New RAC building plans approved by city council

The city council gave architect Don Daugherty the green light to draw specific plans for construction of a new Recreational Activities Center building.

During Monday's council meeting, aldermen not only approved a layout of the building, but its location in the planned development of the city-owned block between Third and Fourth streets.

Council members several weeks earlier had decided to build a new structure, rather than expending the funds necessary to bring the present RAC up to building codes, at an estimated cost of some \$25,000.

A long-range plan for the block, which is approximately 400 by 600 feet, includes a park area with various facilities such as volleyball courts, picnic areas, walk path, tennis courts, swimming pool and parking to accommodate approximately 100 vehicles.

Aldermen explain the complete development will take several years,

as money is made available.

Another plan which received tentative approval is to tear down the two-story garage at the Burnett Memorial Library.

The deteriorating structure is near collapsing, and the cost to save it is considered prohibitive. It presently is serving as a storage area for the city's Christmas street decorations.

The distinctive roof tiles would be used to make repairs on the main building.

A plan for the building's razing, with a facility to handle the electrical service it now contains, is to be ready for the next council meeting.

Aldermen approved requests to advertise for proposals for a new lawn mowing contract and for construction of drying beds at the water treatment plant.

No action was taken on bids to purchase a pneumatic roller machine and accepting the completed water tower on Emerald, for further study on both issues.

Also, the council took no action on designating which streets would be rebuilt this summer, while a study of traffic on Ruby is prepared. Studies on several other streets had been made, but Ruby was not among them.

Mike Price, public works director, told the council his department will attempt to replace all old street signs over the coming months, and also erect signs at intersections not now marked.

He said workers plan to make the signs themselves.

The council decided to take no action on installing a sewer line from US 287 to Lake Iowa Park dam, for future service to a restroom that is planned at the lake. The line would also service the trap club area.

Cost of installation was estimated at \$35,000.

Two aldermen, Diane Robnett and Bud Mercer, were absent during the meeting.

Two homes hit in two days

Iowa Park firemen are concerned over the number of house fires that have occurred during the past seven months in the city, especially when two of them take place in a two-day period.

Fire almost completely destroyed the home of Marty Forman, at 713 Manes, Friday night before firemen could bring it under control.

Then, Saturday afternoon, the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Bowerman, 1615 Karen, was heavily damaged.

In both cases, as well as the three other residential fires that have occurred inside the city since July, no one was at home when the blazes were reported.

The Forman home fire was reported at 7:46 p.m., and when firemen arrived, a roaring fire had already spread from the garage, where it apparently ignited, into the two-story structure, and neighbors were watering down their homes to prevent its spreading even further.

The Bowerman fire report was received at 3:23 p.m. Chief Danny Skinner said when trucks arrived, the flames appeared to have spread from a stack of firewood that was behind the garage.

Damage was primarily restricted to the garage, though some flames did enter the attic of the house before brought under control.

The rent house at Diamond and Yosemite, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Mark Wicks, was totally destroyed July 10. It was unoccupied at the time.

On Oct. 31, the home of Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Kenyon, 300 S. Victoria, was heavily damaged by a roaring blaze that apparently started in the kitchen. The couple had left shortly earlier to eat at a restaurant.

Then, when Mr. and Mrs. Frank Burns also left to eat dinner in Wichita Falls on Sept. 16, their home at 1018 was seriously damaged by flames.

That fire appeared to have ignited in the garage or adjoining utility room.

Chamber banquet speaker was outstanding as coach

Tickets for the annual Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce banquet, to be held Saturday, Jan. 20 at the high school cafeteria, went on sale this week, according to Kenneth Via, president.

Available at \$8 per person, the tickets are available from Tommy Key, State National Bank, Settle Drug, Parkway Furniture, or the Chamber of Commerce office.

Highlight of each year's banquet is the recognition of outstanding citizens in the community.

Taking advantage of a western decorating theme, this year's meal, to be catered by the Iowa Park Mule-Skinners, will be brisket with all the trimmings.

Jerry Larned, known professionally as "The Old Coach," will be the speaker for the evening. His talks are described as humor, inspiration, motivation and fun.

Larned's nickname obviously comes from his former profession. During his 18 years in coaching, he led programs in all high school classifications, as well as in college. His football teams compiled a record of 125 wins, 54 losses and eight ties.

He left the coaching field to serve as superintendent of schools in Monahans, but now is in private business.

A resident of Midland, he is president and partner for a chain of lubrication centers in central and west Texas, and also is head of Kent Distributors, a chain of convenience stores and a wholesale gasoline distributor.

Larned has served as president of

the Rotary Club and Chamber of Commerce, and also as chairman of a county appraisal district.

He was chosen the Outstanding Citizen of the Year in Monahans.

The speaker is not unacquainted with this area, having been raised at Haskell. He earned his degrees from North Texas State Univ. and Sul Ross State Univ.

Larned earned numerous honors

while in the coaching field. He was named West Texas Coach of the Year in 1967, '73, '74 and '76; South Plains Coach of the Year 1974; Director of Texas High School Coaches Association 1973-75; installed in the Texas Panhandle Football Hall of Fame 1982, and presented the Distinguished Service Award in 1987 from the Texas High School Coaches Association.

