# School budget, tax voting set tonight

School trustees will adopt the 1990-91 budget and set a tax rate to fund it at a called meeting tonight.

The meeting is to begin at 7:30 p.m. in the junior high library.

As has been the board's custom in recent years, a reception for new teachers in the system will begin half an hour earlier than the meeting.

Cuts made at the direction of trustees, since the original budget was proposed, amount to \$67,059. However, \$5,200 not in the original budget has been added.

The budget calls for expenditures of \$6,407,841.

Yet to be determined will be the tax

Supt. Glen Mitchell continues to appeal to the board to adopt a rate of 96cents per \$100 valuation.

That would be a 15-cent increase over the 1989-90 rate of 81-cents.

Eleven cents is required for debt service, created when voters in the district last fall approved a \$2.75-million

The superintendent's proposal is to increase taxes above the debt service requirement by four cents. He explains there are several items that are needed this year which are not included in the budget, as well as additional needs which will be identified for 1991-92, as well as the state's formula to receive maximum state funding.

Needed but not included in the budget are: Extended Living Center teacher; new school buses; computers and software; air conditioning for elementary school cafeterias which was deleted from construction projects because of a lack of money; parking lot paving, and furniture that was deleted from the bond money.

Cuts which contributed to deletion of \$67,059 included: Barry Lucy's salary for one semester; athletic trainer cost; choir chairs; baseball pitching mound; Extended Living Center teacher; administrators' and counselors' salaries; property insurance; maintenance; journalism, and weed eater.

Added to the original budget were \$200 for junior high special education and \$5,000 for higher gasoline prices.

# Council's meeting has heavy topics

# Street work, park conditions, RAC highlight city business

Improvements at city parks, more streets designated for work, completion of the Recreational Activities Center and additional work on the Colorado paving project were highlights of Monday's city council meeting.

After viewing a slide film presentation on the condition of the city's parks and equipment, a lengthy discussion was held concerning possible routes of improvements to be taken.

The city's landfill will be closed

Monday, in observance of the Labor

Day holiday, according to Mike Price,

Mayor Wayne House commented, "It's all leading to creation of a parks department."

Playground equipment and picnic benches were all in a poor state of repair, the photos indicated.

"You can't expect Mike (Price, public works director) to pull off his people (from street and water work). We need some other prople to do park

Alderman Johnny Crawford proposed an overall master plan, "...to see direction over the years by this and following councils.'

The mayor agreed, but suggested the immediate need should not have to wait for an overall plan.

Former alderman Bud Burch said the council might set priorities on the parks, and possibly do away with those that seldom are used. A suggeston by Dee Decker was to

declare a park day, similar to the annual clean up project, during which residents might volunteer their work in cleaning and improving the parks. The outset of the discussion was to

have a list of work needed to be done ready for consideration at the next meeting of the council.

Twenty nine more blocks were identified to have a slurry coating applied to their asphalt paving, though a time schedule was not made.

Identified were portions of Park Plaza, First, Alameda, Washington, Texas, Penn, Alameda, Second, Cornelia, Ruby, Garden and Poe.

A public hearing was held during which council members discussed with the Recreational Activities Center (RAC) board when and how the new facility might be completed.

The structure, located on Third Street, is almost completed, as far as was originally planned. That includes the building, office and portions of the rest rooms.

Yet to be completed are the other interior walls, floor covering, the balance of the rest rooms, the kitchen, air conditioning, parking lot and landscaping.

During the discussion, it was pointed out that one method of financing completion might be for the RAC board to solicit individual and organization pledges to fund the work, and the city complete the building and be paid back as the pledges were honored.

It was decided that information as to how much the completion work would be, with a breakdown of each phase, and have that information brought before the council in the near future.

Another topic which drew considerable discussion was the city's ordinance concerning fire and burglar alarms, which has been in force less than a year.

Also discussed was the city's program for compensatory time off, which was described as a method of saving overtime pay.

Council members decided to continue the present policy.

A changeorder on the Colorado Street construction project, which is to pave the drain area from the north side of the shopping center's parking area to West Highway, was approved.

