JULY 4TH *Not a holiday for everybody*

Iowa Parkans are looking forward to next Wednesday for different reasons.

For most residents, July 4th will be a holiday, with all public offices closed as well as most businesses.

However, for members of the volunteer fire department, as well as city police, July 4th is usually a day of pressure-packed work -- because of fires and fireworks.

Due to the extremely dry conditions, fires can easily be ignited by

fireworks. One such fire, in a plowed field of wheat stubble west of the city, was fought Tuesday night.

Firemen determined it had been ignited by fireworks.

Police Chief Wayne Parsons said his staff would be enforcing the city ordinance, enacted some three years ago, which prohibits any fireworks inside the city.

Fireworks are not only disallowed for sale in the city, but the mere possession violates the ordinance.

Volunteer firemen have for the

past few years spent the entire holiday at one of their stations, to be ready for emergency calls to scenes where fireworks have caused blazes.

Street work prohibits parking for residents

Portions of three streets in the city will be closed not only to normal traffic but also to parking by residents this weekend for repairs.

Crews will be applying a slurry mix on the asphalt surfaces, and no traffic of any kind will be permitted.

Barricades will be put into place at 7 a.m.

The streets include East Emerald, South Victoria and West Chestnut.

Work on the 400 to 600 blocks of South Victoria and 300 block of East Emerald will be done Friday,

June 29, and Monday, July 2.

West Chestnut, from FM 368 to the treatment plant, will be closed Saturday and Sunday, June 30 and July 1.

Residents in the affected blocks should seek alternate parking places for their vehicles, such as at the ends of the blocks or in the alleys.

Vehicles parked in driveways after work is commenced will not be permitted to leave until the barricades are removed, according to the city's public works office.

Swimming pool schedules special events for July 4th

A three-division diving contest will be the major feature at the Bicentennial Swimming Pool July 4th, and competitors will be vying for some significant prizes.

The three divisions will be composed of elementary-age children, junior high and high school/college-age students.

Additionally, a coin dive in the shallow part of the pool will be open to children 10 years old and younger. Those participating will keep all the coins they find.

The elementary diving contest will be held at 1 p.m., junior high at

2 and high school/college at 3.

First and second place prizes in all three divisions include a book of 10 tickets for first place and five free passes for second place.

Members of the pool staff will serve as the judges.

A new session of swimming lessons will begin July 9 and continue through the 20th.

One-hour classes, to be held in the evenings after the pool closes to the public, will be available for beginners, advanced beginners and intermediates.

Registration can be made at the pool during regular business hours.

Gov. Clements appoints former resident a judge

Former Iowa Park resident Tom Neely was appointed Tuesday by Gov. Bill Clements as judge of the 46th State District Court, which includes Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger counties.

The appointment is to be effective July 1.

Neely was running unopposed as the Democratic party candidate for the

post on the November general election ballot. Since 1987 he has served as Wilbarger County Attorney.

The Vernon native returned from here to his hometown in the late 1970s. While here, he practiced in Wichita Falls. During that time he served as president and director of the Wichita County Bar Association.

All police work not 'routine'

Not all cases worked by the Iowa Park Police Dept. are "routine."

Three persons from Dallas who were driving a vehicle that was reported as stolen were arrested here, taken to county jail, and later released when it was determined a Dallas officer had made a mistake on his reporting.

During a routine traffic check on a vehicle by local police late Thursday evening, it was determined the vehicle had been reported on the statewide computer network as being

stolen.

A 36 year old man and two females, 18 and 15, were taken into custody. The two adults were later taken to county jail and the juvenile to the juvenile detention center in Wichita Falls.

The next morning, all three were released after a judge determined they were involved in a civil matter.

However, the father of the juvenile female reportedly indicated he was going to take the issue farther,

because the man had apparently crossed state lines into Oklahoma with the juvenile female.

Another non-routine case was reported to the radio dispatcher at 4:23 a.m. Friday.

Upon responding, the officer found a vehicle parked in the 1100 block of Second street had been struck by an unoccupied vehicle that had rolled from its parking space in the 700 block of Louisa.

The "runaway" car had no keys,

and the steering wheel was in a locked position, but apparently malfunctioned and began rolling.

Damage to the parked vehicle's dented fender was estimated at \$75.

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DPS trooper likes working with his hands

Mike Negri is a man who likes to do things with his hands and be creative. And he likes to stay busy.

