Construction, personnel get school board action

School trustees, meeting for the second time in less than a week, Tuesday night heard a progress report on construction projects, accepted two resignations and hired two

At their called meeting Wednesday night of last week, trustees approved bids for construction work at the junior high school, as well as swearing in newly-elected trustees and reorganizing the board.

Architect Don Daugherity said the new bids on the Kidwell Elementary building project are to be opened at 3 p.m. Thursday of next week, and new bids will be sought for the sheep and cattle barn buildings at the school's agriculture facility.

Otherwise, work is well underway at the high school, junior high, Bradford Elementary, and football fieldhouse, as well as asbestos removal work at the high school and two elementary campuses, Daugherity said.

Veteran teacher Patsy Todd's resignation was accepted, as was Janet Walker's.

Mrs. Todd, junior high English teacher, pointed out in her letter that she has been associated with Iowa Park schools 30 years, 23 as a regular instructor and seven as a substi-

"Because of my many other interests and the forthcoming events in my family life, I feel that my resignation would be in the best interest of all concerned," she wrote.

Miss Walker, choir teacher, said in her letter she has accepted a graduate assistanceship at Hardin-Simmons Univ., where she will pursue a masters degree.

Susan Mollett, who had earlier this spring resigned her post as a special education resource room teacher, was hired to fill a position as second grade teacher at Kidwell.

Also hired to fill the vacancy of administration building secretary Georgia Moore was Angie Coving-

In other business Tuesday, the board approved expenditures of Chapter Two federal funds for next year; two freshman transfers from the City View district, making a total for next year of 48; approved appointment of Supt. Glen Mitchell to the Region Nine advisory board, and approved a report stating all school bus routes for the 1990-91 school year would remain the same as the past year.

Tax collector Allen Shewmake said collections for the school district were 96.73 percent complete, and 95.94 for the city. He also pointed out that the state-mandated penalty on unpaid current taxes will be increased to 33 percent if not paid by the end of June.

At last week's meeting, trustees approved a bid of \$725,185 for construction work at the junior high school, submitted by Buchanan Construction of Wichita Falls.

Because of an oversight on advertising for bids on the project, work which had begun was delayed until the formal bidding process was completed.

Supt. Mitchell said the bid was exactly the same as Buchanan had previously given, and was again the lowest of several bids received on the

Oaths of office were given to Keith Fisher and Randy Catlin, both of whom were winners in the May trustee election.

A plaque was presented to outgoing trustee Don Decker, in recognition of his service on the board.

During the reorganization of the board, all three officials, president Jerry Reed, vice president John Sibley and secretary Sheri Kennedy, were

re-elected. Supt. Mitchell told the board Tuesday he had not received any official information from the state concerning the effect of the recently-

passed school reform legislation. He said he hoped to have that

information for the July meeting. Trustees in the past have not held meetings in July, but because of construction and the reform bill, they plan to meet at least once that month.

City council meeting set for Monday

One of two meetings scheduled for the city council next week will be a regular business session, to start at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Two of the agenda topics are carryovers from the council's last meeting: group medical coverage and a lease agreement with Little League for the girls' softball field.

Aldermen will consider bids that have been received for medical coverage for all city employees. Bids were sought after the current carrier noted a 32-percent increase would be required for the same coverage next year.

In order to give exclusive use of the girls' softball fields, located on Bell Road, to the Little League during playing season, a lease agreement will be required, it was pointed out.

League officials had asked one unauthorized group to leave recently, they refused, and police were asked to enforce the officials' demands. They did, but later determined there was no formal authority for the action.

A formal agreement, as an amendment to the League's lease of the Senior League field, will be acted

on Monday. The council will consider authorizing a proposal to advertise for bids to lay a new water line on Cash Street that was planned to be done by city employees. Due to an increased demand on available workers, council will consider the project to be done by a commercial firm.

Also on the meeting's tentative agenda is a proposal to advertise for bids to sell the city's 1950 model fire truck, which was displaced by the purchase of a new pumper truck.

A proposal that the council set a policy requiring broken sewer line repairs on private property will be considered Monday.

City workers have determined a considerable amount of water infiltrating the sewer system during heavy rain periods is entering the main system through private line breaks.

