No injuries in shooting at Wal-Mart

A 14-year-old Iowa Park boy is facing charges of assault on a police officer and burglary of a building, as result of a New Year's Eve benge.

The youngster, whose name cannot be used because he is a juvenile, remains in the county juvenile detention center.

He allegedly broke into Wal-Mart and, when police officers responded, fired in their direction with a shotgun, but later gave up before anyone was injured.

At almost the same time, 9:31 p.m. Sunday, friends of the youth went to the police station to inform officers the youth intended to break into the store, the police dispatcher received notice from a burglar alarm system of the entry.

Local police, Department of Public Safety troopers and deputies from the sheriff's office converged on the building as two officers entered.

And when a report was made that shots had been fired, emergency medical technicians and an ambulance also were summoned.

The youth, reportedly intoxicated after a party in a Garden Valley home, was known to have been carrying a shotgun.

However, officers were unaware of the suspect's age.

Police found the glass of an east entry door shattered, as well as one from the lobby into the main building. The store's interior lights were on.

Officers Ray Smock and Mike Stark heard glass being broken in the back of the store when they entered the building. The sound came from the sporting goods area, where guns and ammunition are displayed.

As the officers were nearing the checkout stands, a gun was fired from that area, and one of the officers returned fire.

One of the officers explained he fired only when he saw the gun pointed in their direction.

After a few instructions were shouted for the suspect to give himself up, he did.

The youth was first taken to Wichita General Hospital, a formality observed before being taken to the juvenile detention center. He reportedly had only a minor cut on one hand.

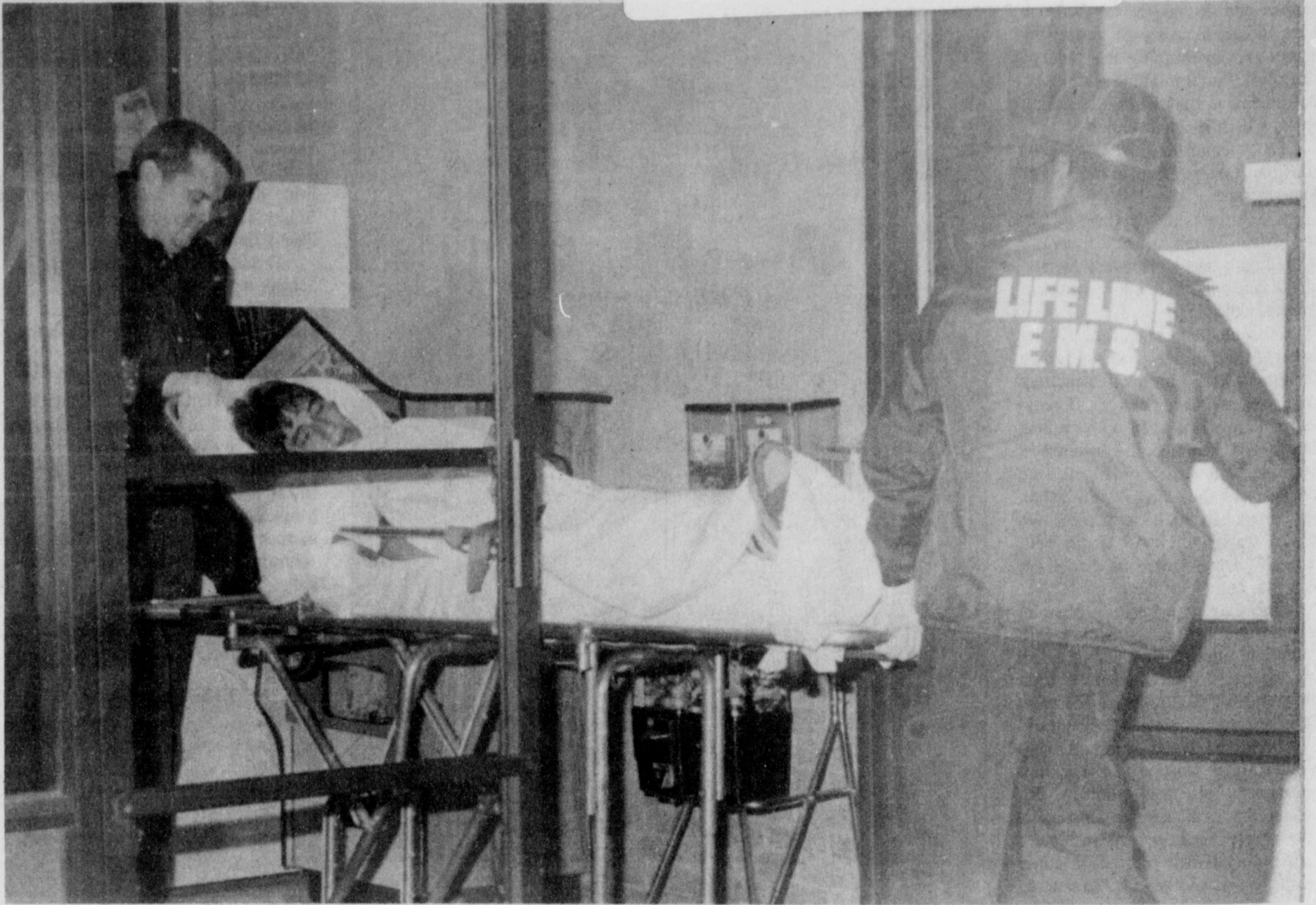
He also was tested for alcohol content in his blood system.

