There are a few things all golfers should stop and think about before they start trying to get their game in shape for the warm months ahead.

There is no substitute for serious, thoughtful practice. Please note, I said serious thoughtful practice. Many golfers make the mistake of heading for the practice tee with no specific ideas about what they are going to do when they get there. Practice can do one of two things for you. It can either help to improve your game, or groove even worse the same old bad habits you may have had before.

When practicing you should

have had before.

When practicing you should think out each and every shot and take the same amount of care as you would a shot during a round of golf. You should always have a specific target selected to work on the accuracy of all shots. Remember distance isn't the name of the game. The object is to get the ball in the hole, and the straight way is always the easiest.

1. When practicing with the
driver, give yourself about a
15-yard wide target to hit to.
Anything smaller than an area
of this size makes for a pretty
tough target with the driver
for even the most accomplished
of golfers. Also remember that
the ball should merely be swept
off of the tee with the driver,
eatching it slightly on the upswing. Many golfers make the
mistake of teeing the ball too
low and taking turf with this
shot. This can cost distance as
well as accuracy.

2. The fairway woods are not as difficult to hit as they seem. Do not be afraid to hit slightly down on the ball with these clubs. The ball should be slightly gown on the ball and stay down over the sbot.

3. The long irons. I would say that 75 percent of the people who play golf make the same mistake on the long irons. They be to the turn of the people with the same smoothness and firmness as the middle or short irons. Here again do not be afraid to hit slightly down on the ball and taking turf with the long irons, A good firm grip I feel is essential also for these clubs, because the clubhead has a tendency to turn in your hand on these longer shots.

4. The medium irons many players make the mistake of trying to hit the ball solidly with the medium irons and tend to get a little over-confident. Consequently, trying to overpower the ball. This applies to all shots: Stay with your natural limitations.

5. The short irons and pitching the part important element in the proper important element.

AUSTIN — Thwarted in one effort to keep down the size of the 1970-71 tax bill by school fund diversion. Gov. Preston Smith took a new approach. He called on Atty, Gen. 



Rat feeding demmonstrations are an effective teaching device in stimulating awareness of food in relation to growth and health. The demonstrations are designed to help boys and girls realize the need for a well chosen diet. It can be hard for boys and girls, and even adults, to recognize the real importance of food. They are told that certain foods are important but they cannot see the effects readily. A demonstration with young animals is one way to show that foods work together to promote healthy growth. The most observable difference between young rats fed constrasting diets is in the rate of growth. They will eat approximately the same foods that people do and respond to various diets in much the same way. They have a short life-span and grow so rapidly that various diets in much the same way.