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



We would like to inform you that had it not been for our organization this project might never have found its way to our fine city and the youth thereof. Several years ago our club became very active in the Substance Awareness Program. Through the tireless efforts of one of our members, a program was found whereby young people were sent to seminars for training in this area. At one such seminar, the seniors of Iowa Park High School learned of this program and it was brought back to the Iowa Park School System. This could all have been learned perhaps had the coordinator, Mrs Venhaus, a member of the Iowa Park Optimist Club been ask (sic) for an

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR WASTE DISCHARGE PERMIT RENEWAL

CITY OF IOWA PARK, 103 North Wall Street, Iowa Park, Texas 76367 has applied to the Texas Water Commission for renewal of Permit No. 10691-02 which authorizes a discharge of treated domestic wastewater effluent at a volume not to exceed an average flow of 1,000,000 gallons per day. A portion of the treated effluent may be used to irrigate a 52-acre golf course at an application rate not to exceed 3.2 acre-feet/acre/year. The wastewater treatment facilities are southwest of the City of Iowa Park, approximately 0.25 mile west of Farm-to-Market 368 and 1 mile north of Farm-to-Market 367 in Wichita County, Texas. The effluent is discharged into an unnamed tributary of Buffalo Creek; thence to Buffalo Creek; thence to the Wichita River in Segment No. 0214 of the Red River

In accordance with the Texas Surface Water Ouality Standards, the Commission staff must determine the existing uses for the receiving water in the area of the proposed discharge. The unclassified receiving waters of the unnamed tributary and Buffalo Creek have limited aquatic life uses. The designated uses for Segment No. 0214 are contact recreation and high quality aquatic habitat. The effluent limitations in the draft permit will maintain and protect the existing instream uses. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved by the Commission, will specify conditions and limitations generally the same as those currently enforced by the existing permit except that effluent limitations for minimum dissolved oxygen concentrationhave been added. Effective July 1, 1991, provisions for dechlorinating the chlorinated effluent will be added. It is proposed that the

AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Texaco, operating out of Velma, Okla., has completed two new producers with combined ability to pump over 70 barrels of oil per day in the Wichita Regular Field.

The wells include the No. 131 W.B. Honaker, located 2.5 miles northeast of Electra, and the No. 133 W.P. and J.F. Bickley, two miles northeast of Electra.

They potentialed at 45 and 26 barrels of oil per day, respectively. Water production totaled 130 and 281 barrels per day.

Texaco perforated for production ranging from 475 to 1,803 feet into the hole. Both wells have three production intervals.

Exmoor Oil of Dallas has filed first production figures for three new oilers in the Wichita Regular Field, six miles north of Iowa Park.

Making 16, five and 16 barrels of oil per day, respectively, the wells will be known as the No. 179, 180 and 181 Ruyle Unit "E". Water production ranged between five and 60 barrels daily.

The wells were perforated to produce at 600 to 610 feet (Nos. 179 and 180) and at 1,715 to 1,725 feet (No. 179).

Operating out of Irving, Tri-Core Oil and Gas has posted first production figures for the No. 3 Roberts "T" in the Wichita Regular Field, nine miles west of Burkburnett.

The well potentialed at five barrels of oil per day, pumping from perforations 1,570 to 1,575 feet into the wellbore.

Water production totaled about 50 barrels daily.

The No. 2 Glenn Cato is scheduled for spudding in the Wichita Regular Field, about six miles southeast of Electra. It carries permit for 2,000 feet of hole with Tom Swanson, independent from Electra, as the operator. The location is in the T&NORR Survey A-316.

Tom Swanson of Electra has driven stake for a 2,000-ft. developmental bid in the Wichita Regular Field, eight miles southeast of Electra. It will be known as the No. 60 Burnett "D," with drillsite in the SA&MGRR Survey A-271.

An 8,600-ft. wildcat well is scheduled to be drilled in Wilbarger County by Corda Corp. of Wichita

Designated as the No. 1 Souris, the venture is in the H&TCRR Survey A-47 Section 41 Block 10, about three miles southeast of Chillicothe. Location is 519 feet from the east line and 1,869 feet from the south line of the survey.

Location has been staked for the No. 15 Munger Farm in the Wichita Regular Field, 1.3 miles north of Kamay. Don R. Talley of Holliday will be the operator. Carrying permit for 1,990-ft. maximum hole, the well is in the KWVFL Survey 24

At a location nine miles southeast of Electra, Tom Swanson of Electra is preparing to make hole for a 2,000-ft. developmental bid in the Wichita Regular Field. It will be known as the No. 23 Burnett "E" and is situated in the G.R. Meade Survey A-464.

The No. 1 Preston has been written off as a dry hole venture in the Wichita Regular Field, seven miles southwest of Burkburnett. It probed to total depth of 1,320 feet with no commercial shows. Location was in the O. Parish Survey A-383. J.F. Hood of Fort Worth was the operator.

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for the No. 7 Lydia Daume in the Wichita Regular Field, 1.5 miles north of Holliday. It probed to a dry bottom at 1,875 feet in the SPRR Survey A-1 ABB Drilling of Wichita Falls was the operator.

Two shallow developmental wells are slated in Hardeman County's Chillicothe Field, four miles south of Chillicothe. Kadane Oil of Wichita Falls is the operator. Carrying permit for 375 feet of hole, the wells are designated as the No. 7 and No. 8 Schmoker-Lambert-Tabor Unit "R". The No. 7 is 668 feet from the west line and 2,131 feet from the south line of the survey, while the No. 8 is 165 feet from the west line and 1,371 feet from the south line of the H&TCRR Survey A-1058.
