## Two major projects approved by council

The city council Monday night gave the go-ahead on two major projects, including the purchase of materials to seal coat 3.2 miles of asphalt paving and advertising for materials to loop existing waterlines in the northwest part of town.

Council members also gave their "blessings" to a Hotter 'N Hell delegation requesting support of the Wichita Falls project, by allowing a portion of the bike ride participants to travel through the city and using the library grounds as a rest stop.

Aldermen voted to accept the lowest of two bids to supply materials, 14,000 gallons of seal coat slurry. Low bidder, at 54-cents per gallon, was Elf Asphalt of Ardmore, Okla.

Public Works director Mike Price told the council his crews should be ready to receive the materials in about 10 days.

Though there are still questions as to where some water lines are in the northwest part of the city, and what size lines exist, council members approved a motion by Alderman Johnny Crawford to commence purchasing of pipe and acquisition of easements to loop lines in that area.

Engineer Kerry Maroney estimated the cost of materials to complete the project at \$65,000.

Looping of the lines will greatly improve the quantity of water available to residents in the Shiloh Addition, Maroney said.

He explained that the Shiloh area was on the highest point of land. Water passes through lines there and on to the Quail Valley Addition, which is on a lower level.

Because Quail Valley is lower than Shiloh in elevation, the latter area's lines are actually drained, of "siphoned," off toward the former area, he said.

Most of the pipe to be purchased will be used to loop lines along the access road, it was explained.

Roby Christie of Wichita Falls appeared before the council to ask its permission to allow bicycle riders to pass through Iowa Park, using the route for the 100-mile "bail out," for riders unable to finish the longer route.

The ride official apologized for not having approached the city earlier, as the bail out route had already been printed on maps.

Though he said the cost of the city to provide police for intersection control would not be necessary, local volunteer firemen suggested traffic control was very important, especially at the intersection of Yosemite and Old Highway.

Christie made several points about how the bicycle ride, which last year attracted some 11,000 participants, helps the entire area both for identification and economically.

Mayor Wayne House told him "We don't want to be a bunch of old soreheads. Ya'll have a good ride. We'll do our part."

With very little discussion, councilmembers approved renewal of a five-year lease of land to Iowa Park Ready Mix.

Administrator James Barrington told the council the new lease is exactly the same as the one expiring.

The concrete firm has always been located on city-owned land at the sewer treatment plant.

Another proposal that received approval was a request by the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Dept. to close off part of Cash and Wall on Aug. 11 so members could put on a fund-raising carnival.

Chief Danny Skinner explained the annual street dance sponsored by the department had failed to raise needed funds the past few years, so members wanted to try something new.

The "carnival" would be similar to the annual Whoop-T-Do sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

Besides a water polo concession, some 11 booths will be in the area. Aldermen agreed to use a water pump replacement in the Buffalo which provides water for treatment at the city's plant. Cost was set at \$4,700.

Two other proposals were approved by the council.

One authorizes travel for aldermen and key staff members to the Municipal League meeting in October in Corpus Christi.

The other was to waive all fees for

## Elementary supplies are listed

Registration dates for elementary and junior high students who did not attend Iowa Park schools last year, and supplies for elementary pupils were announced this week by the principals.

Students who will be attending Iowa Park schools for the first time, and who have not already pre-registered, should register either Aug. 16 or 17, between the hours of 9 a.m. to 12-noon, and 1-3 p.m. at their respective campuses.

Pupils who will attend early childhood through second grade will register at Kidwell Elementary; grades three through five are at Bradford Elementary, and grades six through eight are at the junior high.

## Juvenile, theft cases almost overload police

Juvenile cases and thefts almost filled the police blotter this week.

A phone call from a suspicious resident in the early morning hours Monday led to the arrest of at least one juvenile, and broke up a massive theft of two and three wheel vehicles in the east part of town.

Police were notified at 1:35 a.m. by a man who said he went outside to see what dogs in the neighborhood around the 1000 block of East Highway were barking at.