The youth had apparently used a baseball bat to break a sliding glass door where several shotguns were on display. Two guns were on the counter, but they as well as all the others were made useless by trigger locks.

Some ammunition from the storage area below the guns had been removed, through a wire guard.

The suspect's gun was left on the floor, next to the counter.

There was considerable damage caused by the shotgun blast, primar-

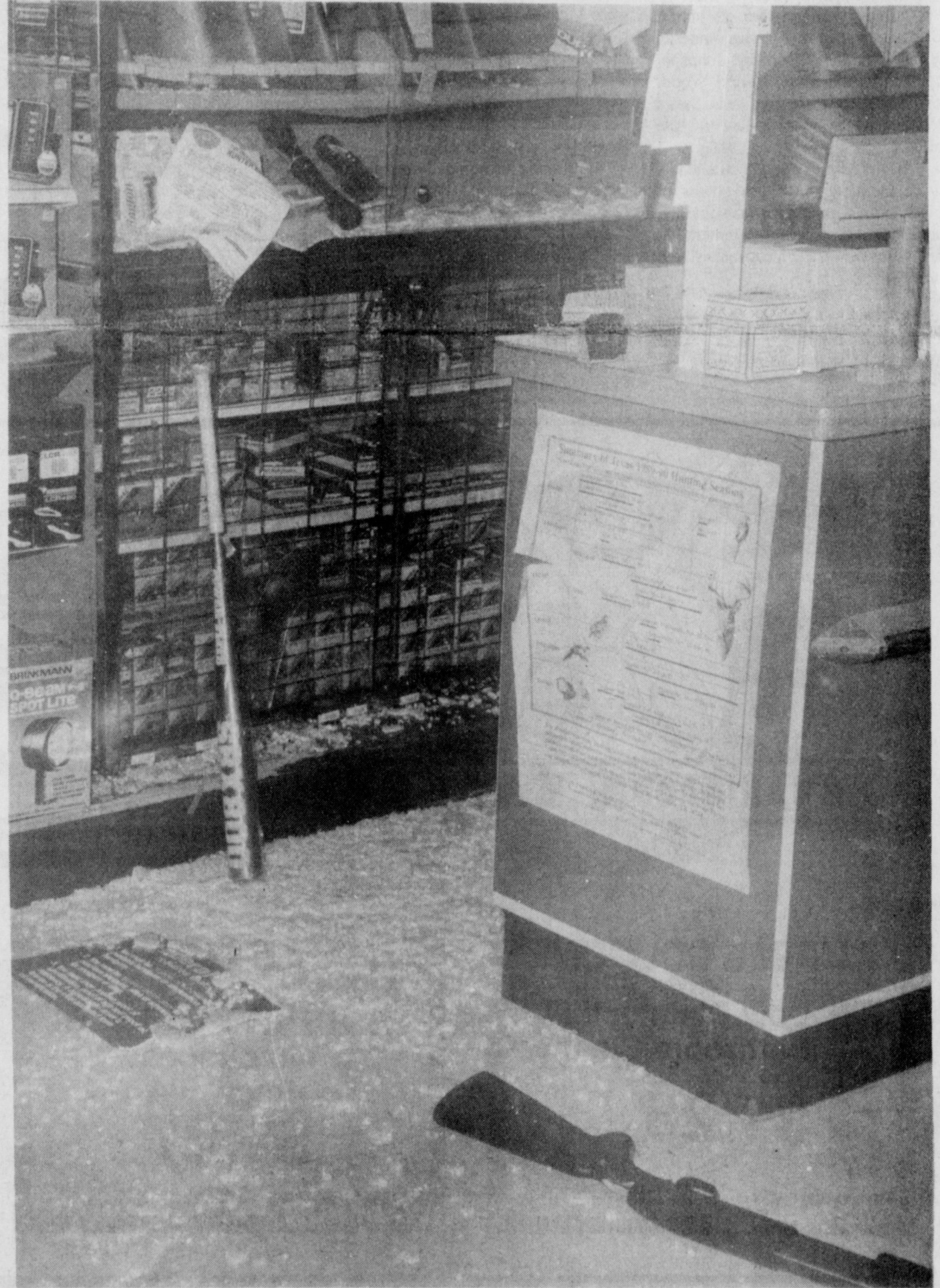


AMBULANCE CREW REMOVES UNINJURED YOUTH FROM BUILDING

ily to displays of liquid soap in the aisles. Some merchandise had been knocked from the shelves.

The youth was shielded from the line of fire from police by display racks. Items on some of the shelves were seen to have been penetrated by bullets.

Police said yesterday they still have no idea as to why the youth did what he did.

Council to consider projects for future

Members of the city council will consider three future projects when they meet at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

The three are plans for building a new Recreational Activities Building, 1990 street construction, and a new pump system at Lake Buffalo.

Architect Don Daughterty is to have plan proposals for a new RAC building, a project aldermen have been considering since being told the present structure does not meet the city's own codes.

Aldermen have said they would rather put the money, estimated as high as \$25,000, needed to revamp the old structure into construction of a new facility.

At their last meeting, aldermen discussed a proposal that city funds be used to erect a structure shell, and solicit organizations to adopt rooms for finishing. No decision was reached, however.

Council members will hear recommendations of streets most in need of rebuilding, and set priorities for this year's work.

However, because some \$72,000 more than was available from sales tax receipts were expended on last year's projects, less work is expected this year in order for the fund to be rebuilt.

Aldermen will be considering a proposal to install new and more effi-

cient pumps to deliver water from Lake Buffalo to the city's treatment plant. The present pumps would be retained for back-up use.

Also at the meeting, aldermen

will consider bid proposals for purchase of a compactor roller, and a resolution to accept the work by the contractor in relocating the water tower at Emerald Street.

Blood donors needed Monday

An all-out effort to attract more than 20 blood donors is being made for the Red River Regional Bloodmobile's visit here Monday.

A spokesman for the Red Cross recently told the Iowa Park city council that the Bloodmobile could not

continue coming here if at least 20 units could not be collected.

Donors are asked by Ed Anderson, member of the sponsoring Iowa Park Optimist Club, to go to the Faith Baptist Church between 4 and 6:30 p.m.

County's farmers eligible for loans

Wichita County and 10 others in Texas recently declared eligible for Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) disaster emergency loans as a result of actual production or physical losses caused by drought which occurred Jan. 1 through June 15, 1989 and freeze which occurred in February and March 1989.

Joe Gilbreath said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less.

