City council meeting set for Monday

One of two meetings scheduled for the city council next week will be a regular business session, to start at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Two of the agenda topics are carryovers from the council's last meeting: group medical coverage and a lease agreement with Little League for the girls' softball field.

Aldermen will consider bids that have been received for medical coverage for all city employees. Bids were sought after the current carrier noted a 32-percent increase would be required for the same coverage next year.

In order to give exclusive use of the girls' softball fields, located on Bell Road, to the Little League during playing season, a lease agreement will be required, it was pointed out.

League officials had asked one unauthorized group to leave recently, they refused, and police were asked to enforce the officials' demands. They did, but later determined there was no formal authority for the action.

A formal agreement, as an amendment to the League's lease of the Senior League field, will be acted on Monday.

The council will consider authorizing a proposal to advertise for bids to lay a new water line on Cash Street that was planned to be done by city employees. Due to an increased demand on available workers, council will consider the project to be done by a commercial firm.

Also on the meeting's tentative agenda is a proposal to advertise for bids to sell the city's 1950 model fire truck, which was displaced by the purchase of a new pumper truck.

A proposal that the council set a policy requiring broken sewer line repairs on private property will be considered Monday.

City workers have determined a considerable amount of water infiltrating the sewer system during heavy rain periods is entering the main system through private line breaks.

Sewer plant, landfill main study subjects

Sewer treatment plant repairs and the future of the city's landfill operation highlighted Monday's planning workshop held by the city council.

The meeting, one of a series by the council to discuss needs of the city and their effect on the 1990-91 budget, was held at the Tom Burnett Memorial Library. Another session was set for next Tuesday.

A section of the treatment plant is in serious need of repairs, because it reduces the plant's capacity. But, because it is in a submerged area and a complete shutdown of the facility is one means of repairing it, council members face a dilemma.

No backup system for such repairs was built into the plant when it was constructed some 17 years ago.

June sales tax shows gain

Iowa Park's sales tax rebate this month, \$11,414.34, was a 6.12-percent increase over last June's check of \$10,756.17, but for the year, the city has received less than in 1989.

The city had received \$82,234 at this time last year, but to date the 1990 checks amount to \$79,740.79, according to the state comptroller's office.

Plant superintendent Bural Yoder has offered to utilize his Navy experience as a deep sea diver, if equipment is provided, to do the work. But no decision was reached.

Among the alternatives being considered is to construct a smaller, lower-capacity plant.

Public works supervisor Mike Price suggested to the council that if the city is to participate in a regional trash landfill, preliminary work must be initiated in a very short time.

All landfill owners are facing a federal mandate which will require an extremely expensive program for closing landfill pits after the end of 1990, he has often pointed out.

A regional landfill is being planned in Archer County, but certification of the site, as well as its opera-

tion, will not be completed until about 1994.

It has been proposed that one of the municipalities in the area must offer its landfill as a temporary site for the participating entities, which would allow them to close their own sites before the deadline.

Iowa Park and Burkburnett have both been suggested by a regional planning committee, of which Price is a member.

Because Burkburnett's site is larger, Price has said the committee is suggesting it be used.

Landfills not closed by the deadline will require, whenever closed, to have several test wells drilled, as well as an extremely expensive program of keeping on deposit enough money to pay for a cleanup project should any contamination of that area be determined in the future.

Administrator James Barrington suggested quick, 60-90 day, action on deciding whether to participate in the regional concept and all related plans for that operation.

Aldermen asked Mayor Wayne House to have the subject on the next regular council meeting, which will be Monday, so action might be officially taken.

RAGING FLAMES, pushed by hard winds, scorched some 45 acres of unharvested wheat Wednesday of last week at the Linda Hicks farm, west of Iowa Park. Apparently ignited by welders laying a Lone Star Gas pipeline, the flames also posed a serious threat to the



Construction, personnel get school board action

School trustees, meeting for the second time in less than a week, Tuesday night heard a progress report on construction projects, accepted two resignations and hired two persons.

At their called meeting Wednesday night of last week, trustees approved bids for construction work at the junior high school, as well as swearing in newly-elected trustees and reorganizing the board.

Architect Don Daugherty said the new bids on the Kidwell Elementary building project are to be opened at 3 p.m. Thursday of next week, and new bids will be sought for the sheep and cattle barn buildings at the school's agriculture facility.

