since its last meeting, the city council Monday night will face an agenda ladened with nine topics, including calling an election for three of its members.

And there could be more topics. Administrator James Barrington said Wednesday that the list was still ten-

Three members of the council, including mayor Tim Hunter and aldermen Bud Mercer and Bud Burch, will have terms expiring this spring.

The election will be held May 5. Also on the agenda are three public appearances, two ordinances, two resolutions, action on two different bid proposals, appointment of four members to the planning and zoning commission, and a proposal to simplify permits for contractors.

TU Electric manager Harold Smith has requested time to address his company's rate increase request, which is now before the state Public Utilities Commission.

One of the ordinances listed on the agenda concerns council action following Smith's appearance.

Mike Avey, of Entex Fabrications which is located near Bradford Elementary, is to request water and sewer service for his plant, which is not inside the city limits.

The third public appearance will be by Denny McCarthy, who is to seek the city's assistance in repairing fencing of land he has leased from the city at Lake Buffalo.

The second ordinance on the agenda, if approved, would abandon a 20-foot strip of right of way on the west side of the 400 block of North Victoria.

Action is to be taken on two different bid proposals, including one to construct drying beds at the water treatment plant and the other for lawn maintenance, a three-year contract.

A resolution will be considered which would seek a juvenile officer grant funding from the Criminal Justice Department.

The other resolution, postponed from a previous meeting, would accept the work of relocating the overhead water tower on Emerald St. and make final payment to the

Four persons are to be appointed to the planning and zoning commission. Two of the three-year-term seats are to expire, and two members are resigning.

Aldermen will consider a proposal that the public works department be authorized to issue books of permits, upon purchase, to plumber and electrical contractors. Permits would be filled out upon use.

police he was shot by a man during the course of an armed robbery Sunday morning in his office.

Smith was taken to Wichita General Hospital for treatment of a gunshot wound in his upper left shoulder, and reportedly was to have been released from care sometime Wednesday afternoon.

The police dispatcher was notified by telephone of the incident at 10:46 a.m., according to the police Building permits

Local, county and DPS officers converged at the location and immediate launched an area search for the suspect Smith had described as a white male in his mid 30s, about five feet, 10 inches tall, long, curly blond hair, thin mustache and wearing a blue denim jacket.

Smith told police the suspect had talked with him Saturday about renting an apartment, and was there that morning to look at one.

But, the manager said, the man then pulled a silver .38 caliber revolver and demanded his money.

Smith told police he was sitting at his desk in the office at the time, and after he had handed over his billfold, he had waved his hand toward the gun and attempted to stand.

That was when the suspect shot him, he said.

The bullet passed cleanly through Smith's shoulder and struck the wall behind where he said he had been sitting.

Emergency medical volunteers said they had to cut away a down vest Smith was wearing in order to treat the wound. He was later taken to the hospital by ambulance.

After Smith was taken away, police continued their investigation.

They later found a pistol, that was similar to the one the wounded man had described, in a robe hanging in a closet just outside the office, Sheffield said.

While no official estimate of the amount of cash the alleged robber had taken was disclosed by police, early reports indicated Smith had said he had about \$200 in his billfold.

Smith told police he had called a friend in the apartments after being shot, and the friend had notified police by dialing a 9-1-1 emergency telephone number.



Possible charges of criminal mischief may be filed against a trio of young men in Electra for damaging an Iowa Park student's car Tuesday night.

Jimmy Duggins, who had played in a basketball game at Iowa Park High School earlier in the evening, went to the police station at 9:50 to report the damage.

He said he had seen an individual walk to his car and kick the door, doing considerable damage.

Though he did not give police the suspects' names, they matched

the description officers noted earlier when they stopped a car at Wall and Diamond.

In the vehicle were suspects identified as George Stephen Owen, 19, Larry Hernandez, 18, and a 16-yearold juvenile.

