FIGHTS

Two arrested in altercations

Fighting was the most common of entries on the police blotter this past week.

Two arrests resulted from complaints when officers responded to reports of fighting, and the third case is still under investigation.

A junior high school student was accosted while walking home from classes Thursday afternoon, by another juvenile from Electra.

Approached in the 400 block of East Cash, the local youth reportedly refused to fight, but was struck in the fact, breaking his glasses.

That case is being investigated by the department's juvenile officer.

Officers were called to Woodbriar apartments, unit 408, shortly after midnight Saturday night, where an argument reportedly had developed between three related males.

Michael Joe Loyd, 19, refused treatment by emergency workers. He was taken into custody on an outstanding warrant issued by Wichita Falls police for driving with an expired operator's license.

Another involved in the fracas, Eldron Loyd, also 19, reportedly entered Bethania Hospital later that

day with a broken jaw.

Police were called to the apartment below where the Loyd fight had taken place the following evening, where a domestic disturbance was said to be underway.

Officers found no evidence of any physical violence, according to the blotter report, but determined one of the persons, Felix Randal Esparza, was wanted on warrants issued by both the local police and Wichita County Sheriff's Office.

Esparza was wanted locally for no liability insurance, and by county for theft by check and violation of probation, DWI. He was transported to county jail.

A woman called police at 9:58 p.m. Sunday, saying she had seen the form of a man in her home in the 900 block of Van Horn.

She told the dispatcher she had gone into her bedroom and locked the door, and was calling from there.

When police arrived, they found no one else in the house, but did find that an outside door had been forced open. Pry marks were left on the facing.

Contents of the woman's purse were dumped onto the floor of the room where she had seen the figure. Items missing were \$67 in cash, personal checks, drivers license, credit cards and a ladies watch.

The owner of a pickup who lives in the 100 block of Westview told police Monday morning that a tool box had been taken from the bed of his pickup, sometime since Saturday.

Officers took Susan Edwards, 27, into custody Saturday afternoon after stopping her on a traffic check and determining she was wanted on warrants issued by the Department of Public Safety.

She was released after paying fines amounting to \$118 for having no valid inspection sticker, failure to appear in court and speeding, according to the blotter.

A case of criminal mischief was reported by the owner of a van in the 200 block of West Garden Monday.

She said someone had apparently used a medium similar to shoe polish on the vehicle, but when attempting to remove it, paint and striping was damaged.

Handing out specially-printed shirts at 10 p.m. will be Ruth

Welch, Laura Thames, Connie Duggins and Cookie Brown.

Basketball games are to start at the same time the doors are locked, 11, under direction of Tom Venhaus and Phil Welch.

Volleyball games will start at 12-midnight, called by Jimmy Duggins and Herman Turner.

At 1 will be wiffleball, with Mike Brown, Charles Hickey and Gowdy Slack in control.

Dance competition is slated at 1, under the watchful eyes of Kelley Hickey, Cookie Brown and Carolyn Richter.

Relays are scheduled at 2:30, including: waterballoon toss (Bertha

Heidrich); bat-spit (Lavena Turner and Jobeth Meisel), and ice cream (Ruth Welch).

Also planned, to begin at 3:30, will be bingo, called by Susan Biddy. A pancake breakfast will be served at 6 by the Iowa Park MuleSkinners.

Throughout the evening, refreshments and snacks are available to those participating, as well as rooms for relaxing and watching video movies.

Numerous prizes, donated by merchants or purchased with donated funds, are awarded to the participants, based on their point earnings during the evening.

Council to meet Monday; work session held Tuesday

The city council will hold a regular business meeting at 7 p.m. Monday night in council chambers.

Aldermen also held a called meeting Tuesday, continuing their study on next year's budget.

Roy Robertson has requested to speak to the council Monday, seeking water service at Southgate Garden outside the city limits.

An ordinance will be considered which would permit the railroad to increase its limited speed between Jackson Street and Johnson Road, when traveling westward.

Administrator James Barrington will ask council authorization to advertise for bids for installation of a 12-inch water line from the Johnson Road water tower to Mary Drive.

A lease agreement with Little League for the use of the girls' softball field on Bell Road is also on the council's tentative agenda.

During Tuesday night's workshop on the budget, major topics of discussion were the police department, library, and health care insurance for city employees.

Chief Wayne Parsons told the

council, "I'm quite satisfied with what's in front of you," referring to a printout of department needs for the coming year.

Parsons, who took over the head position of the department two weeks earlier, said the budget request reflected a 9.4-percent reduction in the current budget, primarily because he had no capital expenditures in the request.

