# Water, sewer rates to remain the same

Local residents will not have lower sewer and water rates, at least not in the immediate future.

A proposal to reduce both sewer and water rates by 30 percent was rejected by a 3-2 vote during Monday's city council meeting.

Proposing the reductions were the council's two newest members, Charlie Helms and Johnny Crawford.

Helms originally offered a motion to reduce the rates of both services 10 percent. Crawford seconded the motion, and offered an amendment to increase the reduction to 30 percent.

Helms then moved to increase the reduction to 30 percent, and was seconded again by Crawford.

They were the only two voting for the motion. Aldermen Johnny Coker, Virgil Woodfin and Diane Robnett voted against it.

One motion during the evening did receive an unanimous vote. It was to permit the railroad to increase its speed when traveling west through the city, once the engine has passed Jackson.

The old barrier was Johnson

#### Road.

Ordinance does not permit a train to travel at a speed greater than 30 miles per hour now, between Jackson and Bell.

Railroad officials asked that the westbound trains be allowed to accellerate at Jackson, because of the incline of the line to the west. Gaining speed earlier will reduce energy consumed climbing the incline.

A request to improve drainage in the 1100 block of Lincoln was approved, but by another split vote. Aldermen were told that Harold Stucki, a resident of the block, had made numerous requests over several years that a drainage problem be corrected by the city.

A cost study was made by city staff, and it was estimated the cost would be \$1,954. Only Alderman Crawford voted

against the motion to have the work done. Most of the balance of the meet-

ing was discussion, primarily on projects already planned or underway. They concerned plans to upgrade the pump station that supplies water to the treatment plant from Lake Buffalo, construction of the Recreational Activities Center, rebuilding with concrete 1,340 feet of Colorado, and operation of the landfill.

Public Works director Mike Price completed his presentation of projects and requests for the 1990-91 fiscal year. He had begun his presentation at a workshop session last week.

Among his requested needs was a new trash pickup truck, estimated to cost \$72,000. He explained both the trucks used were 1982 models.

And, during the discussion on the operation of the landfill, Price suggested allowing the cities of Electra and Holliday to use the pit here.

He explained the added trash would make better use of the pit, because the amount of trash generated daily by Iowa Park does not justify daily covering of dirt, which is required by the federal government.

Aldermen agreed to hold their next in a series of budget workshops at 7 p.m. next Tuesday.

# Two vehicles stolen

Reports of two stolen vehicles and three burglaries were reported to police during the past week, and continue under investigation.

Both vehicles have been recovered, one of them only a block away.

The first stolen vehicle involved one of the burglaries.

A representative of Thompson Tool called police at 6:35 a.m. Friday to file a complaint that someone had forced entry into the office, taken a set of keys to a pickup parked in the yard, and used the vehicle to haul away several power tools.

Wichita Falls police later called to inform local police that the 1985 model pickup had been found at the intersection of Seymour Road and Beverly Drive. It had caught afire, apparently after being driven on a flat

The vehicle was damaged, but saved, and all the tools were recovered from the truck.

Saturday evening, a resident in the 1000 block of Fourth Street told police someone had taken his 1990 Dodge Spirit from the driveway. He said he did not hear anything until noticing the vehicle missing.

The car did not have keys in it, but was left unlocked.

Police figure someone pushed the vehicle out of the driveway and somehow down the street to midway in the 900 block, where they lost control and it bounced across a curb and was left.

Officers found the vehicle 13 minutes after the report was received, according to the police blotter entry. Officers concede the case was a possible prank on the owner.

A resident in the 1000 block of West Cornelia reported to police Friday evening the theft of approximately \$4,500 in cash. The complaintant, who admitted he had not seen the money, most of which was kept in a locked briefcase in his bedroom, since March.

He said he was missing \$4,200 in cash from the briefcase, and a collection of quarters with a face value of some \$250.

A resident in the 900 block of West Louisa told police he was missing \$10 in cash and almost \$200 worth of fishing gear, apparently taken by someone who was going to rent the house and had a key. The complant was filed Monday night.

Officers arrested Donna Kay Lively, 26, on a Class C assault complaint at 12:26 a.m. Monday after being called to a home in the 700 block of West Cornelia on a domestic disturbance.

She was released at 12:50 after a \$69 cash bond was posted and signing a promise to appear in municipal court.

A near disaster Friday morning at the high school turned out to be nothing more than an inconvenience and missing one class by students.

The building had to be evacuated when a natural gas line was broken by a construction worker.