So, after he gets off his shift as a trooper for the Department of Public Safety, had dinner with his family, he often is found in his 12x16 air conditioned shop in the back yard of his home at 1517 Bentwood.

His current hobby is repairing, and sometimes building new, golf clubs. And he's a craftsman.

You might say, besides his work with the DPS and his family, Negri's life is golf. He plays at least twice a week: every Wednesday and often on Saturday afternoons.

His home was to have been less than a wedge shot from a course former resident Rip Smith (a building contractor who formerly was a DPS trooper), tried to develop on the northwest edge of the city.

Negri has a part-time job at the Sheppard AFB pro shop, where he works most every Saturday and Sunday morning for another Iowa Parkan, Jim Frazier, who is manager of the base course.

And when he retires, probably sometime in the next 10 years, he plans to add a 16x20 wing onto his shop and get serious about his hobby. His present shop area is

so crowded with a work bench, power tools, parts and supplies that he has only a narrow path in which to walk and work.

His estimates he has about \$5,000 to \$6,000 worth of tools and supplies in that small building.

Negri has been playing golf almost all his life. He started while an eighth grade student in Wichita Falls, playing at Weeks Park.

When asked his handicap, he smiles and says it's 10, but admits that is about to drop, because he is regularly shooting 75-77 on the long Sheppard course. Sheppard is a par 72.

A close friend who was the pro at Hillcrest Country Club at Lubbock, where he was stationed before being transferred here, got him interested in repairing clubs some 11 years ago.

Besides replacing old worn grips, or replace a bent or broken shaft, Negri can custom build a set of clubs to fit a customer.

He explains his gross revenue is small from the fruits of his hobby, just trying to get back the cost of parts used. "I don't count on it as a supplemental income. Anything above the cost of the parts, the IRS gets," he said.

"But," he added, "There's enough business here. I can see there

is a living in it (club repairing)."

"I really didn't get all that involved in club work until I moved here," he recalls. "Nobody was doing it. It's just a fun hobby. Hopefully, it will turn to full-time after retirement."

Negri was graduated in 1962 from Wichita Falls High School. He attended one year at North Texas State and another year at Midwestern State before a two-year hitch in the U.S. Marine Corps.

He entered the DPS academy in June, 1967, and married Iowa Parkan Margie Lee three months later, after graduating.

Mrs. Negri, though born at Salasaw, Okla., was raised in Iowa Park and graduated W.F. George High School the same year Mike graduated "Old High."

She is a carrier and clerk at the Iowa Park Post Office, having first worked for the postal department at Lubbock in the late 1970s.

Mike's rank is Trooper Four, which is the highest trooper rank before sergeant.

The couple has one son, Brandon, 16, who will be a junior at Iowa Park High this fall. His sport is tennis.

About the evening hours he spends in the shop, and what Margie thinks about it, Mike says, "She knows where I'm at. She's suppor-

tive of it, and she can get me when she wants me. I haven't let it get to the point that it covers me up.... not like Lubbock."

This isn't Negri's first hobby work. In fact, he became so involved in his first major hobby, that of building straight-edge knives, he reached a point where he slept fewer than seven hours any night.

It was at that South Plains city that he met the noted Ralph Bone, maker of the famous Bone Hunting Knife, and learned the skill from him in Bone's shop.

"It got to the point it wasn't fun anymore," he recalls.

His craftsmanship developed word of mouth advertising, and Mike began filling orders from all over the world. Two sporting goods stores in Tulsa, Okla. kept orders of 10 to 15 knives on his desk.

