The first truck was unable to respond immediately, being held up at coal passing through the city. However, fireman Mark Wis was the first official at the scene, going there directly from his home on South Wall, and immediately began doing

And before the first truck arrived, a relative of the family, Juanetta Allene Stone, drove to the smoking home and alerted those there that "there are children in the house."

The fire was contained in a small bathroom in the northeast corner of he woodframed house.
