NORTHWEST PART OF CITY Council slates project to hike water pressure

The city council approved a project designed to improve water pressure in the northwest part of town, a proposal to include the girls' softball field in a lease agreement with Little League, and amended an ordinance to increase train speeds through the city, during Monday night's meeting.

A proposal, suggested by Mayor Wayne House, to lay a 12-inch water line along Johnson Road from the water tower to Mary Drive was approved on a 4-0-1 vote.

House explained he had received numerous complaints from residents in Shiloh Estates that, especially during the summer season, their water pressure was less than desirable.

"They tell me that they can turn on one water sprinkler. But if they turn on a second, neither one will work," he said.

A lengthy discussion followed with an engineer, concerning looping of the line and whether the 12-inch line would improve pressure without looping.

Alderman Johnny Crawford said he felt a number of other improvements scheduled in coming years by

the previous council should be incorporated into one major project.

Crawford said he felt the bids would be lower, having more than one project going at the same time, and also be less than purchasing supplies at anticipated higher prices in the future.

When the vote was counted, Crawford abstained, explaining he was "concerned about funding and the way the (12-inch line) cost would be funded."

During the conversation about the project, it was pointed out that it would not be completed in time to provide relief to residents of that area before summer's end.

Also concerning water, council members approved a request from Roy Robertson to purchase water at his property at Southgate Garden, an area directly south of the city and east of FM 368.

Robertson agreed to have a two-inch line extended from his nearest neighbor's line, a distance of some 610 feet, at his own estimated cost of \$605.

Administrator James Barrington

explained a problem Little League officials had in maintaining control over the girls' softball complex on Bell Road, as the reason for asking the council to consider a lease agreement.

The city has an agreement with Little League, giving that organization control of the new field on West Highway, during season. No unauthorized persons are allowed on the field during season.

However, it had only been presumed that authority had been given to girls' softball in the past, when it had not. The field is currently listed by its owner, the city, as a community park area.

A recently-approved agreement with Little League on the new field will be amended to include the girls' softball field.

The amended agreement is to be given to the council for approval at the next regular meeting, and then submitted to Little League for its approval.

A minor change in the recently-approved ordinance concerning train speeds through the city was approved.

The change permits westbound trains to increase speeds once the engine(s) have passed Jackson Street. The wording of the other ordinance was when the train, meaning the last car, had passed Jackson.

Railroad officials had requested the change in order for westbound trains to begin picking up speed earlier, in order to more easily make the incline to the west of town.

One topic likely to be on the next regular city meeting will be to consider offering trash pickup to homes outside the city that are now purchasing water from the city.

Alderman Crawford requested it be included on the agenda. He had taken up the subject, but Mayor House cut off discussion.

Aldermen have scheduled another work session on next year's budget for 7 p.m. Monday. It will be held in Burnett Memorial Library.

was to be administered to Randy Catlin, who was elected to the board last month, and the annual reorganization of the board held.

Resignations and employment of new personnel are on Tuesday night's agenda, as well as considering bus routes for the 1990-91 school year, and considering requests for student transfers.

A public hearing on expenditures of Chapter 2 funds next year will be held, and trustees are expected to appoint Supt. Glen Mitchell to the Region Nine advisory committee.

Other listings on the meeting's tentative agenda include reports on district taxes and cafeteria.

Iowa Park school trustees were to hold an emergency meeting Wednesday night, and are to hold a regular meeting at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday.

Last night's meeting was to act on awarding a contract on the junior high school construction project, which was halted after it was noted state-required advertisements had not been completed, even though a contractor was already set up at the site.

Wednesday's meeting agenda also called for changes of easements and right of way for TU Electric and Southwestern Bell Telephone, for work connected with construction at the high school building.

June gets off to soggy start

The month of June started off extremely wet, forcing high school graduation exercises indoors, but has cleared to allow wheat harvest to get underway.

Iowa Park has received 4.01 inches, most of which fell Friday, according to Virgil Woodfin's measurements.

The heaviest of the rains fell in

the early morning hours Friday, and again about mid-morning, depositing 3.55 inches by afternoon, Woodfin reported.

Wet conditions, and the threat of additional rainfall Friday night, forced graduation exercises to be held in the auditorium of Iowa Park High School.

It was only the second time since the ceremonies were begun in

Hawk Stadium that graduates were forced to use their allotted tickets for family members and guests. This year's seniors were limited to eight tickets.

Despite the heavy rains, however, some wheat harvesting was begun Monday in the area, and crews were busy over the entire area by Tuesday afternoon.