Cost of the project is \$20,483. Also approved was a proposal to

advertise for bids to purchase a tire shredder for the city's landfill. Unshredded tires are not allowed

to be buried in a landfill. The council voted to table a proposal to spend \$18,900 on rubber rail-

road crossings to be used on Victoria. Without discussion, the council voted approval of the 9-1-1 Communications District annual budget.

# Every campus reports increased enrollment

Each campus reported increases, with Bradford Elementary and the high school counting the largest gains.

Bradford had 486, an increase of 25; high school 526, a gain of 22; Kidwell Elementary 491, 14 more than opening day last year, and the junior high had a gain of six, with 412 enrolling.

Supt. Glen Mitchell said each of the school principals anticipated still more to enroll, based on past experience that not all parents enroll their children on opening day.

# Fifth arrest made in 4-week-old case

The fifth and final arrest relating to a theft of several vehicles July 30 was accomplished Monday at the county courthouse.

Investigator Ray Smock arrested Larry Moss Dewvall, 17, on a charge of theft over \$750.

Dewvall was taken before a justice of the peace, placed under a \$1,000 bond, and put in jail.

He, another adult and three juveniles were charged with cutting the fence of a used vehicle lot on East Highway and taking several motorcycles and all terrain vehicles, which were returned to the owner.

A woman reported an attempted assault early Saturday morning, but police have not been able as yet to identify the suspect.

She told police she was returning home after taking her husband to work, when her vehicle stalled at the intersection of Texowa and Ruby.

A shirtless man offered assistance, reached inside the vehicle to shift the vehicle's gear, and then allegedly grabbed the woman by the throat and ordered her out of the vehicle.

She told police she screamed, scratched the man, possibly around the eyes, and drove away.

In another case listed on the police blotter, a man told police he had left his automobile parked at the high school Friday night, and when he returned about 2 a.m., several items had been taken.

Listed as missing were the car's sun roof, stereo, equalizer, tapes and clothing, all estimated at \$2,200.

### MARK TWAIN AND EVOLUTION

One of the fallacies that has led to a belief in evolution is a failure to recognize that one cannot always project backwards on he basis of the current situation. May evolutionists ignore that the world was covered by a flood in the time of Noah and further ignore the effect such would have on the formation of fossils, the origin of coal and oil and reach conclusions that miss the mark. Mark Twain with his vivid humor points out one cannot always know the past simply by loking at the present. The following is from his writing:

Since my own day on the Mississippi, cutoffs have been made at Hurricane Island; a Island 100; at Napoleon, Arkansas; at Walnut Bend; and at Council Bend. These shortened the River in the aggregate 67 miles. In my own time, a cutoff was made at American Bend which shortened the Riber ten miles or more.

Therefore, the Mississippi between Cairo and New Orleans was 1,200 miles long 176 years ago. It was 1,180 after the cutoff of 172. It was 1,040 after the American Bend cutoff. It has lost 67 miles since that time. Its present length is only 973 miles.

Now if I want to be one of thsoe ponderous scientific people and "let on" to prove what has occurred in the remote past by what has occurred in a given time in the recent past, or what has occurred in a given time in the recent past, or what will occur in the far future by what occurred in late year, what an opportunity is here! Geology never had such a chance, nor such exact data to argue from. Not "Development of the Species," either. Glacial epochs are great things, but they are vague.

In the space of 176 years the lower Mississippi has shortened itself 240 miles. This is a trifle over one and one-third miles per year. Therefore, any calm person who is not blind or idiotic, can see that in the Old Silurian Period, just a million years ago next November, the lower Mississippi was upwards of one million three hundred miles long and stuck out over the Gulf of Mexico like a fishing rod. And by the same token, any person can see that 742 years from now the lower Mississippi will be only one and three quarters of a mile long, and that Cairo and New Orleans will have joined their streets together and be plodding along under a single mayor.

There is something fascinating about science. One gets such a wholesale return of conjecture out of such a trifling investment of fact."

# Estelline Newman's life mirrors many roles

he attractive, soft-spoken businewoman assumed a yoga-like posin as she sat in a comfortable overered chair.