Otherwise, work is well underway at the high school, junior high, Bradford Elementary, and football fieldhouse, as well as asbestos removal work at the high school and two

elementary campuses, Daugherty said.

Veteran teacher Patsy Todd's resignation was accepted, as was Janet Walker's.

Mrs. Todd, junior high English teacher, pointed out in her letter that she has been associated with Iowa Park schools 30 years, 23 as a regular instructor and seven as a substitute.

"Because of my many other interests and the forthcoming events in my family life, I feel that my resignation would be in the best interest of all concerned," she wrote.

Miss Walker, choir teacher, said in her letter she has accepted a graduate assistanceship at Hardin-Simmons Univ., where she will pursue a masters degree.

Susan Mollett, who had earlier this spring resigned her post as a special education resource room teacher, was hired to fill a position as second grade teacher at Kidwell.

Also hired to fill the vacancy of administration building secretary Georgia Moore was Angie Covington.

In other business Tuesday, the board approved expenditures of Chapter Two federal funds for next year; two freshman transfers from the City View district, making a total for next year of 48; approved appointment of Supt. Glen Mitchell to the Region Nine advisory board, and approved a report stating all school bus routes for the 1990-91 school year would remain the same as the past year.

Tax collector Allen Shewmake said collections for the school district were 96.73 percent complete, and 95.94 for the city. He also pointed out that the state-mandated penalty on unpaid current taxes will be increased to 33 percent if not paid by the end of June.

At last week's meeting, trustees approved a bid of \$725,185 for construction work at the junior high school, submitted by Buchanan Construction of Wichita Falls.

Because of an oversight on advertising for bids on the project, work which had begun was delayed until the formal bidding process was completed.

Supt. Mitchell said the bid was exactly the same as Buchanan had previously given, and was again the lowest of several bids received on the project.

Oaths of office were given to Keith Fisher and Randy Catlin, both of whom were winners in the May trustee election.

A plaque was presented to outgoing trustee Don Decker, in recognition of his service on the board.

During the reorganization of the board, all three officials, president Jerry Reed, vice president John Sibley and secretary Sheri Kennedy, were re-elected.

Supt. Mitchell told the board Tuesday he had not received any official information from the state concerning the effect of the recently-passed school reform legislation.

He said he hoped to have that information for the July meeting.

Trustees in the past have not held meetings in July, but because of construction and the reform bill, they plan to meet at least once that month.

Police activities reflected in blotter

It was one of those "full moon weeks" for Iowa Park police, with five arrests, four burglary or theft cases, two criminal mischief complaints, and an assault still under

investigation.

Almost every time the moon turns full, law enforcement officers expect their activities to pick up, and they usually do.

The first of the arrests listed on the police blotter for the week was that of George D. Ray, 17, who was wanted for aggravated assault on a police officer and resisting arrest in relation to a case a week earlier.

Ray turned himself in at the police station Thursday morning, was booked and transported to county jail.

Officers took Chad Eric Ashford, 17, into custody at 1:46 a.m. Friday in the area of Washington and Bond, on a public intoxication charge.

A resident of the 300 block of East Alameda had complained that a man had been setting gasoline afire in the street, and running off. Police believe Ashford was the suspect.

Police responded to an emergency call to a home in the 400 block of South Texowa at 1:57 p.m. Friday, and arrested Todd Edward Ledbetter, 22, and Pamela Gaye Collier, 23, on charges of criminal trespass and criminal mischief.

The two were transported to county jail, but Tuesday the complainant informed police of wanting to drop charges.

Ledbetter, however, had since been bonded out of jail, and then arrested by Wichita Falls police on several charges after a chase that ended in Clay County.

Officers responded at 2:57 a.m. Saturday to the 700 block of East Washington, where a car had reportedly been abandoned in the middle of the street.

Upon arriving, they found the driver, Peter Francis Hobor, 21, asleep. He was taken to the station on a charge of public intoxication.

While booking Hobor in at the station, however, a small plastic bag containing less than one ounce of marijuana was found in his pants

pocket, so an additional charge of possession was filed against him, according to the report.

Hobor was later transported to county jail.

Vehicle stereo systems apparently are the goal of thieves, as two complaints were filed of thefts.