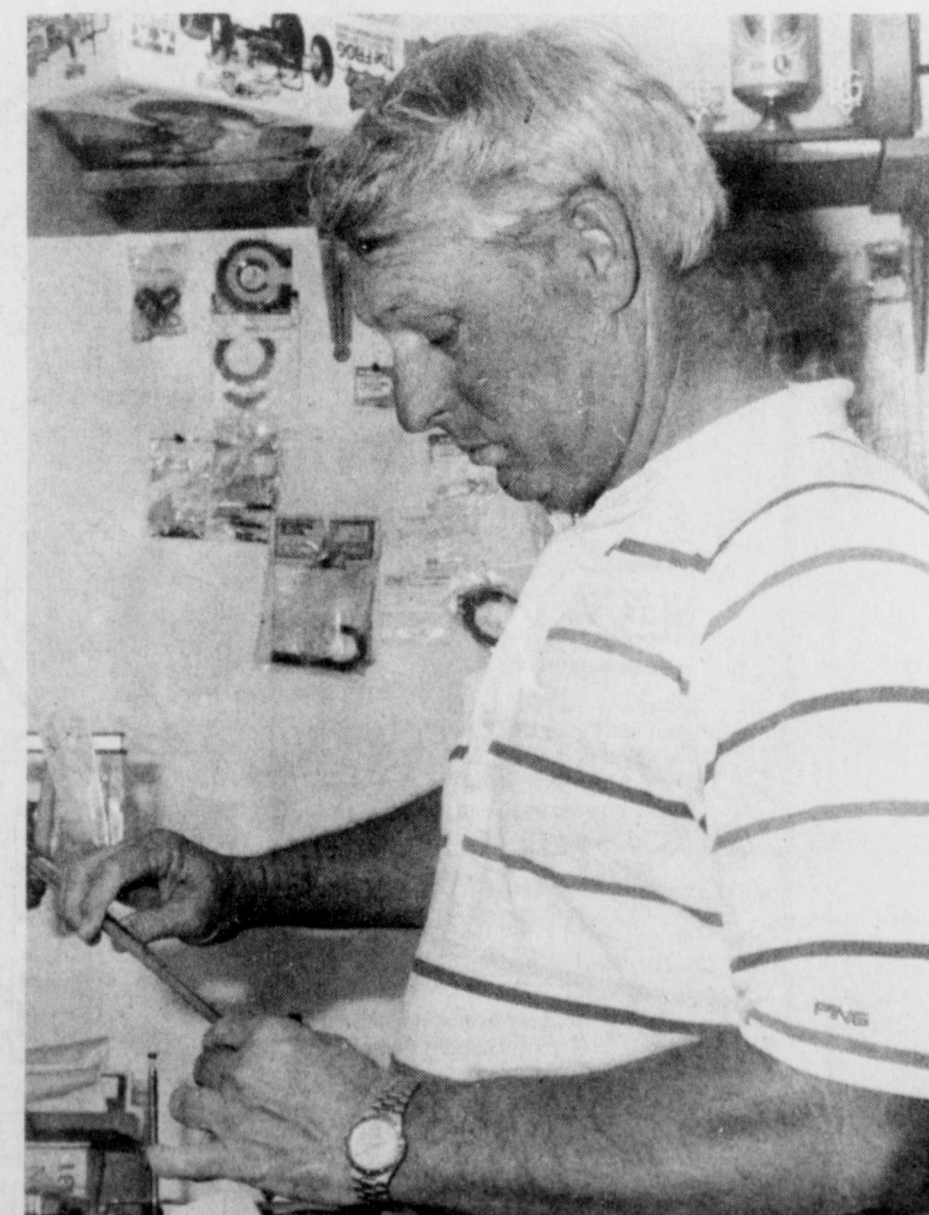
"I didn't have time to go anywhere."

Bone taught him the skill of developing blades from high grade, hardened steel that was not tempered. "I could temper the steel for what it was going to be used for," he said.

Bone later closed his business at Lubbock and moved to Colorado.

There have been other hobbies that he and Brandon could enjoy together, like building and

To be eligible for the honor, a student must earn a grade point average of 3.5 to 3.99.

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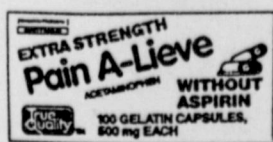

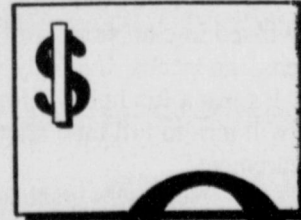

The Quickstepper teams work out of the Wichita Falls YWCA, 801 Buarnett St. and the Recreational Activity Center in Iowa Park.



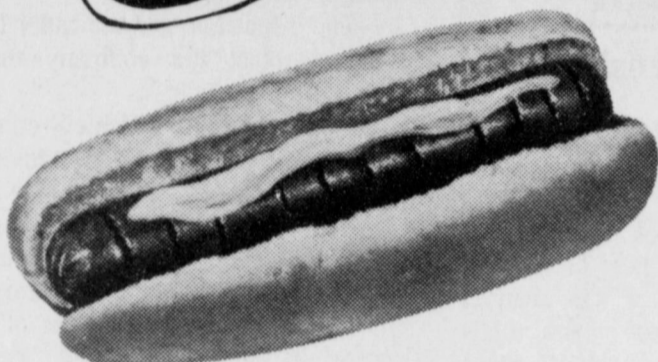

Crust:
1 cup flour
1 stick margarine
1 cup chopped nuts
Mix together and press into a 9 1/2x11 pan. Bake at 350 degrees 15 minutes. Let cool.