All three were ticketed for possession of alcoholic beverages found in the car. Owen, it was learned through a

computer check, also was wanted on an outstanding warrant from the Wichita County Sheriff's Office for public intoxication, capius profine.


Owen paid his fine and the three were released. No formal charges have been filed against any of the three on the criminal mischief case.

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

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As I See It...

Dolores and I attended the annual mid-winter meeting of the Texas Press Association in Dallas last weekend, and I found it enjoyable, informative, and painfully disappointing.

It was enjoyable, as I've mentioned in this space other times, to get to meet with my newspaper friends from all points of the state. The programs, equipment displays and hotel accomodations were outstanding.

The informative portion had to do with two programs. One was when six of the major gubernatorial candidates submitted themselves to answer questions from publishers. The other was a speech by the head of the Texas Education Agency.

The politicians included Republicans Clayton Williams, Tom Luce and Jack Rains, along with Democrats Jim Mattox, Mark White and Rev. Otwell.

I was especially interested in their responses to my question which concerned a bill that never got to the floor of the last regular session.

I asked their reasons if they could not support legislation which would prohibit further mandates by the legislature without state funding.

Only one said he would not sup-

port it. To no one's surprise, it was Mattox, who explained the state would have no recourse should a school district not be functioning properly, or something like that.

Rains and Williams both took the mike and said they would be glad to support such legislation.

The other three, including White, who was the major armtwister in the 1983 passage of House Bill 72 that local school districts are still paying for, never said a word.

Of the six candidates, and to my surprise, I found myself being more impressed with the responses to other questions by Rains than any of the

The panel was made even more interesting because of its makeup. If you don't remember Rev. Otwell's name, he's the preacher who operated a foster home for children and was forced to close because he refused to license it, as required by state law of all such homes.

And it was Mattox and White who were in power at the time.

Worth Quoting

A few days ago we were asked to do an article on the changes that affected community newspapers during the past decade.

And like most industries, especially in Texas, the changes have been both dramatic and drastic operation wise, internally but even moreso

Nearly all community newspapers in Texas have now converted to some type of computerized typesetting with the final product coming off in a stream from a big offset press. And the economies are such that it permitted most newspapers to withstand the onslaught of the external changes in retailing nationwide.

At the beginning of the eighties, newspapers had their traditional competitors for the advertising dollar from radio, television, yellow pages, coupon promoters, and gimmick pushers.

And at the beginning of the decade, most retailers in smaller towns found that their competitor for the retail dollar was the larger discount store in a nearby larger city.

But no longer.

Now, the community newspaper is faced with the same problem as the local retailer. Now, the retailer and the newspaper find that their biggest competitor is the United States Postal Service.

With the advent of the bulk discount rate for third class mail, the postman is a bigger competitor for both the newspaper and the retailer than the big discount house in the neighboring larger cities.

How many catalogs arrived at your mail box at home or business during the final three months of 1989? How many preprints cluttered your mail during the final weeks of the year?

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has stated that the largest untapped source of sales tax funds left for the state treasury are the sales made from out-of-state catalogs.

And the reason the mails have become increasingly cluttered with catalogues, preprints, coupon offers, magazine pitches, bonus prize awards, and dozens of other gimmicks, is the special rate given by the post office department to big, mass, third class mailers.

All of them directly affect local retailers and thus, local newspapers. And it's going to get worse be-

fore it gets any better.

Now, the supposedly independent postal authority has proposed that it be permitted to make individual contracts with 20 or 30 of the top mailers in the country for special treatment, cheap postal rates, and volume discounts.

If the proposal goes through, the biggest mailers in the country would be able to mail at special rates, first, second, third, and fourth class rates that are cheaper than the rates afforded

everyone else.

