TWO YEARS AGO -

Economist forcasted '90 unusual weather

The unusual weather thus far in 1990 was prophesied two years ago by a speaker in Wichita Falls.

Dr. James F. Smith, director and chief economist for the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas at Austin, was speaking on the topic of "Texas Economic Outlook" February 1988 on the campus of Midwestern State Univ.


Dr. Smith, one of several on the "North Texas: Its Place in the Economy of the Future" speakers, made the statement, "Based on past history, I would suggest that you worry about unusual weather extremes in 1990."

Besides well-above rainfall, temperatures have been unusual, with no daytime high below freezing thus far this year.

Continuing, Dr. Smith said, "We all seem to have a thing about census years. In 1950, you managed to hit 7 degrees in December and 14 degrees in November; I'm certainly glad it's not 1950 weather today. In 1970, you managed to have 54 degrees in July and 51 degrees in June. In 1980, you managed to have 117 degrees in June -- Death Valley type temperatures -- and 114 in July and cooled all the way down to 113 in August."

"Never underestimate the role of the economist on practically any subject," he commented.

He did not comment on weather during 1960.

Council rescends sewer line action

In a called meeting Monday night, the city council passed a motion to rescend its action taken the previous week to install a sewer line

Permits are down

Eventhough there were no permits issued for new homes or major structures by the city during April, the month's total still reached a reputable level of \$65,325.

Among the permits listed for the month were three for Ken's Pizza, which was heavily damaged by high winds that blew off part of its roof, and then was followed by heavy rains that collapsed part of the ceiling. Three permits were taken out for repairs and additions to the business.

April's permits raised the year's total to \$283,490.

As was the case the previous meeting, however, the vote was not unanimous.

Alderman Bud Mercer moved the action accepting the construction bid be rescended. It was seconded by Virgil Woodfin.

Voting for the motion were Mercer, Woodfin and Diane Robnett. Voting against it were Johnny Coker and Bud Burch.

Mercer, Coker and Burch had voted the previous week to accept a bid of \$42,656.50 to install the line. Woodfin had voted against it, and Robnett was absent.

Engineer Kerry Maroney answered several questions concerning the estimated costs of extending sewer service to homes and a business inside the city and to the east of Wigley Road, as well as serving those homes on Quail Valley Road that are not inside the city.

The cost of serving five homes from Wigley Road along the access road to the entrance of Quail Valley was estimated at \$48,000, and additional \$31,000 to take the line on east to Park Tank.

However, because of lift pumps that would be necessary to serve the homes north of the city on Quail Valley, the total cost would be as much as \$160,000, Maroney said.

During a discussion of making sewer service available to all residences inside the city, Mike Price, public works director told the council there were approximately 50 homes using septic tanks because sewer service was not available to them.

The discussion later extended to recent sewer problems throughout the city following heavy rains.

Aldermen were told the treatment plant had, at peak flow during the flooding problems, handled 1.9million gallons in one day, when the normal flow was less than 750,000. The plant, however, is designed to handle 2.5-million gallons.

Maroney suggested the city permit his firm to conduct a complete study of the city's sewer system, and reminded them that he had made the same proposal more than a year ago.

Mercer asked if it were possible that a separate line from Bradford Elementary, which was hard-hit by backflowing sewer a week earlier, would correct the school's problems.

"I think it's awfully important, more than anything else, to help the south side and mainly the school," he







And one of the teacher organizations, the Texas State Teachers Association, at its convention last week endorsed its first candidate for governor since 1982.

That was when the TSTA endorsed Mark White. And he won. The TSTA made the boast to reporters that a large percentage of those the organization has endorsed wins in elections.

God help us if we have a second coming of Mark White.

Anyway, it's back to the drawing board for the legislators. Or some of them, anyway. Most of them spend their time at the golf course while all the infighting goes on in committee during special sessions.

I'm still very upset with our commissioner of education, and those who used his same technique, about warning everyone that public schools would have to close as of May 1, if

That was a bunch of bull! A lie!
The schools were going to get
their money through all but a couple
of days in May. They got it April
25. But no one ever mentioned that.

Now the new deadline is June 1. If not reached by then, the court will appoint a "master" who will be empowered to take over public education in Texas, set whatever salaries and operating expenses he wishes, and send us all the bill.

I'd suggest the politicians in Austin get their acts together. We had a plenty of that with our prison system, ala William Wayne Justice.



Four new oil wells with combined ability to pump 108 barrels of oil per day have been completed in the Wichita Regular Field, about four miles west of Burkburnett.

Atapco of Midland is the operator.

The wells are designated as the Nos. 100 through 103 H. Reilly "A.

They are in the L.C. Dennison and L.C. Ellis Surveys and will produce from perforations ranging from 1,369 to 1,611 feet into the

Pumping 52 barrels of oil daily from four sets of perforations, the No. 130 W.B. Honaker has been completed in the Wichita Regular Field, 2.5 miles northeast of Electra.

With Texaco as the operator, the well was perforated to produce from intervals ranging from 614 to 1,927 feet into the wellbore.

Location is in the SPRR Survey A-280.

Texaco is operating out of Velma, Okla.

At a drillsite about two miles south of Iowa Park, Winfrey Oil of Wichita Falls is preparing to make hole for the No. 5 Mayer in the Wichita Regular Field. It is under permit for 1,350-ft. maximum drilling depth. Location is in the Denton CSL Survey A-417, 250 feet from the north line and 900 feet from the east line of the survey.

Ronkaran Oil of Wichita Falls will be the operator at two projected 1,900-ft. developmental bids in the Wichita Regular Field, about three miles northeast of Holliday. The wells are designated as the No. 3 James Cullum and No. 1 Perkins and Cullum "C."

The No. 3 well is in League 4 Lot 5 of the Denton CSL League, while the No. 1 well is in League 3 Lot 4 of the Denton CSL League

Showing ability to pump crude oil at the rate of 17 barrels daily plus 40 barrels of salt water, the No. 10 Bickley "B" has been brought on line in the Wichita Regular Field.

Location is about three miles northeast of Electa with Keuhne oil Co. of Dallas as the operator.

Kuehne perforated for production at 1,991 to 1,995 feet into the wellbore.

Initially, the only tools needed are a pencil type etcher and an electric or carbide-tipped pen. After a design is placed under a piece of glass, one simply has to trace over it with the electric pen.

Safety glasses must be worn to prevent glass fragments from getting into the eyes.

So intrigued with the new hobby, she has etched the bathroom windows and kitchen cabinet glass in her home. She has also etched designs on glasses, pitchers, cake-plate covers and various decorative "suncatchers" that people hang in windows.

She is presently designing an etch for two large entrance door panels for a new home. She plans to acquire a new, high-powered engraving system this summer which uses an air compressor to turn the etching pen. It will also be used to engrave on metal, plastic and wood, as well as glass.

Windows and doors with excessive etching designs require a more intricate technique known as acid application.

This entails placing a piece of plain, undesigned contact paper on the glass surface. The design is then drawn on the paper. Areas or pieces to be etched are then cut out with a sharp knife leaving the areas exposed for etching.

The acidic compound, a thick paste, is then applied by brush. Safety precautions while working with served. After a 13-minute dwell ume, the glass is water rinsed, the contact

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
