State school board member frustrated with legislature

State school board member Bill Hudson, speaking here Tuesday to the Iowa Park Lions Club, allowed his frustrations with the legislature

In fact, the Wichita Falls resident and retired veteran of more than 50 years in education, stated he didn't know how to sound a warning to all the million-plus people he represents about what could come out of the current special session concerning school finance.

His primary concern is the wording of Senate Bill 31, which has been passed, pointing out that more than half the material in the 34-page

document has nothing to do with the financing of education, but rather to dictate control of the duly-elected state board of education.

The Senate bill, after adoption, was sent to the House. And members of the House voted down their own bill, prompting Gov. Bill Clements to call for a second 30-day session to begin April 2.

Hudson's fear of the Senate bill surviving was born the following day, when a reporter for the Dallas Morning News wrote, "The Senate is expected to stay with the education bill it passed last week when the next session gets under way."

"I am only safe (as a state school

board member) while the legislature is not in session," Hudson stated.

"You voters have the intelligence to elect your legislators and governor, but right now the legislators have the opinion you do not have the intelligence to elect me," he said.

Part of his frustration is the fact that he, and the rest of the state board, were elected by the voters to set policy for the operation of public schools in Texas. But, based on the Senate bill, the defeated House bill, and House Bill 72 which was passed in 1983, legislators appear to believe it is their task to dictate the running of public schools.

Besides drawing the line on who is to direct policy of public schools, Hudson pointed out his responsibilty is dictated by more than anyone in the legislature.

He explained that his district includes 49 counties, 14 state representative districts, five senatorial districts, six congressional districts, eight of the 20 Educational Service Centers, and 1,100,000 people.

All of which is more than any member of the members of the Texas Senate and House.

"Any change in the powers of the school board to be taken away must be done so by a constitutional amendment," Hudson said.

He made the point to explain senate's first bill draft, which was defeated, required the appointment of the board chairman by the governor.

Another point of frustration is the fact that a concurrent resolution by the legislature has instructed the school board to draft a finance plan which would meet the state supreme court's demands.

The board has completed the plan, but it apparently is not being included in either the Senate bill or those considered by the House.

"I resent it when they tell me I'm not a quality educator. And like others, we taught every one of those legislators who were raised in this state," Hudson commented about the lack of confidence in the board by members of the legislature.

Another portion of SB 31 which makes Hudson's blood boil is a section that requires "oversight" of board actions. Any and everything the board might do, under the Senate's legislation, would, if adopted, mean the board had to answer to the Foundation School Fund Budget Committee, Legislative Educator Board, Bond Review Board, Leadership in Educational Administration Development, Legislative Budget Board, Academic Excellence Indicators Advisory Committee, and Educational Economic Policy Center.

Senate members proudly state that under their bill, the state's share in public education costs would rise from 42 percent to "not less than 50

Besides his frustration with the legislation that has thus far been brought out in Austin, Hudson has one other.

After referring to the size of his district (he traveled over 25,000 miles during his campaign), he asks "How in the world can I get the word out to all these people in time for them to let their legislators know how they feel about public education and how it should be run."

Trustees okay contracts, reassigns nine teachers

As in the case of administrators' contracts which were approved earlier, however, the board's motion included a phrase, "...with the salaries to be set when the budget is approved."

* Terry Davis - now junior high athletics and PE; changed to Kidwell PE currently taught by Daryl Frazier.

* Bob Gray - now junior high coach and assistant to principal; junior high coach, teach three PE classes

now being taught by Davis. * C.D. Knobloch - now junior high history and 7th grade sports; coach junior high athletics now being taught by himself and Davis, and continue to teach junior high history.

* Daryl Frazier - now Kidwell PE and high school coach; will teach two high school history classes taught by Len Williams, and teach high school health.

* Dennis Brooks - now CVAE vocational instructor; become vice principal at junior high.

Mike Bowling - now maintenance/energy coordinator; teach CVAE and continue with energy program.

Jimmie Cain - now high school coach and teacher; continue present assignment, except will assist Mrs. Smith with 7th grade girls until football season is over.

Ray Sefcik - now high school coach and teacher; continue present work, except will work with 8th grade off season sports 7th period after football season is over and until track starts.

LaRae Collins - now high school English/journalism teacher; become elementary counselor presently held by Pat Davis.

Aldermen pledge help with flooding problem

The city council Monday night promised a number of residents that an effort will be made to correct flooding conditions along Hawthorne near the intersection of East Garden.

