City workers get okay to stop runoff in sewer

In an effort to further cut down on excessive infiltration of rain water during storms, the city council Monday night approved a proposal to allow city crews to make certain repairs on private property.

Public Works Director Mike Price explained his theory that one of the greatest contributors of rainwater into the sewer lines was by way of improperly sealed lines on private property.

The smoke detection study made during the past couple of years indicated a number of sewer lines on private property had major leaks.

Price suggested most of those leaks were the result of the sewer line being broken, in order to clear out roots and other debris in the line, and not properly sealing the line after the obstruction was cleared.

He said an old practice was to cut a can in half, lay it over the brok-

en pipe area, and cover that back with dirt.

However, most of those patches are in low areas, and under the eaves of home roofs, where runoff is heaviest. There is where much of the rain water is getting into and overloading the city's main sewer lines and treatment plant.

He said the smoke detection study identified approximately 45 leaks on private property throughout the city.

The overloading of the lines, as experienced during the extremely heavy rainfall last spring, caused considerable backing up of sewage into homes and Bradford Elementary, he told the council.

Price said a two-man crew could be dispatched to make repairs on the private sewer lines, and the owners be charged only for the materials, which he said would be approximately \$30.

Going a step further, the council agreed to have that payment, with the homeowner's approval, put on the monthly utility bill and spread it out over a 12-month period.

The public works director told the council that, until such leaks in private lines created a backup into the owner's home, there was really no incentive to have the closure done properly.

Three topics on the meeting's agenda prompted lengthy discussions that took up most of the almost three-hour meeting. They were bids to provide health insurance for employees, a lease agreement with Little League for ballfields, and looping of water lines in the northwest part of the city.

Because the various types of coverages are so complicated, aldermen decided to table any decision for more study.

Two insurance representatives, one from Lubbock and Carmen Lozopone of Iowa Park, made presentations to the council to explain the coverages on which they had bid.

While final contracts are to be rewritten, aldermen agreed in general to enter into contracts with Little League baseball, giving the local group exclusive use and oversight of the Senior League field at West Highway and Third, and girls' softball fields on Atlanta, for a 25-year period.

In an effort to increase water pressure to homes in the northwest part of the city, Price suggested four routes which could be taken.

Materials for the project, if all four routes are utilized, would cost an estimated \$22,300, which does not include labor and equipment.

Chamber eyes Chanute move

As many as 600 families could be making their decision where to live within commuting distance to Sheppard AFB in the next two years, directors of the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce were told Monday.

Those would be the families of military and civil service personnel who will be moved to Sheppard when Chanute AFB is closed under the federal government's cutback of military funding.

Detailed figures of anticipated personnel and training programs were provided by Col. William Miller and Lt. Col. Bruce Fried, when Chamber officials held their regular monthly meeting.

Chamber President Harold Smith had invited the officers, as part of the local community's effort to attract those being moved here by the base closure, which is expected to be completed by mid-1993.

The average 1,500 students undergoing training will be housed on base, but almost 700 military and civilians will not, the Iowa Parkans were told.

Anticipated to move to the area will be 308 military permanent party, 148 civilian permanent party and 236 base operations support personnel.

Most of the families will begin moving in late 1992, Col. Miller said, and training classes will begin in early 1993.

While adequate dormitory space will be provided for the military students, there is not enough housing on base for the permanent party military personnel, and civilian employees do not reside on base.

A delegation from Iowa Park is expected to travel to Chanute prior to the start of the moving, to acquaint those being transferred with the community.

The delegation possibly will join with groups from Burkburnett and Wichita Falls, and all make their presentations at the same time, it was discussed.

Indecent exposure leads to man's arrest

A 22-year-old man was arrested for exposing himself at a drive in Monday afternoon, and wound up going to jail on two different charges.

Shortly after that arrest, a deputy from Clay County and a Department of Public Safety trooper reported to the police station they were about to execute a warrant in the city.

The two officers arrested Richard Wesley Smith, 30, on a charge of burglary, according to the police blotter.

Police arrested Chris Briscoe, 16, in the 300 block of East Diamond Friday afternoon on a charge of assault causing injury, relating to an incident reported the previous Tues-

day. Briscoe was transported to county jail.

Wichita County deputies continue investigating a fight between two groups of young men Friday night at Lake Buffalo.

The incident was referred to the county, because the lake is not inside the city, after one of the groups went to K&K Quick Stop, asking for a towel to wipe blood from themselves.

