Ongoing major projects of both the city and school are on tap for their meetings this week.

The school board will consider awarding a contract to build two structures at the vocational agriculture facility when it meets at 7:30 this evening in the administration building.

Improvement of water service

and street repairs will be one of the numerous topics to be considered by the council when it meets at 7 p.m.

School trustees also will slate dates for public hearings on the 1990-91 budget and consider requests for budget changes.

Trustees are expected to accept the resignations of some faculty members, as well as hire new personnel during the called meeting.

Two other topics, student transfer requests and placement of teachers on Career Ladder levels two and three also are on tonight's agenda.

The council is expected to authorize the city administrator to purchase materials and labor to apply a slurry coating on existing asphalt

Also to be considered is a request to authorize the administrator to advertise for materials and labor to install water lines which will loop water lines at Shiloh and Quail Valley, in an effort to improve water pressure in those areas.

A resolution will be offered authorizing to renew and extend the lease contract of Iowa Park Ready Mix at the sewer treatment plant site.

Six items are listed on the agenda under "administrator's report." They include:

* consider supporting Wichita Falls' bicycle race through Iowa

* consider authorizing a fire department carnival;

* consider authorizing travel to the annual Texas Municipal League conference in Corpus Christi in

* consider a Burlington Northern proposal for city participation in upgrading railroad crossings; and

City receives .45 moisture

Iowa Park received .45 of an inch precipitation from two showers during the past week, according to measurements recorded at the sewer treatment plant.

Wednesday's shower produced .10 of an inch, and .35 more was added Sunday.

Some east and southeast parts of the city received additional moisture from a brief shower Tuesday afternoon, but not enough fell at the treatment plant to record.

High-speed chase nets arrest

A 17-year-old former resident was arrested Tuesday evening and placed in county jail under a \$50,000 bond following a pursuit through the city by Iowa Park police.

A.D. Sparlin Jr. was charged with fleeing, after he collided with a patrol unit on US 287 at the west city limits.

Sparlin, who was uninjured in the collision, was clocked while riding a motorcycle on First Street at 53 miles per hour, a 30 MPH residential zone, at 5:29 p.m.

Patrolman Mike Stark attempted to stop the rider, and the pursuit began. At times, the youth was said to be driving at speeds reaching 70 on several residential streets, before he

left the city on the highway. Officer Stark continued his pursuit, which went as far west as Harmony Road, and twice through the crowded highway rest stop area.

At least once, the motorcyclist drove against oncoming traffic in the wrong lane, attempting to avoid the pursuing officer.

The policeman had to end his chase because of the creek at the rest stop, and had started on his way back

to the city. As he crossed the median into the eastbound lane, Sparlin had also crossed into the same lane, and crashed into the front right fender and door of the cruiser.

Sparlin scrambled to his feet, and was chased by Stark and DPS Sgt. Alton Yeakley, who was off duty but had joined the chase in his cruiser.

The two subdued the youth, just as another DPS trooper and a county deputy sheriff arrived.

Leroy Threet, whose home is at the corner of Wigley Road and Access Road, said he looked out his front window "to see what all the noise was about," just as the two vehicles collided.

Threet said one of Sparlin's tennis shoes flew high into the air, that Sparlin rolled a couple of times in the bar ditch, scrambled to his feet and began running.

Sparlin was taken before Justice of the Peace Bill Robinson, who set his bond at \$50,000, and was later transported to county jail. He was still there at noon Wednesday.

Sparlin now lists his address as a community in Alabama, and is said to be visiting here at the time. He is a former resident of Iowa Park and a student in schools here.




The anniversary cake, decorated with mauve frosting roses lent special appeal to the table decor.





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As I See It..

It's with a great deal of apprehention that I await disclosure of Iowa Park's school budget.

No, I've not asked Supt. Glen Mitchell for any details, feeling he wants to discuss it with his board first. Trustees don't like to find out what their budget will be by reading their local newspaper, and I can understand that.

But after the legislature adopted the disasterous House Bill 72 some six years ago, I can't be anything but suspicious about the new "reform" bill entitled Senate Bill 1, which goes into effect this year.

Even if I could get my hands on a copy of SB 1, it wouldn't make much difference. Officials were still making new interpretations of HB 72 three years after its passage.

state will receive additional funding from the state, as result of SB 1.