1st layer:
1 cup powdered sugar
1-8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
1 cup Cool Whip
Spread on top of crust.

2nd layer:
1 can pumpkin (2 cups)
2 pkgs. vanilla instant pudding
3/4 to 1 cup milk
Dash of cinnamon & nutmeg

3rd layer
Top with remaining Cool Whip and sprinkle with toasted coconut.

DEER CHILI w/BEANS

2 lbs. ground beef or diced chuck roast (I use 1 lb. ground beef and 1 lb. ground venison)
1 onion (1 cup) chopped
1 Tbsp. butter
2 Tbsp. salt
1/2 tsp. black pepper
1 tsp. oregano
1 can (8 oz.) tomato puree
2 cups water
1/4 cup catsup
2 cloves garlic, minced
5 Tbsp. chili powder
1/4 tsp. tabasco sauce
1/4 tsp. red pepper
2 Tbsp. sugar
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1/2 tsp. cumin powder
Brown meat, add remaining ingredients. Stir to blend and simmer 2 hours. Add 1/2 pound cooked pinto beans.

CARAMEL BROWNIES

14 oz. pkg. Kraft caramels
1 German chocolate cake mix
2/3 cup Pet milk
1-6 oz. pkg. chocolate chips
1 cup pecans
3/4 cup melted oleo
Melt caramels in microwave 2 1/2 minutes. Add 1/3 cup Pet milk, stir, then set aside.
Mix cake mix with 3/4 cup melted butter, 1/3 cup Pet milk and 1 cup chopped pecans. Press half of mixture in a greased 9x12 pan. Bake 6 minutes at 350 degrees. Then spread caramel mixture on top; sprinkle 6 oz. pkg. of chocolate chips on top of that, and crumble rest of cake dough on top. Bake 15 minutes more in 350 degree oven.

SUPPER NACHOS

Crumble 1 lb. lean ground beef in skillet, brown, add large onion, season with salt, liquid hot pepper sauce if desired.
Spread 1 or 2 cans refried beans in pan. Top with meat, 1/2 oz. can diced green chilies. Cover with Jack or Cheddar cheese and small bottle of red or green taco sauce. Bake covered in 400 degree oven 20-25 minutes.
Garnish with avocado dip, sour cream, red cherry pepper, and 8 cups tortilla chips.

SALSA

1 small can chopped ripe olives
1 small can chopped green chilies
4 green onions, chopped
2 large tomatoes, chopped
1 1/2 Tbsp. olive oil
3/4 tsp. garlic salt
3/4 Tbsp. vinegar
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
1 small can jalapeno relish
Mix all together and chill.

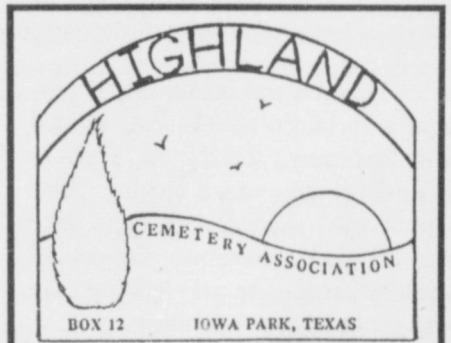

Delegates will attend sessions to help them reach goals in community service, in-depth programs and leadership roles.

