Mother, two children perish in house fire

The community of Iowa Park remains in shock following a housefire Monday that took the life of a woman and two of her children.

Firemen were called to the scene at 701 S. Victoria at 9:21 a.m.

The first truck was unable to respond immediately, being held up at the railroad crossing by a trainload of coal passing through the city.

However, fireman Mark Wicks was the first official at the scene, going there directly from his home on South Wall, and immediately began doing what he could with a garden

And before the first truck arrived, a relative of the family, Juanetta Allene Stone, drove to the smoking home and alerted those there that "there are children in the house."

Fire trucks arrived immediately after, and the mother and children were found soon afterward.

They were Mary Sue Copeland,

20, Jacob Matthew Copeland, two, and nine-month-old Burton Russell Copeland.

The fire was contained in a small bathroom in the northeast corner of the woodframed house. The bedroom in which the three bodies were found was in the southeast corner, and there was no door separating the two

The father, Floyd Matthew Copeland, later explained he had left the home at 4:30 that morning, in order to reach his job at Sears in Wichita Falls by 5. He said all three were still in bed asleep when he departed.

Firemen, with the assistance of Donald Wayne O'Brian, who lives at 610 S. Victoria, entered the house by knocking out a window in the bed-

There, they found young Jacob lying atop his mother, and then discovered the baby under his crib.

Authorities determined the fire was started by piles of clothing that

were near a small gas heater in the bathroom.

Matthew and his brothers had been working several months on the house, installing siding and storm windows and other improvements.

The siding and windows had made the structure extremely "tight," and inspectors believe the clothes had been smoldering for some time before enough smoke escaped the house to be detected. By that time the heat inside the structure had become exremely intense.

The heat, not flames, had seared the walls of the bedroom from the ceiling to within two feet of the

None of the bodies had been burned. Rather, the victims apparently died of asphyxiation and smoke inhalation.

The bodies were taken to Wichita General Hospital and later transferred to Dutton-Tanner-Aulds Funer-

al Home, where funeral services are to be held at 3 p.m. Friday.

There was a third Copeland child who was not at home when the disaster struck. Jennifer, six, had spent the night with relatives. She is enrolled in elementary school here.

The Copeland couple actually were never married, but had been living together the past three years in Midland.

Matthew Copeland confirmed the two had planned to obtain a marriage license Tuesday and be married

Mrs. Stone asked that she be quoted as saying she felt "The firemen and everyone who helped did as best they could to save the family members and the house.'

The family had no insurance. A fund has been established at State National Bank to assist the survivors. Donations can be made to the Floyd Matthew Copeland Account 1106341, or the Copeland Fire Fund.

Several individuals and firms have volunteered clothing for the burial, digging of the graves, and other means of support.

This was the first fire fatality inside the city limits in almost two years.

Council selects street

Iowa Park's city council Monday night ranked North Colorado, from West Highway to Alameda, as the highest priority street to undertake rebuilding this summer.

Traffic surveys were made on 13 streets, and although Colorado was not the highest traffic count street, it was chosen because of its proximity to the city's only shopping center, Park West, as well as its deteriorating condition.

From West Highway to Park Street, Colorado's asphalt paving has deteriorated to only one lane of traffic, it was pointed out.

Some aldermen expressed concern that owners of the business property in the first two blocks of the street, north of West Highway, might not complete the surfacing on their property, which is the main reason for the surface deterioration.

However, when aldermen voted on the motion, there were no dissenting votes.

For the past several years, the council has undertaken rebuilding streets, replacing the asphalt surfaces with concrete. The projects are paid for by sales taxes, which aldermen have dedicated to that purpose.

After delaying a decision a week concerning purchase of a pneumatic roller machine, aldermen accepted the recommendation of Mike Price, head of the public works department, to choose a new machine, rather than one that had been used.

The city had received proposals for both new and used machines at the last council meeting, but opted to delay a decision until Price had inspected the used machines.

The bid submitted by Associated Supply Co. of Lubbock on a Ferguson-made roller for \$28,791 received council approval.

After hearing a request from Stewart Lutz, in behalf of Chaparral Baptist Assembly, for trash pickup service, council members suggested

he contact Bell Processing. They explained the firm already is in the business of serving the rural area, and suggested it was being done at a price much less than the city would have to charge.

Following the discussion, council members voted to deny the request.

Mrs. Sam Hunter, a former member of the club and a member of the North Texas Bird and Wildlife club affiliated with the National Society which includes the Americas, West Indies and Canada, gave a report of the 90th annual Christmas bird count in the local area which took place Dec. 1.

She said in spite of the bitter cold weather, the counters here saw 36 white fronted geese, 350 Canadian geese, numerous ducks and one unusual bird, a LeConte's sparrow and reported their spotting to the national office.

Mrs. Don Stribling gave the first of two topics under "Save the World By Enjoying It" as she discussed "Preserving Wildlife." She said there were 10 refuges in the United States devoted to preserving wildlife.

Among those she mentioned were the Lower Rio Grande Valley Refuge, which has been able to increase the whooping crane population from 16 in 1941 to 200 now because of conservation efforts. She then told how many birds had been lost at Aransas Pass since 1950 because of dredging in their habitat.

Mrs. Stribling discussed poaching in Yellowstone National Park which cannot be stopped because of lack of manpower. The golden eagle and gyrfalcon and many others are being killed by illegal methods. She also mentioned how the black bears in the Smoky Mountains are the victims of poaching. She con-tinued by reminding her listeners that astounding numbers of birds and ducks are illegally killed each year, and that others are dying in the swamplands because of runoff from chemicals in the water.