The first complaint filed was Wednesday of last week. Someone got into an unlocked vehicle during the previous night, while parked in the 100 block of West Aldine, and took a dash-mounted system.

Tuesday, the second complaint was filed when a resident in the 200 block of West Alameda told police someone had forced their way into a locked garage, and removed a dash-

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR WASTE DISCHARGE PERMIT RENEWAL

CITY OF IOWA PARK, 103 North Wall Street, Iowa Park, Texas 76367 has applied to the Texas Water Commission for renewal of Permit No. 10691-02 which authorizes a discharge of treated domestic wastewater effluent at a volume not to exceed an average flow of 1,000,000 gallons per day. A portion of the treated effluent may be used to irrigate a 52-acre golf course at an application rate not to exceed 3.2 acre-feet/acre/year. The wastewater treatment facilities are southwest of the City of Iowa Park, approximately 0.25 mile west of Farm-to-Market 368 and 1 mile north of Farm-to-Market 367 in Wichita County, Texas. The effluent is discharged into an unnamed tributary of Buffalo Creek; thence to Buffalo Creek; thence to the Wichita River in Segment No. 0214 of the Red River Basin.

In accordance with the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards, the Commission staff must determine the existing uses for the receiving water in the area of the proposed discharge. The unclassified receiving waters of the unnamed tributary and Buffalo Creek have limited aquatic life uses. The designated uses for Segment No. 0214 are contact recreation and high quality aquatic habitat. The effluent limitations in the draft permit will maintain and protect the existing instream uses. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or revisions.

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved by the Commission, will specify conditions and limitations generally the same as those currently enforced by the existing permit except that effluent limitations for minimum dissolved oxygen concentration have been added. Effective July 1, 1991, provisions for dechlorinating the chlorinated effluent will be added. It is proposed that the

expiration date of the renewed permit be specified as midnight, five years after date of Commission approval.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code and 31 TAC Chapter 305 of the Rules of the Texas Water Commission.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application has requested a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and phone number of the person making the request; and (2) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the application, or that a public hearing, would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 30 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.

A trip made by the physics class at Iowa Park High School, and the Boy Scouts were topics for programs given at a recent meeting of the Iowa Park Optimist Club.

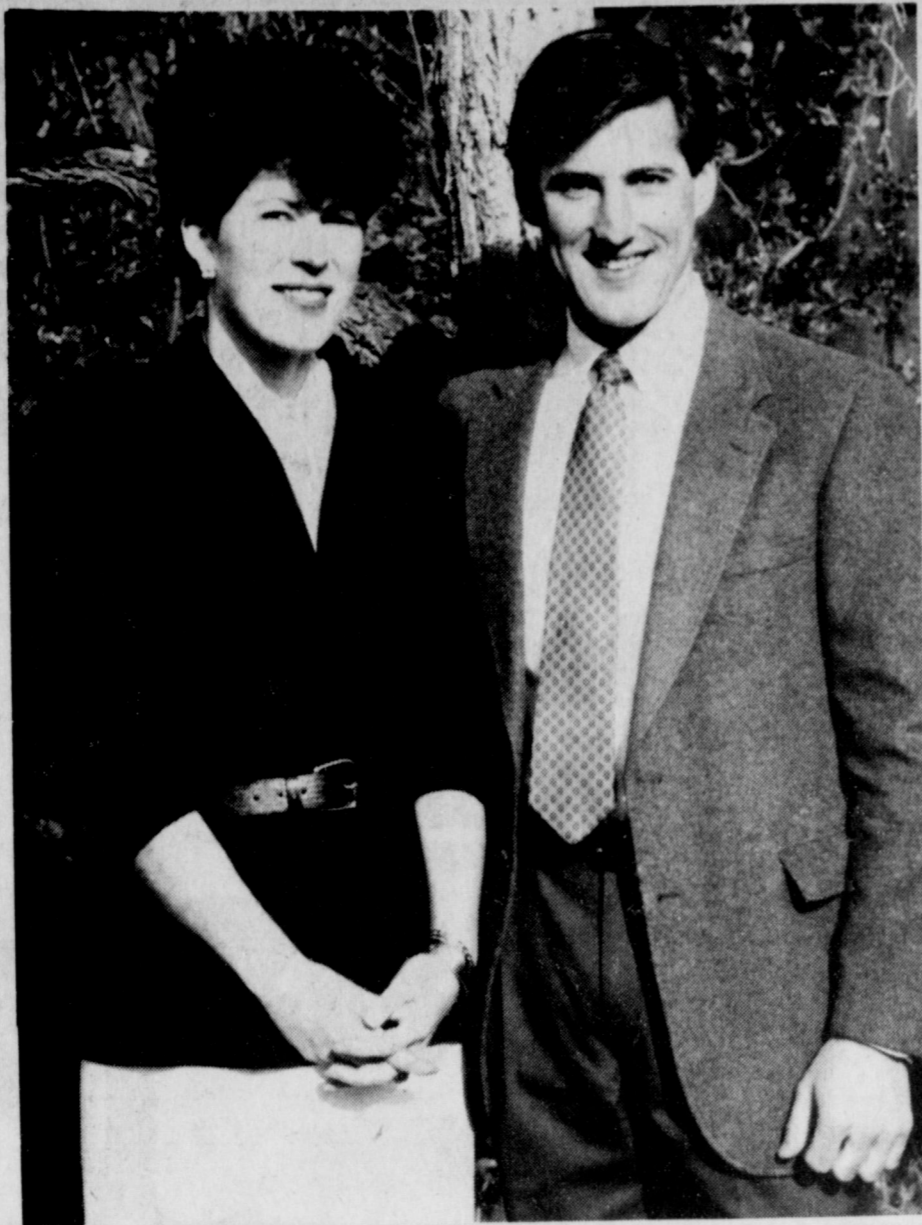
Diana Collins, high school physics teacher, told of a trip she and three of her students took to Los Alamos, N.M.