For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production or a qualifying physical loss to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Gilbreath said.

Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under the emergency designation will be accepted until Aug. 6, 1990.

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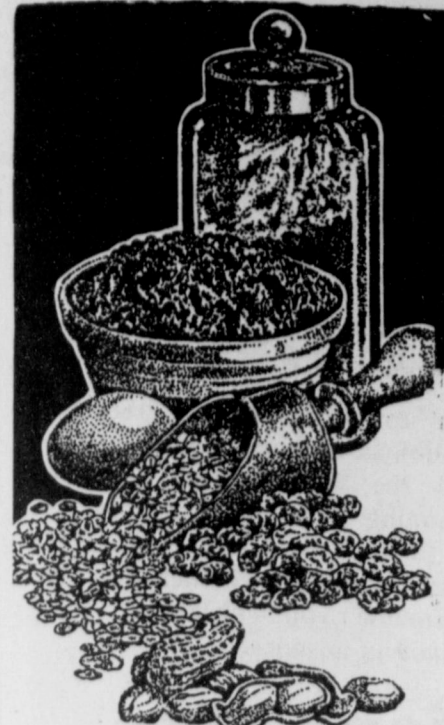

SWEDISH MEAT BALLS

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1/4 tsp. nutmeg
- 1 1/2 cup bread crumbs
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 egg
- 1 tsp. salt
- 3 Tbsp. chopped onion

Blend the above together and form into balls. Brown in butter, over low heat, until done.

Pour in:
1 can beef consommé
1/2 can water

Stir until blended and simmer five minutes. Remove meatballs from skillet.

Mix 1/2 cup flour and a little water to make a paste; add this to gravy. After gravy thickens, return meatballs to pan. This is good served with rice, noodles, or mashed potatoes.

- Potatoes
- Milk

Peel and slice potatoes; boil until tender. Drain off one-half to three-fourths of the water. Add milk to cover top of potatoes. Add lots of butter and Accent to taste. Salt and pepper to taste. Serve with grated cheese sprinkled over the top.

BARBECUED BRISKET

- Brisket
- 3/4 cup Watkin's barbecue sauce
- 1 can tomato paste

Mix barbecue sauce and tomato paste. Brush mixture thickly over brisket in pan and let set in refrigerator overnight. Cover with foil and bake in 250 degree oven 12-14 hours.

LASAGNA

- Lasagna noodles
- Ricotta cheese
- Ragu spaghetti sauce - home style
- 2 pkg. sliced Mozzarella cheese
- 1 lb. hamburger meat
- 1 egg

Prepare noodles according to instructions on package. Lightly grease an 8x11 pan. Brown hamburger meat, drain, and add spaghetti sauce. Beat Ricotta cheese together with 1 egg until smooth.

Cover bottom of pan with thin layer of meat sauce; add layer of noodles, Ricotta cheese sauce, Mozzarella cheese, and meat mixture. Repeat layer process, ending with meat sauce topping. Bake in 350

The Arthritis Foundation developed a seven-point listing of warning symptoms of arthritis. The first letters of each symptom, when combined, spell the word S-E-R-I-O-U-S.

- S- Swelling in one or more joints.
- E- Early morning stiffness without apparent cause.
- R- Recurring pain or tenderness in a joint.
- I- Inability to move a joint properly. Inability to bend or straighten the knee or elbow.
- O- Obvious redness and warmth in a joint.
- U- Unexplained weight loss, fever or weakness along with any of the above symptoms.
- S- Signs and symptoms like the above which last for over two weeks.

How about a challenge for the 1990s? Something we can sink our teeth into. Something that would make our community an even better place in which to live.

FINNELL SAYS-

School financing change is hurdle

Rep. Charles Finnell sees public school financing as the next major hurdle facing the Texas legislature.

Gov. Clements has already announced he will call a third special session of the legislature in March. The first two dealt with workers' compensation reform.

"Your legislature is under a Texas Supreme Court imposed deadline to replace the current school financing system," Finnell said. "We have to entirely restructure our state funding system by May 1, 1990, according to court order."