Four or five persons were in both groups, and during the altercation, a small caliber rifle reportedly was discharged. However, no report was filed by either hospital in Wichita Falls concerning a gunshot victim.

A deputy picked up a group of photos from the police department in an effort to possibly identify some of those involved, according to the blotter entry.

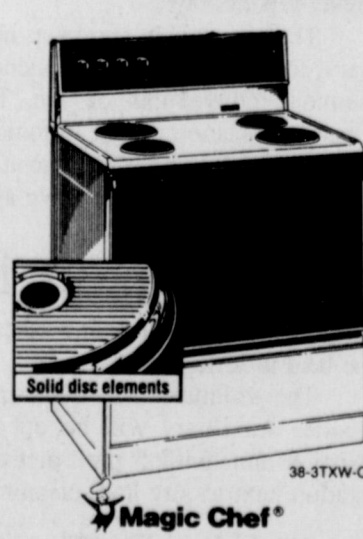

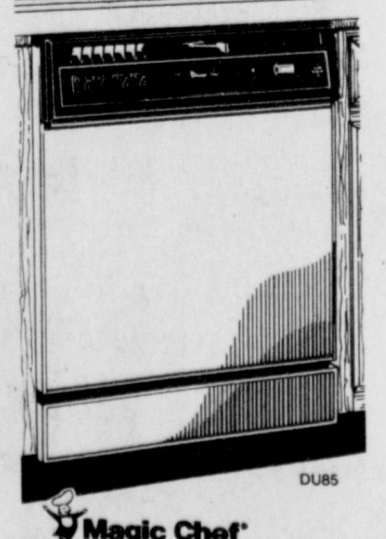

It's just amazing how much our elected and appointed governmental officials can improve our lives ... if they have enough money.

Heard about the newest pitch to raise the state gasoline tax by 10-cents a gallon?

One of the reasons is the fact that the State Highway Commission is approving projects for which there is not enough money, and now the commission chairman is dangling a carrot to get his way.

Texas already ranks 39th in the nation with a 15-cent tax after a nickel was added during Mark White's tenure as governor. Raising it another dime would make the state among the nation's highest.

Agreeing with the proposal of Dallas businessman Robert Dedman, chairman of the state commission, is another Dallasite, Rep. David Cain, who just happens to be the chairman of the House Transportation Committee, who says more funding "is a very real need."

According to an article Saturday in the *Dallas Morning News*, the highway department "must raise an additional \$750-million a year for the next seven years to complete 70 percent of state road projects slated for construction in the 1990s."

And the carrot being dangled? That lack of funding could stretch the

completion of a nine-mile project now underway in Dallas, North Central Freeway, from the predicted seven years to 20.

And Dedman added one additional carrot, by saying one-fourth of the additional \$1-billion annual windfall would go to education.

After having made a few trips to Dallas and between there and Fort

Worth, I'm convinced a lion's share of the gasoline tax money the state is now receiving is being spent in the Metroplex right now.

If they want North Central, which is to cost a whopping \$636-million for 9.3 miles, completed, why not make it a toll road, so that those who use it pay for it?

Recognitions were the highlight of Saturday's banquet. Among them were:



BANANA CAKE

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 cups flour
- 1 tsp. double action baking powder
- 3/4 cup chopped pecans
- 3/4 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 cup mashed bananas
- 1/4 cup buttermilk
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Cream shortening and sugar with mixer. Add eggs and beat until very fluffy. Add mashed bananas, vanilla and buttermilk. Beat again until mixture is well blended. Sift flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Add to other ingredients. Mix with mixer four minutes. Add pecans. Pour batter into 2 greased 9-inch cake pans. Bake 30 to 35 minutes at 350 degrees.

CREAMY FROSTING

- 1 cup milk
- 5 Tbsp. flour
- Dash of salt
- 1 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup chopped pecans (optional)

In medium saucepan, mix milk and flour. Stir until smooth. At low heat, cook until it forms a thick paste. Let cool. In a large bowl, cream shortening and sugar. Add to milk and flour mixture. Beat at high speed until light and fluffy. Add vanilla and nuts. Make sure cake is completely cool before frosting.