In his appearance before the council, Eddie Richardson suggested the culverts at Garden and the alley were too small and created a backup of water.

Mike Price, public works director, told the council materials, not including labor and equipment, to replace the present horns would cost approximately \$1,400.

Alderman Bud Burch suggested one home flooded by the problem would cost considerably more than that amount, and others on the council agreed.

Because the cost was under the \$5,000 level, no vote was required for the project to be approved.

Though it was not mentioned during the discussion, council members had attempted to discourage any home building in that area earlier, because of potential flooding.

Two aldermen, Bud Mercer and Virgil Woodfin, were not present at Monday's meeting to express their opinions, but the concensus of the rest of the council was to have the work done.

Also approved was the cost of erecting a radio tower which has been given the city by Wichita Falls.

Aldermen were told contractor Bill Sargent would erect the 80 feet of tower and add an additional 70 feet to reach the desired 150 height for the radio antennas of the police and fire departments.

Cost of the project was reported to be \$4,557. The city has already paid Sargent \$4,957 to dismantel and store the tower.

Part of the total cost will be paid from \$6,000 the city is to receive from the city of Woodson, which has agreed to purchase the old water tower at city hall, on which all antennas are now located.

Earlier discussions have pointed out that cost of maintenance on the old tower, which has not been used since the Johnson Road tower was constructed, would be less than the erection of a smaller tower.

Also approved was a proposal to advertise for bids to rebuild part of North Colorado. Concrete will replace the present asphalt surface, but curbs and gutters will not be included





Boy, have things changed since I was in school back in Hereford!

I'd never have been able to get a job, pay for my clothes and various activities I wanted to do, if the U.S. Department of Labor had the same rules then they do now.

Our government, while trying its best to do what is right, I'm sure, is making it tougher for teenagers to get jobs these days.

Besides the minimum wages now in place, how in the world can businesses afford to hire school-age youngsters for part time jobs?

I must admit my ignorance of the DOL's regulations. But, apparently, there were several others in this state who shared that lack of information. The DOL recently issued more citations to Texas employers than all employers in the other 49 states, for alleged violations, according to Mary Scott Nabors of the Texas Employment Commission.

For you employers, I'll give you the basic guidelines, so you also will know them and not be cited. NONAGRICULTURAL JOBS:

(1) Youths 18 years or older may perform any job, whether hazardous or not, for unlimited hours;

(2) Youths 16 and 17 years old may perform any nonhazardous job,

for unlimited hours; (3) Youths 14 and 15 years old may work outside school hours in various nonmanufacturing, nonmining, nonhazardous jobs under the

following conditions: (a) no more than three hours on a school day,

(b) no more than 18 hours in a school week,

(c) no more than eight hours on a nonschool day,

(d) no more than 40 hours on a nonschool week,

(e) work may not begin before 7 a.m., nor end after 7 p.m., except from June 1 through Labor Day when evening hours are extended to 9

(f) 14 and 15 year olds who are enrolled in an approved Work Experience or Career Exploration Program (WECEP) may be employed for up to 23 hours in school weeks and three hours on school days (including during school hours.)

(4) Fourteen is the minimum age for most nonfarm work. At any age, however, youths may deliver newspapers, work for parents in their solely-owned nonfarm business (except in manufacturing or on hazardous jobs) or gather evergreens and make evergreen wreaths. Children of any age may perform in radio, tele-

The Center is located in the old Tanner Hardware Store building that now is owned by the Evening Lions Club. The Center pays the club \$1 a year rent and the utilities in exchange for the part of the building they

Anyone who is 60 years of age and over is welcome to join senior citizens at the Friendly Door, which is open five days a week. Meals are served at noon and no one is required to pay, however, donations are accepted. From 35 to 40 people congregate each day for meals and 20 to 25 Meals on Wheels are delivered by volunteers from churches, organizations and Camp Fire groups.

Specially scheduled activities include a performance by the Rhythm Band at the Center on the first and third Monday mornings of the month. In the afternoon on those days the Band goes to any of the nursing homes or other places their appearance is requested. Sue Gwinn is volunteer pianist.

The second Monday of each month is set aside for a birthday party for all members who have birthdays that month. A special table is arranged for the honorees and each member brings a covered dish. Kathy Hicks furnishes the birthday cake each month and Iowa Park Florist provides a potted plant. The birthday honorees draw for the plant following the luncheon.

