Iowa Park will ask the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to conduct a "feasibility study" in the northeast part of town in an effort go

The decision was reached Monday night at the city council meeting, after hearing from a number of resi-

Once completed, the study is in-
tended to provide a guideline on work which will relieve present and potential flooding in the low lying areas in that part of the city.
After being designated as a floodway and floodplain by the Corps, the city was provided by the government an ordinance for adoption
The ordinance, which has been
he source of problem for residents in the designated area, prohibits any improvements to homes and land which can cause flooding problems to their neighbors, unless a prohibitivelyexpensive engineering study is first completed and approved.
However, without the adoption