"I call on the governor not to wait until March to begin," Finnell said.

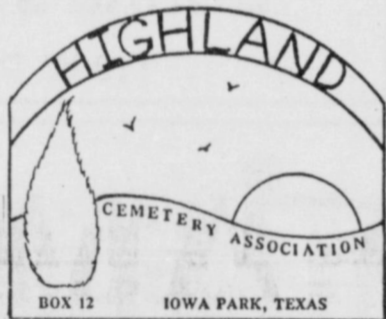
The Supreme Court ruling resulted from a lawsuit filed by Edgewood I.S.D. in San Antonio against the state and Commissioner of Education W. N. Kirby.

Last fall, the court ruled 9-0 that the state's present funding system is unfair to students in property-poor school districts and violated the state constitution.

Finnell commented, "The sessions on workers' compensation reform were very bitter and divisive. However, I believe restructuring the method of funding our public schools in view of the court order will prove to be even more complex, pressing and emotional."

"I look forward to representing the citizens of our 31 northwest Texas I.S.D.s on the public school issue. However, I need, want and seek input from constituents with ideas, comments and suggestions concerning the most important resource we have in this state: our Texas school children."

"Funding public education is the first responsibility of state government. And I insist that the state fund entirely any new programs it mandates on our local school districts," Finnell said.

Virgil Woodfin said he measured .25 of an inch from the light shower that fell at his home.

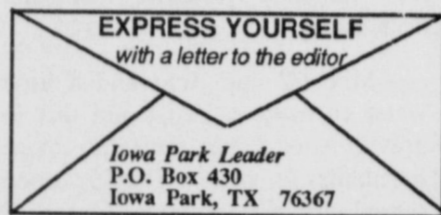

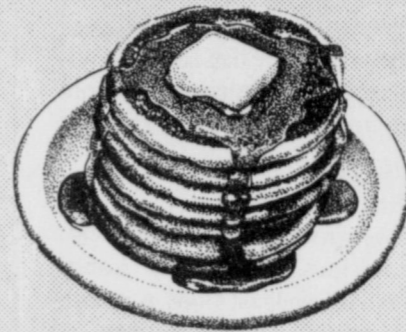

Payday laws are changed

"Some changes are about to take place with the state's payday laws and business men and women need to be aware of them," Mary Scott Nabers, commissioner at the Texas Employment Commission, warns.

The 71st Texas Legislature amended the Texas Payday Law during the regular 1989 session and transferred enforcement responsibility to the Texas Employment Commission beginning in January of 1990.

The new law requires the Commission to collect wages owed to workers who have not been paid.

The new law also authorizes the Commission to levy administrative penalties against employers who in bad faith fail to pay wages or who fail to pay them when due.

The penalty may not exceed the amount of wages in question or \$1,000. The old Payday Law had no wage collection provisions and provided for a flat penalty of \$50 against employers who failed to pay wages owed.

- Notices must be posted prominently in the workplace designating official paydays. Employers may pick up notices from the Texas Employment Commission offices throughout the state after Jan. 1.
- An employer may not withhold or divert any part of an employee's wages unless the employer: (a) is authorized to do so by a court of competent jurisdiction; (b) is authorized to do so by state or federal law; or (c) has written authorization from the employee to deduct a part of the wages for a lawful purpose.
- Employers should pay particular attention to item (c) because it has broad implications, including but not limited to deductions for loans or advances of wages to employees, group

insurance, employee uniform rental, etc.

4. The new law does not allow wage claims to be filed for vacation pay, sick leave pay, parental leave pay, or severance pay unless it is owed to an employee under a written agreement with the employer or under a written policy of the employer.

"Employers who wish to secure a summary of the new Payday Law may get one from any TEC office after Jan. 1, 1990, the effective day of the new law," Nabers said.

The No. 21 F.D. Morgan is scheduled for spudding in the Wichita Regular Field, six miles south of Iowa Park. It will be an 800-ft. test, located in the M. Ramsey Survey A-471, 275 feet from the east line and 450 feet from the south line.