"You won't find anything interand enough to write about me," she

Reared in Freeport, she met Newt, er future husband, while he was orking for Dow and attending the Iniversity of Houston Law School.

She was 18. Had just graduated from Freeport High School and had enrolled at the university.

Her father died and her mother's health was not good, so Estelline would not leave her when it came time to enter the university in the fall.

After their marriage the Newmans lived at Lake Jackson. He drove more than 100 miles round trip a day for seven years while earning his law de-

His father, who died when Newman was a young child, wanted his son to be an attorney, so Newt pursued that career.

The Newmans came to Iowa Park in 1957.

"I don't think I could have made it after we moved here if it had not been for two friends I made when we first came. I was away from my folks and was lonely and depressed," Mrs. Newman said.

The two friends were the late Mrs. S.T. Buzzard and the late Mrs. John B. Barbour Sr. Mrs. Barbour later would become godmother to the Newman's daughter, Staci.

For a time after moving here Estelline was active in club work. She is a charter member of the Iowa Park Garden Club and Philia Study Club. She also was a member of Epsilon Sigma Alpha, the Jayceettes and Woman's Forum of Wichita Falls.

Beginning in 1964, there was a period of time punctuated with sad-Staci was just a baby and in No-

vember Estelline was diagnosed with thyroid cancer.

She waited until after Christmas to have surgery. This began a long seige of illness. But, she has been very fortunate and has had no reoccurence of the malignancy.

In 1965 Mrs. Newman's mother died and a short time later her grandmother died.

"My mother owned a dress shop in Freeport. For the next few years we made a trip there once a month to check on the business," Estelline said. They eventually sold the Velfree to the store manager.

Remembering the Velfree shop long before her mother purchased it, she had always thought the name probably had something to do with the name of the town. When her mother bought the shop from the Greek owner, she told her Velfree in the Greek language meant "coming of age."

As long as Staci was small Mrs. Newman would not work outside the home. She didn't want to leave her with baby sitters.

When Staci started to school her mother decided it would be good to have something to occupy her mind. She decided to open a sportswear shop, which she named Velfree. Staci always went to the store after she got out of school.

Estelline said all she knew about running a dress shop when she opened was keeping the books and going to market. She soon learned.

She had always had an affinity for wedding apparel. "When I was small I loved weddings and would dress my dolls in wedding finery and put them on display on our front porch," Mrs. Newman recalled.

After she opened the Iowa Park Velfree a sales representative came by with some wedding dress samples. Mrs. Newman stocked a few in the back room of the shop that was used as an office.

"I had no idea there would be such interest in bridal gowns," she said. But when customers came in, so many started going to the back room to look be good merchandising items.

Mrs. Newman began stocking bridal gowns, dresses for the attendants, tuxedos and apparel for other members of the wedding party.

She served as a bridal consultant, advising the girls on wedding etiquette, rehearsals, receptions, their announcements, etc. She gave many rehearsal parties and showers for the brides-elect.

Estelline operated the shop here 15 years before the building where it was located sold. She was assisted at that time by Leta Bedford. After the building sold, Mrs. Newman moved her shop to Wichita Falls for a short

Four years ago she and her partner, Mary Blanche Guthrie, with whom she had worked since 1975, opened the Just Because Shop. And they still stock wedding apparel.

The unusual name of the shop was really coined in fun. When they told their husbands, Newt and Junior, they wanted to open another shop their husbands naturally wanted to know

They told them, "just because we want to make our own money, or "just because we miss seeing the people," or 'just because we want to have some thing to do."

So, when they opened the shop they thought "Just Because" might be a "catchy" name. "Just because we were too old to get a job and too young for Social Security."

The Newmans did a lot of entertaining for youth when their children were young. He was a Sunday School teacher and a Boy Scout leader and Mrs. Newman worked with Cub Scouts.

She recalls one time she had Christmas parties three nights in a row. That was when they lived in a much smaller home than they now have.

They had room to set up tables for only 14 couples each night by using a large piece of plywood on top of smaller

Newman had killed deer and they were thrilled to get to share with their friends. She made tablecloths out of burlap, "because that was all I could afford at that time. I decorated them with red felt poinsettias and they looked real pretty.