He told the police dispatcher that he had seen a tall white male pushing a three-wheel vehicle down the street, and when he shined his flashlight in that direction, the suspect ran, leaving behind the vehicle.

The first officer on the scene found the vehicle on Saratoga. He began checking a newly-established used vehicle lot in the neighborhood, and found where a six-foot hole had been cut in the fence.

Further investigation turned up two more three-wheelers and a dirt bike that had been taken from the fenced lot.

Officers also found an automobile parked in the 900 block of West Pasadena, and soon took into custody a 16-year-old male and Bryan Scott Garcia, 17.

## Trustees to view budget

Iowa Park school trustees will get their first look at the proposed 1990-91 budget when they receive their hand-delivered copies Friday.

The finance committee is to have a work session Monday with Supt. Glen Mitchell, and the entire board will meet Tuesday to study the financial plan.

Mitchell said the board is expected to continue its study of the budget again Aug. 16, and trustees may want to meet at least one more time before adopting it Aug. 30.

## Board meeting Tuesday night

Iowa Park school trustees will hold a called meeting at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday at the administration building, primarily to hear a report on the district's tax appraisals and take their first look at the proposed 1990-91 budget.

The tax report and adjustments for the months of June and July will be considered, as well as accepting the certified tax roll of appraised values.

Also on the agenda is employment of new personnel.

Supt. Glen Mitchell said a replacement for former high school art teacher and coach Barry Lucy may have been found by that time.

During interrogation, both the juvenile and Garcia reportedly admitted to involvement in the thefts, signing confessions, and implicated at least two other males.

A warrant is being filed against Larry Ross Duvall, 17, police said.

The juvenile was released to his mother after being arrested, and Garcia was taken to county jail.

"I can't emphasize too strongly about the need of citizens calling in suspicious activities," commented Ray Smock, department investigator. "If that man had not called, we might not ever have found the vehicles and who took them."

Enroute to the police station with their suspects following the arrests, one officer had to stop another vehicle that

resulted in another arrest.

James Monroe Hawkins, 36, was stopped at 2:26 a.m. at Wall and Pecan and charged with public intoxication. He was released at 8:20 a.m. after paying a \$187.50 fine, according to the blotter.

Another theft of sporting equipment, though believed unrelated to the earlier arrests, was reported to police early Monday morning.

A resident of the 100 block of East Garden told police a trailer and two surf jets had been stolen.

The trailer, which reportedly had a special lock on it when the owner saw the equipment the evening before, was found empty and abandoned on FM 367

## Teachers advance on career ladder

School trustees in a called meeting Thursday night approved a proposed list of teachers on Career Ladder levels two and three, hired six new teachers,

accepted resignations of four, and accepted the low bid for animal buildings.

Based on test scores, nine teachers were elevated to Career Ladder level three, and 18 to level two. The additions increased the list of level three to 19, and level two to 66.

To fund the bonuses paid teachers on the Career Ladder, the legislature increased its allotment to \$90 per average daily attendance (ADA), Supt. Glen Mitchell explained.

The bonuses, to be paid for the school year 1989-90, includes \$3,005.70 for level three and \$1,502.85 for level two.

Resignations accepted were by Barry Lucy, James Merchant, Judy Schenk and LaRue Slack.

New personnel include: Brenda Kay Reilly, kindergarten; Mickie Jo Moody, second grade; Rebecca Ann Moore, third grade; Sharon Gail Pepiton, eighth grade English; Matthew E. Haddock, grades 6-12 choir director, and Sonya Lynn Herrell, high school science.

Lowest of five bids received to construct two buildings at the school agriculture facility was submitted by Eugene Weekley of Burkburnett.

Weekley's bid was \$51,000, including \$39,000 for the base and \$12,000 on the alternate for gates and panels. The board had budgeted \$60,000 for the project, which includes buildings to house lambs and cattle.

Highest of the five bids was \$63,350.