Operating out of Midland, ATAPCO Inc., has plugged and abandoned two unsuccessful developmental wells in the Wichita Regular Field, about four miles west of Burkburnett. The wells were known as the No. 96 and No. 97 W. Reilly "A." Both bottomed dry at 1,750 feet.

A shallow developmental bid is planned in the Wichita Regular Field, eight miles southeast of Burkburnett. It will be known as the No. 1 Stephen Ramming "D," with J.L.B. Enterprises of Wichita Falls as the operator. Carrying permit for 475 feet of hole, it is in the Henry Hastie Survey 1,420 feet from the east line and 1,200 feet from the north line.

Three new producers have been brought on line in the Wichita Regular Field by Landrum West Inc., about three miles northeast of Kamay.

All three made about 16 barrels of oil per day plus salt water ranging from 50 to 120 barrels per day.

The wells are designated as the No. 1 and No. 5 Munger "C" and the No. 30 Bailey "L." Production will be from 1,223 to 1,573 feet into the wellbore.

Pumping 60 barrels of oil per day on an open choke, the No. 2 Munger "A" has been completed in the Wichita Regular Field by Singleton Production of Iowa Park, about one-half mile south of Kamay.

The well will produce from perforations 1,569 to 1,582 feet into the wellbore.

Water production totaled 15 barrels per day.

First production data have been posted for the No. 2 Munger "E" in the Wichita Regular Field, about 1,500 feet northwest of the Kamay

townsite.

It pumped 16 barrels of oil along with about 150 barrels of salt water per day on open choke.

Production will be from 1,740 to 1,742 feet into the hole.

Singleton Production will be the operator.

Flowing 125 barrels of crude per day, the No. 1 castleberry has been brought on line in the North King Field, Wilbarger County, nine miles south of Vernon.

EJB Oil of Wichita Falls is the operator.

The production interval is at 1,670 to 1,678 feet into the wellbore.

Carrying permit for 2,000 feet of hole making, the No. 11 Waggoner "RSG" is scheduled for spudding in the Wilbarger Regular Field, 6.5 miles south of Vernon. Location is in the H&TCRR Survey Section 99 Block 14 2,780 feet from the west line and 493 feet from the south line.

Jeral W. Jackson of Wichita Falls will be the operator.

The No. 169 Frances Sumner is scheduled for a re-entry operation in the Wilbarger Regular Field, three miles northwest of Electra. A completion depth of 3,000 feet is planned by the operator, Mobil Producing of Midland. Location is in the H&TC Survey 995 feet from the south line and 625 feet from the east line.

Two 2,000-ft. developmental wells are planned by 4-B of Iowa Park at drillsites eight miles south of Electra, Wichita County. The locations are in a lease in the BS&F RR Co. Survey A-394, 1,584 feet from the north line and 1,860 feet from the east line; and 1,760 feet from the north line and 2,160 feet from the east line. wells' designations are the Nos. 121 and 122 Waggoner Brothers. They are in the Wichita County Regular Field.

Ronkaran Oil Co. of Wichita Falls has revealed plans to drill two 1,875-ft. developmental wells in the