Yet, on June 29, state Education Commissioner Bill Kirby told the Legislative Education Board, "There is no way to know" how much school districts could lose until they adopt their budgets in August.

Now, how would you like to have the responsibility of a trustee facing the budgeting of the 1990-91 school year?

There are several portions to the formula of arriving at how much state funding a district will receive. I don't know them all, but some.

For instance, Sen. Teel Bivins of Amarillo, in a speech recently in Perryton explained one portion of the formula as being a tier system.

If a district's tax rate this year is You'll recall that SB 1 is the re- at least 54-cents per \$100 valuation, the state will increase its allotment per pupil from \$1,500 to 1,900.

Because Iowa Park taxpayers approved that bond issue last year, our tax rate will likely be at least 91cents. That means the state's basic funding will be \$2,620 for each pupil

Bivins didn't mention, however, that the state has changed its formula for determining a school's enrollment. It will be based on the total year's average attendance, instead of one month's attendance, as has been the process for several years.

So, does that mean the local district will not receive any money, or part of its money, based on the tier system, until sometime in the summer of 1991?

As I've said before, whatever the legislature approved in the form of additional funding to local districts, it wouldn't actually be "new" money. It wouldn't really cover those mandated expenses that came from HB 72. such as increased teacher salaries.

Until they reach a "cap" that was established in that bill, each classroom teacher received an annual increase of \$1,140. That alone raises Iowa Park's budget expenditures each year by some \$100,000. And it does not include any increases for administrators or professional and paraprofessional support personnel.

I noticed that dates for the public hearings on the 1990-91 budget will be set at a board meeting tonight. The posted agenda, however, does not call for any discussion on the proposed budget itself.

If I've given any indication that Iowa Park's board of trustees are the only ones facing budgeting problems this summer, I didn't mean to. Every board has the same problem.

I suspect Granbury's board president summed up the situation for what is going on around the state when he said, "We'll have to have a lot of meetings. We'll be scratching our heads."

Worth Quoting

They came to Hereford Tuesday and presented themselves as "Global Walkers for a Livable World," calling their effort "a journey to raise environmental consciousness."

What they didn't tell the news media, when they came to the Cattle Feeding Capital of the World, was found in flyers which they sparingly distributed: A major goal is to ban meat consumption.

Hey, pardner, them's fighting words in Hereford, Texas! Perhaps that's why they didn't emphasize the anti-beef message here, but you can bet it will be a major thrust as the walkers move on east.

The group concentrated on recycling, wind generators, solar-powered batteries, holistic medicine, recumbent bicycles and native American issues in their booths Tuesday night at "A Living World Fair" in Dam-

But their primary solution to environmental problems, according to the literature offered by some of the walkers, is for Americans to quit feeding grains to livestock, as well as poultry, and go on a vegetarian diet.

One of the group said there were about 80 members of the Global Walk. Just how many aspire to the vegetarian way of life and the philosophy of banning meat consumption was not known. Nor did they provide a flyer to the newspaper -- it was brought to The Brand by a local

"Sixty million people will starve to death this year; the same number could be saved if America reduced its meat consumption by 10 percent," is one item in the brochure.

The propaganda reports that 1.3 billion people could be fed by the grain and soybeans eaten by U.S. livestock, but there was no explanation how this could be accomplished. The literature contained one disclaimer: "This is not to say that eating any animal flesh is intrinsically bad - that is a personal, moral issue. But the facts in this flyer clearly indicate the immediate and dangerous wastefulness associated with the livestock industry and the massive consumption







Locals to attend conference on aging

A local forum for the Texas White House Conference on Aging (TWHCoA) will be held for the public Aug. 1 at 1:30 p.m. at Red Door Citizens Center, 1008 Burnett, Wichita Falls.

The forum, co-sponsored by North Texas Area Agency on Aging and the Texas Department on Aging, will provide citizens an opportunity to discuss key issues affecting older persons and their families.

Ten representives from Iowa Park's Friendly Door Senior Citizens will attend the forum, according to Myma Robinson, director.

"Similar forums will be held over the state, and the feedback gathered in local communities will be examined during the Texas White House Conference on Aging next fall," said Rhonda Pogue, director of the Area Agency on Aging at Nortex Regional Planning Commission. "We're encouraging adults of all ages to attend. Aging is an issue that will ultimately affect all of us."