TWO MESSES resulted when a truck loaded with 30,000 pounds of wheat overturned at the FM 368 and Lafayette curve Monday afternoon. Firemen hauled the flow of diesel fuel and motor oil in the ditch and city personnel used heavy equipment to clear the street and yards of the spilled grain. The truck was owned by Kent Wasielewski of Bushnell, Neb., and driven by Ronald S. Cortney, 17, of Kimball, Neb. The driver was shaken, but not injured.

Four persons arrested; search for elusive man

Four persons were arrested during the past week by Iowa Park police, and a search is on for another who is wanted for aggravated assault, according to the police blotter.

It was an extremely busy week for the department, but primarily on calls relating to domestic disturbances and cases of harrassments by telephone calls, none of which has yet resulted in formal complaints.

Officers were called to 310 W. Bank at 11:30 p.m. Monday, where a domestic disturbance was reported.

When they arrived, they attempted to take George D. Ray, 17, into custody. During a confrontation with officers, Linda Mae Koerth, 46, reportedly attempted to intervene, with a large wrench.

As the officers' attention was diverted to Koerth, Ray escaped, and is being sought on a warrant for aggravated assault on Officer Mike Stark, who suffered an injury to his nose, broken eye glasses and torn uniform.

Koerth was not only arrested on a charge of hindering apprehension, but resisting arrest and aggravated assault.

She was transported at 1:25 a.m. Tuesday to county jail.

The first arrest of the past week was at 1:51 a.m. Thursday, when

Mark Allen Conyers, 30, was taken into custody in the 100 block of East Highway on a charge of public intox-

ication. He was released at 6:15 a.m.

School, church projects make permit total jump

Building permits for major school projects and a church addition issued by the city during May have elevated the year's total well over \$1-million.

In fact, the total for the year is almost three times the \$488,578 for the same five-month period of 1989.

May's total was \$1,081,667, which raised the year to \$1,365,157.

Three of the permits issued to the school are for the bond-financed work that was approved by voters of the district.

Lakeview Church of God asked a permit to construct a new gymnasium. The original structure's gym reportedly will be converted into smaller classrooms and storage.

centerpiece fashioned of pink and dusty rose flowers, accented with greenery. Each table was draped with an ivory lace tablecloth.