"But, my feeling of elation didn't last too long,"she laughed. "I had to send Newt's suit to the cleaners the next morning and come to find out all of the other men had to send theirs too. Their suits picked up the lint from the burlap. And right there at Christmas! We could laugh about it later, but it was rather embarassing at the time," Estelline added.

The Newmans wouldn't have a problem feeding 40 or 50 friends at one time in their present home.

They built their sprawling red brick home 21 years ago. It started out to be a swimming pool, turned out to be a house, and the swimmming pool became a reality 10 years later.

Newman had always liked Spanish style houses and after a trip to Mexico his liking became more intense.

Although they had a professional architect draw up the house plans, Newman also was instrumental in the planning.

His wife says, "Newt could just as easily have been an architect as a lawyer. He has always had a natural bent for that."

The imposing structure with arched facade and red brick retaining wall sits on a graduating hill on Peterson Road. Red brick and wrought iron encloses the courtyard.

Red tile brought from Mexico is used as flooring throughout the home. It also is used on the porches and patio.

Some of their furniture also came from Mexico. Heavy double doors at the front entrance have carved panels.

Mrs. Newman didn't say if her experience at Christmas time years

ago had anything to do with the decision to have tables and chairs in almost every room in the living area.

This is also true of the glass enclosed garden room, which originally was an open patio. So much traffic noise made the Newmans decide to enclose it. There are white patio tables and chairs in this area.

The garden room looks out on the kidney shaped swimming pool that is surrounded by more white tables and chairs.

One side of the back yard, near the pool, is lined with colorful blooming crepe myrtle. Foliage plants are noted in other areas around the yard.

After the pool was built swimming parties were held for their children and friends.

To one side of the garden room is a connecting guest area that affords a bath, a kitchenette with refrigerator and microwave oven, and a combination living-dining area.

Currently Mrs. Newman is utilizing this as her "sewing" room, "I wish I could say that I can sew, but I

can do only enough to upholster furniture. I guess you could say that is my hobby.

Upholstering is what she is doing now. Staci has been living at home but is planning to move to Wichita Falls where she is employed. Her mother is upholstering some furniture for her to move to her apartment.

Newman's primary hobby is farming his 100 acres of land where their home is located. He also likes to hunt and he and one of his sons have a deer lease they make an effort to visit each year.

They now have the fourth generaton "Newt" in their family. Newman's father was named Newton and called Newt, as is the attorney. They have a son, Newt III, and he has a son, Newt IV.

Newt III is married to a former Iowa Park girl, Carol Sharp. They live in Coral Springs, Fla. and he is area manager for Linear Products. They have three children.

Another son, Randy, is in construction work in Boston.

The Newmans are members of First Christian Church.

Estelline says if things go as planned she will start playing bridge at the RAC this fall.

A team of doctors, nurses, and dietitians from the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston taught campers about exchange diets, blood sugar level testing, exercise effects upon blood sugar, and how to give their own insulin injections.

A well-trained staff supervises each camp activity with a ratio of just three campers to each counselor.







# Peach tree care explained to Evening Lions Club

Virgil Woodfin gave a program on starting a peach orchard in the fall Tuesday for the Evening Lions Club. He was introduced by Lee Pelz.

Woodfin advised those who were interested in planting peach trees in the fall to select trees that were three or four feet tall and to plant at least three varieties the first year, then add another variety each year. He said the winter varieties that do well in this area are: Ranger (his favorite), Red Globe, Red Skin, Loring and Jefferson, all freestone peaches, and Scentinal, a cling peach.

Woodfin warned about the danger of the peach tree bore and told how to spray the trunk of the tree each year to keep it out. He said if bores were already in the tree to apply PDB crystals around the trunk of the tree in the fall, then get rid of the crystals in the spring. He also discussed the damage of the scale insect that works on the bark of the trees, and again advised spraying the trees after the leaves have fallen off and again in the spring.

The program closed with a long question and answer period which attested to the interest club members had in peach tree planting and the care of the trees.


