SETS BOND VOTE FOR AUGUST 6th

The Iowa Park school board met in regular session Thursday, July 14, and acted on three petitions which had been submitted for their consideration. Notices of the call for election on these petitions are published elsewhere in the Herald. For the past three months the board has been studying the needs of the school system as to buildings and other necessities under the Gilmer-Aiken setup.

For full details of the need for this program, the reader is referred to a discussion by Supt. W. R.

In order to make an opportunity for all voters of the school district to become well informed, a Mass Meeting will be held in the high school auditorium at 8:00 p.m. Tuesday, August 2. Full discussion will be held on all three questions to be voted upon. Rollins Woodall, president of the board, will be in charge and the school board will be on hand with full data to answer any and all questions.

Although the measures have not yet been voted, the time element has had to be taken in consideration by the board and hiring of teachers has been done with provisions of the Gilmer-Aiken bill in mind. The election comes on August 6 and it is the sincere desire of sues be approved.

assroom units or teachers for one of the special service teachers. We can qualify for a teacher of handicapped children if we can have the room and physical set up for these children, such as a room, teaching aids, and can get a qualified teacher. Handicapped children come under 6 groups: 1-3 vision loss, 1-3 hearing loss, speech disorders, orthopedic handicaps, lowered vitality and nervous disorders. These pupils go on with their regular class work, but are given extra and special help in their handicap field. If poor in speech pronunciation,

then extra help is given and in most cases individually. We can have two rooms constructed for our primary grades much larger than the ordinary class rooms and rest rooms built in connection

with the primary rooms. I mean the first grade when I say primary rooms. We can have two or more voca

tional teachers if need for same exists and we can have a nice sheet iron building for our buses instead of the place we now have. We can have a vocational and band building, also we can fix up our football grandstands to take care of 500 or more people when attending our football games. We will be in a class of all other schools of this county and section of Texas.

We can relieve the crowded con dition now existing in the ward school. One section of the sixth grade has to be taught in the high school building at present. The cost of all these extras and more I have not mentioned will not be over 35c on a \$100 valuation of county purposes in part of our dis-

trict. If a person renders a home for \$1000 in part of our district, it will cost that person \$3.50 more school tax in part of Iowa Park

School District where we are now paying \$1.00 on a \$100 valuation. In three districts now paying 50c on the \$100 valuation, it would cost \$8.50 more on a \$1000 valuation.
