Ever since that group of Hispan ic legislators stormed out of the meet ing in Austin in protest against Sec retary of Education Lauro Cavazos, has bothered me that we Texans let them get away with the remarks they made. What upset these members of the legislature so much? Dr Cavazos, an educator of national rep utation, merely pointed out that will take more than money to improve education in Texas schools. He just pitch money at the problem and hope it will go away.

State Senator Carlos Truan heckled the secretary at a news conference but did not make Dr. Cavazos budge an inch from what he had said. The senator said Dr. Cavazos showed a
lack of commitment to education Commitment spelled $m-o-n-e-y$. Sen. Truan and his buddies hold a firm belief that lots of money buys lots of education. The group of Cavazos critics are pushing for an additional $\$ 1$-billion or so for Texas education in the hopes that it will produce better educated youngsters and happier There is no evidence whatsoever that this would take place.
Texas has spent a lot more on public education in the past decade and has seen the test scores of Texas children go downward. Texas increased per pupil expenditures 193.8 perlargest increase in the nation. Who can argue that Texas schools are now 193.8 percent better? The facts indicate otherwise.

Spending per pupil is not the ardstick some people seem to believe. The Darrouzett schools spend more than four times as much per
student as the Perryton schools spend. I would challenge anyone to show me that Darrouzett graduates get four times better education than Perryton graduates. It is not the spending of money that is the answer to our education problems. It inv ves a great many other things.

We who support the Perryton schools need not feel ashamed of our level of support. We pay school taxes and contribute to school program
and are proud of our schools, our and are proud of our schools, our
teachers and students and administrators. Right now I am not as proud of the Perryton schools as I once was. The disclosure of the state TEAMS test scores, not only for the ninth
grades, but the other grades test improving to do just to come up to the level of our neighbors. It is not that Perryton TEAMS test scores are lower than Canadian and Booker and Spearman and Dalhart. I think our
schools ought to be just as good, if schools ought to be just as good, if not better.