An extensive questioning followed, primarily offered by Alderman Johnny Crawford. Parsons answered most of the questions, but at times former chief Alan Sheffield was needed to provide some information.

Librarian Sue Maness told the council her major need this year was to replace approximately 1,200 books which had been taken from the inventory because of either wear or lack of reader interest.

She said her inventory now contains 13,588 volumes.

Another major increase in cost of health care insurance premiums is facing the city this year, Barrington told the council.

He pointed out the coverage was increased in cost 30 percent for the

current year, and the company is seeking an additional 32 percent for the coming year.

He said he was looking to the council to see how flexible and how innovative the members would be to allow the staff to seek alternate means of health coverage.

Barrington said he was talking with representatives of several companies, trying to determine what different types of coverage programs were available.

Heavy rains

Most of Tuesday evening's storm passed to the south of Iowa Park, but no one has complained.

A few may have wanted more precipitation than the .15 of an inch Virgil Woodfin measured, but only a few, because most areas receiving more than that also had hail.

Wheat farmers in the immediate area say they will be cutting their bumper crops, probably by this weekend, and any moisture at this stage would only delay the start of harvest.

Special guests at the luncheon were her mother, Ruth Welch and grandmother, Mrs. Hallie Sanders.


75 class reunion planned for homecoming weekend



HOMEMADE FLOUR TORTILLAS

2 cups flour
3/4 cup hot water
1/4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. baking powder
1 Tbsp. Crisco
Mix all together until soft. Roll into 2-inch balls and roll flat with a rolling pin.
Place in a hot cast iron skillet until lightly brown on both sides.

Simmer 15 minutes. Combine beans and sauce in pan, mixing well. Cook until heated.

Place spoonful meat and lettuce on each tortilla, rolling to enclose filling. Place seam side down in a baking dish. Pour bean mixture over top and sprinkle with cheese. Bake at 400 degrees 15-20 minutes. Garnish with sour cream and onion.

HEAVENLY HASH

4 1/2 cups sugar
1 can Carnation milk
1/2 inch off stick of butter
Boil alone exactly seven minutes. Add:
1 lb. pecans
2 pkgs. chocolate chips
1-7 oz. jar marshmallow whip
Beat until slightly glazed and drop on wax paper.

BROWNIE BOTTOM PIE

1 box Duncan Hines Chewy Fudge Brownie Mix
1/2 gallon vanilla ice cream
1 can Hershey's chocolate syrup
Bake brownies according to directions on box. Cut into 2-inch squares. Put one scoop vanilla ice cream on a square and pour hot syrup over top.

BEEFY BAKED BURRITOS

1 lb. ground beef
1 envelope taco seasoning
1-16 oz. can refried beans
1-8 oz. can enchilada sauce
1 head lettuce, chopped
1 pkg. 12-inch flour tortillas
1 lb. Colby cheese, shredded
1 pint sour cream
1 med. onion, chopped
Brown meat until crumbly. Stir in taco seasoning and 1/2 cup water.

TATER TOT CASSEROLE

1 lb. ground beef
1/4 cup chopped onion
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 16 oz. bag tater tots
Brown ground beef with onion until crumbly. Place in 2-quart casserole dish, top with soup and tater tots and bake at 350 degrees 45 minutes.

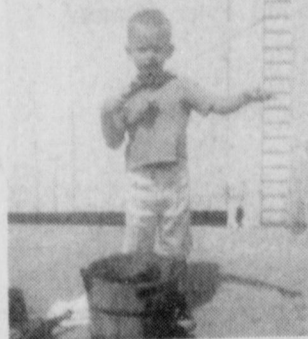

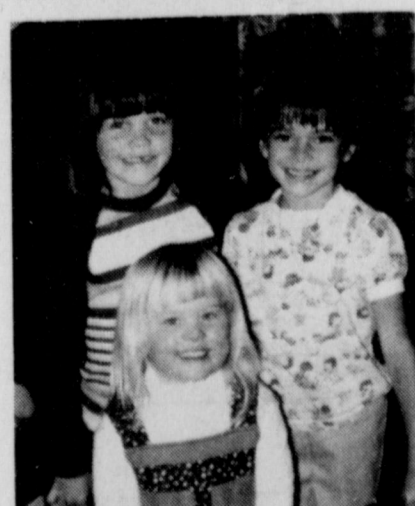

As I See It...

I was looking out a west window Tuesday evening and saw a brilliant flash of lightning, and almost before I turned around there was a resounding clap of thunder that literally shook our house.