The board had to go back to the drawing board on the project to make cuts in the specifications, after the first

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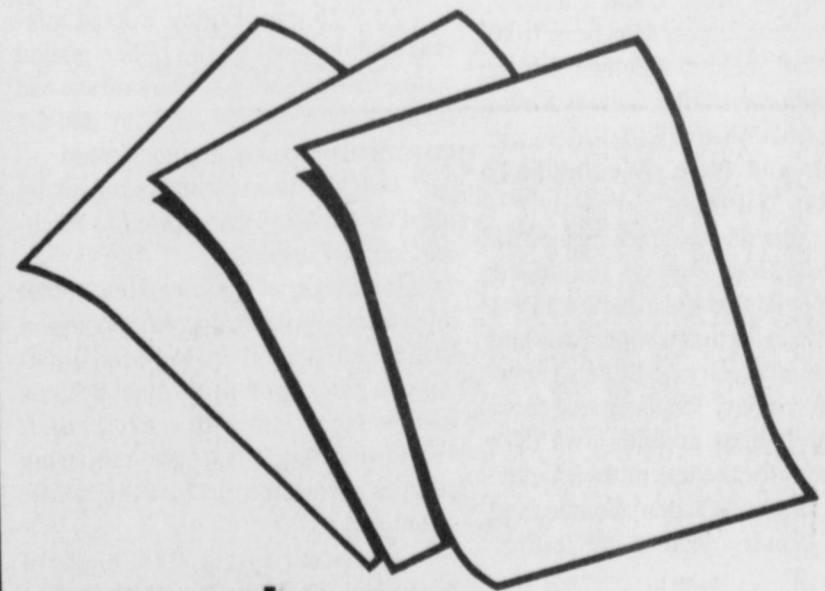
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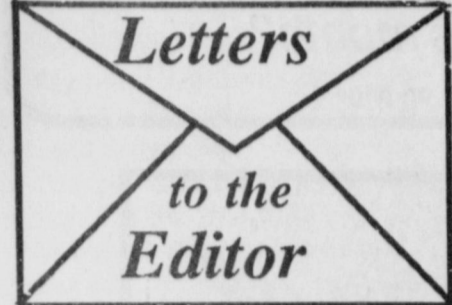
# As I See It...

supplies we are publishing this week. She explained she wanted to determine if Principal Ron Woods had picked up the correct list or incorrect list.

When I showed it to her, she quickly pointed out that there was no brand name on the water colors. I agreed, and pointed out that even if there had been I would have deleted it.

It's against the law to specify a brand name on any such list, I told her. That obviously unnerved her, and she began telling me a story I've heard from teachers for years, that certain brands of water colors just simply will not do.

I admitted I didn't know the difference, but I did know it was illegal to specify any particular brand of any type of supplies, as long as the public had to purchase them.

If a school wants a particular brand to be used in instruction, then the school itself must purchase it.

That holds true with glue, with pens, with paper, with any supplies.

Well, I was informed these students just cry when they have to purchase three or four water color brushes in a year's time, when those purchasing the "proper" brands have brushes that last an entire year.

I've been told by other teachers that the children suffer mental anguish when

near Wichita Falls. The two surf jets, valued at \$800 each, were missing.

Three reports of criminal mischief were filed with police during the past week. They included windows on the north side of Kidwell Elementary, the front door of a home in the 100 block of S. Hawthorne kicked in, and windows of a home in the 1300 block of Westridge being broken out.

An unusual number of complaints involving juveniles were listed during the week on the blotter.

Two male juveniles were picked up at 2:49 a.m. Thursday of last week while walking down a street. They were carrying a full case of Gaterade.

In the meantime, another officer found the door to a storage building at Scobee's Mini Mart unsecured.

The carton had the firm's name on it, and the juveniles, ages eight and 13, then admitted where they obtained their box, as well as implicating an adult male.

The male was initially arrested, but had to be released because the arrest was made without a warrant. Police said they expect the subject to be properly arrested this week.

The trio is also suspected of having tampered with construction barricades in the 1000 block of West Highway.

After appearing before Justice of the Peace Bill Robinson, the two juveniles were taken to the juvenile detention center in Wichita Falls.

