New RAC building plans approved by city council

The city council gave architect Don Daugherity the green light to draw specific plans for construction of a new Recreational Activities Center building.

During Monday's council meeting, aldermen not only approved a layout of the building, but its location in the planned development of the city-owned block between Third and Fourth streets.

Council members several weeks earlier had decided to build a new structure, rather than expending the funds necessary to bring the present RAC up to building codes, at an estimated cost of some \$25,000.

A long-range plan for the block, which is approximately 400 by 600 feet, includes a park area with various facilities such as volleyball courts, picnic areas, walk path, tennis courts, swimming pool and parking to accomodate approximately 100 vehicles.

Aldermen explain the complete development will take several years,

as money is made available.

Another plan which received tentative approval is to tear down the two-story garage at the Burnett Memorial Library.

The deteriorating structure is near collapsing, and the cost to save it is considered prohibitive. It presently is serving as a storage area for the city's Christmas street decorations.

The distinctive roof tiles would be used to make repairs on the main

A plan for the building's razing, with a facility to handle the electrical service it now contains, is to be ready for the next council meeting.

Aldermen approved requests to advertise for proposals for a new lawn mowing contract and for construction of drying beds at the water treatment plant.

No action was taken on bids to purchase a pneumatic roller machine and accepting the completed water tower on Emerald, for further study on both issues.

Also, the council took no action on designating which streets would be rebuilt this summer, while a study of traffic on Ruby is prepared. Studies on several other streets had been made, but Ruby was not among

Mike Price, public works director, told the council his department will attempt to replace all old street signs over the coming months, and also erect signs at intersections not now marked.

He said workers plan to make the signs themselves.

The council decided to take no action on installing a sewer line from US 287 to Lake Iowa Park dam, for future service to a restroom that is planned at the lake. The line would also service the trap club area.

Cost of installation was estimated at \$35,000.

Two aldermen, Diane Robnett and Bud Mercer, were absent during the meeting.

Two homes hit in two days

Iowa Park firemen are concerned over the number of house fires that have occurred during the past seven months in the city, especially when two of them take place in a two-day

Fire almost completely destroyed the home of Marty Forman, at 713 Manes, Friday night before firemen could bring it under control.

Then, Saturday afternoon, the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Bowerman, 1615 Karen, was heavily

In both cases, as well as the three other residential fires that have occurred inside the city since July, no one was at home when the blazes were reported.

The Forman home fire was reported at 7:46 p.m., and when firemen arrived, a roaring fire had already spread from the garage, where it apparently ignited, into the two-story structure, and neighbors were watering down their homes to prevent its spreading even further.

The Bowerman fire report was received at 3:23 p.m. Chief Danny Skinner said when trucks arrived, the flames appeared to have spread from a stack of firewood that was behind the

Damage was primarily restricted to the garage, though some flames did enter the attic of the house before brought under control.

The rent house at Diamond and Yosemite, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Mark Wicks, was totally destroyed July 10. It was unoccupied at the

Formal presentation of his prize was made at the high school this week by Pat Thomas, commander of the VFW post in Wichita Falls, and George Owens, post chaplain.

While Schlaud has not yet chosen the institution he will attend, he was told the scholarship fund would be placed in escrow, awaiting his call for payment.

Schlaud's speech was:

Why I am proud of America. In a time of cynicism it sometimes seems that a better question would be "Is anyone proud of America?"

The answer is yes. The fact is that Americans, no matter how apathetic or lethargic, love their freedom. They hold their freedom as dear as life itself. To us today freedom is a necessary part of life. Most of us have never known life without it. Our freedom is so certain that we forget the great sacrifice that our fore fathers made for us. We forget that there was a time when freedom was only a hope-filled dream. Yet it was an alluring dream. So alluring that thirteen colonies decided it was better to face death in order to establish freedom for their posterity, than to submit to the tyranny of Brittian. Those colonists knew that there was a better life. They knew that it was their inherent right to live a life of freedom. Thomas Jefferson was speaking the heart of every American when he wrote "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal. That they are endowed by their creator with certain unalienable rights." Those words inspired not only a young nation but an entire

Those words of Jefferson ring as true today as they did when initially uttered. It was upon such thoughts and dreams that our nation was built. It has been through living those dreams that our nation still endures. The country that was brought forth by such notions has become a symbol to the world. A government for the people, by the people has inspired people world wide to claim their basic human rights. We continue to do so even today as the long oppressed peoples of eastern Europe topple the Iron Curtain that has denied them their freedom.

People of all races, people of all nations, peoples of all colors and creed have come and sought refuge in America. The melting pot is not a dream but is one of the greatest realities about us. It is the mixture of cultures and peoples that make America unique. It is only through that mixture that we find our American

It is that freedom which has inspired generation after generation to do their part to preserve it. Whenever our freedom is threatened, we stand

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

















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As I See It...



"True reform of Texas' school finance system will require a large infusion of new tax dollars to ensure that all school children benefit from the changes," Kent McGuire, a consultant to the Governor's Task Force on Public Education, is quoted as having said this week.

He, in effect, is disagreeing with Gov. Bill Clements, that "efficient" distribution of funds is needed, not more money.

I also disagree with the governor, and have, even before he was elected this last time.

