## Traded pistol for his Bible

After six years in law enforce ment in Dallas County and city Michael D. Grubbs "came to grips" with himself and the idea that $h$ wanted to go into the ministry.

Christian Church (Disciples of Christian Church (Disciples of
Christ) from Lufkin where he had served two years as associate minister.

He made his decision to enter the ministry while recovering from an off-duty accident. He was working on his grandmother's house when he with the Dallas Police Department for six weeks.

Though switching from a "first
career" choice, Grubbs is redirecting

 environment and focusing on helpin people find true happiness in life. Just after graduation from a Dallas high school, Grubbs starte Dallas County Sheriffts office. From his job as a dispatcher he moved int patrol and investigation. He began his stint with the Dallas Police Department on patrol duty, later going into the special assignments division.One of his most exciting and his most embarrassing times on the police force was his second day out on the streets. Though not a novice, he was the "new patrolman on the block." The excitement was provided
by being involved in a "shoot-out" by being involved in a "shoot-out"
and his embarrassment came about when he was run over while attempting to arrest a drunken driver, he related with a chagrined expres sion.

Rev. Grubbs really misses his work in law enforcement. "It exciting, challenging work," he remarked, "but so is being minister, only in a different way.
ou certainly can't play favorites. It doesn't matter what the gender, race or age, if a woman or a 13 -year old
has a gun pointing at you, you have to treat the situation the same." Rev, Grubbs says what it amounts to in the final analysis is that you treat people as nice as they allow you to in any given situation.
He believes the primary motivation behind the current crime
rate is drugs. "It's a rate is drugs. "It's a whole different
world out there on the streets now, world out there on the streets now,
compared to a few years ago. You don't find professional burglars anymore -- they won't hurt you. The burglars' hype now is to steal so they will be able to buy more drugs. A person on drugs is very dangerousthey'll kill you," he said.

The young law enforcement officer-turned-minister is a crusader
against the use of illegal drugs. "It is against the use of illegal drugs. "It is
not really uncommon to see a person not really uncommon to see a person
smoking marijuana today. People talk about the nation's war on drugs. We are trying, but in my opinion there is no war. Oh, there are skirmishes here and there, but no allout war, and until we can stop the market for drugs in the United States we can't expect other countries top sending drugs to the market. Continuing, Grubbs said, "We to those around us who have a drug problem. Often if we know someone
who has that or another problem, we are unwilling to become involved, unbelieveable!"

He does some hunting, but Rev. Grubbs says he probably hasn't picked up a pistol in two years. "But still hold my own. Although he was on active duty only 45 days in the Air Force, he went through training and on Jan. in the Air Force Reserve which he currently serves as chaplain.

The third generation Texan has attended church since the age of six and has maintained an interest in tudying the Bible through the years. He received an Associate Degree from