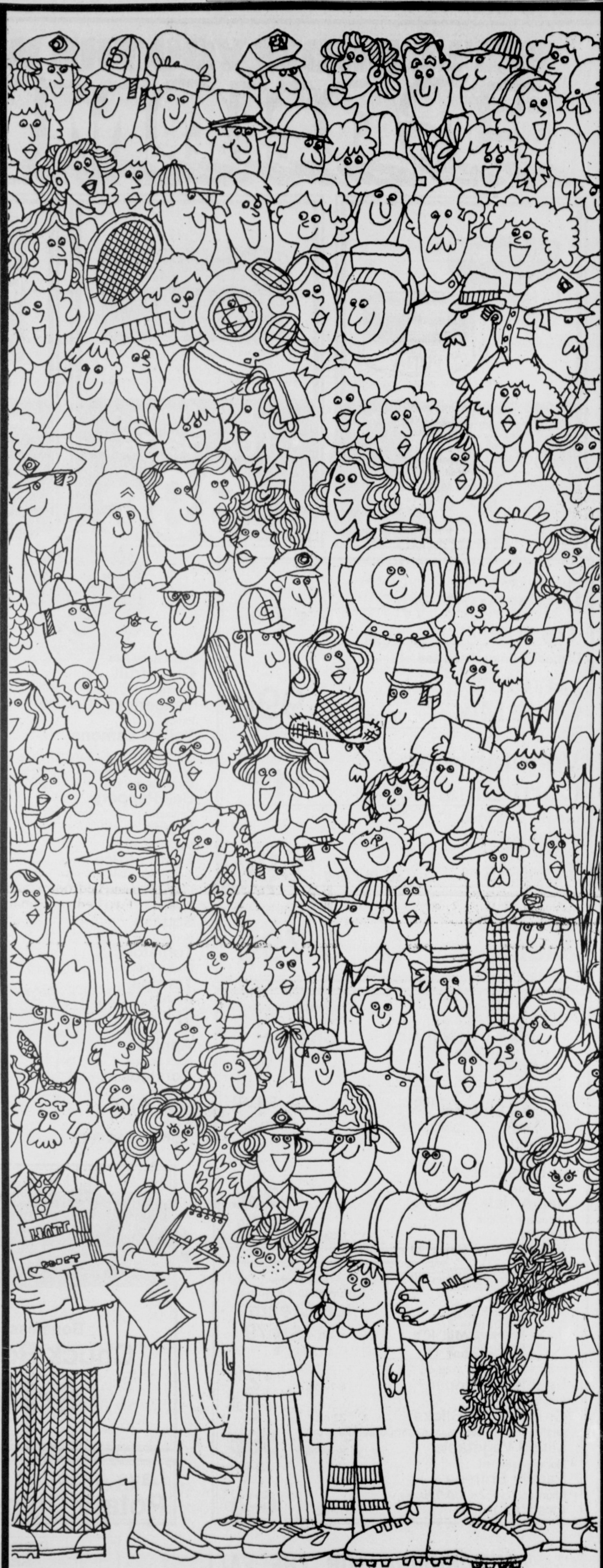
Wichita County Regular Field, three miles north of Holliday. The operator has a lease with drillsite 1,500 feet from the east line and 2,100 feet from the north line; and 1,076 feet from the east line and 1,500 feet from the north line of the Denton CSL Survey A-57. The ventures are designated as the Nos. 10 and 11 Perkins & Cullum.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 7 L.K. Holman, a 1,900-ft. developmental well in the Wichita County Regular Field. The operation will be located two miles south of Burkburnett in a lease in the Reuben Homsby Survey A-97. Location is 300 feet from the north line and 1,368 feet from the west line of the survey. The operator is F.T. Felty Operating Co. of Burkburnett.

The No. 1 Schmoker Lambert Tabor Unit, an 8,350-ft. wildcat well, is scheduled to be drilled in Hardeman County. Kadane Oil Co. of Wichita Falls is the operator. The well will be spudded in a lease four miles southwest of Chillicothe in the H&TC RR Co. Survey A-1058. Location is 1,478 feet from the south line and 668 feet from the west line of the survey.

Trio Operating Co. Inc. of Wichita Falls has filed for permit to drill the No. 3 Parker, a 6,200-ft. wildcat well 4.7 miles north-northeast of Quanah. Location is in a lease in Hardeman County's W&NW RR Co. Survey A-779; 2,208 feet from the north line and 467 feet from the west line.

F.T. Felty Operating Co. of Burkburnett has filed for permit to drill the No. 1A L.K. Holman, a 550-ft. developmental well two miles south of Burkburnett. Location is in a lease in Wichita County's Reuben Hornsby Survey A-97. Location is 160 feet from the north line and 1,511 feet from the west line of the survey. The well is in the Wichita County Regular Field.



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
