GAS STATISTICS RELEASED

DALLAS — Callahan County oil and gas wells pumped some \$4.6 million into the county's economy last year, according to a study just released by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas

Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association. Value of production from oil wells was \$4.4 million and from natural gas wells \$202,000, bas-ed on the most recent U. S. Bureau of Mines figures com-piled by the Association. The county ranked 127th in the state in value of production. "Output from Callahan Coun-ty is part of this country's do-mestic oil supply which is en-dangered by some of the propo-sais now before Congress," com-mented Corbin J. Robertson, Assn, president, "Attempts to destroy depletion provisions of our income tax laws and to nul-lify present controls over im-ported oil could discourage fur-ther development of Texas oil resources. Eventually oil mar-kets now shared by the county would be given over to foreign producers." Last year, the county produ-ced 1.5 million barrels of crude
