet from the east line.

Pumping 43 barrels of oil per day, the 91 Dickinson has been completed in the Tricore Field, Wichita County, three miles northnortheast of Clara.

With Tri Core Oil and Gas as the operator, the well bottomed at 1,727 feet and will produce from the Gunsight Sand, 1,634 to 1,636 feet into the hole. Water production totaled 27 barrels daily. Oil tested at 41-gravity.

Tom Swanson of Electra has completed the No. 54 Burnett "D" in the Wichita Regular Field, two miles south of Fowlkes, Wichita County. It pumped 18 barrels of oil per day.

Swanson took the hole to a 2,000-ft. bottom and perforated the Megargel Formation for production at 1,830 to 1,840 feet. Oil tested at 40-gravity.

The same operator has plugged and abandoned the No. 12 Burnett "F" in the Wichita Regular Field, two miles south of Fowlkes. Spudded on Jan. 4, the well probed to a dry bottom at 422 feet.

pair of 2,000-ft. developmental bids are scheduled for spudding in the Wichita Regular Field about five miles south-southeast of Electra. Ray Craighead Petroleum of Wichita Falls will be the operator. The wells will be known as the No. 2 and No. 3 Mrs. E.D. Collett "C".

THey are in a 251-acre lease in the GS&SF Survey Block 1. The No. 2 is 150 feet from the south line and 150 feet from the west line of the block, while the No. 3 is 140 feet from the south line and 450 feet from the west line of the block.

Ronkaran Oil of Wichita Falls has revealed plans to drill the No. 9 Perkins and Cullum in the Wichita Regular Field, about six miles south of Iowa Park. The 800-acre venture is in a 180-acre lease in the Denton CSL Survey A-417, 150 feet from the north line and 725 feet from the west line of Section 5 Block 4.

Kuehne-Pullen Oil has completed a trio of stripper wells in the

Wichita Regular Field, about five miles southeast of Burkburnett. The wells include the Nos. 32, 33 and 34 North Bear.

They showed ability to pump one, two and one barrels of oil per day from Cisco Sand perforations. Pay interval for the No. 33 was 250 to 260 feet into the hole. The other two wells produced from 574 to 584 feet into the hole. Water production average about 19 barrels per day.

An 8,200-ft. Wilbarger County wildcat is scheduled for spudding three miles south of Farmers Valley. Baker and Taylor of Amarillo will be the operator.

Elwood took the hole to total depth of 8,320 feet and plugged back to 8,125. Production will be from a set of perforations in the Bend Conglomerate, 7,315 to 7,489 feet into the wellbore.

East West Oil of Edgewood, Ky., has suspended operations at a location in the Bryant-Dobos Field, Wilbarger County, two miles southeast of Odell. It was designed as the No. 1 Lehman with total depth projected to 5,700 feet. The well was bottomed at about that depth and had been perforated for possible production.

Wildcat drilling action is slated in Wilbarger County, about five miles south of Lockett, with Kingdon Resources of Austin as the operator. The explorer well will be known as the No. 3 Guggisburg. It is located in a 200-acre lease in the W. McKinney Survey 1,200 feet from the north line and 2,370 feet from the west line of the survey.

The No. 191 Frances Sumner has been brought on line in the Wilbarger Regular Field by Mobil Producing of Midland.

Harrold, the well is in a 1,099-acre lease in the H&TC Survey 2,168 feet from the south line and 556 feet from the east line of the section.

Amerada Hess has abandoned plans to re-enter a 46-year-old producer in the Fargo Field, Wilbarger County, about three miles southwest of the Doan community. The well was known as the 1902 Fargo Unit, formerly the No. 2 Luedtke when drilled by Amerada in September of 1941. It produced from the Canyon Sand at 3,892 to 3,965 feet into the hole.







Scholarship offered



Worth Quoting

The proposed new Wise County Emergency Services District may be a great idea, but I don't think so.