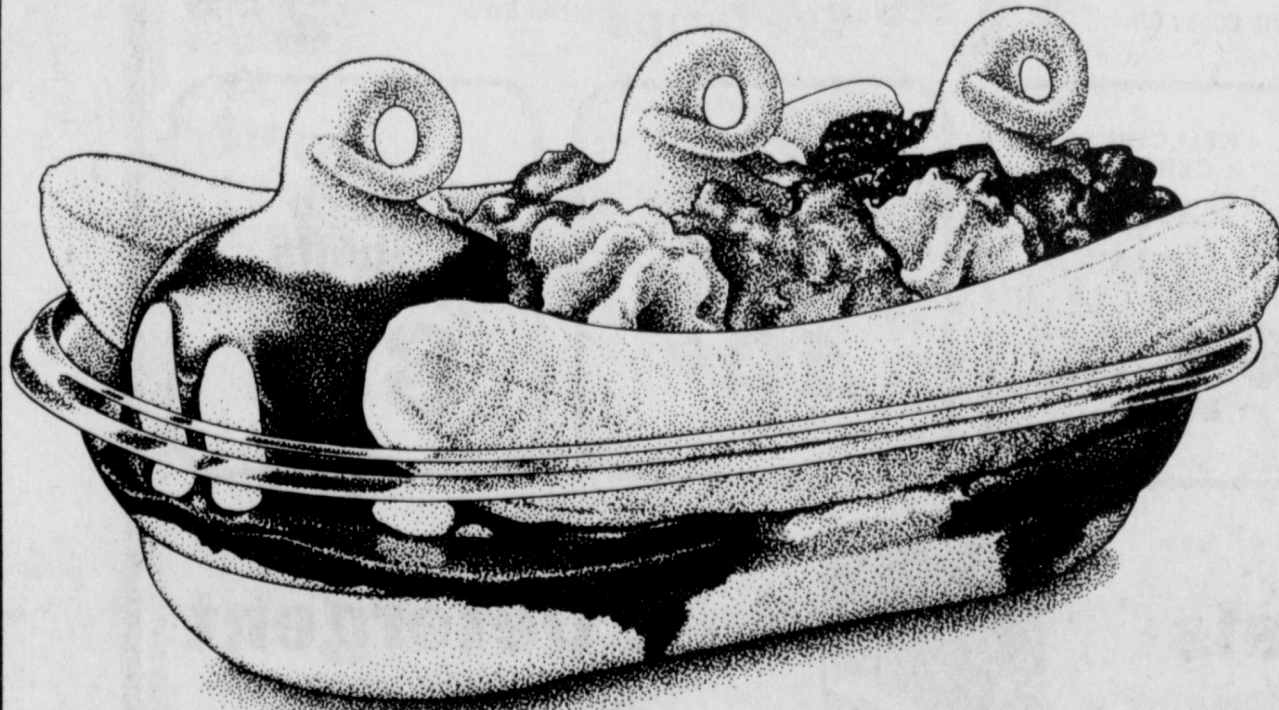

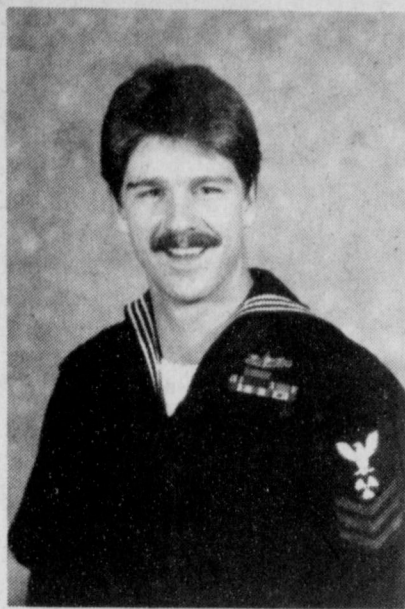

In a bowl, lightly beat eggs, about one for each person. Pour the eggs over potatoes, then crumble in the bacon and stir. Add salt and pepper.

- 3 lb. chicken
- 3 lb. American cheese
- 1 large onion

6 jalapeno peppers

Salt and pepper
Cook chicken and save stock. Cut chicken in slivers. Chop onion and garlic. Stir into sour cream. Dilute sour cream with some of the chicken stock. Grate cheese. Slice green pepper. Cut jalapeno in strips, discard seeds.

Soften tortillas in hot grease and drain. Place chicken on tortilla, sprinkle cheese. Roll up. Fill a baking dish this way. Place sliced green pepper, jalapeno, grated cheese, salt and paprika over layer. Pour some of sour cream over. Make another layer on top.

Refrigerate 8 hours (overnite?). Heat at 350 degrees until hot thru.

YOGURT OATMEAL MUFFINS

That heavenly aroma coming from a kitchen in Florida will make you say "I've got to have that recipe." Here it is.

- Preheat oven to 375 degrees.
- 2 cups oatmeal
- 1 pint yogurt, plain
- 2 cups brown sugar
- 2/3 cups butter, soft
- 4 eggs
- 2 cups flour
- 2 t. baking powder
- 1 t. baking soda
- 1 t. salt

Mix oatmeal with yogurt and let stand. Cream sugar and butter. Add eggs one at a time. Stir in the oatmeal mixture. Sift together: flour, baking powder, baking soda, and salt. Stir into mixture. Spoon into greased muffin tins. Bake about 25 minutes. Makes 2 dozen.

Serve with rice.

AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Texaco, operating out of Velma, Okla., has completed two new producers with combined ability to pump over 70 barrels of oil per day in the Wichita Regular Field.

The wells include the No. 131 W.B. Honaker, located 2.5 miles northeast of Electra, and the No. 133 W.P. and J.F. Bickley, two miles northeast of Electra.

They potentialed at 45 and 26 barrels of oil per day, respectively. Water production totaled 130 and 281 barrels per day.

Texaco perforated for production ranging from 475 to 1,803 feet into the hole. Both wells have three production intervals.

Exmoor Oil of Dallas has filed first production figures for three new oilers in the Wichita Regular Field, six miles north of Iowa Park.

Making 16, five and 16 barrels of oil per day, respectively, the wells will be known as the No. 179, 180 and 181 Ruyle Unit "E". Water production ranged between five and 60 barrels daily.

The wells were perforated to produce at 600 to 610 feet (Nos. 179 and 180) and at 1,715 to 1,725 feet (No. 179).

Operating out of Irving, Tri-Core Oil and Gas has posted first production figures for the No. 3 Roberts "T" in the Wichita Regular Field, nine miles west of Burkburnett.

The well potentialed at five barrels of oil per day, pumping from perforations 1,570 to 1,575 feet into the wellbore.

Water production totaled about 50 barrels daily.

The No. 2 Glenn Cato is scheduled for spudding in the Wichita Regular Field, about six miles southeast of Electra. It carries permit for 2,000 feet of hole with Tom Swanson, independent from Electra, as the operator. The location is in the T&NORR Survey A-316.