"That was a big one," I commented to my wife, "and it was pretty close, too."

Minutes later, I left the house to attend that evening's workshop of the city council.

There was a uniformed Little League team working out on the Kidwell Elementary playground, and as I drove down Fourth Street, there was another bolt of lightning to the south, somewhere in the Holliday area.

I saw that flash just as I passed the city's volleyball courts, where a spirited game was underway.

Then, as I turned onto West Highway, I could see the lights of the Little League fields and noted teams were engaged in action.

People, doesn't anyone realize the danger of lightning?

Clouds were already overhead, and no one, to my knowledge, can tell exactly when and where a bolt of lightning will emerge.

I just don't understand how anyone will stay out in the open when a thunderstorm is in the immediate area.

I will not stay out of doors, in

the open, under such conditions, and I darned sure wouldn't have let any of my children be out there either.

I'm not condemning anyone in particular, but those responsible for others being outside in that sort of situation should understand their positions and liabilities.

Caution may be an inconvenience, but that's better than someone being seriously injured, or killed, by an unpredictable bolt of lightning.

Was anyone surprised when the legislature wound up its special session Tuesday without a school reform bill signed by the governor?

I wasn't.

The senate and house leadership apparently felt they could force an override of Gov. Bill Clements' veto.

Both chambers apparently felt they could bully the governor into approving what he had said all along he would not approve.

The liberals all said they had given on their initial proposals, but the governor hadn't given anything. And they had, cutting the original senate bill to increase first-year funding by over a billion dollars, down to half

that amount.

And the governor had said he would not allow any increase in taxes, but finally said he would not allow any increase in sales tax.

The liberal legislators, after all those special sessions, failed to realize that the governor would stick to his guns, and wouldn't be forced into breaking the ground rules he had set at the beginning.

Now, it appears they will go into one more special session, with an eye toward coming out with a bill that everyone can agree on, including the courts, by June 21.

This all reminds me of the year when Hobby, Lewis, White and assorted liberals got House Bill 72 passed.

That was when the poor local school administrators and trustees had to wait until way past their regular time of setting their budgets, because they didn't know what was coming from the state and how much money they had to raise locally.

For those on the local fronts, this sort of thing is very tough on the nerves.

I feel for them.

New Rehab facility underway

The North Texas Easter Seal Rehabilitation Center's groundbreaking for its new facility at Armory Road and Midwestern Parkway in Wichita Falls was held May 24.

Phase One of the construction represents 21,000 square feet and will house all but two of the Center's programs and administrative offices.

The volunteer Capital Campaign Committee will continue to solicit funds for Phase Two construction, as well as furniture and equipment costs. When the additional 11,000 square feet are built it will replace the old facility at 516 Denver St.

When completed the new facility will relieve overcrowding in the Center's current two locations and will allow for expansion of services.

When the North Texas Easter Seal Rehab Center was founded in 1948 it served only disabled children during the first 20 years.

For the last two decades, it has also served disabled adults in a variety of programs.

Over the past five years, services have increased 82 percent. Last year, over 1,200 children and adults were served.

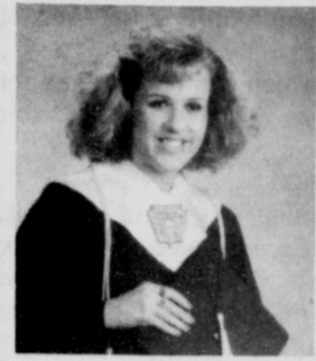
Gross re-enlists

Iowa Parkan establishes a 'first' for an Air Force fighter pilot

On May 4, Capt. Ben Joplin, of Iowa Park, Texas, successfully launched four AIM-120A, Advanced Medium Range Air-to-Air Missiles (AMRAAM) from an F-15C at four specially-modified QF-100 drones in a test conducted over the Gulf of Mexico.

Three of the missiles scored direct hits with the fourth passing within lethal distance of its target. Since the AMRAAM does not have to score a direct hit to destroy its target, the test was a complete success.

Captain Joplin launched the missiles from an altitude of 15,000 feet while traveling at 650 miles per hour. Two of the drones were flying at 10,000 feet with the other two flying at 5,000 feet. All four missiles were launched nearly simultaneously.

Captain Joplin, who graduated from Iowa Park High School in 1975, is assigned to the 4485th Test Squadron at the USAF Tactical Air Warfare Center, Elgin AFB, Fla. He is the son of Wanda Joplin of Wichita Falls.