We don't need another bureaucracy and taxing authority. What we do need is to demand that county commissioners and city councils adequately fund emergency services, using existing tax sources.

The answer seems so simple, but county commissioners repeatedly reject efforts to adequately fund the 14 volunteer fire departments in this

The proposed emergency services district is a direct result of the frustration of volunteer firefighters and citizens in the Southeast part of the county to secure adequate funding.

The proposed district, which could add up to 10-cents to your tax bills, is not necessary if county commissioners and city councils will live up to their obligations to finance fire and ambulance operations.

County Auditor Tim Rodgers told me last week the county has budgeted \$78,000 this year for fire protection. Of that amount, \$68,640 goes directly to the fire departments with the remainder financing the fire marshal's office.

Rodgers also said each penny of the current tax rate brings in \$118,200 based on present valua-

The arithmetic is woefully simple. Commissioners could double the monthly allocation to fire departments, from \$380 to \$760 per month for only six-tenths of a cent increase in county taxes.

I feel like ambulance operations are adequately funded for the two existing EMS operations, but if the county wants to add a third ambulance to serve the Southeast communities of Rhome, Boyd, Aurora and Newark, it would not "break the bank" and would be far less expensive than the new district.

Rodgers said the county spends \$156,200 a year for EMS services and buys a new \$45,000 ambulance about every 18 months.

That means each ambulance operation costs \$78,100. Be a little generous and buy a new \$45,000 ambulance every year. My math tells me the cost of adding a third ambulance would be \$123,100.

If each penny on the tax rate brings in \$118,200, then you could see that third ambulance would cost a little over an extra penny in taxes.

So instead of a five-or-ten cent tax rate and another bureaucracy, we can double the support to the fire departments and add the third ambulance for less than two cents on the county tax rate -- 1.7 cents to be

I sat at home this weekend and listened to the scanner as a volunteer, and I stress the word volunteer, firefighters battled grass fires in every nook and cranny of this 920 square mile county. It made me ashamed that I haven't done more to press elected officials for adequate funding.

Compare the money the firefighters get -- \$78,000 -- with the cost of a new dump truck at \$45,000 or a new motor grader at \$100,000 and you will quickly see where commissioners' priorities lie.

Before I get off this soap box, one more thing.

City councils must also step up their support of the fire departments with adequate city budgets. It is the cities that benefit from lower fire insurance rates when fire departments are adjautely equipped and have proper training, not the folks out in the country.

Decatur is a good example of a city that is slowly, but constantly, increasing its financial commitment to the fire department. This year's budget for the Decatur Fire Department is \$70,500 -- \$45,500 for operations and \$25,000 for debt retirement.

The time is long since past when the volunteer fire department in this county must go hat-in-hand to the folks they serve. We should demand that our elected officials adequately fund them with tax dollars.

Fire protection and ambulance service are darned sure more important than dump trucks and road graders.

The national media has made so much out of the Iowa caucus, and the New Hampshire primary, it would almost make you think that these early voter actions have more or less decided the presidential nominations.

Now, let's examine the facts.

FACT: Iowa has only eight electoral votes. New Hampshire has four. By contrast, when several state primaries are held on "Super Tuesday," there are well over 100 electoral votes involved. Texas has 29 and Florida 23.

In Iowa, these were local (precinct) caucuses. The candidates who won approval on that level now have their delegates set for county conventions, and later state conventions.

At the final state convention, the decisions are made as to how to divide up the state's votes (and remember, compared to other states, Iowa doesn't pack much of a punch).

It was argued that Iowa is "Middle America," and should prove fairly representative of the nation as a whole. FACT: Regional candidates Bob

Dole (senator from Kansas) and Richard Gephardt (representative from Missouri) had the best support from their neighbors in Iowa.

These candidates now must move into other areas of the country and prove themselves. We expect that in the other states, other region support may develop in other directions.

We feel that it is too bad that so much is made by the media of these early primaries, which usually causes some candidates to lose their support in other states, before they even have a chance to voice their wishes.