Student's speech earns scholarship

Iowa Park High School student Paul Schlaud earned a college scholarship with his winning speech on "Why I am proud of America."

The competition is sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Formal presentation of his prize was made at the high school this week by Pat Thomas, commander of the VFW post in Wichita Falls, and George Owens, post chaplain.

While Schlaud has not yet chosen the institution he will attend, he was told the scholarship fund would be placed in escrow, awaiting his call for payment.

Schlaud's speech was:

Why I am proud of America. In a time of cynicism it sometimes seems that a better question would be "Is anyone proud of America?"

The answer is yes. The fact is that Americans, no matter how apathetic or lethargic, love their freedom. They hold their freedom as dear as life itself. To us today freedom is a necessary part of life. Most of us have never known life without it. Our freedom is so certain that we forget the great sacrifice that our fore fathers made for us. We forget that there was a time when freedom was only a hope-filled dream. Yet it was an alluring dream. So alluring that thirteen colonies decided it was better to face death in order to establish freedom for their posterity, than to submit to the tyranny of Britain. Those colonists knew that there was a better life. They knew that it was their inherent right to live a life of freedom. Thomas Jefferson was speak-

ing the heart of every American when he wrote "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal. That they are endowed by their creator with certain unalienable rights." Those words inspired not only a young nation but an entire world.

Those words of Jefferson ring as true today as they did when initially uttered. It was upon such thoughts and dreams that our nation was built. It has been through living those dreams that our nation still endures. The country that was brought forth by such notions has become a symbol to the world. A government for the people, by the people has inspired people world wide to claim their basic human rights. We con-

School may move buildings

Eventhough most of the new classrooms to be built here, financed by the recent bond issue, are to be at the junior high campus, trustees will consider moving two temporary buildings to that campus.

At their meeting Tuesday, which is to begin at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building, members of the school board will be asked to consider approving a proposal to move two of the structures to the junior high.

Purpose of the structures at that location will be for special education

function living center training.

Trustees also will consider a health insurance plan for employees, and act on the district's published annual performance report, according to the meeting agenda.

An executive session is listed on the agenda, during which trustees will consider extension of Supt. Glen Mitchell's contract.

Reports also will be made for the board on taxes, transportation, cafeteria, athletic finance, and the architect's progress on the building program.

EQUADORIAN CEVICHE

- 1 Tbsp. cilantro
- 1 Tbsp. catsup
- 1 lb. shelled cooked shrimp
- 1 small red onion, sliced thinly
- 1/2 green bell pepper, sliced thin
- 1 tomato, sliced thin
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. black pepper
- 2 large lemons
- 1 1/2 cups water

Squeeze lemons over thinly sliced vegetables and add salt and pepper. Allow to set 10 minutes, stirring once or twice. Place shrimp in separate bowl. Add catsup, water and cilantro to vegetable mixture. Let set about 30 minutes. Serve with crackers or popcorn. The Equadorians always used popcorn.

BISLIK DE CARNE

- 1 lb. tip roast
- Cumin (for taste)
- Garlic powder (for taste)
- 1 lg. onion, sliced thin
- 1 lg. bell pepper, sliced thin
- 1 lg. ripe tomato, sliced thin
- 1/3 cup oil
- Dash salt and pepper
- 2 Tbsp. catsup

Cut roast across grain in 1/4-inch slices. Season with garlic, cumin, salt and pepper. Let stand covered 2 hours in refrigerator.

In large skillet, heat oil and add meat, cooking a few seconds on each side. Add onions, pepper and tomatoes. Cover and cook 20 minutes or until meat is tender. Add catsup and blend well. Remove from heat and serve on steamed rice.

MARITA'S AMISH SUGAR COOKIES

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 1 cup oleo
- 1 cup cooking oil
- 2 eggs
- 4 1/2 cups flour
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. cream tartar
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Combine first four ingredients. Beat well. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well. Beat this mixture very well. Add remaining ingredients and mix well. Make one-inch balls and place on ungreased cookie sheet. Press with fork and sprinkle with sugar. Bake at 375° 10 to 12 minutes.

TINA'S CABBAGE STEW

- 1 medium cabbage
 - 1 1/2 lb. hamburger
 - 1 lg. can tomato juice
 - 1 can Ro-Tel tomatoes
 - 1 lg. onion
 - 1 Tbsp. seasoned salt

