



Those who are interested in the summer jobs covered may apply to take the written test on or before three filling dates - Dececber 5, 1969, January 9, 1970 and February 4, 1970, Representative Burleson stressed that applications for the written test postmarked after February 4, 1970, will not be accepted. If you miss the last test, you can not be considered for jobs filled by this application and for maximum consideration, you should apply as soon as possible.