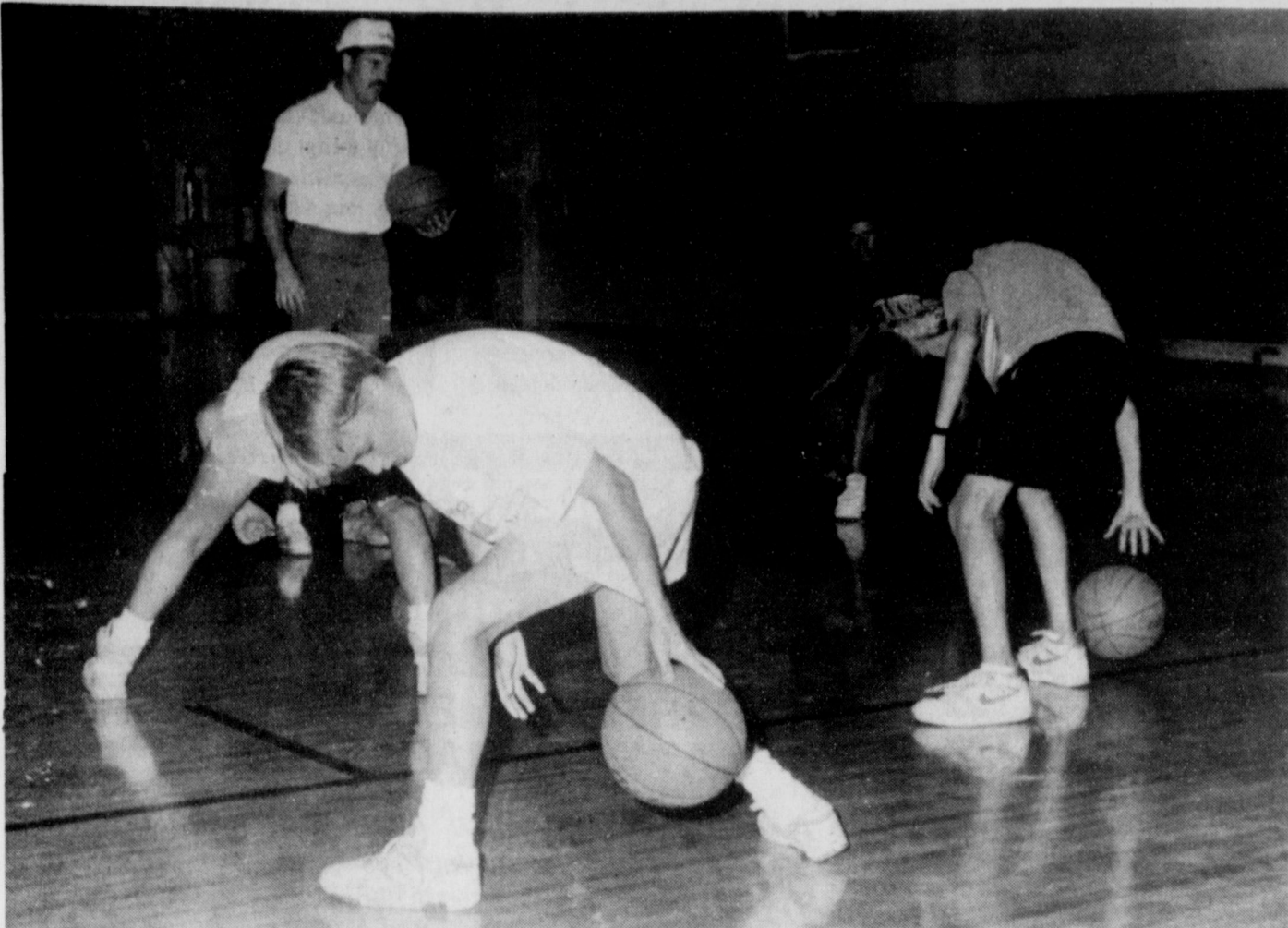

Price said one line could be laid connecting present lines at Bentwood to Quail Valley; one connecting Yucca and Quail Valley, a third from Bentwood to Yucca, and another from Quail Valley to Wigley Road.

No action was taken on the proposal, since none was called for on the meeting agenda. However, aldermen indicated acceptance of the project.

The council decided to give the city's old fire truck to Cameron Gardens Volunteer Fire Dept., rather than attempt to sell it at auction.

The truck, which no longer met state requirements because of its age, was displaced when a new pumper truck was purchased.

An offer of \$1,500 as a trade in on the new truck was turned down, and one alderman pointed out the Cameron Gardens volunteers often aid Iowa Park's firefighters on calls.

The Cameron Gardens department had expressed an interest in the old truck.

Council members also approved a resolution giving the city's support to the concept of a regional landfill.

Also during the meeting, former alderman Bud Mercer was presented a plaque for his service to the community during three terms of office, and Karla Hopper was recognized as the city's employee of the month.

The council had another of its work sessions scheduled for Tuesday night.