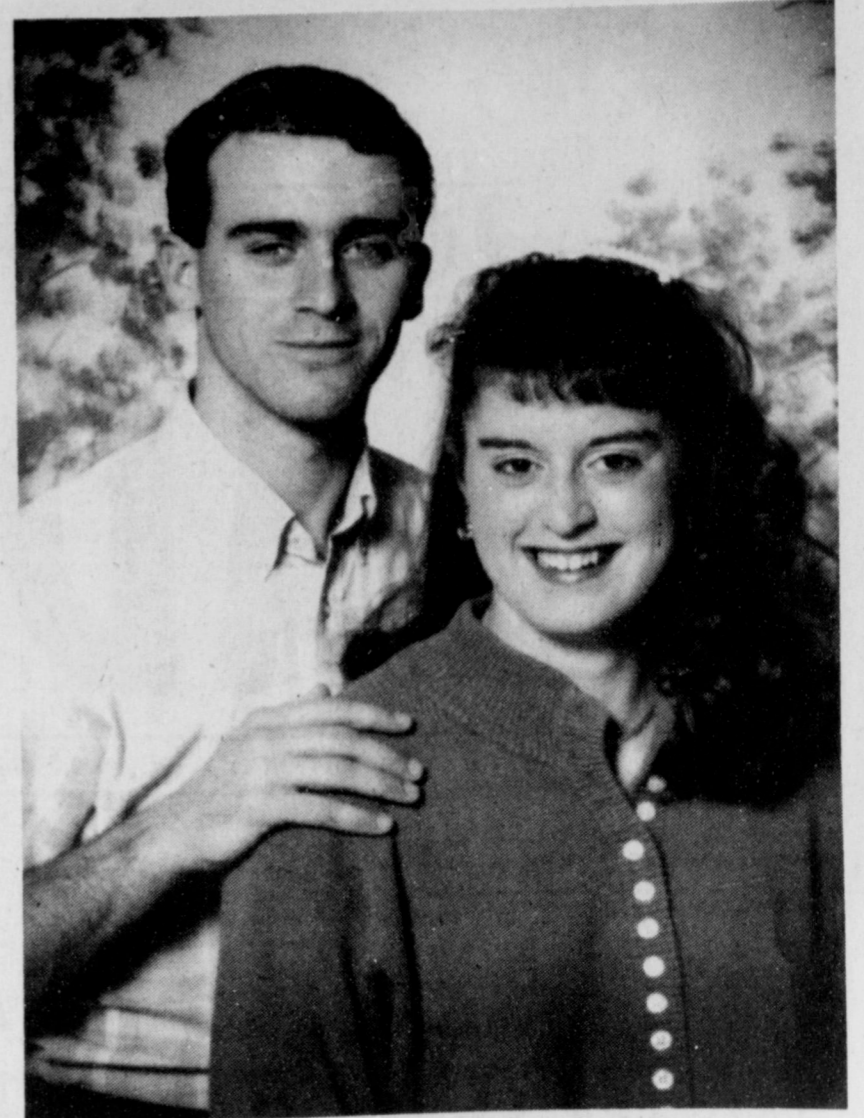

'Jail Ministry' program topic

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
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
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


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As I See It...

If you want to record some history of Iowa Park, get your cameras out by this weekend and take a picture of the old water tower behind city hall.

It's coming down. The tower, which has been Iowa Park's most visible landmark since it was erected around 1919, has been sold to the community of Woodson, down in the southeast corner of Throckmorton County.

The demolition crew began draining the water Wednesday, and workers are expected to begin cutting it apart today or Friday.

It could take as long as two weeks for the removal to be completed.

I hate it when any landmark as visible as the tower disappears, but after having sat through all the city council meetings concerning the sale of the tower, as well as problems in the past, I really have no argument with the city's action.

Those problems really began back when the Johnson Road tower was constructed. The engineer made a major mistake which rendered both the city hall tower and the one that was at Gordon Lake virtually useless.

And while its sole use has for the past several years been to hold up the city, police and fire radio antennas, that task was displaced when a separate tower was erected.

The cost of retaining the water tower as a base for the antennas was far greater, in the long-term, than the erection of a free new tower, a gift from Wichita Falls. We're talking major bucks whenever that old tower is painted.

Travelers for many years depended on the names painted on water towers to know which town they were passing through.

Knowing the future of the old water tower was in question, I was one of those who pushed hard for the Burnett home to be preserved as our city's library.

And I was delighted when the Evening Lions Club purchased the old Tanner building, as well as DeWayne Williams buying the old Overbey building. Both of them are on our Cash Street block.

Retaining landmarks is impor-

tant to any community or area, whenever possible.

But, we've gotta say goodbye to Iowa Park's old water tower, and hope, for the people of Woodson, it serves them as well and long as it has the citizens of Iowa Park.

And, though a lot of people don't know it, those same water towers were guides and locaters for aviators, before radios and radar took over.

Combine eggs, spinach, sour cream, peppers and carrots; mix lightly. Top muffin halves with egg mixture, process cheese spread and bacon. Broil until process cheese spread begins to melt. Makes 8 sandwiches.

FRANKS IN A LOAF

6 frankfurters
6 julienne strips Cheddar or American cheese or 2 Tbsp. sweet relish or catsup
1 cup Bisquick baking mix
1/4 cup milk
1 tsp. parsley flakes
1 egg

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Grease a 9x5x3 loaf pan. Split frankfurters lengthwise, not cutting completely through. Fill each with a strip of cheese or about 1 tsp. relish or catsup.

Mix remaining ingredients with fork; beat vigorously 30 seconds. Spread in pan. Arrange frankfurters crosswise on dough in pan, curving slightly and pressing to fit pan. Press into dough slightly.

Bake until bread is light brown, about 20 minutes. To serve, cut bread between frankfurters. Six servings.

MINI-MINCEMEAT NUT CAKES

1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened
1/3 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar
3 eggs

2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1 tsp baking powder
1/2 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. salt
1 (14 oz.) can sweetened condensed milk
1 (28 oz.) jar commercial mincemeat
2 cups chopped walnuts

Cream butter; gradually add sugar, beating well at medium speed of an electric mixer. Add eggs, one at a time, beating after each addition.

Combine flour and next 3 ingredients; add to creamed mixture alternately with condensed milk, beginning and ending with flour mixture. Mix just until blended after each addition. Stir in mincemeat and walnuts.

Spoon batter into paper-lined miniature (1 3/4-inch) muffin pans, filling three-fourths full. Bake at 350 degrees 20 minutes or until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Remove from pans, and cool completely on wire racks. Yield: 16 dozen.

Note: Nut cakes may be baked and frozen.