The remote-controlled drones were launched from nearby Tyndall AFB. They were flying in a corridor of chaff and were provided standoff jamming protection by three F-4s in the area. Both the chaff and standoff jamming were designed to make it harder for Captain Joplin's radar and the missile guidance system to track their targets.

The test was designed to show AMRAAM's ability to make multiple near-simultaneous kills against more than one target, despite attempts to confuse missile and aircraft guidance systems through electronic countermeasures, according to Brig. Gen. Charles E. Franklin, the AMRAAM program director at Elgin AFB.

By all accounts, the test was a dramatic success.

"This was the toughest test a U.S. air-to-air missile has ever had to undergo. It was a dramatic demonstration of what the AMRAAM provides in improved combat capability," said General Franklin.

For Captain Joplin, it was the most pressure-packed mission he has ever flown. Although the 4485th Test Squadron routinely performs operational and test evaluations of air-to-ground and air-to-air missiles, the ability of the AMRAAM to shoot down four enemy aircraft after being launched from a single plane had never been proven.

The North Texas State Univer-

sity graduate was supposed to maneuver against the four heavily-protected "bogeys," launch his missiles, perform evasive maneuvers and leave the area as soon as possible. While he eventually was able to complete his mission in spectacular fashion, it was no easy feat.

A sheared starter shaft on his F-15 left him unable to start his engines at the scheduled time. Only a heroic effort by his crew chief and his maintenance people enabled him to get off the ground.

Normally, it takes six to eight hours to replace a starter shaft but Captain Joplin's maintenance crew was able to do it in just over two. The timing was critical since many of the aircraft involved in the test were already circling over the Gulf of Mexico and were quickly running out of fuel. A long delay in Captain Joplin's takeoff would mean scrubbing the entire mission.

Once he got airborne, Captain Joplin headed directly for the test range. Shortly thereafter, four blips appeared on his radar screen. In the next two minutes, Captain Joplin was able to home in on his targets and successfully launch his missiles.

But not without complications. At first, all was going well as he fired on targets one and two but just before the veteran F-15 pilot was to launch on target three it momentarily disappeared from his radar screen.

Not wanting to waste precious seconds, he turned his attention to the fourth target which he was able to fire on immediately. Seconds later, when target three reappeared, Captain Joplin was able to down it as well.

Immediately after firing the missiles, Captain Joplin performed evasive maneuvers and left the area. This "launch and leave" capability is made possible by the missile guidance system, which independently guides the missiles to its target after being launched.

"AMRAAM is a quantum leap forward in aerial combat capability. The air-to-air missile of the future, it increases our offensive capability four-fold and allows the fighter pilot to engage and destroy opposing aircraft before coming within the lethal range of the enemy's air-to-air weapon systems," said a beaming Col. Ross Smith following the test. Colonel Smith is the commander of the 4443rd Test and Evaluation Group. As such, the 4485th Test Squadron falls under his command.

Following the mission, Captain Joplin traveled to Washington, D.C.,

where he briefed Secretary of the Air Force Donald Rice and the Air Force Chief of Staff, General Larry Welch, on the details of the mission.

Captain Joplin is married to the former Jerri Paschall, also of Iowa Park.

"The success of this multi-million dollar milestone test hinges on Captain Joplin's outstanding airman-ship. This is an example of having the right fighter pilot in the right place at the right time. It was a great job," said Colonel Smith.

Cook awarded scholarship

The 21st college scholarship to be awarded to a 1990 graduate of Iowa Park High School was not announced until late last week.

Chris Cook, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Cook of 1001 Cornelia, was named recipient of a three-year advanced designee Army ROTC scholarship.

Because Cook has chosen to continue his education at Midwestern State Univ. in Wichita Falls, the value of the scholarship is \$8,800.

Announcement of Cook's selection was not in time to be a part of last week's fifth annual Honors Recognition Banquet, where 20 scholarships were awarded.

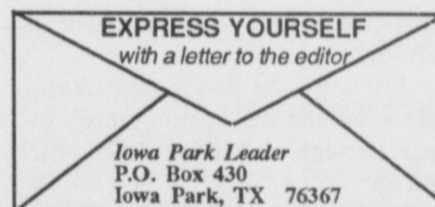
Every year the U.S. Army awards three- and four-year scholar-

Light Summertime Entertaining With Mixed Berry Pie

Summer is the perfect time to enjoy the goodness of garden-fresh fruits and delicious low-fat dairy foods. Succulent June berries are an all time favorite — dipped whole into low-fat sour cream, served in a bowl with low-fat milk, spooned over low-fat ice cream or baked into a pie featuring a low-fat crust.