Topics to be discussed at local forums may include important issues, such as health, including the cost of care and medicines; community and social services, including in-home services and senior centers; housing, including nursing homes; economic security, including Social Security and employment opportunities; and social well-being, including intergenerational and volunteer issues.

"We want to have some grassroots input on these and other issues that will affect our elderly population in the next decade and in the next century," said Ms. Pogue. "Voices we hear at our local forums can be instrumental in shaping future policy."

Forums being held around the state will be completed by Aug. 15, and the Texas White House Conference on Aging is scheduled for this fall in Austin. A date for the national White House Conference in 1991 has yet to be called by President Bush.

Several other national forums on aging have been held in Washington since 1950, with official White House Conferences held in 1961, 1971 and 1981.

According to Gary Cook, chairman of Texas WHCoA Executive Committee, Texas' conference will be held whether or not a national event is scheduled.

"The statewide conference, along with the local forums that precede it, represents an opportunity for Texas to take the lead in addressing the needs of an aging population in a changing society," Cook said.

Police Chief addresses Evening Lions

Chief of Police Wayne Parsons was a guest speaker of the Evening Lions Club Tuesday. He was introduced by Gordon Callahan.

He introduced his talk by telling of his background, with special attention to his education and training for the position that he now holds. He made it very clear that he wanted educated police officers, who were community-oriented. He said he now has 10 police officers, four dispatchers and a temporary dispatcher working in the department.

Parsons said his main goals were

to have more officer training and to keep the same service in spite of the tight economy in the area at this time. He said he would like to have better report writing and was trying to avoid cutting the police force.

The major part of the program was given to a question and answer period which gave the members an opportunity to get acquainted with him, and it also gave Parsons an opportunity to find out what the members expected of the police force. He said, "I am asking the citizens of Iowa Park to be my watchword."

He said the drug program was going to stay in the town and area and urged his listeners to be aware of the importance of reporting anything they saw that might be related to drug peddling or selling.

Sticking to native grass recommended

Many introduced grasses such as weeping lovegrass, kleingrass, old world and yellow bluestems, and bermudagrass, received freeze damage the past winter, reports Reggie Quiett, Vernon Area Range Conservationist.

For a period of approximately four months it was extremely dry and coupled with three to five days of subzero temperatures during later December, many of the grasses suffered.

Most noticeable are CRP plantings, but these are not the only stands of grass to suffer. Many pastures and range seedings received damage as well if introduced grasses were used.

Some of these grasses may come back with sufficient time and proper management while others may have to be reseeded. Each one will have to be evaluated individually to see what the needs will be. Those stands that produced two or three viable seed crops may come back on their own with proper management such as weed control and fertilized as

Knowing that the type of weather we had this past winter will occur every seven to 10 years, it may be advisable to take a closer look at native grasses. The native grasses are here for a reason, they are adapted to where we live and can withstand our climate.

When CRP first started, the seed prices of native grasses skyrocked due to a large demand and short supply and many producers elected to go with the cheaper introduced species. Prices of the native grasses have come down and are very affordable compared to past years.

It may take a little longer to get native grasses established, but once established, they will stick with you unless continuous grazing pressure forces them out. Native grasses can be used for pasture plantings and perform very well if managed correctly.

One of the native grasses of 10 overlooked as a pasture grass is switchgrass. This grass is best adapted to the sandy type soils and has tremendous potential.

If an introduced grass, such as kleingrass, is used as part of a range mixture with native grasses, consideration should be given to limiting the introduced species to no more than 25 per cent of the total mix. If the weather does kill or damage the introduced species, the remaining 75 per cent are native

species that will continue to provide grazing.

According to Quiett, often times we think that we have a new introduced species that is going to be a miracle grass. These all have their places, but let us not overlook what was growing originally, our native species.





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'Star party' is crowd pleaser at McDonald Observatory

The planet Jupiter was setting in the western horizon of the Davis Mountains just as 99 elementary students from El Paso arrived at McDonald Observatory.

Mark Bridges, senior publicist at the obervatory, began the evening's tour of The University of Texas at Austin's most celebrated research facility with a description of the giant planet and an overview of other celestial objects the students would see through the 14 and 24-inch visitors' telescopes once the sky was completely dark.

"So Jupiter is the evening star?" someone asked.

"For the time, yes," replied Bridges, explaining the progression of the planets through the heavens and the ways a planet could be identified by the naked eye.