The money that is necessary is that money the legislature failed to provide when it passed House Bill

Yeah, you've heard me say it before. And I still say it. And, eventhough I dislike the guy with a passion, I'll quote Justice Oscar Mauzy to make my point.

Mauzy, in his brief on the court's decision in the Edgewood vs. Kirby case, said "...the Foundation School Program does not cover even the cost of meeting the state-mandated minimum requirements."

can be. The legislature mandated programs without funding. Period.

Now there's a few who are hoping the voters continue to have short memories. A couple in point are former governor Mark White, who is running for the same office again, and one of his opponents, our present attorney general Jim Maddox.

White was the major arm-twister when HB 72 was passed. Now he wants another shot, having failed to completely break the state.

Maddox, you will recall, was in his present office when HB 72 was passed. One of the major jobs of that office is to determine wheather a bill is constitutional or not. He's supposed to give an opinion.

Well, despite all this time in office, Maddox hasn't seen what the supreme court has found, that the present school financing system is unconstitutional.

"Most importantly," Mauzy said in his brief, "There are no Foundation School Program allotments for school facilities or for debt service. The basic allotment and the transportation allotment under-state actual

costs, and the career ladder salary supplement for teachers is underfunded. For these reasons, and more, almost all school districts spend additional local funds."

The court has given the legislature until May 1 to come up with a reformed program that will meet the approval of the justices. This may be a task no one is capable of doing.

Their mandate from the court is to meet the mandate of the constitution, which is to "...make 'suitable' provision for an 'efficient' system for the 'essential' purpose of a 'general diffusion of knowledge'."

Mauzy admits suitable, efficient and essential are not precise terms, but warns that if the reform measure doesn't suit the justices, "...it is our duty to say so."

The court has given the legislators a key which must be met in its actions in the special session that is coming up in a few weeks.

"Districts must have substantially equal access to similar revenues per pupil at similar levels of tax effort," Mauzy wrote.

It appears the legislators must turn a deaf ear to White, Maddox and everyone else, when they start in that special session, and keep the court's comments on a big blackboard where it is constantly in view.

Otherwise, our education system next fall could well be run by a judge. And after desegregation and prison issues, we don't need that.

While on the subject of education, I'd like to comment about the infamous dropout rate and test scores

There's a remedy that's obvious to me. Maybe the judges will make it a mandate, if they get control of our school system.

My formula for a student's success in school is, 30 minutes per day per child with parents and children together in a room without tape player, television, telephone or anything else except the student's school work.



Palmer earned his reputation with 67 tackles, many of them touchdown-savers from his safety position. He also was credited with nine interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, and two fumbles.

He had four interceptions alone against Abilene Wylie, three in the Graham game, two against Bowie and one against state finalist Vernon. The two fumble recoveries were against Graham and Decatur.

Two other Dist. 5-AAA players were also listed on the All-State team. Vernon runningback Derrick Richardson was second team offense and, and the Lions' outstanding linebacker, Bryan Nava, was third team defense.

The Hawks competed against two more players this season who were selected by the sports writers. Gainesville's Chris Lewis was listed as punter on the first defensive team, and also with Palmer on the second platoon defensive secondary. The other was Breckenridge guard Rex Bussell, a second-team offensive unit selection.



ARE YOU A "BORN AGAIN"

CHRISTIAN? Most people speak of "born again Christian" as someone who has had some kind of sudden and mystical experience by which he knows he is saved. That idea is just not found in the Bible. The truth is when one does what the Lord says, he is born again. Notice the parallel readings "except one be born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God" and "he that believes and is baptized shall be saved" (John 3:5; Mark 16:16). It is by the Spirit that the word of God was delivered to man (1 Cor. 2:11-13) and it is by that word that faith is produced (Rom. 10:17). When we hear and accept the gospel, we are "begotten by the word of truth" (James 1:18) for "whosoever believes

that Jesus is the Christ is begotten (f God" (1 John 5:1). The place of water in the new birth is clearly defined. Baptism is water is "for the forgiveness of sins" (Acts 2:38) and was an essential part of the coversion of the Samaritans (Acts 8:12), the Ethopian eunuch (Acts 8:36-38), Cornelius (Acts 10:47,48), the Philippian jailor (Acts 16: 31-34), Saul of Tarsus (Acts 9:4-6; 22:16). The apostle Paul wrote of being born again in Romans 6:3,4. Romans 6:4 results from the "new birth" (John 3:5). When one is led by the Spirit (by the word of God) to believe in Jesus as the Christ, is then baptized into Christ, that person is "born again of water and the Spirit" (John 3:5).

The apostle Paul writes of the importance of the promise to Abraham, and our blessings that result from it (Gen. 22:18; Gal. 3:16). Nicodemus considered himself a child of Abraham, and thus a child of promise. Paul explains how this new birth makes one a child of God

If a person has been born again, he is a Christian. Conversely, if one is a Christian, it is because he has been born again. One cannot be a Christian in any other way. What of the "born again Christian"? The truth is there is no other kind. Friends, don't look for an experience that is "better felt that told". Tale esus at His word and do what He tells you. That is what it means to "walk by faith" and "live by faith" (2 Cor. 5:7; Romans 1:17; 5:1,2. When you obey Jesus, that will