On the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month a Bible study is held with a member of the Iowa Park Ministerial Alliance presenting the study at 10 a.m. The third Tuesday of each month at 11 a.m. Rev. Ed Prince, minister of the Iowa Park Church of God, conducts a

sing-song and serves as pianist. Wednesdays are disignated as grocery shopping day, when senior citizens are taken to shop by volunteers, Mrs. Robinson or her assistant, Cherry Wood. They also furnish transportation for the seniors to go to the bank, the pharmacy, post office or doctor's office.

On the first and third Wednesdays, Pat Kisner from Region IX Education Service Center brings films on "Remembering When."

Special services are provided for the group throughout the month. Modena Blair checks blood pressure from 9:30 a.m. until noon the second Thursday of each month. Each Thursday a volunteer, Chapman, trims fingernails and toenails for senior citizens at the Center. On the last Friday of each month a person from Park Home Health Services checks blood sugar levels from 10:30 a.m. until noon. Also each Friday at 1 p.m., transportation is provided for those who want to go bowling.

Programs are presented by various groups for the enjoyment of the seniors group. In the afternoon members play dominoes, 42, Canasta, work puzzles, crochet or quilt, and once a month they have Bingo games. And Mrs. Robinson or a volunteer picks up commodities for the seniors once a month.

The Friendly Door Senior Citizens Center began May 1, 1977, meeting in the First United Methodist Church building. After three years, they moved their meeting place to its present location. The members are picked up each day, Monday through Friday, at 9 a.m. and 11 a.m.

Mrs. Robinson has served as director since the Center's inception. She is paid for six hours work, but anytime a senior citizen needs anything, Mrs. Robinson takes care of that need.

A native of Loving in Young County, Myrna is the youngest of 10 children. Following graduation from Graham High School in 1949, she attended Draughan's Business College in Wichita Falls. She and Bill Robinson married when she worked for the City of Wichita Falls and he

CONSTRUCTION BIDS

Architect Don Daughterity told the board he had no idea why or reason for bids for additions to the two elementary campuses to be higher than expected.

The bids were opened earlier Thursday afternoon, and the lowest of five bids received was 47 percent higher than the \$669,000 budgets for the work.

Daugherity explained he had not had enough time to study each of the bids submitted, in an effort to determine where most of the increases in his projected costs were made.

He said all estimates he had made were based on \$45 per square foot, and still believed that to be a "good number."

The lowest bid, \$849,534, was submitted by Arthur/Moss Construction of Wichita Falls. The figure was the net after all alternates were deleted.

The other bids, after deletion of alternates, were \$867,999, \$868,797, \$876,013 and \$906,100.

The board has 30 days from when the bids were opened to take action.

Daugherity, Supt. Glen Mitchell and the two elementary principals will be studying the plans in an effort to determine where cuts can be made, and report back to the board.

The architect said he had no feel as to how the bids would be on the work to be done at the high school. Those bids are to be opened this afternoon.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business, the board voted to deny the "freeport" tax exemption, approved a number of proposals including a new pay scale for cafeteria employees, the sale of excess equipment, textbook committee recommendations, and a starting date for the 1990-91 school year.

By a split vote of 4-3, the board voted to not allow a tax exemption to industries within the district that manufacture goods for shipment outside the state. The product, if approved, would not be taxed.

Citing a lack of data which would inform the board how much money they were talking about, as well as not knowing what state funding could be expected from the special session of the state legislature, trustees Jerry Reed, John Sibley, Don Decker and Denny McCarthy voted against the exemption.

Keith Fisher, Wendell House and Sherri Kennedy said, before voting for the exemption, they wanted to show support to industries in the district and indicate an interest in more locating here.

Board chairman Reed pointed out the exemption could be enacted any time in the future, such as after the data is provided and more is known about what is to come out of Austin.

Once the exemption is approved, it cannot be started again, according to information provided the board.

Sam Laird, Cryovac manager, told the board his company is proud of Iowa Park schools and fully supports them. While recommending the exemption be passed in the future, he pointed out that a reduction in inventories is already a goal of the firm, but not because of the "freeport" tax.

Because of the new minimum wage bill enacted by congress, some employees of the cafeterias received an automatic 30-cent-per-hour salary increase.

on years service and responsibilities, has been observed for several years by the local district. The increase for the "non-skilled" workers would have affected the step program, had the board not approved an across-theboard similar increase.

But, for the year, all step increases were frozen, the board voted.

The new pay scale for regular employees of cafeterias now ranges from \$3.80 an hour to \$5.90. Parttime employees start at \$3.80 and step as high as \$4.90. Managers are paid \$5.15 starting to \$7.45.