At 9:15 p.m. Friday, a local married couple went to the police station with a 15-year-old girl who said she had been hit by a vehicle on Ruby and the driver failed to stop and render aid.

The girl was given treatment by local firemen and transported to Wichita County Hospital.

However, in the meantime, other juveniles approached police to report that the girl and others had been drinking at a party, and the girl had become involved in a fight with another girl.

Police said they are preparing charges against the girl for filing a false statement.

A resident in the 1000 block of West Louisa complained to police Tuesday that a seven-year-old boy in the neighborhood keeps breaking into his home. He said nothing was taken, however.

Police investigated, and found the screens to windows removed and damaged, and the juvenile reportedly admitted to the charges.

His case will be referred to the child protective services as a juvenile in need of supervision.

Within a short period of time just before midnight Friday, police received telephone calls from residents on Coleman and Rebecca that some boys were knocking on doors and running.

Police were unable to locate them, however.

Well, I was told, one of the major problems school teachers have is because of business people like me not supporting them.

The longer the conversation, the more frustrated our complainant became.

Almost as a threat, she said she was going to call the Texas Education Agency as soon as she left. I suggest that might be a very good idea.

Thanks to a well-manufactured front door on my office, I still have one, because one of less quality would not have survived her exit.

I've been trying to convince our principals for years of the need to educate our teachers with the law concerning school supplies. I apparently have not been convincing of the need.

But, as I see it, the real problem might possibly be other than a simple reporting of a supply list as presented.

My question is, does this teacher restrain her temper with her students any better than she did with me?

# Ranch Roundup Aug. 17-19

This year's event is set Aug. 17-19, and as usual, will be held at the Wichita County Mounted Patrol Arena on FM 369.

The Roundup pits ranch hands from 11 of the largest, most legendary ranches in Texas against each other in six events which are typical of working ranch activities.

There also will be a ranch cooking contest, talent contests in categories of painting/photography, crafts and music.

A special cowboy Sunday service will be held.

The world-famous Budweiser Clydesdales will make a special 10th anniversary appearance, and will be available for viewing that Thursday at the R&B Arena.

The Clydesdales will be performing both evenings of the Roundup.

Roundup performances begin at 7:30 both evenings. Other activities, including the talent competitions and cooking contest will begin at 8 a.m. Saturday. A dance follows both evening performances at 9.

With two newcomers to the event, this year's Roundup promises to be a real "wild and wooly" showdown.

The Green Land and Cattle Co. of Albany and Johnson Ranches of Amarillo will be participating in all the cowpunching events for the first time.

During the past nine years, the Roundup has raised more than \$570,000 for the North Texas Rehabilitation Center, West Texas Rehabilitation and West Texas Boys Ranch.

The North Texas Rehabilitation Center, located in Wichita Falls, provides therapy to thousands of people with a variety of disabilities. The Roundup is one of the largest special events to raise money for the Center's therapy program.

The West Texas Rehabilitation Center, with facilities in Abilene and San Angelo, offers long-term therapy to handicapped people of all ages.

The West Texas Boys Ranch, located in San Angelo, was established in 1947 to help boys who are behind in school and have a history of truancy. The ranch has cared for almost 1,200 boys with the assistance of contributions from programs such as the Roundup.

Tickets to the Roundup are \$9 for reserved seats. Admission to the dances is \$5 per person. Tickets for the Saturday afternoon events are \$3 for adults and \$1 for children.

The third warrant reportedly was issued by the Texas Department of Corrections, for violation of probation.

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## Frenchman testing Texas hospitality

Cecile Jonchere from Bougival, France, has been experiencing the famed hospitality of Texas and of Iowa Park, "The Friendly City," in particular since July 13.

"I'm impressed with the friendliness of the people," the attractive 17-year-old said in her heavy French brogue.

A guest in the home of Kristi Lane, Cecile's trip to Texas is under auspices of Nasal Cultural Exchange. Purpose of the program is for young people to learn about America and to live in the homes of American families.