Tom Swanson of Electra has driven stake for a 2,000-ft. developmental bid in the Wichita Regular Field, eight miles southeast of Electra. It will be known as the No. 60 Burnett "D," with drillsite in the SA&MGRR Survey A-271.

An 8,600-ft. wildcat well is scheduled to be drilled in Wilbarger County by Corda Corp. of Wichita Falls.

Designated as the No. 1 Souris, the venture is in the H&TCRR Survey A-47 Section 41 Block 10, about three miles southeast of Chillicothe. Location is 519 feet from the east line and 1,869 feet from the south line of the survey.

Location has been staked for the No. 15 Munger Farm in the Wichita Regular Field, 1.3 miles north of Kamay. Don R. Talley of Holliday will be the operator. Carrying permit for 1,990-ft. maximum hole, the well is in the KWVFL Survey 24 Lot 18.

At a location nine miles southeast of Electra, Tom Swanson of Electra is preparing to make hole for a 2,000-ft. developmental bid in the Wichita Regular Field. It will be known as the No. 23 Burnett "E" and is situated in the G.R. Meade Survey A-464.

The No. 1 Preston has been written off as a dry hole venture in the Wichita Regular Field, seven miles southwest of Burkburnett. It probed to total depth of 1,320 feet with no commercial shows. Location was in the O. Parish Survey A-383. J.F. Hood of Fort Worth was the operator.

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for the No. 7 Lydia Daume in the Wichita Regular Field, 1.5 miles north of Holliday. It probed to a dry bottom at 1,875 feet in the SPRR Survey A-1 ABB Drilling of Wichita Falls was the operator.

Two shallow developmental wells are slated in Hardeman County's Chillicothe Field, four miles south of Chillicothe. Kadane Oil of Wichita Falls is the operator. Carrying permit for 375 feet of hole, the wells are designated as the No. 7 and No. 8 Schmoker-Lambert-Tabor Unit "R". The No. 7 is 668 feet from the west line and 2,131 feet from the south line of the survey, while the No. 8 is 165 feet from the west line and 1,371 feet from the south line of the H&TCRR Survey A-1058.

County farmers eligible for emergency loans

Wichita County was recently declared eligible for Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) disaster emergency loans as a result of actual production and physical losses caused by severe storms, flooding and tornadoes occurring April 15.

Joe Gilbreath said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 per-

cent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less.

"As a general rule, eligibility is extended to farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest; who are unable to obtain suffi-

cient credit elsewhere to finance actual needs; who have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production or a qualifying physical loss (must be an essential part of farming operation), who had multi-peril crop insurance coverage on the affected crop, and who have adequate security for the loan," Gilbreath said.

Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their losses.

Applications for loans under the emergency designation will be accepted for Wichita County through Jan. 24, 1991.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living.

Dallas area getting new phone code

A new area code, 903, will be introduced later this year impacting calling habits for everyone calling locations north, east and southeast areas of the Dallas metro area, according to Dan Adams, Southwestern Bell manager in Vernon.

The area code for the immediate area in and around Dallas and 30 nearby cities will be unchanged and remain 214.

"Our studies indicated sometime back we will be running out of numbers in the 214 area code late in 1991, and we've experienced renewed

economic growth since that time," Adams said.

"The new demand for numbers, coupled with an already exhausting supply, brought about the need for the new 903 area code."

For several months after the Nov. 4 conversion, calls made to the old area code number will still be completed.

But after a transitional period, it will be necessary for everyone to start using the new 903 code. Calls to the old 214 number will not go through after a few months.



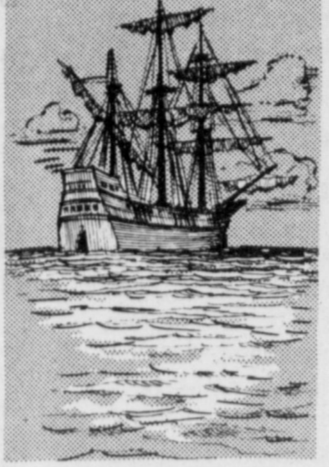

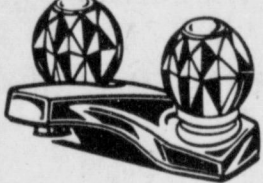