COFFEE 'N' SPICE PECANS

1 Tbsp. instant coffee granules
1/2 cup sugar

1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon
Dash of salt
1/4 cup water
3 cups pecan halves, toasted
Combine first 5 ingredients in a medium saucepan, stirring until sugar dissolves. Add pecans, and bring to a boil. Cook 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Spoon onto wax paper, separating pecans with a fork. Store in an airtight container. Yield: 3 cups.

OATMEAL MONSTER COOKIES

1 lb. butter
2 lbs. brown sugar
4 cups white sugar
12 eggs
1 Tbsp. vanilla
1 Tbsp. corn syrup
8 tsp. soda
3 lbs. peanut butter
18 cups oatmeal
1 lb. M&M's
1 lb. chocolate chips
Mix butter, sugars, eggs, vanilla, syrup and soda. Stir in peanut butter, oats, M&M's and chips. Bake at 350 degrees 12-15 minutes.

He assumed his duties May 6 after leaving a similar post at the First Baptist Church of Sayre, Okla.

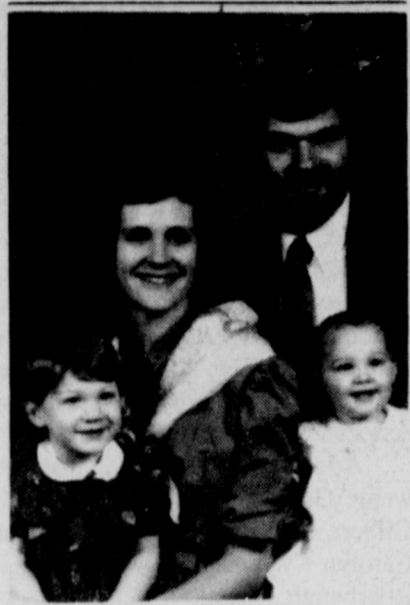
Gallant, 27, and his wife Kathy, have two daughters, Jessica Autumn and Rachel Rene.

THINK ABOUT THIS!

Once upon a time a wise architect hired a group of carpenters, bricklayers, plumbers, etc. to gather their materials, prepare them and bring them together on an acreage for he was going to build a huge castle. As they were doing their work, many people were thrilled. As they walked through the stacks of material, certain warnings were posted throughout the aisles of unassembled parts of the castle. Signs were posted that informed viewers of the coming castle. The wise architect sent messengers throughout the immediate area informing people that the castle would soon be built. Explanations were given on how to enter the castle and proper etiquette on how to act in the castle when it is built.

People pressed unto it and waited with great excitement. Others mocked this promise and preparation. After a long time when everything was in order, the wise architect paid the high price for the castle, gave the keys to the workers, and unveiled the finished, completed castle. For the first time ever, details were given on how to enter the huge castle which just came into existence.

Much of the Old Testament and especially the books of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John in the New Testament, tell of the prophecy and preparation of the coming kingdom of God, the church. While preparation was being made and its nature was being set in order, people reacted differently toward it. When taught that the kingdom of God was at hand (Matthew 3:2; 4:17), some caused it to suffer violence (Matthew 11:12). Some pressed into it (Luke 16:16); that is, they were heeding the teaching of John the Baptizer, Christ, and the apostles in getting ready for the church, the kingdom which would soon be established. Others were hindered from entering the knowledge (Luke 11:52) which the apostles preached of the coming kingdom. Other passages such as "tell it unto the church" (Matthew 18:17), how to enter the kingdom of God (John 3:1-7), were pointing to the Pentecost, the day when the kingdom of God, the church was established. If one can understand the preparation, the gathering of materials, and the people's reactions, in building a castle, maybe he can understand the preparatory work of John the Baptizer, Christ, and the apostles for the establishment of the church. Think about it.

Heart transplant recipient speaks to local Optimists

Buddy Vise, a heart transplant recipient, was speaker for a recent meeting of the Optimist Club.

Vise, who underwent the transplant March 18, 1989, said he found out about his heart problems after consulting a physician for what he thought were allergies and pneumonia.

He did have pneumonia, but during the second visit, the doctor told him he had heart problems. "It was just worn out," said fifty-two year old Vise.

Vise said anyone who has a need is eligible for a transplant, but you must either have good insurance or about forty to seventy thousand dollars up front. He estimated that a heart transplant today cost somewhere in the neighborhood of \$225,000.

He said that when a person becomes eligible for a transplant, he must be able to walk into the

hospital, where the operation will take place, within two hours. He said he and his wife moved into a one room apartment in Dallas, about 15 minutes from the hospital.