Cecile arrived in Detroit with 60 other French students. They had to pay their own airfare and have their spending money. She arrived in Iowa Park July 13 and will leave Aug. 8.

Although Kristi is single and works a 3 to 11 shift at Heritage Manor, Cecile has been well chaperoned and has been a guest of a First Christian Church family each evening.

Cecile has just completed schooling which is equivalent to our high school and in the fall will enter a university in Paris where she will major in Math and Physics.

She has had a little trouble adjusting to the time change in Texas. France is seven hours ahead of the time here.

One of the first differences Cecile noticed after arriving in Texas was the flat land. She lives in an area near Paris that has hilly and rolling terrain. But, she likes the country here, "you can see so far."

Because English is a required subject in French schools, she has had little difficulty in understanding or being understood.

All of her family can speak English, but at home they speak French. Her mother does not work outside the home. Cecile has a sister, 23, and a brother, 20.

Her father is an engineer in the oil and natural gas business and had an opportunity to move to Washington, D.C., but because of the crime rate in that city, he decided not to take the job. Cecile lived in Indonesia for one year while her father worked there.

She has heard about the "hot" weather in Texas, but as yet she has not experienced any 100-degree temperatures. The average temperature in Bougival is 70. "Sometimes it gets a little warmer than that, but we do not have central air, or even use fans, because we do not need that much cooling," Cecile explained.

Some of the low sprawling homes Cecile has seen in Texas are most unusual to her. In France the houses are two-story.

The roads are confusing to her. "I have had a problem trying to figure out how you know where you are going. Also seeing all of the big cars is different from home where everyone drives small cars."

Persons must be 18 years old before they can get a drivers license in her country. When they are 16 they can drive if someone in the car has had a drivers license for at least five years. There is only one traffic light at the intersections and they are placed where stop signs are here.

Some other things new to Cecile are drive-in banks and medicine cabinets in the bathroom.

"Texan eating habits are different to ours" said Cecile, "we do not snack between meals, and we really have meals."

She said they have sandwiches, using bagels instead of sliced bread as is our custom, but they use sandwiches for picnics.

Their typical meals consist mostly of vegetables, salads, fruits, cheese and yogurt. Cecile drinks hot tea and water.

Kristi says Cecile had chicken every day for a week, but she liked it that way. "I love chicken," she commented. "We do not have chicken very often at home because it costs so much."

She can get Mexican food in France, but it isn't like the Mexican food here. Her favorites are fajitas and guacamole. She has been to a backyard barbecue and has eaten her first goulash and snow cone.

Cecile has been to Six Flags and Wet 'n Wild, the Fort Worth Zoo, to movies, swimming, the Putt Putt course, and to a soccer game (which they call football in France). In the metroplex area they stayed with Kristi's grandparents.

Cecile enjoyed her trip to the Earl Scheffe Farm where she saw horses, donkeys and wild sheep and caught grasshoppers. "I hadn't seen a lot of insects here," she said. They also toured the Bill Lane farm. She had seen most of the animals before, but because she lives in town, they are not a common sight. She also went to the recent tractor pull.

Other activities she has experienced since she has been here include a visit to the Wichita Falls Museum and Art Center, the Falls, a water skiing trip and bowling. She has been snow skiing many times, but water skiing was a first for her.

An unusual activity for Cecile was to be an assistant Bible School teacher at First Christian Church with Kristi last week. She is a Catholic and they do not have Vacation Bible School in Bougival.

Kristi will host a going away

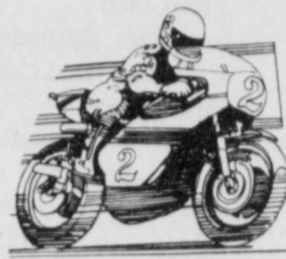
party Saturday for Cecile. When she departs Iowa Park she will return to France with a number of souvenirs of her Texas trip, including an Iowa Park T-shirt and sweat shirt, a book of Texas, neon sunshades (which she cannot get in France), a sun visor, and a large stuffed bear among other things.