"Your eyes are time machines," Bridges said. "We'll be looking at galaxies as they appeared millions of years ago, when the light you'll see actually left them." Bridges then directed the students' attention overhead to the star Arcturus.

"That star's about 35 light-years away, so the light we're seeing right now started its journey about the time your parents were born," he said as the students watched in amazement.

Thus began another "star party," a special offering of the observatory to visitors, the Texas public schools and other large groups.

For more than 50 years, the observatory's public information office staff has been conducting tours of the heavens as well as the observatory domes that sit 600 feet above the visitor center.

Because non-scientists get only one chance a month to see images through the 107-inch research telescope, the star parties held three times a week are the best opportunity for visitors to look directly through an eyepiece in the time-honored but outdated fashion.

That astronomers have liberated themselves from the eyepiece is one the many facts that inquisitive students quickly perceive when they visit the observatory.

When they toured the main dome, the children from El Paso's Hueco and Vista Del Sol elementaries were scanning the 107inch telescope for an eyepiece before Bridges had reached that part of his presentation. Eyepieces are no longer used, he explained, because a special television camera attached at the focal point will produce an image vastly superior for research purposes.

"How do you keep the mirrors dust-free?" asked one child.

"How long did it take to put the

telescope together?" "How do you get it to move?"

"What's that thing up there?" asked one girl, pointing to the f/9 wide-angle secondary mirror that can be put in place by an overhead crane to decrease the telescope's focal length.

Bridges, apparently pleased with the quality of inquries from such a young audience, answered a final question on careers in astronomy by saying that he preferred the role of astronomy teacher to researcher.

"The money's not all important-it's the job," he said.

The El Paso students also had the opportunity to view a number of celestial objects, including the M13 star cluster ("looks like a bunch of salt on the table," said one student). the Ring Nebula, the double-star Alberio at the foot of the Northern Cross, and for the finale, Saturn. The clear view of the ringed planet through the 14-inch telescope easily elicited the most startled reaction from the students.

Remarkable attentiveness of the large group of nine-to-12-year-olds was easy to understand once their teacher, Linda Casbeer Chew, explained the criteria for selection to the summer camp that she supervises.

Chew, a 1974 graduate of UT Austin, had obtained a \$2,700 National Science Foundation grant through UT El Paso to interest minority elementary students in science, math and engineering. The McDonald trip was one of the

activities during the weeklong camp, which also included building a solar box that could bake beans and making a solar collection unit.

Every child who really wanted to attend the camp was able to do so, Chew said. To be selected, a student was required to fill out an application and write an essay explaining why he or she wanted to attend the camp. As it turned out, there was room for exactly the number of students who followed through with application requirements.

"We wanted kids who would stick with it," said Chew, adding that the camp was intended not only for ethnic minorities, but also for female and disabled students of elementary age. Not all the students were high achievers, she said, but all were the type of kids who "would come and work at it."

Some, of course, were high achievers as well---such as the student who said his father had shown him how to locate the Orion

Although a trip to the observatory and the Davis Mountains is of tremendous educational value for any group of science students, getting there can be difficult. El Paso schools are at an advantage because the drive can easily be made in an afternoon. But school groups 600 miles away in East Texas could almost as easily visit Cape Canaveral.

remoteness of observatory deters some visitors, but it is a blessing for astronomers because the sky is unobscured by city



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The observatory may be inaccessible to many far-away Texas schools, but the McDonald staff tries to increase the accessibility of astronomy itself by offering teachers a packet of materials providing organized lab activities and other hands-on astronomy projects. The packet, which costs \$9.95 contains instructions on how to watch the sun safely and build a sundial on the ground, how to run a computer program that will show the position of the sun at any time and day of the year; how to know when and where the moon will rise, and in which phase; and how to find the constellations.

The packet includes an "armchair tour of the universe," a data sheet on the solar system, an article on the pseudoscience of astrology, a discussion of the moon's phases, and a group of pamphlets describing research at the observatory.

Also included are resource lists for astronomy instruction at all grade levels, bibliographies on astronomical topics; and an invitation to subscribe to a newsletter on teaching astronomy titled "The Universe in the Classroom."


"The best part of my job is showing people that the sky is as much a part of their world as the volcanic rocks or javelina they're possibly seeing for the first time," said Bridges. "It's just that the moons, planets and stars are much more distant.

"Astronomy is accessible and interesting at any level of understanding, from constellation and meteor shower observing to professional research at observatories like McDonald," he said.