There was no explosion or fire, which was an immediate danger and the reason for the evacuation.

A worker cut a two-inch gas line and a water line at the same time with a backhoe, when he started digging on the north side of the building shortly after classes got underway.

Gas began escaping freely from the high-pressure line, and flowing through an open door to the building.

The incident was seen by both M.L. Hodges and Jack Blagg, employees of the school. Blagg ran to the gas meter and turned off the flow while Hodges went to the administration office to tell authorities. Assistant Principal Randy Lovelady, in the absence of Principal Richard Davis, announced over the school speaker system that everyone should exit the building on the north side. He explained the practiced fire exit drills couldn't be used because that would have sent some into the danger area.

"All the students handled themselves very well and quitely," Lovelady said, and the building was vacated within some 30 seconds.

Police and volunteer firemen were called to the scene to assist.

The students were allowed to return to their classes in 30-40 minutes after it was determined the building was safe to occupy again.

Water service was resumed to the building about 11:30 a.m.

The loss of natural gas did not hamper cafeteria workers, other than not being able to bake potatoes. The main fare of the day had already been

#### planned for sandwiches.

Boys showering at the fieldhouse were slightly inconvenienced, however, because they had no hot water. Coach Ray Sefcik said they took the quickest showers he had ever seen.

The gas line was finally repaired and cleared by workers Monday.

Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer said he and others on the staff had pointed out where lines were on the west side of the building, where other digging is to take place. But he was unaware the digging on the north side was to begin when it did.

He credited Blagg and Hodges for their quick work, to cut off the flow and alert authorities of the need to evacuate.

Palmer explained it was a very touchy situation, with the volume of gas being spewed, that it was not touched off.

"It was a very explosive situation," he commented.

# Construction, career ladder on school board's agenda

Construction and career ladder will be the primary subjects of a called meeting by the school board this morning.

The meeting is to begin at 7 a.m. in the administration building. Trustees will consider, once

again, a proposed addendum to the high school construction project, to put back in a teachers' workroom that was taken out because of funding.

Board members also will hear a recommendation by Supt. Glen Mitchell to reject all bids on the vocational agriculture's project buildling.

Recommendations will be made on the amount to be paid, and when, to levels two and three of the career ladder, as well as teachers to be placed on the two levels.

Career ladder funding is not affected by the as-yet unanswered school reform legislation expected to come out of Austin, Mitchell said.

In the original building proposal

for the high school, three new classrooms and a teachers' workroom were planned for addition to the south end of the east wing of the building.

Bids were higher than anticipated and the workroom was eliminated by recommendation of the committee, in an effort to work within the budget.

However, some board members have asked that the full board take a second look at a plan to put the room back into the plans, but not complete the interior until a later date.

The cost to "rough in" the room would be \$23,720, according to the contractor.

The lowest base bid for the ag facility, which did not include several items necessary for its use, came in at \$82,375.

The budget called for \$60,000, and the additional items would cost another \$23,494, Mitchell said.

Committee members will be asked to study the issue and make a

recommendation on future steps the board should take in order to complete the facility which was approved by bond issue voters.

"We have no choice" but to reject the bids because they are so much higher than the budget, Mitchell said.

Also on the meeting agenda is an annually required action on the 1990-91 Standard Application System Vocational Education Funding.

The bride presented her mother and the groom's mother with a longstemmed peach rose tied with English ivy and white satin streamers.



# Woodfin gives program for Evening Lions Club

"I am not afraid of bees, but I do respect them," Virgil Woodfin told the Evening Lions Tuesday as he showed them the paraphernalia he wore when he was working with them.

He gave a brief history of the bee, stating that its honey was mentioned in the Bible and that it had been preserved and found in recent years in the pyramids of Egypt. He said that honey was the "perfect food" where no bacteria will live, and once it is capped over it will not spoil.

Woodfin, who has his own

hives, said that he does not process his honey as some do, rather he takes it out of the frame, strains it and puts it in jars.

When he was asked how to get a start of bees, he said that the best way was to get them when they were swarming and that an ordinary swarm contained about 3,000 bees. He said that a swarm holds the queen bee, which lays the eggs, a good one being capable of laying 3,500 eggs a day; the drone bee which does no work, and the worker bees.

Woodfin said that the bees

become workers three weeks after they are born and that their life span is about three weeks. He said that the drone bee does not gather any nectar, rather he mates with the queen bee. There is only one queen bee to a hive and her life span is about three years. He said the best sources for nectar in this area are the clover, alfalfa and mesquites.