Mrs. John Clapp gave the second topic of "Save the World by Enjoying It" as she discussed "Vanishing Songirds." She said 13 songbirds have become extinct, or almost extinct, including the wood thrush, fly catcher and warbler because of deliberate killing. DDT sprayed on Dutch elms to kill the beetles have also killed many of the robins.

Mrs. Clapp told how the songbird population had decreased in the Tropical Rain Forest in South America because so many trees had been cut down and they had no place to winter. She emphasized how the devastating chemicals that people and industries are using are endanger-ing the songbirds and suggested a possible solution of "letting the birds control the insects."

During the business directed by Mrs. Soell, Mrs. Sam Hill gave the Texas trivia that is a part of each program during the current year and chose to give bits of information about Ross Perot of Texas, one of the ten richest men in the United States.

Mrs. Howard Marlar gave the federation counselor's report by telling that the General Federation of Women's Clubs will launch its centennial celebration with a coast-tocoast videotele conference.


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

one topic listed on the agenda, that of acting on an ordinance authorizing the city's tax collector to accept partial tax payments on current taxes.

Administrator James Barrington contacted Allen Shewmake to confirm a suggestion that state legislation had been passed permitting the early partial collections, and action on an ordinance was not necessary.

Barrington told aldermen partial tax collections on current taxes would not begin until the 1990-92 taxing year, however.

Also, action on an ordinance "approving rate schedules and service regulations for Texas Utilities Electric Company upon approval by the Public Utility Commission" was passed until the council's next meeting.

The council approved a proposal to continue paying annual corporate dues to the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce, which is \$120 annually.

James Cox sent us a note the other day with information from some magazine that indicates that cows are worse than cars for greenhouse gas.

"Next," the article said, "the Environmental Protection Agency will be calling for on-board vapor canisters for livestock."

The article pointed out that the EPA's newly released report on global warming cites cows and rice paddies as the worst producers of methane gas, a prime cause of the "greenhouse effect."

Cattle gases account for about 15 percent of total methane emissions, twice as much as either coal mining or oil and gas production, according to the EPA report.

The Agency recommends that cows be fed differently to help clean up the air.

I don't know what kind of cows produce milk of magnesia, but a little bit of that stuff added to their feed might cut back on emissions.

James said he's been trying to think of a way to pick up a little pocket change, and he was wondering if I thought a person could get some financial backing to manufacture vapor cannisters and recovery hoses for cattle.

I would think that Olney Savings might be interested in financing a project like that. It would certainly beat some of the things they've loaned money for in the past.

I personally would like to see the EPA do a little more research before they start meddling too much with the cow business.

If they're really serious about trying to do something about air pollution in this country, they could start by putting scrubbers on both ends of

Iowa Park received more than an inch of welcomed rainfall last week. Virgil Woodfin had reported .36 of an inch Tuesday, and added another .73 of an inch Thursday, which was welcomed by area wheat farmers.

In your life and mine, it may be that we are not solving some things because we are making them more complicated than they are. Scurvy is a terrible disease, yet it is solved by the simple addition of a a little vitamin C to the diet. Think

AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Bridwell Oil of Wichita Falls has staked location for the No. 27 First National Co. "A" in the Wichita Regular Field, about two miles northeast of Kamay. The well is under permit for 2,100 feet of hole making and is in the KWVFL Survey A-246. It is 950 feet from the south line and 1,065 feet from the west line of Block 28.

Extec Inc. of Dallas has staked location for a quartet of 1,900-ft. developmental wells in Wichita County's Regular Field, about nine miles southeast of Wichita Falls.

The wells are known as the Nos. 1, 2 and 3 Thom-Extec. All are in the W.H. Spiller Survey A-257. The No. 1 is 5,235 feet from the south line and 2,000 feet from the east line of the survey. The No. 2 is 6,355 feet from the south line and 2,750 feet from the east line of the survey. The No. 3 is 6,355 feet from the south line and 2,750 feet from the east line of the survey.

Pumping eight barrels of oil per day, the No. 22 Heiserman has been completed in the Wichita Regular Field by Krot Oil of Burkburnett. The well is located about 12 miles northeast of Electra.

It will produce from a set of perforations at 1,665 to 1,676 feet into the wellbore.

A wildcat drilling venture is planned by Trio Operating of Wichita Falls in Wilbarger County, 1.8 miles south of Farmers Valley. The well will be known as the No. 1 Kempf-Boone-HBJV Univ, with total depth projected to 8,400 feet. It is in the H&TCRR Survey A-427.



F.T. Johnson Jr. of Wichita Falls has plugged and abandoned a depleted oiler in the Wilbarger Regular Field, seven miles southwest of Harrold. Designated as the No. 23 Waggoner "DT," it was bottomed at a depth of 1,175 feet in the H&TCRR Survey.

Wildcat drilling action is planned in Foard County by Gunn Oil Co. of Wichita Falls. The well will be known as the No. 1 Burnett-Triangle "G" and is under permit for maximum drilling depth of 8,500 feet. The location is about 18 miles northwest of Crowell.

Jimmy Pautsky of Holliday has plugged and abandoned a depleted oil well in the Foard Regular Field, one mile northeast of Thalia. The well was known as the No. 1 John Matus and was drilled to a dry bottom at 1,900 feet.

Trio Operating Co. Inc. has filed for permit to drill the No. 4 Parker, A 6,200-ft. wildcat well 4.7 miles north-northeast of Quanah. Location is in a lease 4,670 feet from the west line and 467 feet from the north line of the W&NW RR Co. Survey.