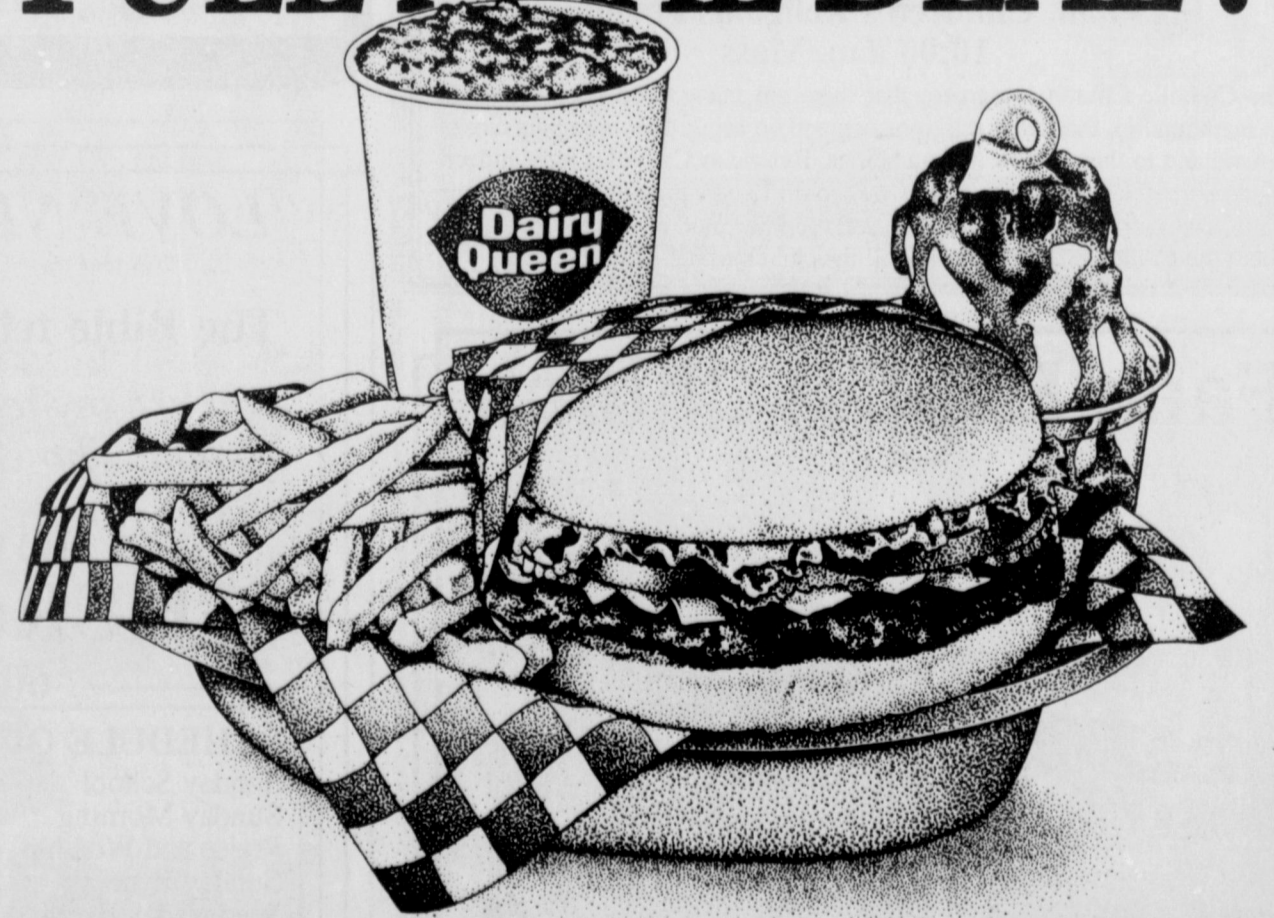
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Funds given to firemen

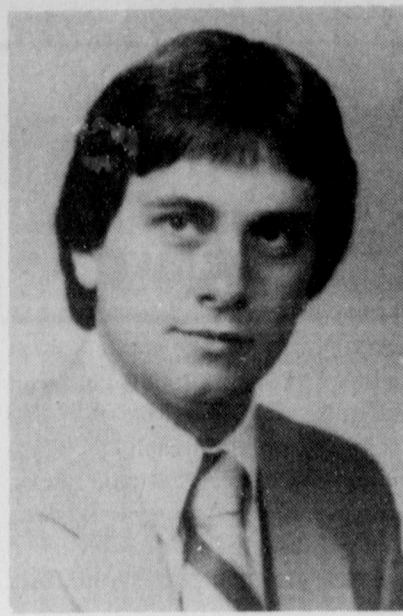

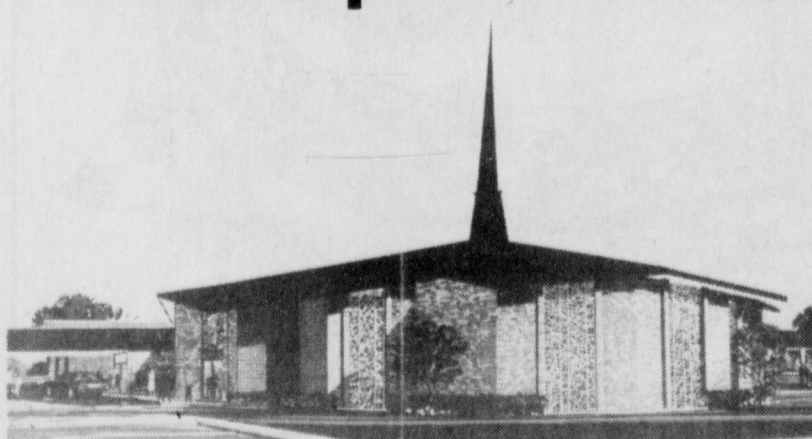