When Cecile gets back home, she has another trip planned. She soon will go to Spain.

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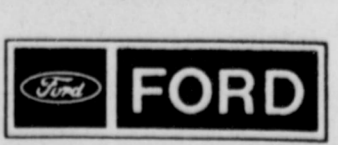
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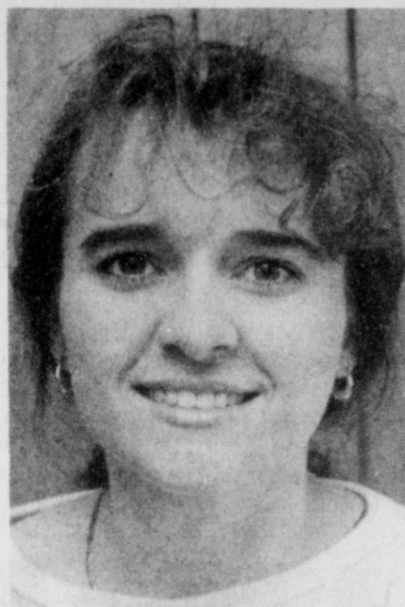
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# Cook of the Week

Dee Ann and her mother recently made a batch to send to her brother, Glenn, in Miami, Fla., who is a sales representative for the NBA basketball team Miami Heat.

All of Dee Ann's recipes look as though they would be delicious, and any mother would be happy to have a daughter like her helping in the kitchen.

### GRANDMOTHER WILSON'S BUTTER ROLL

1 recipe of biscuit dough (I use Pioneer Biscuit Mix or Bisquick)  
Butter (real butter is best)  
Sugar  
Vanilla  
Hot water  
Milk

Make biscuit dough according to directions. Divide into 2 parts. Roll out to about 1/8" thickness. On edge of roll put about 2 pats of butter. Put 2 tsp. sugar on top of butter and 1/4 tsp. vanilla on sugar. Roll about 1 1/2 times. Cut this portion off and place in oblong baking dish. Continue to make rolls and place in baking dish until the dish is full but not crowded. Bake at 400 degrees.

Cover with 3 cups of boiling water and cook until dough is brown. Add 1 cup milk and continue to cook for 5 minutes.

### PUDDING CHIP COOKIES

2 1/4 cup unsifted all-purpose flour  
1 tsp. baking soda  
1 cup butter or margarine  
1/4 cup granulated sugar  
3/4 cup firmly packed light brown sugar  
1 pkg. (4-serving size) vanilla instant pudding  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1/2 tsp. cinnamon  
2 eggs  
1 pkg. (12 oz.) peanut butter chips or chocolate chips  
1 cup nuts (optional)

Mix flour with baking soda. Combine butter, sugars, pudding mix and vanilla in a large mixing bowl; beat until smooth and creamy. Beat in eggs. Gradually add flour mixture; then stir in chips and nuts. (Batter will be stiff.) Drop from tsp. onto ungreased baking sheets, about 2 in. apart. Bake at 375 degrees 8-10 minutes. Makes about 7 dozen.

### ICING

4 tbsp. cocoa  
1 stick oleo

1 tsp. salt  
1/2 cup cooked rice  
2 tbsp. oleo  
6 crackers, crushed  
1 1/2 cup grated cheese  
Dash pepper

Cook broccoli and onion until tender, drain, add salt, pepper, soup, milk, rice and 1 cup cheese. Pour in baking dish. Put remaining cheese on top. Add cracker crumbs and oleo on top of cheese. Bake at 350 degrees 30 minutes or until brown and bubbly.

### DEVIL FOOD CAKE

Mix:  
2 cups flour  
2 cups sugar  
Put in pan:  
1/2 cup shortening  
1 stick oleo  
4 tsp. cocoa  
1 cup water  
Let melt, bring to a boil, pour into flour and sugar mixture.

Add:  
2 eggs  
1 tsp. cinnamon  
1/2 cup buttermilk  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 tsp. soda  
Bake at 350 degrees 30 minutes. When almost done begin icing.