Bright red strawberries, plump sweet blueberries and tart raspberries are always a special treat when eaten fresh from the garden. Combined together in Mixed Berry Meringue Pie, the berries' eye-catching colors and shapes create a dramatic dessert. The creamy rich filling blended with the full-flavored berries and melt-in-your-mouth meringue will quickly become a summer favorite.

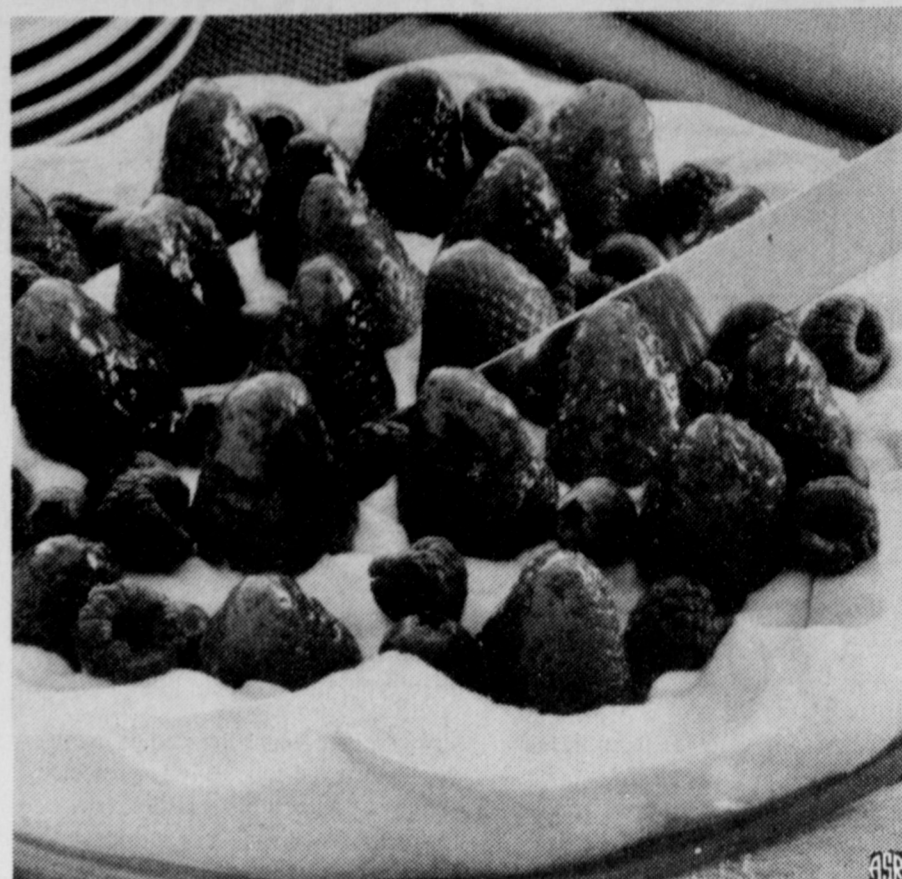

Mixed Berry Meringue Pie

Meringue:
2 egg whites
1/4 tsp. cream of tartar
1/2 c. sugar



Filling:

3/4 c. powdered sugar
1 8-oz. carton LAND O LAKES Light Sour Cream
4 oz. Neufchatel cheese
1 tbsp. orange juice
1 tsp. grated orange peel

Topping:

1 pt. strawberries, cleaned, hulled
1 c. raspberries*
1/4 c. apple jelly, melted
Heat oven to 275°. In small mixer bowl combine egg whites and cream of tartar. Beat at high speed until foamy. Continue beating, gradually adding sugar and scraping bowl often, until glossy and stiff peaks form (3 to 4 min.). Spoon into well greased (bottom only) 9" pie pan; using back of spoon spread meringue over bottom and up sides. Bake for 1 hr. Turn off oven; leave meringue in oven with door closed for 45 min. Finish cooling

meringue at room temperature. In small mixer bowl combine all filling ingredients. Beat at med. speed, scraping bowl often, until smooth and creamy (2 to 3 min.). Spoon filling into meringue shell; using back of spoon spread over bottom and up sides. Refrigerate 2 hr. or until firm. Just before serving, place strawberries, stem side down, on filling. Sprinkle raspberries over strawberries. Brush or drizzle melted apple jelly over berries. YIELD: 8 to 10 servings.

*1 c. blueberries or combination of raspberries and blueberries can be substituted for 1 c. raspberries.

A committee meeting for parents of Cub Scouts will be at 7:00 p.m., Aug. 20, in the Chamber of Commerce office.

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