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Woodfin displayed one of his bee hives and explained the function of each part, one being the queen and drone bee trap. As he discussed the activity of the hive, he said that the worker bees do the hike duty, feed and groom the queen bee and stop up cracks in the hive. The drone bee



does not have a stinger and can go from one hive to the other. He said that most hives have ten frames and told how to get honey out of the shallow frame that had been carried there by the worker bees. He said that he usually takes the honey from his hives each August.





It was a picture-perfect setup for a victorious rally. But it didn't come off.

Playing Abilene Wylie, runner up of Dist. 3-AAA, Monday at Stephenville in a single-game bidistrict playoff, it was the bottom of the seventh inning, the Hawks were batting, they trailed 5-3, had two outs, the bases loaded, and Kelly McClure, one of the team's most dependable hitters, at the plate.

He swung at the first pitch and connected. But he had pulled the ball just inches wide of the third base line. Foul ball.

McClure then made solid contact with the second pitch. But it was a medium-high fly ball into left center field.

The ball was caught. The game was over. And so was Iowa Park's hopes of once again returning to the state championship tournament, because the season was also over.

Including Friday's 14-6 warmup game with Holliday, Iowa Park's record for 1990 was 17-5.

The Hawks scored twice in the bottom of the first inning. Leadoff batter Jimmy Duggins singled, and Danny Tatom followed with a walk.

Robert Denton poped up. Then McClure advanced Duggins on an infield sacrifice.

Duggins scored when a hard-hit ball off Jimmy Nicholson's bat was bobbled by the shortstop, and Tatom was later sent home when Wylie's pitcher was charged with a balk.

Tatom walked the leadoff batter in the second inning, and he scored on a single to narrow the score to 2-

Wylie took the lead in the third inning, and never gave it up.

Tatom struck out the first hitter, and the second poped up to first baseman Ken Schlaud.

Then, with two outs, the third hitter connected on an 0-2 count with a double to the center field fence. The next batter walked.

The blow that made all the difference followed. Wylie's batter, with a 1-2 count, clobbered the ball on an almost line drive to the base of the 395-foot center field fence.

Fielder Bunkie Imboden raced to the fence, arriving at the same time as the ball, and attempted an over-theshoulder catch. But the ball bounced off his glove, then the fence and off his leg.

As the relayed ball reached home plate, the third runner was sliding under Nicholson. The Hawk catcher had to make a jumping catch, and almost caught the runner before he touched the plate.

A perfectly-placed infield hit to first base by Jeremy Carroll scored Nicholson, who had singled, in the fourth, narrowing the score to 3-4.

Iowa Park had a rally going in the sixth, when Denton, Nicholson and Carroll each singled. But Denton was called out in a very close call trying to score from third on Carroll's hit, and two were left on base when Schlaud grounded out to end the inning.

Wylie's leadoff batter in the seventh inning was walked, after Tatom had a count of 0-2.

Duggins then was moved from shortstop to the mound, and promptly struck out the next two batters.

But, after having stolen his way to third base, Wylie's walked runner caught Duggins in a full windup and successfully stole home plate on a squeeze play.

That extra-run lead changed the complexion of Coach Daryl Frazier's attack in the bottom of the inning, from needing one run to tie, to two.

Patrick Kennedy lead off the last inning, and flied out to right field. J'Bill Merrick singled, and advanced to second on an error by the right fielder.

Duggins then hit a fly out to left field, but Tatom walked to represent the tying run.

Denton followed, and he was un-

able to dodge a ball and was sent to first base, uninjured, to load the hases.

McClure's fly to left center was caught, and the game ended after two hours and 24 minutes of play.

Reflecting on the game, Coach Frazier said the following day, "You can't blame any one individual on the final outcome. All season we played as a team. We didn't come out with enthusiasm. They (Wylie) played well, probably better than they have all season, according to their record and scouting reports.

"They got the breaks (Wylie's pitchers were credited with only two strikeouts), we didn't execute, and we lost," he said.

Frazier said he felt his club could have been 22-0 at this point in the season, except for five innings in which they failed to execute or didn't get a needed hit.

Looking forward to next year, the coach said his five seniors, Nicholson, McClure, Duggins, Tatom and Bruce Palmer, who had started all four years, would be difficult to replace.

However, with the success of his freshmen on the JV team, and those who were returning from the varsity, he felt the Hawks would be back in the playoffs very soon.
