## Mrs. Tanner Listed As First Pioneer Day Queen Nominee

The name of Mrs. Mae Tanner of Iowa Park was the first nomination received for Pioneer Queen of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair, who will preside over Pioneer Day festivities Tuesday, Oct. 3.

Mrs. Tanner, a spry full of life person for her 73 years, arrived in Iowa Park with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. George Akers, on Nov. 30, 1890, from Cooper county, Mo., and has never had a desire to leave.

She is still active in helping manage J. A. Tanner and Son Hardware and Furniture store, which was purchased in 1908 by her and her husband, the late Jesse Tanner.

Mae-Mae, as she is commonly known here, has been a licensed funeral director since 1935. She has been active in community service work and is a charter member of the Order of Eastern Star chapter No. 42. She has served the Pioneer Day celebration in some capacity since its beginning many years ago, before it was a part of the T-O Fair activities.

To be eligible for this honor the nominee must have lived within a 100-mile radius of Iowa Park for at least 40 years.

Oral Jones of Wichita Falls, as chairman of the Pioneer Day committee, is urging that nominations be sent in as quickly as possible, that they may be turned to the special committee in charge of selection. Nominations should be accompanied by the reason for nomination and a picture if possible, and mailed to the T-O Fair office, Box 412, Iowa Park.

Col. J. O. Dotson, manager of North Texas Motor company of Wichita Falls, contributed the first \$25 toward special awards to be presented the queen.

Funeral services for S. T. Odell McKenzie, 40, were conducted at the First Baptist church of Jacksboro, Tuesday afternoon, August 29, Rev. L. H. Hood, pastor of the Pleasant Valley Baptist church, officiated, with assistance from Rev. A. R. Biebery, pastor of the Jacksboro church.

Mr. McKenzie died at Long Beach, Calif., August 25. He was visiting his mother at Long Beach when he became fatally sick.

Mr. McKenzie was a resident of Iowa Park for several years. At the time of his death he was living on the Birk farm south of town. He was a member of the Pleasant Valley church.

The deceased was born in Van Zandt county on August 5, 1910. He was married to Miss Ruby Bilbarry on Oct. 6, 1930.

## Iowa Park Lake Named by Smiths — 'Lake Iowa Park'

The Chamber of Commerce, the City Commissioners and the Board of Directors of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3, have labored, contested, judged and decreed that henceforth all water running into the new lake shall be known as Lake Iowa Park. Officially chosen, the name will be officially bestowed in ceremonies in the near future, when the construction is complete and the dam is accepted from contractors.

This will and should be a gala day in south central Wichita county. Perhaps the band will play, a few civic VIP's will probably make short speeches, the Lions will roar, the Scouts might even put on uniforms. The Camp Fire girls and their leaders could be persuaded to hike out to the damsite in their bus. Oh, we can think of a million reasons for celebration when the great day arrives when Lake Iowa Park will have its chance to be a lake.

To get back to the lake naming deal, there were 56 entries in the contest conducted for the C of C by Chauncey Weller and his public relations committee. ## Francis Lee Mitchell Killed in Korea

Word has been received by relatives here of the death of Pvt. Francis Lee Mitchell, 20, in action in Korea on Aug. 18.

Francis Lee, son of J. C. Mitchell of Iowa Park, was on an ammunition truck bound for the front lines when he was killed. He was in the 35th infantry regiment of the 25th Division and was among the first to enter Korea after the war broke out.

He enlisted with the army in 1947 and had been in Japan two years. He was to have been discharged Sept. 6.

Young Mitchell was born May 29, 1930, in Burkburnett. He attended Burk and Valley View schools.

Besides his father, he is survived by his mother of Kamay, three sisters, Mrs. Zaylia Ann Snow of Nocona and Ruth and Esther Mitchell of Kamay; one brother James Cleo Jr. of Kamay; his grandparents Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Mitchell of Iowa Park and Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Tyra of Arapaho, Okla.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

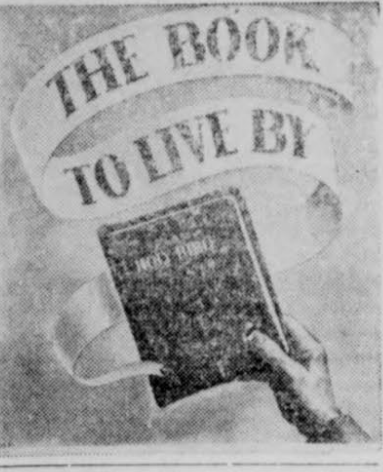

Expert Suggests Early Planning for Winter By Poultry Raisers

Poultrymen should be doing the jobs now that will mean more fall and winter egg production and getting the laying houses ready should be high on the list, says J. C. Williams of A and M.

He recommends that houses be cleaned and disinfected to remove all possibility of disease or parasites. The buildings may need repairing and some of the hinges on doors, windows or shutters may need to be replaced or adjusted. He points out that clean windows let in more sunlight, a source of vitamin D for the layers.

For each five birds, he advises providing one nest and at least three inches of feeder space per hen. Watering facilities should provide each 100 hens from five to eight gallons of water a day, and each hen needs at least eight inches of roosting space.

Williams recommends that litter be from four to six inches deep in order to keep down moisture in the house. Wood shavings, sand, ground corncocks, shucks, cane pulp, straw or other litter can be used.

Williams says he prefers to keep laying hens confined at all times. His reason is that, since plenty of space is being provided in the house for every bird to be comfortable during extremely bad weather and plenty of feed, water, roosting space and adequate ventilation are being furnished, it is unnecessary to turn them out of a house when all conditions inside are favorable for maximum production.
