Tax cut is likely by city council

With at least one, and possibly two, more meetings to be held before the city adopts its 1990-91 budget, it appears Mayor Wayne House is going to be able to reach his objective of cutting taxes.

During Monday night's council meeting, called for further study of the finances of the city for next year, it was pointed out that the budget was built using an 8.5-cent tax reduction. If finally approved, the city's tax

rate would be set at 80-cents per \$100 valuation, down from the current rate of 85.5-cents. And the cost for citizens possibly

will be reduced even more, depending on the rate for treated water that gets council approval.

While Mayor House said a 10-percent reduction would be acceptable to him, Alderman Johnny Crawford is calling for twice or even three times that much of a reduction.

The city budget is figured in two parts, the General Fund and the Water and Sewer Fund.

The proposed budget calls for expenditures during the coming fiscal year, which begins Oct. 1, in the General Fund of \$1,661,000, and in the Water and Sewer Fund of \$972,000, for a total of \$2,633,200.

The current budget calls for expenditures of \$1,767,500 and \$1,065,000, respectively, for a total of \$2,832,500.

That is a reduction of \$199,300. Anticipated revenues, including the 8.5-cent tax reduction, would produce a balanced General Fund budget. The Water and Sewer Fund is expected to produce \$7,000 more than expenditures, but most of that is revenues from investments of excess funds.

Even with that much of a reduction in the budget, only one part-time position is eliminated. No other currentlyheld jobs are eliminated, Mayor House

House did make the statement,

however, that he had issued an order to Administrator James Barrington to freeze all hiring.

The reductions in the expenditures were the result of line item lowerings, when the current and proposed budgets are compared.

Administrator Barrington, during Monday's meeting, told the council the same thing he has told previous councils, that his budgets are built by using liberal figures for expenditures and conservative figures for revenues. This normally produces a carryover, he admitted.

The department which experienced the greatest reduction, when the current and proposed budgets are compared, is the Public Safety Department, which includes both police and fire depart-

That budget was reduced \$57,900. Public Works Department was reduced \$41,275; Administration, \$22,900; and Community Service was increased \$15,575. Total reductions in the General Fund amounted to \$106,400.

The Water and Sewer Dept. budget was reduced by \$85,900.

Revenues in the General Fund are expected to be down \$57,000 from last year, while the revenues for the Water and Sewer Fund are expected to be up

A part of the lower revenues for the General Fund is the fact that taxable values inside the city were \$100,000 lower for the coming year than they were for the current tax year.

UP FROM 81-CENTS Trustees studying 15-cent tax hike

The school board's meeting room 7:30 p.m. was filled far beyond its capacity Tuesday night, when trustees were asked to consider a proposed balanced budget that had been calculated on a 96-cent tax rate.

So crowded was the room, with teachers, that many of them were forced to sit with campus principals and the tax collector in more than a dozen folding chairs set in the hallways outside.

Board chairman Jerry Reed told the crowd that members of the budget committee and Supt. Glen Mitchell had worked some four hours the previous night, going over a budget that was the result of several months preparation.

To fund the \$2,453,116 expenditures during the 1990-91 school year, the 1989-90 tax rate of 81-cents would have to be raised to 96-cents.

The proposal includes only a fourcent increase to fund the school's operation for the coming year.

The remaining 11-cents are to make payments on the bond issue that was approved by the district's taxpayers last fall.

No action was taken by the board on the tax increase, however, other than to agree to discuss it further, at a meeting Tuesday and again Thursday of next week. Both meetings are to begin at

In his cover letter for the budget, Supt. Mitchell wrote:

The proposed budget for the 1990-91 school year is the culmination of several months of preparation and planning by our staff. It is the first balanced budget that has been presented to the board in the past five years. The proposed budget includes a \$.04 increase in the maintenance and operating tax rate as well as an \$.11 increase in the debt service tax rate. Information on how the proposed tax increases will effect the

tax payer and the budget are included in the enclosed support information.

"The proposed budget does include the \$1,500 above state salary schedule for teachers plus the \$300 for those living in the school district.

"There are several major decisions listed in the support information for your consideration. There is also a recommendation on a major purchase of computers for the school system that is tied to enrollment.

"The bond construction revenue and expenditures portions of the budget ar e not included in the proposed budget since this is flow through money that would not give a true budget picture. This information will be in the budget that you approve on August 30.

Every effort has been made to study the budget closely and eliminate items

that are not justifiable. Over \$120,000 in capital outlay items, supplies, and services have been deleted in order to present a balanced budget," he wrote.

The Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Dept. will hold a major fund-raising event Saturday, in the form of a carnival.


It will begin at 10 a.m. and conclude at 5 p.m., and will be in the area of Wall and Cash streets.

It is a two-year early admissions program that allows students who are especially talented in science and mathematics to take their last two years of high school and first two years of college concurrently in resident on the University campus.


Upon completion of the program, the Iowa Park student will receive a high school diploma from the Academy and 60 hours of college credit from the University.

we're trying to reach a balanced budget. We've had deficit budgets the past two years to cut the carryover. We're not after one group, just what's best for the teachers and the taxpayers. If we go from 96-cents to \$1.18 next year to reach full entitlement, it would be catestrophic. We cut all capital outlay last year. This year we're going to have to bite the bullet and catch up. At some point in time, the above base (salary) will have to be looked at. I understand we're the highest in the area."

Randy Catlin: "There are a lot of places we could cut, but I would like to keep if we can."

Sherri Kennedy said, "I agree with them both (Catlin and House), but I'm not sure some fat (is there) that can be cut. To cut above base would be the last option. If cuts affect students, then salaries must be cut."

Reed said, "If there's areas where there is fat, we need to tell Mr. Mitchell and let him try to convince us he needs

Keith Fisher said, "It's going to be expensive whatever we do. But we could be heroes or bums in 1994 (relating to a schedule of mandated tax increases in SB 1 to receive maximum state fund-

According to a schedule of the effect a 96-cent tax rate would have on a home valued at \$50,000, the tax would increase \$75 over the 1989-90 rate of 81-

Revenues would include: \$2,991,500, or 46.24 percent, from state; \$3,381,559, or 52.26 percent, from local, and \$97,043, or 1.5 percent, from fed-



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

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
