City will ask Corps for floodway study

Iowa Park will ask the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to conduct a "feasibility study" in the northeast part of town in an effort go provide relief to residents of that area.

The decision was reached Monday night at the city council meeting, after hearing from a number of residents living in that area.

Once completed, the study is intended to provide a guideline on work which will relieve present and potential flooding in the low lying areas in that part of the city.

After being designated as a floodway and floodplain by the Corps, the city was provided by the government an ordinance for adoption.

The ordinance, which has been the source of problem for residents in the designated area, prohibits any improvements to homes and land which can cause flooding problems to their neighbors, unless a prohibitivelyexpensive engineering study is first completed and approved.

However, without the adoption of the ordinance, homeowners living outside the floodplain would not be eligible for flood insurance.

The council several years ago adopted the ordinance.

Mayor Tim Hunter explained the public hearing to receive input from residents in the affected area was necessary before the city could make its appeal for the Corps' study.

While some residents of the area said they felt the cleaning out of the

shallow creek area, and under the bridge on Victoria, might be sufficient, all appeared to agree that the study should be made.

Responding to a timetable in which the study might be completed, Mayor Hunter said, "It could be 18 months, but likely nothing (corrective work) would be done in four

In requesting the study, the city is committed to paying 50 percent of the study's cost.

However, the work which could follow the study could be cost-prohibitive, the landowners were told. The total cost of the project could possibly cost as much as \$5-million.

The council voted to authorize Administrator James Barrington to advertise for a number of bids, including materials for a boat ramp project at Lake Buffalo, materials for a water line extension on East Cash, bids to construct a new Recreational Activities Center, and laying of a sewer line from US 287 to Lake Iowa Park.

Also authorized was a proposal to request a parks improvement grant and a proposal to hold an auction to sell surplus city-owned items.

The Lake Buffalo project will be partially funded by a state grant. It is to include improvement of a boat ramp on the west side of the lake, a vehicle parking area, and improvements to the road from Burnett Road.


As a result of several months of study, the council decided to advertise for bids to build a new RAC on the city-owned land between Third and Fourth streets, known as "Block 31."

The park is an area adjoining the recently-paved parking and boat ramp on the east end of the dam. While it will not be developed with landscaping, playground equipment and a pavillion are the major improve-



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

Garden Club has program on lawn maintenance educate homeowners on ways to

Mark Terning from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Chris Powell from C&L Service Center presented a program on lawn care for members of the Iowa Park Garden Club, Friday, in the TU Reddy Room. They were introduced by Mrs. Don Decker.

Their program, entitled "Don't Bag It," included a slide presentation by Terning. It was designed to

reduce or eliminate the amount grass clippings being disposed of in our nation's overloaded landfills.

It was pointed out that grass clippings alone take up 20 to 30 percent of the landfills in our nation. By mowing frequently, removing no more than one third of the leaf surface at any one time, and by using a proper watering and fertilizing plan, grass clippings will never need bagging again.

A proper fertilizing plan would require the use of a fertilizer that has at least one half of its nitrogen in a slow release or slowly soluable form, and applying the fertilizer at the appropriate time of the year.

A proper watering plan would call for the lawn to receive about one inch of water every five or six days during the driest periods of summer.

Following the slide presentation, Chris Powell showed the group a Toro Recycler lawnmower. He explained how it finely cuts grass

clippings, giving the result of a clean lawn which looks as though it has been mowed with a bagging mower.





After allowing the host Bulldogs a run in the first inning at Burkburnett Monday, the Hawks racked up four scores in the next three frames for a 4-1 lead.


But the 'Dogs scored three in the fifth to tie the score, and two more in the bottom of the sixth for the win.

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
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Booster Club donates \$6,800

Third-place points were earned by Patrick Birk, 2:08.52 in the 800meter run, and Stephen Brown, 15.85 in the high hurdles.



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

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