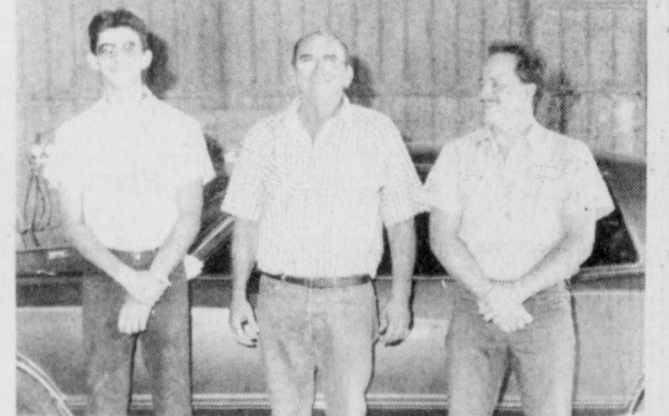
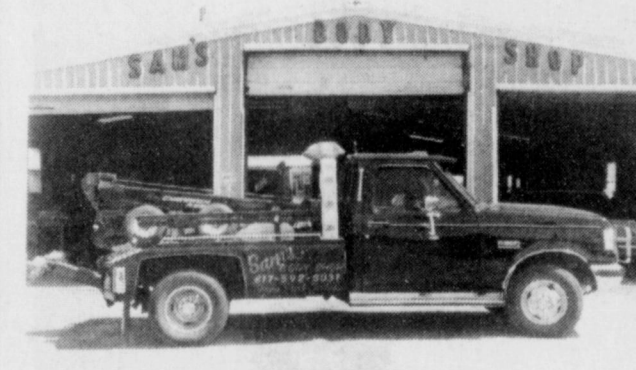
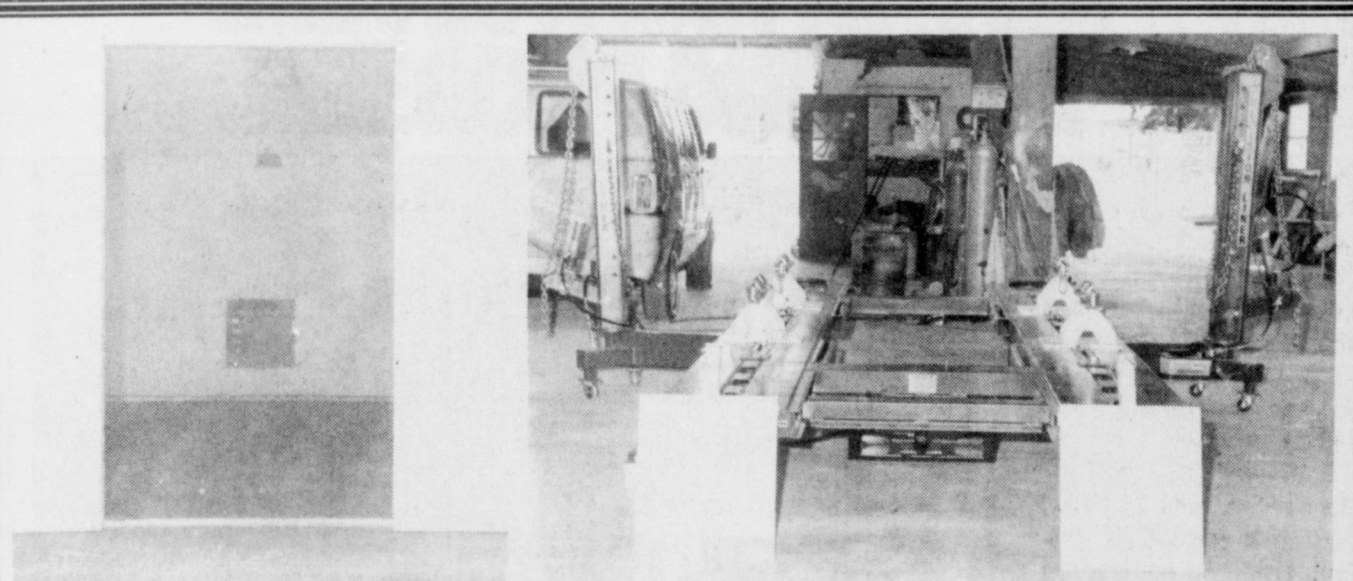

The Lions, who knocked off the Hawks 49-14 and continued undefeated until falling 22-21 to Mexia in the championship final, will open this season loaded with returnees.

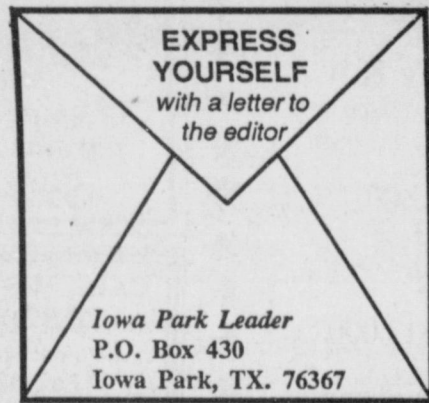