And a second proposal, if passed, would allow the Postal Service to delay a lot of first class mail plus some second class mail, by at least one day. Estimates are that 15 to 30 percent of all first class mail would be

And the Postal Service wants the authority to have different delivery standards for areas adjacent to "local" areas served by an SCF. That means that upon the discretion of the regional postal management, Midland could have much better non-local postal service than either Odessa or

And for cities trying to diversify and bring in additional industry, the status of the "non-local" postal delivery service could give one city an edge over another.

We always throught that with the purchase of a first class stamp for an envelope, Uncle Sam was guaranteeing equal treatment and equal delivery speed for every citizen. If the new proposals go through, a first class stamp only means that the mail should get there -- eventually.

Allowing the Postal Service to make a deal with the country's largest mailers for special rates, volume discounts, and special treatment makes second class citizens, mailwise, of the rest of us.

Postal Service, like justice, should be available on equal terms to every citizen, not just the big, fat cats of the nation.





IT'S NOT GREEK TO ME!

Some would tell you that baptism in Acts 2:38 is not "for" remission of sins, but "because of" the remission of sins. Therefore they state that salvation comes before baptism rather than after. The theory, that decieves many, is a fruit of wrong reasoning based

on a small Greek preposition "eis", which sometimes means "because of" and other times means "for".

Is baptism "because of" the remission of sins? No, not all all. Open your Bible and see for yourself why not. Please compare three Scriptures and match carefully three identically repeated sentences: Acts 2:38 "repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins"; Mark 1:4 "John did baptize in the wilderness, and preach the baptism of repentance for the remission of sins"; Matthew 26:28 "for this is my blood of the new testament which is shed for many for the remission of sins". In all three sentences, the preposition is "eis" and introduces a sentence of purpose, and not one of cause. For what reason did all Judea and Jerusalem go to John's baptism? Why was Jesus going to shed His blood? The answer is not "because of", but rather "for the purpose of". Remember, you either have a sentence of purpose or result! Be honest, let the Bible speak. Tell me now, when Jesus instituted His supper, did he say that he was going to the cross to shed His blood "because of" the remission of sins, or "for" the remission of sins? Be honest again. If Jesus shed His blood "because of" the remission of sins, then lost humans already had

remission of sins before the shedding of His blood! My friends, think straight, be honest, read your Bible. The translators were correct when they translated the Greek preposition "eis" in Acts 2:38 to mean "for" or "unto" the remission of sins.

Medical assistance large chunk of county welfare expenditures

The state spent a total of \$24,044,087 last year for major welfare programs in Wichita County. according to Ray Dunavant, regional administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

"Medical assistance had the biggest impact, with \$12,493,577 spent for aged and disabled residents of the county and \$3,580,487 for families and children in the county," he said.

Food stamps worth \$6,052,252 were issued for the fiscal year which ended Aug. 31, while Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) totaled \$1,917,780. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of applicants and issues the food stamps.

The state and federal govern-

ments share in the cost of AFDC to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the absence or disability of one or both

In addition to services and assistance to low-income residents of the county, the department extended protective services to 469 abused and neglected children and their parents or caretakers. These services, furnished without regard to family income, were designed to reduce or eliminate danger to children.


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Breckenridge replaces Decatur in UIL realignment of district

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
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

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

Daily production also included 15 barrels of salt water.

With Singleton Production of Iowa Park as the operator, the well will produce from perforations at 1,572 to 1,578 feet into the wellbore.

Operating out of Bosque Farms, N.M., Rocky Mountain Resources nas posted first production figures for the No. 1 Collins in the Wichita Regular Field.

The well showed ability to pump 81 barrels of oil per day along with 14 barrels of waste water on an open choke.

Location is six miles southwest of Burkburnett. Production will be from perforations at 1,580 to 1,585 feet into the wellbore.

Showing ability to make 16 barrels of oil per day plus four barrels of water, the No. 1 L.K. Holman has

been brought on line in the Wichita Regular Field by F.T. Felty Operating Co. of Burkburnett. Location is about one-quarter mile south of Burkburnett.

Hale-McDonald Joint Venture is listed as the operator.

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
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
